LTBB CULTURAL LIBRARY RECEIVES \$150,000 NATIVE AMERICAN LIBRARY Services Enhancement Grant Submitted by the LTBB Cultural

Library

The Cultural Library is excited to announce it received a \$150,000 Native American Library Services Enhancement Grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, beginning October 1, 2018 and running through September 30, 2020. The name of the project is Ndbaajmowinaanin or "Our Stories." Its purpose is to increase accessibility of traditional stories, oral histories and culturally relevant children's books by providing them in multiple digital formats.

The project goals of "Ndbaajmowinannin" are to increase LTBB oral history collection, increase accessibility to library services for off-reservation and non-local patrons and to increase awareness of digital library services. This community project is open to youth, young adults and elders among LTBB staff, LTBB Citizens and households and the greater community, including those who cannot access the physical Cultural Library. The Cultural Library will



also be hiring an Ndbaajmowinaanin Project Assistant, who will support the digitization of traditional stories, community-focused preservation and digitization of oral histories and increased awareness and online accessibility of culturally-themed children's books.

The activities funded by this grant include:

• Recording three traditional storytelling events and making them accessible online and available for library circulation.

• Community outreach for interested oral history interviewers and elders interested in sharing their oral histories.





ATTENTION: 2019 PER CAPITA REQUIREMENTS

We are still in the process of scanning enrollment records and linking relationships in our Citizenship Database (Progeny ES). We will be contacting you via mail if your enrollment record is missing a photo copy of your social security card.

If we do not have a copy of your social security verification on file prior to October 31, 2019, (the 2019 per capita payment distribution deadline), your per capita payment may be held or delayed in 2019.

Acceptable Verification of your Social Security number includes the following:

- Copy of your Social Security Card
- Social Security Card number printed by

Social Security Administration Office

• Social Security Administration Benefit Statement

• W-2 or 1099 form

• Pay stub containing your name and social security number

• Valid U.S. military ID card with photo (DD-2 or CAC card)

• Other official document/card containing your name and social security number.

TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to you.

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.





Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, <u>YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST</u> before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me. Thank you. - Theresa Keshick at 231-242-1584.

*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.



WAYS TO HELP ELDERS AVOID ISOLATION

With the holidays quickly approaching, Little Traverse Bay Bands Department of Human Services is reminding everyone to keep an eye out for elders who may be showing signs of isolation. Isolation is more than being alone. It can be the result of feeling detached physically or psychologically or being disconnected from support groups of family, friends and community. Social isolation and loneliness are associated with a higher risk of mortality, high blood pressure and depression, increased risk of dementia and physical health problems and vulnerability to elder abuse.

During the month of December, LTBB DHS is asking people to commit to connecting with an older adult in the community. Some examples of ways to easily reach out to an elder include:

- Ask to take them to an Elders Luncheon.
- Volunteer with a meal delivery program.

- Give your older neighbor a ride to the grocery store or an appointment.

- Invite your neighbor over for coffee or tea or a game night.

- Ask an elder to join you for a walk.

- Ask friends and family to also visit or call, so there is some contact every week.

On July 28th, 2018, Tribal Council passed the Michelle Chingwa Education Honorarium (MCEH) Act which has been enacted to provide a gift

to honor Tribal Citizens that are obtaining post-secondary educational oppo1tunities. The MCEH Act repeals and replaces the original and amended Michelle Chingwa Education Assistance Act including WOS 2007-005 and WOS 2014-010.

With the passage of the legislation, several changes have been made to the previous Michelle Chingwa Education Assistance (MCEA) Scholarship Program:

1. Students attending a post-secondary institution that is accredited by a foreign government accrediting agency are now eligible for MCEH funding.

2. Students are no longer required to submit FAFSA information to remain eligible for an honoralium.

3. Honorariums will be distributed directly to the student.

These changes became effective on 8/2/2018 for Fall 2018. The new MCEH application can be found on the LTBB website. A direct link to WOS 2018-010 has been provided below:

We can provide you with a new well and/or septic system for your new construction OR if your current well and/or septic system is deficient, we can help.

Please call the LTBB Housing Department at 231-242-1540 to find out more about how you can get a free well and septic system or replace your current system.

Please be aware it takes approximately 3 to 4 months to gain federal approval of your application.

HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept, at 231-242-1540.

STR - Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

for this program. HIP - Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

DPA - Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgame (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

FPA - Forcelosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in forcelosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, ML this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.



ODAWA TRAILS Six Reasons Why Our Relatives Stay in Abusive Relationships

"Why don't you just leave?"

When it comes to domestic violence and dating violence, we tend to focus on why anyone would willingly stay in an abusive relationship. After all, no one would stay with someone who hurts them, right?

The truth is, on average, it takes a victim seven attempts at leaving an abusive relationship before they leave for good. It takes a lot of courage to leave, yet most people don't realize that the decision to leave is one of the most dangerous times for a victim of abuse.

For Native Americans, the impacts of domestic violence and dating violence are severe, affecting one in two women and one in three men, according to the National Institute of Justice. Most Native people have experienced violence in their lifetime, and one-third of the population has faced violence in the past year.

No matter the reason for the abuse, domestic violence and dating violence are not our traditional ways. Like colonization, domestic violence and dating violence are about power and control, where one partner uses repeated abusive actions to maintain power over their loved one. So, why not leave?

Here are some reasons why our friends or relatives might stay:

Fear

Fear of what could happen may keep a relative in an abusive relationship. Fears for family, children or pets often plays a role, especially if an abuser has threatened loved ones in the past. Unfortunately, being a "victim" also carries an unfair stigma, instilling fears of being identified or retaliated against for speaking out.

Many survivors of domestic violence or dating violence don't report abuse out of fear or distrust of local authorities or because they don't think reporting will do anything to help or change the situation. In many cases, silence can feel like the safest option. Love

Many survivors who stay in abusive relationships love their partner and may feel like if they just "stick it out," their partner will change. They may hope that the relationship will return to happier times and decide to stay, rather than end the relationship completely.

Family and Community

When children are involved, some survivors may try to maintain harmony within the family by staying in an abusive relationship. They may feel pressure to raise their children with both parents together or fear losing their children if their partner threatens to take or harm the children if they were to leave.

Leaving could also mean standing up to an abuser with power in the community or a prominent family, stoking fears that everyone will take the abuser's side. Some people might fear leaving their tribal community-one's family and culture-in order to escape the abuse, which may be too much to bear.

Denial or Shame

It's not always easy to admit that you're being abused, and your friend or relative may worry that their loved ones will judge them. Victim-blaming and shaming-where survivors of violence are blamed for the crimes committed against them-is another issue. Asking questions like "Were you drinking?" or "Did you talk back?" are unfair and critical, making it difficult for people to reach out.

Being in abusive relationship often leads to doubts of self-worth. Abusive partners often manipulate and criticize their partner to shake their confidence or destroy connections to those who support and love them. Your friend or relative may blame themselves for the abuse or believe that they somehow deserve it.

Tips for Supporting A Loved One

It can be hard to watch a friend or relative suffer at the hands of someone they love. Now that we know some reasons why victims stay in abusive relationships, we can better understand why leaving is not as easy as it seems. It is critical to stand by your loved one, no matter what.

Remember, your loved one-the person experiencing the abuse—is the expert when it comes to their safety and survival, despite your best intentions. So, how can you help?

• Believe their experience. If a friend or relative confides in you that they are being abused, listen and take the situation seriously. Be patient and take time to listen. Avoid judgments. Allow them to tell you as much or as little as they want to share. Storytelling plays an important role in Native communities, so allow time for this process.

• Understand that your loved one did not intend to love someone who hurts them. It's not always easy to tell if a relationship will become abusive. While there are red flags to watch for, abusive behavior can appear at any time in a relationship. No matter if you think they should have known better, your loved one is not to blame for the abuse.

• Trust in their resilience. Remember-it may take several attempts for your friend or relative to leave if they choose to do so. What you can do is show that you love, care and stand by them, no matter what. Whichever way they choose to seek help, the next steps are always their choice, which is critical to rebuilding their self-esteem and personal sovereignty.

• Offer helpful resources. It's okay to offer helpful resources, but always allow your loved one to decide what they need. Some tribes have domestic violence programs and advocates that support survivors in various ways including assistance with navigating the legal system, transportation or safe housing options or with filing a protection order.

• Find healing for yourself. It can be hard to know what to say or do when a loved one is being abused. In this case, it may be helpful to speak with someone to help you cope. The StrongHearts Native Helpline - 1-844-7NATIVE - can assist in finding resources and help you navigate difficult conversations together. Traditional healing such as smudging, talking circles or ceremonies can also help clear the mind, body and spirit.

There are many reasons why your friend or relative might stay with an abusive partner. You can be a good relative by supporting them in making their own decisions and acknowledging that leaving is not an easy decision to make.

Where to Get Help

Concerned a loved one might be in an abusive relationship? Support and resources are available through the StrongHearts Native Helpline -1-844-7NATIVE (1-844-762-8483) - open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. CST. After hours callers have the option of connecting with the National Domestic Violence Hotline or to call back the next business day. All calls remain anonymous and confidential. Domestic violence and dating violence are not our traditional ways, and neither is ever okay. Mallory Black (Diné) is the Communications Manager for the StrongHearts Native Helpline, a confidential and anonymous helpline for Native Americans affected by domestic violence. If you or a loved one is in an abusive relationship, support is available at 1-844-7NATIVE (1-844-762-8483), open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. CST. Advocates offer peer-to-peer support and referrals to culturally-appropriate resources for domestic violence. 





AFDO/SEAFOOD ALLIANCE HACCP TRAINING COURSE TO BE HELD IN DECEMBER

A Seafood Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point (HACCP) Training Course that is being coordinated by Michigan Sea Grant, Michigan State University Extension and the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission will be held December 4-6, 2018 at Bay Mills Resort and Casino in Brimley, MI. All fish processors are required to take this training if they are not currently certified.

HACCP consists of identifying safety hazards, determining where they occur, monitoring these points and recording the results. HACCP involves dayto-day monitoring of critical control points by production employees. The Seafood HACCP regulation that is enforced by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is based on the belief that commercial fish processors can understand the food safety hazards of their products and take reasonable steps to control them. Commercial fish processors are required either to obtain formal training for one or more of their own employees or to hire trained independent contractors to perform the HACCP functions.

The HACCP regulation requires processors to keep extensive records of processing and sanitation at their facilities.

At times, questions arise as to whether someone needs training in Seafood HACCP. The Seafood HACCP regulation defines processing as handling, storing, preparing, heading, eviscerating, shucking, freezing, changing into different market forms, manufacturing, preserving, packing, labeling, dockside unloading or holding fish or fishery products. The regulation does not apply to the harvest or transport of fishery products. It also does not apply to practices such as heading, eviscerating or freezing intended solely to prepare fish for holding on a harvest vessel. Retail establishments are also exempt from the Seafood HACCP regulation.

Fish processors who complete the course put themselves at a competitive advantage as they can then produce value added products such as smoked fish and caviar. Those completing the course will receive a Seafood Alliance HACCP Certificate issued through the Association of Food and Drug Officials that is recognized by agencies regulating fish processors.

U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION ANNOUNCES \$300 MILLION TRIBAL PROJECTS FOR FEDERAL LANDS AND

A MARKENT OF TRANSPORT NOIL STATES OF AMERICAN

On October 3, 2018, the U.S. Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) published a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) making \$300 million available through its Nationally

Significant Federal Lands and Tribal Projects Program (NS-FLTP). Funding under this program is available for the first time to build and repair roads and bridges that serve tribal or federal lands.

The Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act established NSFLTP to provide financial assistance for the construction, reconstruction or rehabilitation of transportation projects providing access to or located on federal or tribal lands. Under NSFLTP, the federal share of a project can be up to 90% and can be used to improve the condition of a critical transpor-

tation facility. Large scale projects with estimated construction costs of \$50 million or more are given priority consideration for selection, but the program will accept projects with estimated construction costs of at least \$25 million.

Applications are being accepted on a rolling basis. Federal lands management agencies and tribal nations can apply directly for grants under the program. States and local agencies may also apply, but only if they are sponsored by a federal land management agency or tribal nation.
