THE TRIBAL OPEN DUMP CLEANUP: An Environmental Success!

Trash. Garbage. Refuse. Solid Waste. There are many terms used to describe the stuff we humans decide to throw away. In our quest to become better stewards of the earth and the resources we rely on, we try to reduce the amount of waste we produce as much as we can. Unfortunately, we live in a very short term "one use" type of materialist economy here in the United States, so producing at least some waste is inevitable. Hopefully, you as a responsible citizen choose to recycle the items you can and dispose of the trash that can't be recycled in the correct manner.

Here in Emmet and Charlevoix Counties also known as LTBB's 1836 Treaty Ceded Territory, we are lucky to have a great location to recycle items and dispose of our trash properly at the Emmet County Transfer Station. The unlucky part of this story is the fact the transfer station has not always been there, and people haven't always ditched their waste correctly. In some cases, people just don't want to deal with the "inconvenience" of properly disposing of their garbage, so they find a spot on their property (or their neighbor's property) to dump their trash. These unregulated and illegal trash piles are referred to as open dumps, and until recently, seven tribal properties contained examples of these open dumps. Fortunately, through the hard work and collaboration of LTBB government employees, Indian Health Services (IHS) and local companies, these dumps have recently been cleaned up! Now, the areas where they once existed can either be reused or allowed to return to their original wild state.

Back in June 2016, the LTBB Environmental Services Program was awarded a Sanitation Grant from the Indian Health Service. This grant was applied for by the previous Environmental Response Specialist (ERS) for the tribe, Kevin Hurrell. He was assisted by other LTBB government employees like Doug Craven (NRD Director), Amber Holt (Grant Writer) and Daugherty Johnson (Environmental Services Manager). The grant had three goals including:

- 1. Upgrading LTBB's Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan (ISWMP)
 - 2. Cleaning up the open dumps on tribal properties
 - 3. Enacting improvements to the ISWMP to prevent

According to the Miss North Carolina USA/Miss North Carolina Teen USA website, a young woman qualified for the pageant if she was single (never married), had never given birth to a child, was a United States citizen and was a resident or full-time college student in the state of North Carolina. To be 2018 Miss North Carolina USA, a young woman must be at least 18 and under the age of 28by January 1, 2018.

The following appears on the Miss North Carolina USA/Miss North Carolina Teen USA website:

"My name is Caelynn Miller-Keyes and I am Miss North Carolina USA 2018. I graduated from VCU (Virginia Commonwealth University) with a Bachelor's degree in broadcast journalism. I am currently working at Windy Gap, a Young Life camp in Weaverville, where I am able to mentor young girls.

During my year as Miss North Carolina USA, I plan to visit several different children's hospitals and sit with the patients and their parents. When I was two years old, I was diagnosed with encephalitis and my parents were told that I would likely pass away. The doctors prepared my parents for the worst, and told them if I did survive I would only



have a 10% chance of ever walking again. I hope my story and my recovery can inspire children and parents who feel hopeless. The power of prayer is real and I never want these children to give up hope.

My goal as Miss North Carolina USA is to continue improving Title IX policies for sexual assault survivors. I hope in sharing my story, I can inspire women and men to speak up for themselves if they experience any type of iniustice.

I want to empower women across North Carolina to allow their voices to be heard and to learn the power forgiveness can have in a tough situation. Forgiveness allowed me to gain my power back and truly be able to heal. I hope to help others find this freedom for themselves during my "Miss North Carolina" continued on page 25.

TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Allie Greenleaf Maldonado: Civil Rights Fighter

Editor's note: For the past 38 years, the *Detroit News* has recognized individuals who have made significant contributions to their communities by selecting them as Michiganians of the Year. LTBB Chief Judge Allie Greenleaf Maldonado, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, was selected for the 2017Class of Michiganians of the Year. The following article and accompanying photograph by Dale G. Young appeared in the *Detroit News* on September 14, 2017, and they are reprinted here with permission.

The only lawyers Allie Greenleaf Maldonado saw while growing up were on television or in the movies. Years later in college, a professor challenged her to consider the unthinkable: Become a judge.

"Quietly, secretly, I dared to dream of one day becoming a judge," she said.

But, doubt crept in.

"I did not know of anyone who looked like me on the bench. Furthermore, I understood how being connected to the right people impacted your career. My family and I were not connected to anyone in power."

That did not matter.

Maldonado graduated in the top third of her class from the University of Michigan Law School.

Maldonado now is the Chief Judge for the 4,566 citizens of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians in

Harbor Springs, MI. She is a citizen of the tribe and a member of the Turtle Clan. She was appointed the Chief Judge of the LTBB Tribal Court in 2012.

After getting her undergraduate degree from the City University of New York and Juris Doctorate

from the University of Michigan Law School, Maldonado was selected through the Honors Program at the U.S. Department of Justice to be a litigator in the Indian Resources Section of the Environment and Natural Resources Division in Washington.

In September 2002, Maldonado returned to Michigan to serve as Assistant General Counsel for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, a position she held until her appointment as Chief Judge of the Tribal Court.

But, it is her tireless work to bring the state into compliance with the Indian Child Welfare Act that earned her the Unsung Hero Award by the Michigan State Bar. Maldonado successfully litigated the first case in which the Michigan Court of Appeals overturned the termination of parental rights due to a failure by the state to follow ICWA.

"The ICWA is a federal law passed in 1978 in response to the alarmingly high number of Indian children being removed from their homes under federal and state Indian removal policies," said Maldonado, 46. "Yet there are still areas of the country today where ICWA is ignored or misapplied. Michigan used to be one of those states. I went to law school because I wanted to keep what happened to my family from happening to other Native families."

She credits her tribe for making it possible to achieve the successes with the ICWA.

"Without their unwavering support, I could not have focused on child welfare issues," she said.

For the judge, those child welfare issues are personal.

Her grandmother, Lou Ella Bush, and all of her great-uncles fell victim to the practice of removing Native American children from their homes and placing them in a boarding school. Her mother, Donna Lou Chapman, also was removed from her home after her mother died when Chapman still was a child.

"My mother could have been placed with a dozen different appropriate relatives," Maldonado said. "Instead, she was sent to live as a domestic worker for a Mennonite minister and his wife. This was a common practice before the Indian Child Welfare Act."

snack tips for parents




10 tips for healthy snacking

Snacks can help children get the nutrients needed to grow and maintain a healthy weight. Prepare single-serving snacks for younger children to help them get just enough to satisfy their hunger. Let older kids make their own snacks by keeping healthy foods in the kitchen. Visit ChooseMyPlate.gov to help you and your kids select a satisfying snack.

save time by slicing veggies

Store sliced vegetables in the refrigerator and serve with dips like hummus or low-fat dressing. Top half a whole-wheat English muffin with spaghetti sauce, chopped vegetables, and low-fat shredded mozzarella and melt in the microwave.

mix it up For older school-age kids, mix dried fruit, unsalted nuts, and popcom in a snack-size bag for a quick trail mix. Blend plain fat-free or low-fat yogurt with 100% fruit juice and frozen peaches for a tasty smoothie.



A cup of low-fat or fat-free milk or milk alternative (soy milk) is an easy way to drink a healthy snack

go for great whole grains Offer whole-wheat breads, popcorn, and whole-oat cereals that are high in fiber and low in added sugars, saturated fat, and sodium. Limit refined-grain products such as snack bars, cakes, and sweetened cereals.

nibble on lean protein Choose lean protein foods such as low-sodium deli meats, unsalted nuts, or eggs. Wrap sliced, lowsodium deli turkey or ham around an apple wedge. Store unsalted nuts in the pantry or peeled, hard-cooked (boiled) eggs in the refrigerator for kids to enjoy any time.

keep an eye on the size

Snacks shouldn't replace a meal, so look for ways to help your kids understand how much is enough. Store snack-size bags in the cupboard and use them to control serving sizes.

fruits are quick and easy Fresh, frozen, dried, or canned fruits can be easy "grab-and-go" options that need little preparation. Offer whole fruit and limit the amount of 100% juice served.

consider convenience A single-serving container of low-fat or fat-free yogurt or individually wrapped string cheese can be just enough for an after-school snack

swap out the sugar Keep healthier foods handy so kids avoid cookies, pastries, or candies between meals. Add seltzer water to a 1/2 cup of 100% fruit juice instead of offering soda.

prepare homemade goodies For homemade sweets, add dried fruits like apricots or raisins and reduce the amount of sugar. Adjust recipes that include fats like butter or shortening by using unsweetened applesauce or prune puree for half the amount of fat.

USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

DPA - Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to 00 to assist in foreclosure prevention.



GIFTS FROM THE NORTH WOODS: HOW NATHAN WRIGHT FOUNDED HERBAL LODGE

Editor's note: The following article and accompanying photograph appeared in the *Northern Express* on September 25, 2017, and they are reprinted here with permission.

He's most familiar with the crunch of twigs underfoot, the scents of pine and earth - and the elusive gifts that nature can bring. It's safe to say that Nathan Wright (pictured above) spends a lot of time in the woods. "As a kid growing up in Rochester Hills, I was often out there by myself, learning how to not be afraid of it," he said. Bouncing between southern Michigan and the U.P. when his parents separated took Wright, then 13 years old, into another new forest ecosystem.

His interest in the wilderness continued when he joined the U.S. Marines later in life. After going through survival training at Camp Pendleton, he was sent on a Pacific Ocean tour of duty where he added jungle training to his list of outdoor skills.

Throughout all of it, the biggest influential thread was his father, Mike Wright, a member of the Sault Tribe of Chippewa Indians and a well-regarded Native American activist. "He's the one who got me into Native American medicines," Nathan Wright said. His father also introduced him to Native American medicine man Dan Pine, Sr., who taught the younger Wright the ceremonial aspects of Native American culture.

"We'd go to Dan, Sr.'s home in Garden River, Ontario, every week in the summer," Wright said. "That's where I first learned about using plants for things like coughs and using cedar tea for cleansing."

Wright also looked upon Pine as a mentor: "He also gave me a lot of guidance as I was becoming a teenager, and helped better my relationship with my father," Wright said. "I'd been around powwows my whole life, but had never gone this deep into the culture. Dan, Sr. expanded my introduction to my ancestors"

After the Marines, Wright decided to pursue a career in information technology. He moved to Minneapolis, taking jobs with a webpage design company and later with NetRadio Networks; but he kept his plant passion to himself the whole time. "Back then, that kind of thing was looked down upon," he said. "People would've just asked what a grown man was doing playing around with plants." When his father, who was still in the U.P., began having health issues, Wright packed up and headed home. "I was making a fifth of what I was in Minneapolis, but I wanted to be there for Dad," Wright said. The two Wrights, father and son, spent more time together, the elder teaching the younger about herbal plants and medicines.

Five years later, the elder Wright had passed away. But his



influence had been well planted, and his son would soon find that it would grow in ways he never expected. In 2008, Wright met Monica Cady, another member of the Sault tribe, at a powwow. "Monica presented me with a jar of herbal salve she'd made, and I was intrigued by how well it worked on my own dry skin," Wright said. "I started wondering if herbal medicines would have helped my dad before he passed away."

The elder Wright, who had eczema but died from liver cancer, had been on a lot of pain medications, which Wright is convinced contributed to his death. "That is what inspired me to learn more about natural pain relief alternatives, and to offer them to everyone suffering pain," Wright said.

He and Cady started experimenting to create salves based on Native American medicine. The first product they settled on was Nojmuk dry skin relief topical salve, which was based on the first salve that Cady brought to Wright. Today, it includes 20 different ingredients. Nojimuk lip balms, also based on that salve, are available too. "We perfected that product and the process used to make it," Wright said.

Wright has also found a fast friendship with Dan Pine, Jr., Dan Pine Sr.'s son, whom he didn't meet until later in both of their lives. The men got along right away as both friends and "plant people," as Wright put it.

"Dan, Jr. always says that the medicines he makes for people come to him in his dreams," Wright said. "He and I started working together, harvesting whatever we could find. One day, Dan, Jr. was trying to teach Wright how to find spikenard [plants], which would reveal its own lessons. Dan kept saying 'It's right there,' but I just couldn't see it. It took quite a while, but suddenly, I started seeing it everywhere — that's when I learned that medicinal plants only show themselves to you when you're ready to see them." Today, Wright harvests directly from the forests of northern Michigan, always practicing sustainable harvesting methods. His daughter, Autumn Wright, assists with production. And they limit the products that Herbal Lodge makes. Right now, they're focusing on four. That might not sound like a lot — until you consider the magnitude of cultural history, research, and effort that go into each one. "We didn't want to start selling 30 or 40 products," Wright said. "We want-

ed to get known for just a few,

and produce everything at very

high quality. Every year we've increased how much we make, so I think we're doing okay." In addition to the Nojmuk and Nojmuk lip balms, Herbal Lodge also offers Minagin, a natural, topical pain-relief salve based on a legendary Native American salve. "The main herbal ingredient for Minagin, balm of gilead buds, can't be sourced from most ingredient companies; we have to wild-harvest it," Wright said. "It's harvested from a tree, and it has to be a winter harvest, so it's hard, intense work. But the Michigan version of that ingredient is the very best." Finally, there's the Chaga Thunder tea, which could merit an entire story all on its own. "Chaga used to be burned by Native Americans around here for its smell, for ceremonial purpose, and to ease headaches," Wright said. Chaga is a wild mushroom that Herbal Lodge harvests from mushrooms growing on white birch trees; it's said to have strong health benefits and is often referred to as a superfood, with high antimicrobial activity, antioxidants, and soothing properties. The flavor is earthy, faintly vanilla, and nutty, best sweetened with maple syrup.

Herbal Lodge's products have been getting quite a bit of attention. Wright is working on a book about Native American herbal medicines that he hopes to see out in 2019, and he'll be speaking at the Northern Michigan Small Farms Conference in January 2018.

"We are also currently working on a partnership with the largest distributed native American company," he said.

In the end, though, his business isn't about money. "I do make a living from this, but I find it more meaningful to focus on being passionate about the products and about helping our customers," he said.

The other bonus? Returning to the forests from which his inspiration first came. "Wild harvesting' is something we really do — it's not just a marketing term," Wright said. "I can return to my childhood memories and passion by going into the woods, this time not to play, but to bring out some time-tested remedies to help everyone in need. We consider ourselves lucky and blessed to do what we do."

Herbal Lodge is based in Hessel, MI, with a sales office in Petoskey, MI. You can find Herbal Lodge products at Oryana in Traverse City, MI, Indian Hills Gallery in Petoskey, MI, the Good Hart General Store in Good Hart, MI, and Cross in the Woods in In-

dian River, MI.



Indian Country Today Media Network Assets to NCAI

The National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) today (October 4, 2017) announced it is as-



suming control of the assets of Indian Country Today Media Network (ICTMN), the result of a donation to the organization by the Oneida Indian Nation. "NCAI's Executive Officers and I are humbled by this donation from ICTMN and the Oneida Indian Nation," said NCAI President Brian Cladoosby. "Their love for Indian Country carries through their every word and has inspired our tribal communities to tell their own stories. This is an immense responsibility; NCAI will approach this responsibility thoughtfully and deliberately with an eye towards strengthening Indian Country's voice." ICTMN recently halted operations to evaluate its next steps in the face of unprecedented changes in the publishing industry, changes that have presented complicated challenges for every media organization across the country. "ICTMN has been the flagship publication producing unique and original reporting about Indian Country - and the Oneida Indian Nation has played a pivotal role in forging that legacy," said NCAI Executive Director Jacqueline Pata. "After years of strong investments, we appreciate the Oneida Nation now turning over ICTMN's assets to our organization, and we look forward to convening meetings with key stakeholders over the next several months to construct a blueprint for how to best respectfully carry on ICTMN's mission." Over the past four decades, the ICTMN has evolved from a local weekly print newsletter to a national



magazine and now an online news syndicate reporting on the ground from - and for - Indian Country about the critical issues impacting Native nations and peoples in the United States and around the globe. "When the Oneida Indian Nation decided to purchase Indian Country Today Media Network, we had a singular goal in mind: We wanted to create award-winning journalism that gives voice to Native Americans, wherever they lived. ICTMN clearly achieved that goal," said Oneida Indian Nation Representative Ray Halbritter. "We know that when we leave our stories to be told only by other media outlets, those stories too often go untold - or aren't told accurately. ICTMN proved that we do not have to sit idly by while that happens. We are very happy to be able to donate ICTMN's assets to NCAI - an organization whose entire mission is to advocate for tribal sovereignty and treaty rights and advance a common understanding of who Native nations and peoples are today." During its years being supported by the Oneida Indian Nation, the organization was recognized for its groundbreaking journalism spotlighting the complex issues facing Native nations and communities, earning several prestigious awards - 30 alone in 2017 from the Native American Journalists Association (NAJA); multiple Clarion Awards; and individual awards and grants to contributors from the Society of Professional Journalists, the Herb Block Prize for cartooning, USC's Annenberg Center and the Playboy Foundation. MICHIGAN INDIAN LAND CLAIMS SETTLEMENT CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates. The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming cer-

tificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows: 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had

- not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18. 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his
- or her certificates must have a notarized signature. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least

4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address Note: The address on the certificates is not correct:

"Cleanup" continued from page 1. future open dumps.

Before leaving, the previous Environmental Response Specialist Kevin Hurrell spent many hours in the field finding, surveying and mapping out the locations of the open dumps. Then, the new Environmental Response Specialist for the tribe, Traven Michaels, was hired in October 2016. He continued this field work and took hundreds of photos documenting these dumps. He also refined the open dump maps and GPS locations with the help of the LTBB GIS Department. Once this important field work was completed, a report was sent to IHS detailing the open dumps cleanup plan. Eric Burtt and his counterparts at IHS took it upon themselves to obtain National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) clearance for the proposed cleanups. NEPA Clearance essentially reviews proposed projects to ensure there are no significant detrimental effects on the environment. The clearance was granted to LTBB in the second quarter of 2017. The seven dumps to be cleaned up were as follows, listed in order from

smallest to largest in size:

Ziibiimijiwang Farm - 5055 Gill Rd., Carp Lake,
MI 49718

Ceremonial and Hunting Property - 5563 Osbourne Rd., Harbor Springs, MI 49740

Tribal Housing Complex, Future Burial Site -10577 Murray Rd., Charlevoix, MI 49720

Old Inn Site, Future Development - 1020 South Nicolett St., Mackinaw City, MI 49701

Taimi Hoag Nature Preserve – U.S. 31 across

from Big Rock Rd, Charlevoix, MI 49720 Econolodge Dumping, Forested Valley 1760

Lears Rd., Petoskey, MI 49770
Biindigen Gas Station - 2169 U.S. 31, Petoskey, MI 49770

Finally, the stage was set for the cleanup to begin. The Environmental Response Specialist worked with LTBB's Accounting Department to develop a request for proposals (RFP) so LTBB could hire a qualified contractor to clean up the dumps. After a few weeks of bidding time, the local contractor, Tri-County Excavating, was hired on July 21, 2017. Their work to clean up the dumps was completed

over the first two weeks in August. Using equipment like backhoes, excavators, skidsters, dump trucks and chainsaws, Tri County did a great job cleaning up the largest portions of the dumps. Safety and environmental protection were their top priorities.

With the large majority of the waste contained in these dumps cleaned up by Tri County, the Environmental Response Specialist (Traven Michaels) moved forward with a plan to collaborate with other LTBB programs to clean up any remaining scraps left behind. Over the next couple of weeks, employees from the Youth Conservation Corps, Environmental Services Program, the Tribal SEEDS and the Natural Resources Department volunteered to visit the dump cleanup sites and hand remove any leftover debris and refuse. More than four truck beds of dump materials were cleaned up! Chii miigwetch to Daugherty Johnson, Jon Mauchmar, Noah Jansen, Maxwell Field and the YCC and SEEDS Crews for the help!

In the end, all seven dumps were successfully cleaned up! We encourage the reader to take a look at the pictures included with this article to see some before and after photos and pictures of the work being completed!

In conclusion, cleaning up these solid waste sites will greatly benefit the tribe by cleaning up the environment, fostering outdoor recreation, providing potential for economic development, enhancing tribal food sovereignty, improving the aesthetic quality of tribal property and protecting overall tribal sovereignty, treaty rights and resources. This work would not have been possible without the collaboration and cooperation of many different LTBB employees, departments and citizens. The IHS Grant still has funding left for accomplishing the next two goals of updating and enacting improvements to the LTBB Integrated Solid Waste Management Plan. Hopefully, this work will prevent any future open dumps from appearing. You can rest assured the Environmental Services Program, especially the Environmental Response (128a) Program, will keep a close eye on our tribal properties for signs of any new dumping. Let us all work together towards reducing waste, protecting our natural resources and cleaning up Ishkamikwe!






