Colby remembered by co-workers, community members for friendly disposition, love of music

Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Petoskey News-Review on May 2, 2016 and is reprinted here with permission.

Albert Colby, Jr., who served as Tribal Administrator for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, passed away on Saturday (April 30, 2016). He was 58.

Colby served as the Administrator of the tribe for 15 years. Prior to that, he also served as one of the first trained Conservation Officers for the tribe's Natural Resources Department, according to Rebecca Fisher, an Executive Assistant to the Tribal Chairperson's office.

"He's just a really good guy, and it's a real blow to our community. I'm going to miss his laugh in our hallways,"

Colby started working for the tribe as a Conservation Officer in 1996.

Spencer McCormack, a Fisheries Technician with the tribe's Natural Resources Department, met Colby during an in-service work day at the tribe's government offices in

"Some mysterious force drew me to sit next to him, I think it was our mutual love for music. Of course, it didn't take long for music to become the subject of discussion, and we spoke of jamming and that would end up becoming a nearly two-year relationship based on our love for music," said McCormack.

When they met, McCormack said he was just a "lowly intern" working for the tribe, but he said that even as the top administrator, Colby wasn't concerned with status or

"We both knew that neither of those things really mattered and that we were 'All One People,' as he named our band. I will dearly miss that man," he said.

Colby also served as President of the Northern Michigan YMCA for two years and was active in the organization for four years, said YMCA Executive Director Chris-

of months ago, Al Colby, Jr. asked me if I would repair a beaded medallion necklace. I noticed the medallion was in good shape. The seed bead loom work had been torn apart. I figured that this would be quite a project. I said, 'Sure Al, let me see what I can do.' First, I took a picture of the damaged beadwork for a reference guide. I then began threading my loom and reused the beads from the necklace. After I was finished, I was so excited to take the repaired loom work/medallion back to work for Al. I charged Al a small fee, and he said it was for a person at the Roast and Toast. I often wonder, 'Who is this person?' When I think about it, that's just Al. I will miss Al's personality and strong leadership at the Tribe. One of my best supervisors I ever had. Miss his singing. At times, I think I hear him."

Lisa Flynn, Repartition and Archives Administrative Assistant: "Albert, my very dear friend. A good man. I am a stronger, better person because of you. You taught me how important family is in my life. You taught me how important 'making memories' are. Through all my tough days at work when I needed comfort and a shoulder to lean on, you would ALWAYS tell me, 'Work is work, it's not how you live.' You taught me the beauty of flowers and gardening. No watch needed and never late in your world because it started when you got there! Best of all, you and I shared a love of music by going to concerts and my first BlissFest. Music soothes the soul! Here's to The Great Gig in the Sky, I know you are having the time of your life in peace, happiness and Bliss. Jam on, Albert!"

Theresa Keshick, Department of Commerce Assistant: "Albert spoke at the Veteran's War Memorial on Beaver Island, MI, on August 1, 2015, honoring Anishnaabek from the islands who served in the Armed Forces. He was such a huge supporter of the Native veterans."

Remembering the Life and Legacy of Simon Otto

Storyteller, Author, Historian and Artist Simon Otto walked on May 5, 2016 at the age of 89.

Otto, a member of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe and a member of the LTBB Community, was born and raised in Petoskey, MI, with seven sisters and two brothers.

His writings and stories came from the stories he heard from elders who visited his home. His father, Foster Otto, was active in the Michigan Indian Defense Association, and many people came to meetings at his home. Simon listened to them conduct business and share stories.

His grandfather was an influential role model in

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Simon's life, sharing many stories with him.

Simon authored more than five books and wrote a column titled, "Talking Leaves," which appeared in the Petoskey News-Review for many years. His column also appeared in the Traverse City Record-Eagle and Cheboygan Daily Tribune.

As an artist, Simon drew, painted in oils and watercolors and made carvings, handmade porcupine roaches and hand drums.

Simon taught Indian oral history at North Central Michigan College (NCMC) in Petoskey, MI, for

He retired as the LTBB Executive Coordinator in March 1992 and worked as an Indian counselor, a substance abuse counselor and a state job interviewer. He opened a halfway house in Petoskey, MI, and helped start a tribal substance abuse program for the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians and the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe.

Meet Suicide Prevention Coordinator Belinda McLester



My name is Belinda Mc-Lester, and I am the new Suicide Prevention Coordinator for LTBB Behavioral Health. Some of you may have already met me, but for those who haven't, let me tell you a little about myself.

I moved here from the Green Bay, WI, area about a year and a half ago with my husband and three children. I am originally from the Northwest Territories of Canada, but grew up in Wisconsin. I am an enrolled tribal member of the Dene Band.

My first job out of college was working as a Native American Student Advocate (JOM program) in the public school system. After three years, I moved into Oneida Social Services where I served as the Women's Domestic Abuse Advocate for seven years. From there, I went on to create a position as Community Wellness Coordinator for the Oneida Tribe. I left that position a little over five years ago to be home with my daughter.

My educational background is in psychology although I am trained in different spiritual/

wellness modalities/teachings, including, wellness/life coaching, law of attraction, Reiki, Reconnective Healing, Angel Therapy and Hooponopono, etc.

In my spare time, I also present workshops on the law of attraction, facilitate Intenders of the Highest Good circles and do inspirational readings/numerology. As far as fun goes, although I enjoy good company, I also cherish my alone time. I love to read, travel (whether solo, with my husband/family or friends), go out to eat (I'm definitely a foodie), be outdoors, go to the movies and attend concerts/ plays, etc.

I am passionate about the work I do and have found my greatest moments of happiness involved random acts of kindness, making someone else happy or by just being of service. I believe we are all born with tremendous power and gifts to offer the world. I consider myself to be a champion for the underdog and love to awaken those who feel disempowered. This brings me to the work I will be doing.

The goal and objectives of the MSPI grant I am working under include decreasing the number of suicide, suicide contagion and suicide attempts or ideations among Native American youth in the LTBB community (grades 9-12 students in Emmet County, MI) through prevention, intervention and postvention practices. The goal will be achieved through the following objectives:

Educate the community on the early signs of suicide/ attempts/ideation to increase chance of prevention and intervention through LTBB Government, behavioral health professionals and community-based programs.

Implement evidence-based prevention programs and behavioral health services to reduce suicides/attempts/ideation


Develop stronger referral mechanisms through implementation of internal LTBB Health Park suicide policies and procedures, and of external referral process with at least one community agency to ensure at-risk youth receive the behavioral health care necessary to heal.

I have many different ideas on how to make this program a success. This success is dependent upon building good relationships with other program entities who are also working towards common goals. Please know I am open to your ideas, and at some point in the future, I may contact you or your program/department to see if we can work together. In the meantime, please know I am new in the area of suicide prevention and will do my best to meet the needs of this program and community.



Colon Cancer is Preventable



What is colon cancer?

Colon cancer is cancer of the lower part of your digestive system (the colon or large intestine).

Most colon cancer starts as small, noncancerous (benign) clumps of cells called polyps. Over time some of these polyps become colon cancer.

There may be few, if any, symptoms. For this reason, health care providers suggest regular screening to find polyps before they become colon cancer.



How to prevent colon cancer?

- · Avoid cigarettes and cigarette smoke.
- · Maintain a healthy weight. · Be physically active.
- · Limit alcohol use.
- · Eat more fresh fruit and vegetables.
- Eat less red and processed meat (such as bacon, sausage, hot dogs or lunch meat.

When should you get screened for colon cancer?

- · Age 50-75 for most people.
- · Younger if you have a family history of colon cancer or polyps.

Why get screened for colon cancer?

Often, there are no symptoms in the early stages of colon cancer.

LTBB Adolescent Program Update - Together, We Make a Family

I was sitting in my office preparing for my adolescent group, and I came across a handout from the Search Institute that suggests different ways for building assets for hard-to-reach kids. When I was looking over the handout, one thing that stood out was a heading typed in bold lettering, "Take a positive, asset-driven approach to young

people (Search Institute, 2006)." Underneath that bold statement are words that everyone could live by, "Instead of labeling them 'at risk,' think of them as having great potential (Search Institute, 2006)." As a professional, I reflected on times when I have used the words "at risk" to define many of the adolescent population I work with. It was a silent reminder of how words can be damaging. Be mindful, and remember that someone is always watching and listening!

In the upcoming month with the adolescent group, we will be learning about and practicing the following assets:

<u>Positive Peer Influence</u>-Young person's friends model responsible behaviors. The circle of friends that youth associate with influence their behaviors.

<u>High Expectations</u> - Both parent(s) and teachers encourage the young person to do well. Helping your child set expectations and achieve them are motivators for success.

<u>Creative Activities</u> - Young person spends three or more hours per week in lessons or practice in music, theater or other arts. Any kind of positive

interaction or group will aid in children succeeding in life.

Youth Programs - Young person spends three or more hours per week in sports, clubs or organizations at school and/or in the community. Surrounding children with positive peer influence and activities to do will promote children achieving their fullest potential.

The group will also be designing medicine wheels and receiving education about tobacco offerings and smudging. Even more exciting, we will be designing, creating and nurturing a medicine garden at the Health Park for all the community to


We were proactive in working with Harbor Springs schools to approve an MOU to ensure language classes will be taught in the fall.





AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Tribal identification cards now have a hologram. This is an added security feature to eliminate duplication. We are phasing out the old cards. Once your Tribal identification card has expired, you will be issued the new hologram card along with a replacement fee of \$10. Replacement cost includes: address change, lost card, expired cards and minors turning 21. There will be no fee charged for: elders (55 and up), first time picture identification card, name change, defective card, faded or cracked (must bring card to office).

Tribal Historic and Cultural Preservatio

In 2015, an application was submitted by LTBB to the United States government to fund and operate a Tribal Historic Preservation Office, also known as a THPO. The application was approved, and the status of a THPO was awarded for the program to begin in 2016. The THPO is under the guidance of the Legislative Branch of the Tribal Council. Daily management of the program is performed by Wesley Andrews, the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer, and by LTBB Legislative staff.

There are many tribes throughout the United States that have THPO status, seven of the 12 Michigan tribes now have it. The National Historic Preservation Act enables tribes to provide vital protection for its culture and history. This law provides authority to the tribe to identify and protect its histori-



cal and culturally significant places, especially on tribal property. These places will also be placed on a tribally-defined Register of Culture and History maintained by the THPO.

A THPO is also eligible to apply for additional funds for specific projects such as oral history, documenting of skills and traditions between generations. Funds are also available for the preservation of historic buildings owned by the tribe and many other types of

Our community will need to create a tribal historic preservation plan, and the THPO is looking for your comments and suggestions on the kinds of program priorities to develop. Meetings will be held for you to participate in the near future and will be announced as soon as dates have been arranged. Look for future articles in *Odawa Trails* providing interesting items about LTBB history and culture by the

This letter is to provide you with information about the Food and Utility Reimbursement program. An Elder is defined as 55 years of age or older by December 31, 2016. If all requested documents are turned in to the Elders Department by the deadline, you may be able to receive a check up to \$400.00. The deadline to submit your application and receipts is November 30, 2016. Please read this letter all the way through before sending receipts.

Step One. Application materials:

- 1. Fill out the 2016 application included with this letter.
- 2. Send in a combination of paid 2016 grocery receipts and utility bills that total up to \$400.00. The \$400.00 reimbursement can be distributed entirely for utility bills, or entirely for grocery receipts, or for any combination of the two that totals up to \$400.00. Total reimbursement will NOT exceed \$400.00 per applicant.
- Grocery items allowed: those paid in 2016 that concern food grocery toiletries; toilet-paper, Kleenex, paper-towel and house-hold cleaners only
- Grocery items not allowed: pet supplies, tobacco products, or alcohol.
- *Utility bills allowed*; those paid in 2016 that concern heating, electric, water, and trash removal.
- Utility bills not allowed; cell phone, cable, satellite, or internet.

Hand written receipts, cancelled checks, or money order receipts will NOT be accepted. Reimbursement will NOT be provided for food

Step two: How to complete application:

- 1. Complete and sign the application.
- 2. Double check grocery receipts and utility bills sent in have already been paid and are only for items approved in the list above.
- 3. Mail to above address or drop off at the office.

Step three: How your application is processed:

- * Please note this process takes about two weeks.
- 1. When we receive your application, it is stamped with the date it arrives.
- 2. We review the application to make sure it's complete with signature and add up the grocery receipts and utility receipts.
- 3. If application and receipts are complete, a check request will be submitted to LTBB Accounting Department.
- 4. LTBB Accounting Department will mail your check.

MICHIGAN INDIAN LAND CLAIMS SETTLEMENT CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land laims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, vever, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public

Law 105-143, are as follows: 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had t reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their

ertificates upon reaching the age of 18. 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his her certificates must have a notarized signature.

3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least

LTBB Cisco Restoration Program

At the turn of the 20th century, cisco (a cousin of the white-fish) supported extensive commercial and tribal subsistence fisheries and played a critical role in the function of the lake's ecosystem.

During the late 1940s and 50s, cisco stocks exhibited a lakewide population crash, in part, due to invasive species, poor water quality and overharvest. Currently, only one remnant population of cisco is known to exist in Lake Michigan, and their future is uncertain.

Despite considerable attention to their plight by numerous federal, state and non-governmental organizations, few active

efforts have been made to restore native cisco in Lake Michigan, and little information exists regarding the potential success of such efforts.

It is in this context that the Great Lakes Fisheries Program (GLFP) initiated what we are calling the LTBB Cisco Restoration Program. The program is designed to answer several fundamental questions with regard to cisco restoration in Lake Michigan, namely:

What is the status of remnant cisco populations in Lake Michigan?

What is the best way to raise Lake Michigan cisco in a hatchery?

How will hatchery-raised cisco perform in Lake Michigan after they are released?

Since 2013, LTBB successfully collected, incubated and hatched cisco eggs sourced from Grand Traverse Bay, Lake Michigan. Of these eggs, nearly 72,000 cisco have been stocked in Little Traverse Bay at various life stages and during multiple seasons.

Most recently on April 23, 2016, GLFP released 2,404 seven-inch long cisco known as "yearlings." Over the coming years, we will continue to stock cisco in the hope that a self-sustaining population can be established in Little Traverse Bay for use by current and future generations


With funding from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, we have also initiated the

second phase of the project; evaluating the effectiveness of our stocking effort. Each cisco stocked by LTBB receives a combination of marks and tags that allow for differentiation between hatchery and wild fish. In the coming years, we will work with partner agencies to recapture cisco released by the stocking program. Information derived from these recaptured fish will allow for estimates of survival and growth and, in the long term, inform restoration of the species as a whole. Fishermen who encounter a marked or finclipped cisco in Lake Michigan in the coming years are strongly encouraged to contact Great Lakes biologists.

The LTBB Cisco Restoration Program is not likely to single-handedly rehabilitate cisco stocks in Lake Michigan, but the information we gain from carefully planned stocking and evaluation may reduce many of the perceived challenges to a lake-wide restoration program. For us, this project is a small step toward restoring balance to an altered Lake Michigan ecosystem and achieving the seven generations philosophy. Significant technical, financial, and political obstacles are likely, but none are insurmountable with well-placed support from the tribal and broader Lake Michigan community.






The trainees also have language class on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons for just their training cohort. These classes are taught by the fluent project instructor and the other Language Department staff, Gwendolyn Gasco, Netawn Kiogima and Carla Osawamick.

On Wednesdays, they have four hours of teacher-education training. The teacher education time is taught by a team of trainers, who come in and teach at different times. The Language Department staff regularly teach the trainees language grammar and teacher-education. Dorothy Perry and Alison Simon of the LTBB Niigaandwin Education Department each come in once a month to teach the trainees about various topics such as early childhood learning and land-based education. Fred Harrington, a Professor at North Central Michigan College in Petoskey, MI, and previous Tribal Council member, is also on the trainers' team. He comes in on a regular basis each month to teach about curriculum design, community planning and much more. The education training received by the trainees is enriched by having the diverse expertise of several people experienced in education, language and the community.

KAP trainees are currently in the process of planning a Community Gathering for June 18, an afternoon and evening of family, fun, food and language activities. It will be held at the Traditional Pow Wow Grounds on Osborne Road. See the flyer in this issue, June *Odawa Trails*. We hope you and your family will join us.



HARBOR SPRINGS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS DONATE MORE THAN 300 GALLONS TO LTBB WATER DRIVE FOR FLINT, MI

In an effort to help those affected by the Flint, MI, water crisis, elders of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians sponsored a gallon size water drive in Northern Michigan.

They received 400 gallons of donated water – more than 300 gallons were donated by Harbor Springs High School students. Cameron Kennard and other Harbor Springs High School students wanted to do their part to help others, holding a month-long fundraiser at Harbor Springs High School to raise money for the purchase of cases and gallons of water. Cameron also held a weekend-long fundraiser at Shot Makers Golf Center in Alanson, MI, where 40% of the money was raised along with a few extra cases of water.

Odawa Casino in Petoskey, MI, also donated 100 gallons of water, and tribal community members donated gallon size bottles of water. Harbor Springs Storage in Harbor Springs, MI, donated space to store the water.

Some of the donated water was taken to the Water Ceremony and Unity Gathering for Flint, MI, held April 16, 2016 on the U of M Flint Campus with the remainder of the water being delivered to Vernon Chapel Episcopal Church in Flint, MI, on the morning of the water ceremony and unity gathering by Mr. and Mrs. Bart Gasco. This church was chosen because it does not require identification to receive water, and the church delivers water to people who do not have transportation.

The church gave LTBB, the Harbor Springs High School students and Mr. and Mrs. Bart Gasco thank you letters which read, "On behalf of Vernon Chapel AME Church, we would like to convey our sincere thanks for your generous support of gallons of water to our Flint Water Crisis. As you know, needy families and individuals in our community go without proper running water. While all of us are susceptible to hazardous water, our children and seniors make up a large number of those at risk. With the generous support of people like you, we will be able to help many of these children, seniors and their families. Words are truly not enough to express our gratitude for what you and supporters have done for us! Each and every one of you will have a special place in our hearts always. We are truly blessed to have you in our lives. Thank you again for helping us!"





Water Ceremony and Unity Gathering for Flint, MI

As Indigenous People, we know that all parts of our land are sacred. The lifeblood of this earth is the water that flows through our land. As such, we are responsible for ensuring that water is cared for through our traditional ways.

After a conversation in February 2016 about water, Flint, MI, and our responsibility as Anishinabek, Theresa Chingwa, an LTBB Tribal Citizen and Cultural Services Specialist in the Education Department, worked with Don Lyons, Patricia Shawnoo of Kettle Point, Ontario; Joann Carey, Jannan Cotto and Dawn Sineway-Nephler of Northern Michigan; Dana Sitzler of Ann Arbor; and Celia Perez-Booth of Flint, MI, to organize a water ceremony for the city.

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians collaborated with several other tribes and two colleges to support different aspects of the event. Partners of the event included The University of Michigan Flint, Mott College, Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe, Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians, Whitney Henry, Employment Services Access, Kettle & Stoney Point First Nations, Points Eagle Radio Station 107.7 and American Indian Services of Lincoln Park, MI.

Don Lyons of Lansing, MI, one of the organizers, explains, "The Flint gathering was intended to be a grassroots gathering to promote healing, prayers and unity as we move forward from what happened with the water and community around Flint."

The event was held on Saturday, April 16, 2016 where nearly 500 people gathered by the Flint River on the U of M Flint Campus for a Water Ceremony and Unity Gathering to honor and respect our water.

Indigenous Nations, Tribes, First Nations, Native Student Organizations, Water Advocates, Ogichidaa, other faiths, religious beliefs and all walks of life were asked to join in prayer and ceremony to honor the importance of our sacred waters.

People came from all over Michigan and Canada, some from Ohio and Illinois and one from France, Native actor George Aguilar. Eagle staffs and flags were welcome.

The warm sunny day started with a pipe ceremony lead by Joe Mitchell. Everyone was given semaa (tobacco) to pray with. After participants prayed with semaa, it was collected and put into about a dozen pipes that came together.

Those in attendance were asked to bring in a small amount of drinking water from their community for the ceremony.

"We want to put the water together for the ceremony to show unity," explains Theresa. "Some people cannot make it to the ceremony, but will send drinking water from their area, so that they can still be a part of the event."

Water was blessed then given to participants by Grandmother Josephine Mandamin who in 2003, traveled nearly 11,000 miles around the Great Lakes by foot all while holding a staff in one hand and a copper pail of water in the other, which earned her the name "Water Walker."

People were asked not to film most of the water ceremony out of respect.

Various Indigenous leaders and elders from the Great Lakes spoke of the importance and sacredness of our water and how it is important to think about future generations when making decisions about

After the ceremony, a pot luck feast was shared. An Aztec Ceremonial Dance Group shared some songs and dances. Sturgeon Bay Singers sang honor songs, flag songs and ended with a traveling song.

Prior to the ceremony, the elders of the Little Traverse Bay Bands hosted a gallon size water drive in Harbor Springs, MI. Community membersincluding the Odawa Casino Resort and students from Harbor Springs High School-helped collect 400 gallons of water. Some of the water was available to city residents at the event; leftover water was dropped off at a local church by Mr. and Mrs. Bart Gasco. The location was chosen specifically because it does not require that people picking up water


"This historical event came together with the help of many and would not have been possible without it. We have received positive feedback and some people from other tribes that were thinking the same thing, a water ceremony should be done in Flint," explains Theresa.

The spiritual leaders will continue to pray for the water and those affected.

CDC 2016 AMERICAN INDIAN & ALASKA NATIVE CANCER SUMMIT LOOKING BACK AND LOOKING AHEAD: COLLABORATING TO ADVANCE CANCER CONTROL IN AMERICAN INDIAN/ALASKA NATIVE COMMUNITIES



Editor's note: The following is an Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan, Inc. press release dated May 5, 2016.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention 2016 Summit titled, "Looking Back and Looking Ahead: The State of Cancer Control in American Indian and Alaska Native Communities," was held for current CDC grantees April 26-28, 2016 at the Grand Traverse Resort in Traverse City, MI.

CDC grantees from five CDC regions across the country collaborated to discuss cancer health policy implementation in Indian country. The grantees included Fond du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, Cherokee Nation, Kaw Nation, Cheyenne River Sioux, Great Plains Tribal Chairmen's Health Board, Hopi Tribe, Navajo Nation, Tohono O'odham National, SouthEast Alaska Regional Health Consortium, Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium, Arctic Slope, Southcentral Foundation, Yukon-Kuskokwim Health Corporation, Native American Rehabilitation Association (NARA), South Puget Intertribal Planning Agency (SPIPA), Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board and California Rural Indian Health Board.

Day one opened with remarks from the Director of CDC's Division of Cancer Prevention and Control, Lisa Richardson, MD, MPH as well the opening prayer for the event offered by Ruth Bussey, Grand Traverse Band Health Director. Joshua Hudson of the National Native Network (NNN), Margaret Farrell from the National Cancer Institute (NCI), Nina Miller of the American College of Surgeons (ACOS) as well as Ena Wanliss and Annie Brayboy from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention welcomed everyone to the event and provided the overview for the summit.

Dr. David Espey, MD of the CDC was day one's keynote speaker. Dr. Espey's presentation "Cancer Surveillance in American Indian and Alaska Natives: What the Data are telling us and Future Directions" focused on emerging trends within American/Alaska Native cancer data sets.

Next was a panel discussion moderated by Kim Marcucci, BFA of the Southcentral Foundation. The panelists, Kris Rhodes, MPH of the American Indian Cancer Foundation, Diana Redwood, PhD, MPH of the Alaska Tribal Health Consortium and Delf Schmidt–Grimminger, MD, MBA of the University of South Dakota presented "Unique Characteristics of Tribal Communities and the Impact of Cancer Control" focusing on different areas, including research, tobacco abuse and colorectal cancer.

search, tobacco abuse and colorectal cancer.

During the afternoon, Noel Pingatore, BS, CPH of the National Native Network and Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan moderated a discussion with panelists Donald Haverkamp, MPH of the CDC; Melissa Jim, MPH of the CDC; Glenn Copeland, BBA, MBA of the State of Michigan; and Bonnie Culfa, RN, MSN of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians Health Division. The afternoon wrapped with working breakout sessions moderated by Linda Burhansstipanov, MSPH, DrPh of Native American Cancer Research, echoing the keynote address and subsequent panel discussing opportunities to decrease disparities in AI/AN communities. This was followed by a summary and

evaluation along with a preview of day two with Jen

Olson, MS of the South Puget Intertribal Planning agency, Ena Wanliss and Annie Brayboy.

The final event of the first day was an nDigi Fest, which was sponsored by the California Rural Indian Health Board and the National Native Network. The event was a cultural exchange through "digital storytelling," which includes stories which cover many aspects of cancer prevention, education, care and treatment. The program celebrated and honored cancer-related, Native-focused digital stories in a "story" setting which was culturally unique and powerfully healing. The presentation was moderated by Brenda K. Stories included titles "Zaagidiwin (Love)" told by Punkin Shananaquet of the Lac Courte Oreilles/ Match-e-be-nash-she-wish Band of Potawatomi; "Stage 2...Stage 3" by Rita McDonald, Cancer Navigator for Northern Cheyenne Tribe, "Lessons Learned" told by Donald Sumners of the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians, "Yuuluaqaucirkaq (Healthy Way of Living)" told by Agnes Roland of the Yupik, "My Mother Prayed Cancer Away" told by Ophelia Spencer of the Navajo, "Nikaanag (My brothers, my friends)" told by Dr. Erich Longie of the Spirit Lake Sioux, "Gift of Another Day" told by Dr. Suzanne Cross of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe and "Calling on the Great Spirit" by Daisy Kostus.

The second day of the AI/AN Cancer Summit opened with Sharon Johnson, Fond du Lac Wiidookaage Cancer Team Chairwoman, offering the opening prayer for the event.

Ena Wanliss, Annie Brayboy and Noel Pingatore offered the day one summary and day two objectives. This was followed by the day two keynote speaker, Jeffrey Henderson, MD, MPH of the Black Hills Center for American Indian Health presenting "Intersections of Culture, Science, Policy and Cancer Disparities Among AI/AN."

The meeting then transitioned to "Embracing Policy, Systems and Environmental (PSE) Approaches to Address Cancer Disparities in AI/AN Communities" panel presentation in two parts. The discussion was moderated by Richard Mousseau, MS of the Great Plains Tribal Chairmen's Health Board and Linda Burhansstipanov, MSPH, DrPh of Native American Cancer Research. The panelists were Margie Burkhart, BA of Cherokee Nation and Eric Vinson of Northwest Portland Area Indian Health Board for the first portion; the discussion continued with presentations by Evelyn Watchman of Navajo Nation and concluded with a presentation from Richard Mousseau. The remainder of the day was dedicated to breakout sessions working to identify PSE opportunities and needs facilitated by CDC Program Consultants.

Day three opened with a prayer offered by Karen Morgan of the Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium. Summaries of the first and second days and objectives for the third day were facilitated again by Ena Wanliss and Annie Brayboy of the



opinion on the stuff. I would advise, "It's your shot." He would ask, "What club should I use?" I would say, "The one, other one you didn't already use."

Annette VanDeCar, Communications Coordinator: "The Communications Department used to be in the Tribal Administration suite at the government building, and Al's office was next door to the suite. At the time, the entire suite, which included Communications, Elders and Al's assistant, were women. It never failed that Al would always walk into the middle of our 'girl talk.' It never seemed to faze him; he always just kept walking and humming or singing like he never heard anything. It was funny because he never knew what he would walk into

Julie Janiskee, Administrative Assistant in the Tribal Chairperson's Office: "Even though his job was a difficult one, I never once witnessed Al have a negative attitude or convey that he was in a bad mood. He was such a generous guy. I can't even count the number of times I witnessed him take money from his own wallet to support Tribal events and many other things. On Administrative Professionals Day, he brought us hyacinth plants and took us to lunch. I will always treasure that hyacinth, and plant it in my yard where I can look at it and think of Al. I will dearly miss hearing him say, 'WHAAAAT?,' singing songs, his great laugh, thinking out loud or just enjoying his oatmeal or doughnuts in the morning. Al was always excited about life and about the next concert he would be attending or the next plans he had with his children and grandchildren who it was easy to tell were the light of his life. I feel so lucky that I got to know him as well as I did. I miss our friend Al with all of my

Marie "Tootsie" Miller, former Elders Coordinator: "Al Colby, 'In your time, you touched so many lives and in your death, many lives have changed! I miss your exuberance and laughter!' In

Spencer McCormack, Fisheries Technician: "I didn't know Al for a long time, but I knew him very well. We developed a friendship based on something we both love, which is music. When you play music with another person, you are able to genuinely understand each other. Music provides a personal expression that is like a viewing glass into your soul. You don't have to know someone's history when you play music with them, you understand how they feel and the energy they bring through the way they play. Al was a big supporter of me musically. He always wanted me to 'let loose' with the guitar solos. 'Don't hold back,' he'd say. He loved listening and playing along with me and others and he wanted to share that.
