Born to Hunt - Falconry: A Hunting Art That Goes Back Some 4,000 YEARS

It was a typical November Sunday - windy, grey, sleet spitting from the sky- when Charlevoix, MI, resident and

LTBB Tribal Citizen Brook Barney pulled into the driveway. A small gathering of folks made a semicircle around the back of his pickup, waiting to catch a glimpse of the big wooden traveling crate he had with him. Or more accurately, to lay eyes on the stunning Red Tail Hawk inside the crate.

Barney, who first discovered the art of falconry in 1990, has been caring for and rehabilitating birds for more than two decades now.

"In 1990, I moved to Salt Lake City. The family that I lived with for a month practiced falconry. So, I had quite the education; I read every book I could get my hands on. I had an opportunity to go hunting with Steve Chindgren, one of the handful of known falconers. That was it, I was hooked! Next step, I had to get licensed."

Barney has worked with approximately 16 birds over the years. He's currently caring for Ayla, a large male red tail hawk. Perched on Barney's glove, the bird looks like a majestic work of art, all the rich brown, red, orange, grey hues of hardwood forests layered in his feathers. Ayla cocks his head, fluffs himself up, eyes each one of his onlookers with eyes like endless pools of black night. The power of a Red Tail Hawk, of a bird of prey in general, is felt in the deepest places of muscle and bone—the primal understanding of the word "hunter."

"They have such a commanding presence," Barney noted of Red Tail Hawks. "Working with an immature Red Tail is like having a new puppy. They become tamed and trained very quickly. What I like about flying Red Tails in Northern Michigan is that they are capable of taking a fairly wide range of game."

Barney places a small band of bells around Ayla's ankle before stepping into the woods. The bird blends so well with the trees above, he's hard to see once the hunt begins. As they walk through the woods together, it's easy to sense the historical connection between humans and birds of prey. Falconry is an art that's approximately 4,000 years

Lifting his gloved hand high, Barney signals to Ayla that it's time to fly, and the bird moves swift and silent to a nearby branch. He pauses, flies to a higher spot, and repeats the process until he's reached the last thick fingerlings in the treetops. Here, he sits, waiting.

SCOUT RESCUES OLD INDIAN TRAIL MARKERS FROM OBLIVION

An old Indian trail between Cadillac, MI, and Traverse City, MI, has a new pathfinder and preserver.

Soon-to-be Eagle Scout Woody Unruh, 16, expects to complete his repair and refurbishing of 33 concrete markers along the 50-mile-long trail by October 15, 2013. A member of Boy Scout Troop 105 in Lake Ann, MI, Unruh has worked on the service project for more than a year.

He got the idea from Joel Wright, the troop's Eagle badge mentor who had been saving the project for just the right person.

"Then along came Woody," Wright said.

Unruh, of Cedar, MI, is a member of the Little Tra-



verse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians.

"I thought it would be good to learn more about my heritage and also preserve part of the tribe," he said.

The Little Traverse Bay Bands gave Unruh a \$500 grant to pay for paint, brushes, replacement aluminum plaques and new concrete markers for two that were destroyed.

The trail dates back to "mound builder" Indians who inhabited Michigan thousands of years ago and created a vast network of trails and portages later used by Ottawa, Chippewa and Potawatomi Indians as well as early white settlers, who relied on them, the late Marje Holland wrote in a local history booklet, "Cadillac to Traverse City Indian

In the 1940s, retired Cadillac farmer Milo Petoskey Crosby and Jim Pontiac, then 96, plotted out and later erected the first 14 markers. James Comp and Edward Babcock installed five more during the early 1960s.

Little Traverse Bands member Frank Ettawageshik, working with the Grand Traverse County Sesquicentennial Advisory Agency, helped place the most recent 14 markers in Grand Traverse County during the 1980s as part of the state's 150th birthday celebration.

Ettawageshik served as Little Traverse Bay Bands Tribal Chairman, 1991-1999 and 2005-2009, and was one of the people Unruh interviewed for the project.

Holland's son, Michael, who now lives in Traverse

Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

- 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.
- 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.
- 3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least
- 4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address

AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example be-

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

LTBB

Tribal identification cards now have a hologram. This is

an added security feature to eliminate duplication. We are phasing out the old cards. Once your Tribal identification card has expired, you will be issued the new hologram card along with a replacement fee of \$10. Replacement cost includes: address change, lost card, expired cards and minors turning 21. There will be no fee charged for: elders (55 and up), first time picture identification card, name change, defective card, faded or cracked (must bring card to office).

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements

making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located

on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate

of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indi-

cated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase,

there is no recourse! If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

or has your condition been aggravated by military service? I encourage you to submit a fully developed claim with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. You can apply online at ebenefits.com or contact your local service officer to obtain proper ez claim form. When submitting

a fully developed claim include all relevant records pertaining to your specific condition, including private medical records. As always and by law, your personal information will be kept confidential. Additionally, a handwritten document of your experience or illness is relevant and considered supporting documentation. If you are injured, sick or experiencing hearing loss due to your military service or if you think your recent condition may be service connected and you have been out of the service for many years, you are due just

for many years, you are due just compensation.

I had the honor of speaking with an out of state tribal veteran. We discussed this question: Why don't tribal veterans apply for health care or benefits with VA? He was already on board

with VA, and thankful to access

health care. His analogy, I would like to offer to veterans who have not accessed benefits from the VA, was he suggested, "Would you go to a fine dining restaurant and order the most expensive steak dinner with all the fixings and then eat only a small portion of the meal after paying an expensive price?" His correlation pertains to veterans, who have paid a high price for serving yet do not access the benefits they deserve. I would like to encourage all veterans to consider gaining access to a number of benefits available to veterans who have paid a high price.

got your dairy today?

10 tips to help you eat and drink more fat-free or low-fat dairy foods



The Dairy Group includes milk, yogurt, cheese, and fortified soymilk. They provide calcium, vitamin D, potassium, protein, and other nutrients needed for good health throughout life. Choices should be lowfat or fat-free—to cut calories and saturated fat. How much is needed? Older children, teens, and adults need 3 cups* a day, while children 4 to 8 years old need 21/2 cups, and children 2 to 3 years old need 2 cups.

"skim" the fat

Drink fat-free (skim) or low-fat (1%) milk. If you currently drink whole milk, gradually switch to lower fat versions. This change cuts calories but doesn't reduce calcium or other essential nutrients

boost potassium and vitamin D, and cut sodium

Choose fat-free or low-fat milk or yogurt more often than cheese. Milk and yogurt have more potassium and less sodium than most cheeses. Also, almost all milk and many yogurts are fortified with vitamin D.



top off your meals



Use fat-free or low-fat milk on cereal and oatmeal. Top fruit salads and baked potatoes with low-fat yogurt instead of higher fat toppings such as sour cream.

choose cheeses with less fat Many cheeses are high in saturated fat. Look for "reduced-fat" or "low-fat" on the label. Try different brands or types to find the one that you like.

what about cream cheese? Regular cream cheese, cream, and butter are not part of the dairy food group. They are high in saturated fat and have little or no calcium.

What counts as a cup in the Dairy Group? 1 cup of milk or yogurt, 11/2 ounces of natural cheese, or 2 ounces of processed cheese.

ingredient switches

When recipes such as dips call for sour cream, substitute plain yogurt. Use fat-free evaporated milk instead of cream, and try ricotta cheese as a substitute for cream cheese.

choose sweet dairy foods with care Flavored milks, fruit yogurts, frozen yogurt, and puddings can contain a lot of added sugars. These added sugars are empty calories. You need the nutrients in dairy foods-not these empty calories.

caffeinating? If so, get your calcium along with your morning

caffeine boost. Make or order coffee, a latte, or cappuccino with fat-free or low-fat milk.

can't drink milk? If you are lactose intolerant, try lactose-free milk, drink smaller amounts of milk at a time, or try soymilk (soy beverage). Check the Nutrition Facts label to be sure your soymilk has about 300 mg of calcium. Calcium in some leafy greens is well absorbed, but eating several cups each day to meet calcium needs may be

take care of yourself and your family Parents who drink milk and eat dairy foods show their kids that it is important. A healthy meal starts with more vegetables and fruits and smaller portions of protein and grains. Think about how you can adjust the portions on your plate to get more of what you need without too many calories. And don't forget dairy—make it the beverage with your meal or add fat-free or low-fat dairy products to your plate.

make half your plate veggies and fruits Vegetables and fruits are full of nutrients and may help to promote good health. Choose red, orange, and darkgreen vegetables such as tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and

add lean protein Choose protein foods, such as lean beef and pork, or chicken, turkey, beans, or tofu. Twice a week. make seafood the protein on your plate.



include whole grains Aim to make at least half your grains whole grains. Look for the words "100% whole grain" or "100% whole wheat" on the food label. Whole grains provide more nutrients like fiber, than refined grains.

don't forget the dairy Pair your meal with a cup of fat-free or low-fat milk. They provide the same amount of calcium and other essential nutrients as whole milk, but less fat and calories. Don't drink milk? Try soymilk (soy beverage) as your beverage or include fat-free or low-fat yogurt in your meal.



Using heavy gravies or sauces will add fat and calories to otherwise healthy choices. For example, steamed broccoli is great, but avoid topping it with cheese sauce. Try other options, like a sprinkling of low-fat parmesan cheese or a squeeze of lemon.

Savor your food. Eat slowly, enjoy the taste and textures, and pay attention to how you feel. Be mindful. Eating very quickly may cause you to eat too much.


Use a smaller plate at meals to help with portion control. That way you can finish your entire plate and feel satisfied without overeating.

Housing Department Programs

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service are An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.

Wolf Hunt Supporters Setting Another Trap for Michigan Voters



Editor's note: The following is a Keep Michigan Wolves Protected press release dated January 2, 2013

LANSING, MI - It seems only fitting Michigan's first wolf trophy hunting season, which was authorized by legislation based on falsehoods and tall tales about marauding wolves, would end in most of its 1,200 licensees failing to shoot a wolf. The final death toll was 23 wolves in spite of the use of bait and predator callers to lure the shy, elusive wolf out into the open to be shot.

Wolf hunting proponents are making clear their plans to allow the use of traps if Michigan voters don't restore protections for wolves. Brian Roell, a Wildlife Biologist from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, recently stated, "We do know trapping is a more effective way of harvesting wolves," (*Marquette Mining Journal*, December 12, 2013). During Wisconsin's 2013 wolf hunt, 67% of wolf kills were the result of these inhumane, painful devices.

Keep Michigan Wolves Protected predicts another trap could be set for Michigan voters in the new year with a repeat of 2013 when lawmakers ramrodded PA 21, a bill to nullify the signatures of more than 255,000 Michigan voters opposing the wolf hunt and granting the Natural Resources Commission (NRC) the power to designate game species without voter oversight.

Now, a group of trophy hunting and trapping interest groups have launched an initiative, misnamed the "Scientific Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act" (despite the lack of any science to justify a wolf hunt), which seeks to recycle language similar to PA 21 through the citizen initiative process and deliver it to the legislature for another vote. If passed, the initiative language would cement the power to designate game species with the NRC and would effectively scuttle two citizen referendums on the November 2014 ballot to repeal bills allow-

ing wolves to be hunted.

Senator Tom Casperson, R-Escanaba, the author of PA 21 and the wolf hunt's biggest advocate in the legislature, recently endorsed the new initiative effort by stating, "I encourage everyone to actively support the effort by signing a petition ... and volunteering to help, so the initiative can be considered by the Legislature." http://abc10up.com/casperson-endorses-citizen-initiative-to-protect-hunting-and-fishing-rights/

"The group behind this petition drive has no intention of putting the initiative on the ballot because they know that the people of Michigan do not support the trophy hunting of wolves," said Jill Fritz, Director of Keep Michigan Wolves Protected. "Legislators are afraid to let the people of Michigan vote. They'd rather put their trust in the bureaucrats of the Natural Resources Commission, who will be sure to grant the wishes of big game and trapping interests."

The end of the wolf hunt follows an investigation by Mlive.com (http://topics.mlive.com/ tag/wolf%20hunt/index.html) revealing false or incomplete data was used to justify the need for a wolf hunt. Lawmakers embellished details of a wolf sighting outside an Upper Peninsula daycare to create an incident which never occurred; the Department of Natural Resources' Furbearer Specialist fabricated a story in a radio interview about wolves threatening people outside their homes; the Upper Peninsula farmer who reported more than 60% of wolf-livestock incidents over the past three years baited wolves using deer and cattle carcasses in violation of state law, and has now been charged with animal neglect; and the Natural Resources Commission asked for public input about the wolf hunt and then deleted or ignored more than 10,000 e-mail comments on the subject.

In March 2013, Keep Michigan Wolves Protected – a coalition of animal welfare groups, conservationists, veterinarians, business owners, faith leaders and Native American tribes – submitted more than 255,000 signatures of Michigan citizens allowing voters to decide in the November 2014 election if the wolf should be designated as a game animal.

Before the people even had an opportunity to vote on the issue, legislators and the governor hastily approved a second law, PA 21, allowing the unelected, political appointees of the Natural Resources Commission to designate the wolf and other protected animals as game species, a decision which could not be overturned by the voter referendum process. Keep Michigan Wolves Protected launched a second petition drive in August 2013 to overturn PA 21.

After a little while, Barney blows a high-pitched whistle, and Ayla swoops back to his glove-perch, where a treat

After Ayla flies back toward the top branches, Barney walks into a field opening a good distance away. Crunching leaves give way to tall grasses. And then, he waits.

"My belief is to engage the hawk in what it naturally does as much as possible, meaning hunting and flying your bird often," Barney says, adding, "working with Red Tail is truly amazing. It's not as difficult as one may think."

Barney said to become a falconer is a highly regulated process that requires several steps—but the work is a learning experience that's vital to being a good steward of birds of prev.

"As an apprentice, one would need to get licensed; a sponsor who needs to be of a general or master classification must be acquired. Next, build your facilities and purchase a few requirements, then finally, get inspected by a Conservation Officer."

Many falconers rehabilitate birds, but also, trapping in

a common way to begin working with a bird.

"The type of trap most commonly used is a Bal-Chatri style," Barney said.

He said apprentices get with their sponsors and head out to the ideal habitat.

"As an apprentice, the only bird one can have are Red Tail Hawks or American Kestrels," he explained.

"Training starts immediately. First on the list is a one foot hop to your glove for food, then progressing to several feet. Next is flying your bird attached to a creance (which is a light line attached to the bird and the falconer) outside. At this point, you have spent countless hours with your bird. Hundreds of flights to your glove. Once you see the bond developing, you're ready to 'free-fly' your hawk and start hunting as quickly as possible."

Barney said he will usually fly a passage hawk for two or three years, giving them as much success as possible in the field and getting them to a healthy reproductive age.

"I release birds always in the spring. Releasing birds in the spring gives them a higher abundance of food before the colder months arrive."

It is estimated only 10% of birds like a Red Tail Hawk survive their first year in the wild. In captivity, the same birds can live upwards of 30 years.

"Concerns for wild birds of prey populations are prob-

ably similar to most wild animals in that land development takes away from their natural habitat," Barney said. "I do see a high occurrence of electrocution for birds of prey. I also know the American Kestrel is declining, which the Peregrine Foundation is taking steps to help. I think falconry and birds of prey displays help educate people and gives awareness to their valuable link in the food chain."

Likely to be kind to those who were watching Barney and Ayla hunt in the wet and increasingly windy weather, the falconer called his bird down to a pre-killed meal of a whole squirrel. Though Ayla was nowhere in sight, the whistle promoted an echo of beating wings.

Less than a minute later, he'd swooped down with a speed too fast to capture on camera, landing on Barney's glove. The bird immediately went to work on devouring the entirety of his squirrel meal, bones and all. Watching up close was both unnerving and awe-striking. The feat of engineering that is a bird of prey makes it clear why getting to work with Ayla is what Barney calls a "true honor."

City, MI, refurbished the 33 markers in 2002 to honor his mother and also ensure that they would last another 20 years. Marje Holland was a former area teacher, Girl Scout leader and Wexford County Historical Museum President who died in 2000.

Unruh's first step — finding the 3-foot-tall markers - took two weekends. His father, Frank Unruh, drove him down many a back road between the two cities and old instructions often referred to landmarks or sites which no longer exist or are obstructed from view. The trail crosses many private parcels, so directions for following it are provided for viewing by car.

"It was quite an accomplishment," Woody said of the search.

Marker 1 is in Hiawatha Park in Cadillac, MI, on the northeast end of Mitchell Lake. Marker 33 is on Traverse City's West End Beach, near the restrooms next to the TART trails. Some markers are in people's backyards. Marker 32 is at the intersection of Cass and Lake Streets across from the Hager building along the Boardman River.

Marker 16 once was an Indian village back in the woods along the Manistee River near what today is Mesick, MI, and Sherman, MI.

Bullet holes pierce some stones. One sits at the bottom of the Manistee River near Mesick, MI. Another three fell over near Cadillac, MI, and had to be reset.

Unruh also will update and produce a detailed brochure on the trail and markers. He also is putting the finishing touches on a Google map. He also has taken photos of each marker before and after restoration.

What has he learned since January 22, 2012, when he decided take on the project?

"It helped me figure out the area and the trail," he said. "I didn't know the trail's history or even what it was when I began. I also learned how much some people really appreciate the stones."

The project also has given him an idea for his senior project at Glen Lake High School during the 2014-2015 school year. He would like to establish a Friends of the Indian Trail organization to recruit people who live along the trail to care for the mark-

"That would help keep the trail around longer," he said.
