# TRIBUTE AWARD WINNERS ANNOUNCED, LTBB'S STACEY ETTAWAGESHIK AMONG THOSE HONORED

Highlighted below are a few of the accomplishments of this year's community-nominated Tribute award recipients.

Advocate Award

Stacey Ettawageshik, Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians

Stacey Ettawageshik has helped put a name to the silent crime of domestic violence. She is the Domestic Violence Project Coordinator for Victim Support Services at Little Traverse Bay Bands (LTBB) of Odawa



Indians.

Ettawageshik created LTBB's Survivor Outreach Services from the ground up and has helped more than 200 families who have experienced domestic violence and/or sexual assault. She has taken a lead role in seeking reform of LTBB statutes about victims' rights, domestic violence and Personal Protection Orders (PPO) and is an active member on LTBB's coordinated community

response team. She has also been the public face of advocacy for LTBB by appearing in public service announcements, participating in news articles and undertaking extensive outreach.

Ettawageshik is not only a leader in her tribal community and surrounding geographic area, but she is also the current President of Uniting Three Fires Against Violence, a statewide tribal domestic violence and sexual assault coalition.

Ettawageshik works to educate professionals and the public about the alarmingly high rates of domestic violence and sexual assault in Native American communities. She has furthered her own education by attending graduate school through Michigan State University to earn a Masters of Social Work degree while also holding a full-time job and raising her young son.

# ODAWA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT MANAGEMENT, INC. UNVEILS PLANS FOR VICTORIES SQUARE DEVELOPMENT

**Editor's note:** The following article appeared in the *Petoskey News-Review* on October 27, 2017 and is reprinted here with permission.

A restaurant/sports bar, coffee shop and hotel are expected to be among the first businesses locating in a new mixed-use development at the former Victories Casino site just south of Petoskey, MI.

The 22-acre complex at U.S. 131 and Lears Road, to be known as Victories Square, is a project of Odawa Economic Development Management, Inc. — an entity the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians created in 2011 to

help diversify its economic base beyond gaming — in partnership with Geodetic North Investors LLC.

"Our vision as a board has always been to create a sense of place and enhance our region," said Odawa Economic Development Management, Inc. Vice President Alan Proctor.

The partners celebrated the project's launch at an event Thursday (October 26, 2017) joined by numerous tribal officials and members and other local business and community leaders.

"We stand here today recognizing the importance of the new chance to foster economic development in our community," said Odawa tribal chairperson Regina Gasco-Bentley.

Victories Casino operated at the U.S. 131 site from 2000 until 2007 when it was replaced by the larger Odawa Casino half a mile to the west. The tribe demolished the Victories building in 2013, and site preparations for the mixed-use project — including reshaping of terrain and construction of a road network on the property — began a couple of years ago.

Project representatives said Boston's Restaurant and Sports Bar — part of a chain with several dozen locations around the United States and Mexico — will be included in the \$21 million first phase of development at Victories Square, occupying a 6,060 square foot building. A 7,482 square foot, multi-tenant retail building also is slated for

construction early on and will be anchored by a Starbucks coffee shop with a drive-thru.

# TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

By Theresa Keshick, Department of Commerce

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), vour RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month. Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the

TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as

# "DISCUSS TO PREVENT, TRAIN TO PROTECT" - HEALTH CLINIC STAFF Participate in 8 Hour Emergency Preparedness Training

On September 19, 2017, the staff at the LTBB Health Clinic participated in the Viral Hemorrhagic Fever (VHF) training with the Comprehensive Emergency Management Associates (CEMA) for a full day. This training was essential in preparation for our clinicians should an outbreak or pandemic illness strike our community.

This Organizational Preparedness Program course consisted of two modules, totaling approximately eight hours of instruction and practical activities. The course provided the clinicians with training on the subject of the group of illnesses known as viral hemorrhagic fevers (VHFs), which include illnesses resulting from exposure to highly infectious pathogens such as the Ebola, Marburg, Hanta, Lassa and Rift Valley Fever viruses among others. The course included both lecture and practical components to maximize the learning experience. This course was intended to supplement and expand on the previous training or experiences of staff.

Module 1 of this course was entirely a classroom-based lecture activity. Staff learned about VHF pathogens of high concern, PPE protocols, disinfection/decontamination, waste management, security needs and related topics. The focus of this module was to provide a broad understanding of the nature of these illnesses and how to achieve the safety of those who may come into contact with VHF patients and contaminated surfaces.

Module 2 of this course was a hands-on, practical activity. Staff received guidance on and demonstrated their ability to properly don and doff PPE required for use when working with patients afflicted by a suspected or confirmed viral hemorrhagic fever. Staff learned the following protective measures: (1) use of an impermeable gown or coverall; (2) use of a PAPR (hooded and with a full face shield) or NIOSH-certified N-95 respirator; (3) use of examination gloves with extended cuffs; (4) boot covers (or shoe covers, if used with coveralls that have integrated socks); and (5) use of an apron covering the torso to the level of the mid-calf.

More trainings such as this will occur in the future months for the staff and others. Preparation is key and timing essential when faced with outbreaks, and the protection of staff is priority.

#### TAX AGREEMENT REMINDER

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

#### ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! 





# PRESIDENT DONALD TRUMP AND SECRETARY ELAINE L. CHAO ANNOUNCE Innovative Drone Integration Pilot Program



Editor's note: The following is a U.S. Department of Transportation press release dated October 25, 2017.

President Donald J. Trump directed U.S. Secretary of Transportation Elaine L. Chao today (October 25, 2017) to launch an initiative to safely test and validate advanced operations for drones in partnership with state and local governments in select jurisdictions. The Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Integration Pilot Program implements a directive signed by President Trump today, and the results will be used to accelerate the safe integration of UAS into the national airspace and to realize the benefits of unmanned technology in our economy.

The program will help tackthe most significant challenges in integrating drones into the national airspace while reducing

risks to public safety and security. The program is designed to provide regulatory certainty and stability to local governments and communities, UAS owners and operators who are accepted into the program. In less than a decade, the potential economic benefit of integrated unmanned aerial systems into the nation's airspace is estimated to equal up to \$82 billion and create up to 100,000 jobs.\*

The program will help the USDOT and FAA develop a regulatory framework that will allow more complex low-altitude operations; identify ways to balance local and national interests; improve communications with local, state and tribal jurisdictions; address security and privacy risks; and accelerate the approval of operations that currently require special authorizations.

"This program supports the President's commitment to foster technological innovation that will be a catalyst for ideas that have the potential to change our day-to-day lives," said Secretary Chao. "Drones are proving to be especially valuable in emergency situations, including assessing damage from natural disasters such as the recent hurricanes and the wildfires in California."

The pilot program will evaluate a variety of operation-

al concepts, including night operations, flights over people, flights beyond the pilot's line of sight, package delivery, detectand-avoid technologies, counter-UAS security operations and the reliability and security of data links between pilot and aircraft. Industries that could see immediate opportunities from the program include commerce, photography, emergency management, precision agriculture and infrastructure inspections and monitoring.

"Stakeholders will have the opportunity through this program to demonstrate how their innovative technological and operational solutions can address complex unmanned aircraft integration challenges," said FAA Administrator Michael Huerta. "At the same time, the program recognizes the importance of community participation in meaningful discussions about balancing local and national interests related to integrating unmanned aircraft."



Initial construction steps for those buildings could start this fall with completion expected during 2018.

The initial project phase also will include a chain-affiliated, 137 room hotel with construction expected to start in 2018 and wrap up in 2019.

Future project phases at the site are expected to include additional hospitality, restaurants, retail businesses and apartments. Victories Square is expected to eventually employ 300 people and create 200 construction jobs along the way, Proctor said.

Tanya Gibbs, President of Odawa Economic Development Management, Inc. noted the site also will include grassy areas open to the public for uses such as picnics.

"Really, we're looking at kind of a family-friend-

ly, lifestyle development," she said.

Chemical Bank is providing financing for the Victories Square project, Geodetic North Investors Representative Steve Hayward said, with a \$21 million loan guarantee through the U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs helping to secure the financing.

When the tribe originally acquired the Victories site for casino use, it was placed in trust with the federal government and remains in that status. The Victories Square company— which is 51% owned by Odawa Economic Development Management, Inc. and organized under the Odawa tribe's laws will have a primary lease on the project site, Gibbs said, with the various tenants subleasing their sites.

# THE \$26.5 MILLION RENOVATION OF SOARING EAGLE CASINO & Resort to Begin January 2018



Editor's note: The following is a Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort press release dated October 25, 2017.

The Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort's renovation construction dates have been solidified. The \$26.5 million project is now scheduled to commence on January 15, 2018 and is expected to be complete by fall of 2018.

The multimillion dollar investment is concentrated on amenities of the casino such as integrating a brand new Sports Bar & Night Club on the west end of the gaming floor, updating the Entertainment Hall, enclosing a non-smoking area, re-designing Kid's Quest & Cyber Quest areas, enhancing gaming experiences with a new high limit & VIP lounge area, a relocated poker room and concluding the renovation project with re-branding the current sub shop. The construction schedule is split into a seven phase plan.

The first phase of construction is anticipated to begin on January 15 and expected to be completed by April 22. This initial phase entails the development of the new VIP lounge and relocating the high limit gaming. The current poker room will be temporarily moved to the Slot Palace during this phase. The repositioning of the high limit area will transform the existing poker room into a luxury high limit gaming space with a full amenity of an integrated VIP lounge to also include Casino Hosts' offices.

The second phase is also planned to begin on January 15 and expected to be complete by March 11. This phase will include a remodel of the Kid's Quest/ Cyber Quest. The two areas will have a centralized entry way with Cyber Quest Arcade to the front which allows guests to walk through the arcade floor to access Kid's Quest on the back half of the redesign.

The far west-end of the gaming floor will go through multiple modifications beginning April 23. During phases three, four and five, various amenities will be constructed. The spaces will include an enclosed poker room (scheduled for completion on June 17), an enclosed non-smoking gaming area (scheduled for completion on July 29) and a sports bar & night club (scheduled for completion August 12).

The current non-smoking area will have a complete transformation. This space will be the site of the all new "ASCEND" sports bar & night club. AS-CEND will have a grand entry with 12-foot tall pivoting doors. It will feature a wing shaped center bar, a stage for entertainers, a VIP seating area, 59 bartop slot machines, multiple television screens and dramatic lighting effects. Neighboring each side of the sports bar & night club will be the relocated poker room and the newly enclosed non-smoking area.

Updating the current Entertainment Hall will encompass phase six and is scheduled to begin on June 18 and expected to be complete by September 23. Live concerts and event experiences will be heightened with the state of the art high-tech programmable lighting elements across the ceiling. There will be upgrades to the acoustics by integrating sound isolation panels around the perimeter from floor to ceiling. The stage will also feature an array of multi-media panels which can produce an unlimited number of scenes.

The final phase involves the re-branding of the sub shop. Currently, Soaring Eagle is considering "Central Deli & Sub Shop" as a new name for the dining outlet. This five week phase is scheduled to commence on July 30. The new Central Deli & Sub Shop plan builds around the existing layout and flow with additional seating and an improved entry area.

This major renovation project will be one of the largest investments Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort's guests have seen since the grand opening back in 1998. The last major renovation was in 2011 when the Firefly Buffet was re-branded to Aurora Buffet and remodeled to provide space for the 24 hour Leg-

The design and construction will be performed by I-5 Design Build. The Washington-based company has built a successful track record working with more than 75 Native American gaming properties throughout the country. I-5's signature renovation process combines inspirational design, innovative planning, specialty in-house fabrication and seamless project implementation to produce impact-rich gaming, F&B and entertainment environments. Their unique and innovative off-site construction methods allow for 50 -70% of a project to be built offsite, using state of the art digital manufacturing methods, leading to onsite project time-frames that are radically reduced, creating the maximum impact and benefit for each project.

# THE SAGINAW CHIPPEWA INDIAN TRIBE OF MICHIGAN TO REPATRIATE Ancestral Human Remains from the University of Michigan's Museum of Anthropological Archaeology



Editor's note: The following is a Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan press release dated November 2, 2017.

The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan and its Ziibiwing Cultural Society (Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture & Lifeways) will lead a repatriation for the ancestral human remains of 20 Native American individuals and 106 associated funerary objects from the University of Michigan's Museum of Anthropological Archaeology (UMMAA) in Ann Arbor, MI, on November 30, 2017. The Ziibiwing Cultural Society has been working diligently on behalf of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan, and in cooperation with the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation & Repatriation Alliance (MACPRA), to bring home ancestors and their associated funerary objects from the numerous museums, universities and institutions across the country since the passage of the 1990 Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAG-

NAGPRA requires museums and federal agencies to inventory and identify Native American human remains and cultural items in their collections and to consult with federally-recognized Indian tribes and Native Hawaiian organizations regarding the return of these objects to descendants or tribes and organizations. The Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan, in cooperation with the Michigan

Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation & Repatriation Alliance, Chippewa-Cree of the Rocky Boy's Reservation of Montana and the Mille Lacs Band of the Minnesota Chippewa Tribe, will carry out the repatriation through a National Park Service NAGPRA Repatriation Grant. Elders and representatives from the tribes will retrieve the ancestors and associated funerary objects at the University of Michigan on November 30, 2017 and bring them to the Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture & Lifeways in Mt. Pleasant, MI, to begin preparations for the reburial on December 1, 2017.

"Respecting Native American history and culture is an important part of the National Park Service mission," said Acting National Park Service Director Michael T. Reynolds. "These grants support the dedicated efforts of museum and tribal professionals to collaborate, consult and respectfully return a significant part of our nation's cultural heritage to Native American communities."

Section 10 of NAGPRA authorizes the Secretary of the Interior to award grants to assist in implementing provisions of the act. The National NAGPRA Program is administered by the National Park Service.

In 1970, human remains representing, at minimum, 20 individuals were removed from the Bugai site (20SA215) in Saginaw County, MI. Contract workers encountered human remains while excavating sand from private property near Interstate 75 in Bridgeport Township. After workers completed removing the sand, amateur archaeologists Leo Purple and Arthur Graves conducted a salvage excavation at the site from late winter through the fall of 1970. Purple had surface collected the site for several years prior to the excavation. Primary and secondary burials were noted at the site. The majority of the burials excavated were bundle burials along with multiple objects. Purple and Graves divided the site collections, donating some to the UMMAA in 1976, and some to the Chippewa Nature Center (CNC) in Midland, MI, in 1974. In 2006, the CNC donated the ancestral human remains and associated funerary objects from the Bugai site to the UMMAA.

A Journey Feast to conclude the ancestral ceremonies and protocols will be held on December 1, 2017 at 1p.m. in the Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture & Lifeways located at 6650 East Broadway, Mt. Pleasant, MI.

# FINANCIAL INDUSTRY REGULATORY AUTHORITY ISSUES ENFORCEMENT Order Against Former Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan Tribal Investment Manager Gopi Vungarala

Editor's note: The following is a Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan press release dated November 3, 2017.

On October 25, 2017, the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA) issued an enforcement order against former Tribal Investment Manager Gopi Vungarala.

In November 2008, Gopi Vungarala was employed by the tribe as in-house investment manager responsible for the management and investment of the tribe's investment portfolio. In 2011, Vungarala began steering the tribe's investments to Real Estate Investment Trusts (RE-IT's) and Business Development Companies (BDC's). By the time Vungarala's employment ended in 2015, more than 22% of the tribe's portfolio was invested in REIT's

REIT's and BDC's are considered high risk investments with a low liquidity rate: Meaning these investments presented greater risk and lockup funds without access by the tribe for many years. FIN-RA is the regulatory authority over licensed firms and professionals selling securities. A complaint was filed by FINRA's Department of Enforcement against Vungarala after an investigation showed possible fraud in his handling of the tribe's investments.

FINRA's order finds Gopi Vungarala received more than \$9 million in commissions as a result of his fraudulent representations to the tribe, and his commissions were not disclosed to the tribe. In addition, FINRA found Vungarala misled the tribe regarding its eligibility to obtain volume discounts for the REITS

in an amount owed to the tribe of \$3.3 million. (The tribe was paid the \$3.3 million in a previous settlement between FINRA and the broker responsible for Vungarala's supervision). FINRA also found from 2011 to near the end of his employment in 2015, Vungarala committed securities fraud under the Securities Exchange Act and FINRA rules.

According to Chief Frank Cloutier, "The Tribe will continue to cooperate with the proper authorities to address the wrongs perpetrated on the Tribe. We directed the Tribe's legal counsel to initiate our own civil litigation against Vungarala and other parties responsible for the fraud perpetrated on the Tribe. We are in the midst of that litigation and are confident that we will prevail and obtain restitution from the parties responsible."



# Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, wever, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates. The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming cer-

tificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had

not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18. 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.

3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least


