### What's Been Happening at the Former Victories Casino Site in Petoskey, Michigan?



Odawa Economic Development Management, Incorporated (OED-MI) will soon begin reshaping and re-grading the former Victories Casino site south of Petoskey, MI, in preparation for construction of roads and new commercial buildings.

This will bring about the first phase or about 30,000 square feet of an eventual 90,000 square feet of retail and other space. The site plan, which is in the process of being submitted to Tribal Council for review, shows a public square, retail space and more than 600' of high visibility frontage on U.S. 131.

### Tribal Court Shoots Down Injunctive Order to Halt the Diversion of Fresh Water Used in Fracking Against the Governor of Michigan for Violation of Tribal and State Law

Editor's note: The following is a press release from Phil Bellfy and Tim LaCroix, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, dated October 7, 2014.

In a ruling by Judge Allie Maldonado of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Tribal Court, Phil Bellfy and Tim LaCroix have been dealt a setback in their goal to stop the diversion of millions of gallons of fresh water for fracking, which they feel is in violation of Tribal and State Law.

"The Judge issued an 'Order of Dismissal,' citing a 'Lack of Subject Matter Jurisdiction,' but this is not over - we will appeal this ruling," Bellfy said. "The Judge cited a number of laws and statutes to defend her decision, but she failed to uphold the LTBB Tribal Constitution, under which an individual can sue. Although the individual Statute in question does state that the Tribal Government can sue and has sole authority to do so, a Tribal Statute does

not trump a Tribal Constitution."

"We do not have to wait for a Tribal Government to act on our suit," LaCroix said. "If this decision is left to stand, it would take away the Constitutional individual rights of the Tribal Membership."

LaCroix also said that the recent Resolution by the Eastern Band of Cherokee against fracking gives him hope that his Tribe will have the wisdom in protecting our natural resources. He also referred to a very recent landmark court case in New York where individual towns were successful with the New York's Highest Court in affirming their right to ban fracking.

"The momentum is going our way," LaCroix said. "We just need brave people to make the stand. There are leaders and then, there are followers; we are asking the Tribes in Michigan to stand as leaders with us. I do not want to see the beautiful area we live in polluted, like 'frack-water'

LTBB Chief Judge Allie Greenleaf Maldonado dismissed the case, but LaCroix and Bellfy plan to appeal it to the LTBB Appellate Court.

### Honoring Our LTBB Tribal Citizen Veterans - In Memory of Augustine C. Kiogima

#### In Memory of Augustine C. Kiogima

This month's featured veteran is an LTBB Tribal Elder who recently walked on after 86 years among us. Augustine C. Kiogima was born in 1928 in Harbor Springs, MI, and during his early years, he attended Harbor Springs schools, both Holy Childhood and the public schools.

He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1944 and served on the Pacific Coast, participating in flights all around the Pacific Rim. He later told stories of his adventures while in the service, including the time he missed his train from Northern Michigan



and had to hitchhike all the way to his base in Gillette, WY.

While in the Army, he attained the rank of Corporal, and then, was part of the transition when the U.S. Army Air Corps became the United States Air Force. He lat-



er attained the rank of Technical Sergeant and was stationed at locations in Colorado and Wyoming. His specialty was working as a repair mechanic and a member of the Crash Crew, and he had many stories of the planes he worked on and around. He was honorably discharged in 1949 and returned home to Harbor Springs.

Among the things he enjoyed most about his time in the military were the ca-



maraderie among the troops and the opportunities to ride his motorcycle. In his later years, he was a regular participant in pow wows and parades and most recently attended the LTBB Odawa Homecoming Pow Wow where he proudly wore his "stripes" and his World War II Victory

Lead Payroll Technician Angela Friend

Angela Friend has worked for LTBB since January 15, 2001. She has lived in the Northern Michigan area all of her life as did her parents and grandparents.

In her position, she completes multiple tasks. Some of those include answering payroll questions, updating payroll files and completing employment verifications for court and financial institutions.

### **Accounts Payable Tonia Gasco**

I have been with the Accounting Department team for more than 10 years. It has been quite the experience working for the tribal government. For some time, I was a one-man show. I did not realize I was so good with math and had an eye for detail, which is highly needed in the position. It takes a lot of patience and knowledge of how the Accounting procedures take place and how to process billing to produce checks at the end. It's like a little assembly line. Review all that comes across the desk from daily post office mail to interoffice mail from departments to be processed for pay-

ments or they try to pass through for processing.

This is where some fun for Accounts Payable begins, when we receive an interoffice envelope from the department. We must be sure all is correct before we can pass on



to the next step, which is with our staff accountants for approval to process for payment. Sometimes, we get lots of incomplete documentation and have to send back for proper documentation over and over. Even staff who have been here longer forget the process. It becomes quite the task to keep all documentation correct with all proper signatures of approval before sending to the staff accountants, so we can process for payment and be able to produce checks.

We usually have two check runs a week; it varies when a holiday interferes. We have approximately 300 checks a week we produce, and we send some of the checks to departments as they requested, but we mail most. We have most on a schedule knowing when the next billing statement from PNC, credit cards to Walmart.

I have great assistance when they hired an Accounting Technician, Lisa Brookens, with the overload; as the tribe grows, so do the bills. I enjoy the busy atmosphere and hope to continue the great service I can provide.

### Purchasing Technician Mandy Szocinski

On November 20, 2014, Mandy Szocinski will begin her 15th year of employment with LTBB. She drives 150 miles roundtrip every day from her home in Lewiston, MI, to the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

In her position, she completes multiple tasks simultaneously. Some of those include assisting purchasing, assisting accounts payable, handling vendors and fixed assets

and writing independent contracts.

Writing independent contracts entails seeking con-



tractors, getting the best bang for the buck and seeing the work is completed. Contracts works closely with the Housing Department, the Planning Department, the Tribal Court and the Grants Department.

"I enjoy working with people and helping people," she said. "I like knowing I helped someone get their house fixed, their bill paid, to a safe place or to go somewhere and learn (travel). I like that every day is something different and a chance to learn new things."

## EPARTMENT COMMERCE AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example be-

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable,

gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

### Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

### LTBB

Tribal identification cards now have a hologram. This is an added security feature to eliminate duplication. We are phasing out the old cards. Once your Tribal identification card has expired, you will be issued the new hologram card along with a replacement fee of \$10. Replacement cost includes: address change, lost card, expired cards and minors turning 21. There will be no fee charged for: elders (55 and up), first time picture identification card, name change, defective card, faded or cracked (must bring card to office).



The Special Prosecutor/Assistant Prosecutor is nominated by the Executive and appointed by Tribal Council. After being nominated by the Executive, Tribal Council appointed Hesselink by a 6-2-0-1 (yes, no, abstain, absent) vote at the July 20, 2014 Tribal Council meeting.

### PLEASE BE COURTEOUS AND PROVIDE 24-HOUR NOTICE WHEN YOU CAN'T MAKE YOUR MEDICAL/DENTAL APPOINTMENT



No show, no call is defined as not going to your medical/dental appointment without at least a 24-hour notice. There are a certain number of no shows, no calls in any medical office. Providers are always working to reduce or eliminate no shows due to the fact there is usually a wait for appointments that are not urgent or emergency. Unfortunately, we have a large number of no shows without proper no-

tification in our tribal health center. We realize there may be situations where notification is not possible, hospitalization for example, but for the most part, patients should be responsible for notifying us in the event they cannot make their appointment. Most medical practices will charge up to \$75 if you fail to show without a 24-hour notice. However, a better approach would seem to be that our community would be respectful and appreciative of others who may be waiting for an appointment and provide proper notification. This will allow for more efficient scheduling since cancelled appointments can then be given to another patient. We will continue to provide same day service for urgent or emergency appointments whenever possible. I hope this fall finds you well, and remember to get your flu shot. Miigwetch.



### LOCATIONS OF OBJECTS

When talking about where someone or something is at, we use different words, depending on the gender of the object. Gender in this case means whether it is an animate object or an inanimate object. There are actually three categories when speaking about the location of objects:

Animate 1 (with a heartbeat) includes animate objects with a heartbeat, so it would include people and animals. (This is the type we put in last month's newsletter.)

Animate 2 (without a heartbeat) includes objects or things spoken about as being animate, but do not have a heartbeat or are not considered alive as in the sense of a person or animal. This includes things such as feather, car, clock, pencil, scarf, gloves or mittens. (This is the type we put in this month's newsletter.)

Inanimate includes all other things not in one of the animate categories. (This is the type we will put in next month's newslet-

My fellow citizens, it has been a very rewarding and satisfying past month. During September to mid-October as I write this, there are several positive things to report on and to keep our tribal nation informed.

The governmental staff, working in conjunction with the Odawa Casino in Petoskey, MI, have been diligently doing their best to get hotel furniture distributed to the elders and those in need within our community, both local and statewide. This has been progressing for several months, and we wholeheartedly thank the Odawa Casino for the furniture that was donated and for covering the costs related to the storage. Many, many staff are to be given kudos for their efforts, LTBB employees in the USDA Commodities Program for storing and helping to load and deliver furniture; Elders Department Manager Rachel Dugal for personally contacting elders outside of the immediate area and arranging for delivery to Grand Rapids, MI, Lansing, MI, and Escanaba, MI; thanks to the Department of Human Services staff for contacting tribal citizens they have worked with and know to be in need of furniture items; and employees from various other departments also helped. It was great to see such a collaborative and willing response from everyone involved to help get this done. This is the first time that a coordinated effort had ever been made to reach out and extend the initial offer of free furniture to all elders and those in need (local and statewide) beyond just opening the doors on a first-come, first-served basis. This effort was pulled together by Interim Tribal Administrator Denise Petoskey who came up with a viable plan to disburse the remaining furniture. It was such a community-wide effort. A special Chi Megwetch to

September 20, 2014 was the 20th Anniversary of our Reaffirmation. It has been 20 years since the U.S. Government reaffirmed what we as Odawa have always known, we are Odawa and a Nation. The battle for reaffirmation started 150-plus years ago, and many Great Grandfathers, Great Grandmothers and many others over the years were involved in the process. Chi Megwetch to them for having the desire, the vision, the commitment and the fortitude to carry this out – without you, we certainly would not be where we are today! Locally, we celebrated "Our" Day with a parade and a great fun-filled family atmosphere and good food. Kudos to all who planned and volunteered their time to make this day a great event even under threat of rain.

On September 24, 2014, the Chairman was able to attend a presentation put on by Essence of Emmet County, which is a group dedicated to the preservation of the local history and its far reaching effects. Representing the LTBB was the Director of Archives, Records and Repatriation Department, Eric Hemenway, former LTBB Chairman Frank Ettawageshik and Historian James McClurken. It was very well attended by both tribal and non-tribal participants, and much was learned. Local historians were recognized for their service. The LTBB Tribal Citizens can be truly proud of their contributions to this area as history has shown.

On September 30, 2014, the Chairman had a meeting with the Director of FLOW (For The Love of Water), Liz Kirkwood. We talked of her concern for the waters here in our beautiful homeland, including her opposition to fracking. Her organization and our tribal beliefs are very comparable. It was a very productive meeting.

On October 6, 2014, the Executive was informed we had been awarded a competitive grant in the amount of \$482,985 to establish a museum with proper climate-controlled storage. LTBB has discussed the need to establish this for many years, but through the hard work and great collaboration of the grant writers, Julie Kauppila and Amber Holt, Planner Bryan Gillett, and Eric Hemenway, Director of Archives, Records, and Repatriation, definite progress has been made. The grant application was successful. Upon assuming the Chairman's Office 14 months ago, I became acutely aware of all the original historic documents that were in our archives and records files. I also noted that we did not have a proper fireproof and climate-controlled environment to protect these items. The more I looked into this and discussed this in depth with Eric, the more I became extremely concerned for the preservation of these documents and cultural items. Documents that supported our long journey to reaffirmation, documents and cultural items/artifacts that speak to who we are and where we come from, documents and artifacts that could never be replaced if anything were to happen to them. This was not even close to acceptable, so I contacted Eric, Julie, Amber and Bryan and advised them that there was a vision that, as identified in an old master plan, was designated for a museum, so let's make it happen. They took up the challenge and delivered on it! As your Chairman, it is my privilege to extend a Chi Megwetch on behalf of all LTBB citizens to Eric, Julie, Amber and Bryan for all their hard work in making this happen! It will be an added cultural component that has been missing for way too long. The Executive will be pleased to keep you informed on this exciting new project as it progresses.

As we observe the National Day of Remembrance for our Veterans (Ogitchidaas), let's remember all of our veterans and their sacrifice and service to this great country of ours. My father, who was a WWII veteran of the U.S. Army and Air Force, recently walked on (September 11, 2014) surrounded by family at home. He taught me many things in life, truth, respect, honor and was integral in my decision to make a career of the U.S. Marine Corps, and subsequently retiring after 22-plus years. So, as we remember those who have walked on and those who walk with us, greet them with a smile and nod of acknowledgement. My father and I participated in pow wows and parades with our fellow veterans. He is surely missed, as I know and feel for all of our tribal veterans and families missing their loved ones. So, let's ponder words of wisdom from a warrior from another time...

"It is not the critic who counts; not the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcomings; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself worthy in a cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."—Theodore Roosevelt

### Did you know...



3 in 10 teen girls in the U.S. will get pregnant at least once before the age of 20?

During 2011, there were almost 11,000 teen births in Michigan between the ages of 15-19, and 112 births to girls under the age of 12! That means our kids are having kids too soon! Most teens must raise their child alone and with little income. These statistics are present despite the  $\frac{1}{2}$  credit requirement for sex education in the schools.

The most recent high school surveys have reported at least 47% of students have had sex.

Unfortunately, 1 in 3 adolescents in the U.S. will be the victim of physical, sexual, emotional or verbal abuse from a dating partner. This is higher than any other type of youth violence.

What can we do in our community to change these statistics?

Our tribal Health Department offers education and mentoring on healthy relationships, proud choices, self-esteem and the prevention of teen pregnancy, HIV and STD's. There is also a lesson on the importance of continuing education and applying for college.

PARENTS: We encourage you to discuss this opportunity with your kids and to consider an appointment. We have many ways in which they can learn this material either on an individual basis, with a few close friends or in small groups. The setting in which the learning takes place can be creative and combined with traditional teachings.

More than 100 Emmet County community members attended the program. Participants enjoyed refreshments, including corn soup made by Archives and Records Archivist Jessica Dominic. Speakers included Tribal Elder Arlene Naganashe, Former Tribal Chairman Frank Ettawageshik, Professor James McClurken and LTBB Archives and Records Director Eric Hemenway.



Eric Hemenway helped to coordinate the program and introduced the panel members. Arlene Naganashe described her life prior to the Tribe's reaffirmation. She recalled that when she was young, there was no help available to attend college because when she filed her application, the BIA told her she was "not an Indian." She reflected on the fact that when she was in her 40s, she was able to attend college and obtain her Nursing degree because "by then, she was an Indian." Frank Ettawageshik recounted travel stories from the days before reaffirmation, noting that several LTBB tribal members would travel to Washington, D.C. in a van with food packed in coolers, and then, rent just one hotel room, shared by the entire group. Jim McClurken discussed the research and historical information compiled in his book "The Way It Happened," and how the book was helpful in LTBB's campaign for reaffirmation. All the speakers brought a unique perspective and insight into this historic occurrence. LTBB Odawa, along with Little River Band of Ottawa Indians and the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians (all of whom were on the same bill) were the first and only tribes to have gone through the reaffirmation process.

The program covered not only the struggle to obtain federal acknowledgement, but also the tremendous progress made in the 20 years since President Bill Clinton signed Public Law 103-324 into law. The reaffirmation bill was the culmination of a journey that began during the Washington, D.C. Treaty of 1836 on to the Detroit treaty of 1855, until the federal government's policy to halt all federal obligations to the tribe in 1889 and ending in 1994. Important leaders such as Augustin Hamlin, Jr, Margaret Boyd and others were discussed. Margaret's trip to Washington, calling on the federal government to live up to the promises made in the Treaties of 1836 and 1855, was told, giving vivid detail to the commitment the Odawa made at improving their conditions. Many other Odawa citizens followed in her footsteps over the years, working tirelessly to remind the federal government that we were still here, and fighting for our survival as a Tribe.

The Essence of Emmet is a local, grassroots group that works to promote our region's history. Essence of Emmet includes the Emmet County Historical Commission, Great Lakes Lighthouse Keepers Association, Harbor Springs Area Historical Society, Headlands International Dark Sky Park, Inland Water Route Historical Society, Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, Little Traverse Historical Society, Mackinac State Historic Parks, Mackinaw Area Historical Society, Emmet County and the Pellston Historical Society. The group has produced the Essence of Emmet history magazine. More information about the Essence of Emmet group is available on the county's website: www.emmetcounty.org.

### WILLIAM I. DENEMY APPOINTED LTBB APPELLATE JUSTICE

On September 12, 2014 in the LTBB Tribal Court in Petoskey, MI, William I. Denemy took the oath of office as an LTBB Appellate Justice from LTBB Chief Judge Allie Greenleaf Maldonado.

Denemy, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, was appointed to a six-year term ending on September 11, 2020.

According to the LTBB Constitution, a person is eligible to serve as the Chief Justice of the LTBB Tribal Appellate Court or as an Associate Justice only if he/she has attained the age of 30 years; is at least ¼ North American Indian, other than the Chief Justice who is required to be an attorney, where being Indian is preferred but not mandatory; is not an LTBB Tribal Council member or the LTBB Chairperson or LTBB Vice Chairperson; and no person shall serve as an LTBB Appellate Court Justice within 10 years of completion of a sentence

or probation upon being convicted of a felony unless such conviction has been vacated or overturned.

The judges of the LTBB Tribal Court and the LTBB Tribal Appellate Court are nominated by the Executive and appointed by the LTBB Tribal Council by an affirmative vote of six of nine members of Tribal Council. After being nominated by the Executive, the LTBB Tribal Council appointed Denemy by an 8-0-1-0 vote (yes, no, abstain, absent) at the September 11, 2014 LTBB Tribal Council meeting.


Denemy served as LTBB Vice Chairperson from 2005-2009, as President of the Michigan Indian Elders Association (MIEA) from October 2012 to October 2014, as the Vice President of MIEA from October 2010 to October 2012, on the LTBB Gaming Administration and worked for the LTBB Tribal Court as the Cultural Resource Advisor for two years. He worked 33 years for the Michigan State Police before his retirement, last working as the Assistant Division Commander in the Lansing, MI, headquarters. He was on the first Michigan State Police diving crew. He served as the President of the Michigan State Employees Association and as the State President of the Michigan Association of Governmental Employees.

He is very active in the LTBB tribal community, attending tribal events, Elders Luncheons and LTBB Elders Association meetings and assisting at tribal events. He has played on the LTBB Duffers Golf League for several years.

He volunteers at the Friendship Centers of Emmet County in Petoskey, MI, the Salvation Army in Petoskey, MI, the Little Traverse Conservancy in Petoskey, MI, and the Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce's Festival by the Bay event held annually every August in Petoskey, MI.

He and his wife, Pat, have been married for more than 60 years, they have five children, William A. Denemy, Judy, Joan, Brian and Terri, and three grandchildren, Michael, Justin and Joey. All of his children are LTBB Tribal Citizens.



# Tribal Court to Establish Specialized

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians has received a federal grant from the Office of Violence Against Women (OVW) to institute a specialized court to oversee cases involving domestic violence in the tribal community. Experts working with the LTBB Domestic Violence Court will focus on the needs of victims and their families as well as offender responsibility and super-

Domestic violence has been a hot-button topic in recent weeks after the video footage of NFL star Ray Rice assaulting then-girlfriend Janay Palmer was released by celebrity news site TMZ.

According to the Department of Justice, Native American women are more often victims of domestic abuse than any other minority group.

"Violence against women is not only unacceptable, it's offensive to a culture that has historically valued the sacredness and role of women in the community," Domestic Violence Court Coordinator Gregory Justis said. "Equality and respect are traditional. Preventing domestic violence requires more than enforcing the letter of our laws

- it requires a community raising its voice and responding together."

With the help of the OVW grant, tribal authorities have formed a Domestic Violence Response Team with staff and advisors trained in law, victim services, mental health and substance abuse. The team will respond to domestic violence cases and provide education to the public.

"We're so fortunate to have an outstanding group of professionals working on the project," Justis said. "Having a strong support network promotes fairness, consistency and justice not just for domestic violence victims, but for offenders and the LTBB community."

The specialized Domestic Violence Court is expected to be in place by the beginning of






### Michigan Remembers POW/MIA Recognition Day

### Tribal General Welfare Exclusion Act Acknowledges Tribal SOVEREIGNTY



On September 26, 2014, President Barack Obama signed H.R. 3043, the Tribal General Welfare Exclusion Act.

It unanimously passed the U.S. Senate and passed the U.S. House of Representatives by a voice vote.

It exempts welfare benefits under Native American tribal jurisdictions from being counted as income for the purposes of income tax. It mirrors the way the IRS already treats state welfare benefits because the benefits from state and local governments generally do not count as income. The welfare benefits covered in the Tribal General Welfare Exclusion Act include universal health coverage, education, cultural opportunities,

elder care and housing. The National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) called it "a victory for tribal governments and a statement to the work of tribal leaders over the years that Congress now implicitly recognizes the importance of tribal sovereignty and that tribal governments provide such important programs and services in Indian country."

# MICHIGAN INDIAN LAND CLAIMS SETTLEMENT CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

- 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.
- 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.
- 3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least your signature.
- 4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address

Forms are also available at www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov. Click on Offices/Government Center/Enrollment Department and click on the appropriate form. The adult form must be printed on legal size paper and the minor form on letter size paper. We will continue to add forms there in the future.

It is the responsibility of the parent, guardian or custodial parent to complete an address verification form.

If you are a custodial parent, please provide proof by documentation.

Once a minor turns 18, you must contact the Enrollment Office and complete an address verification form or we will mark you as undeliverable.

If you are incarcerated and would like to continually receive the newsletter, you must keep your address current.

Towards the end of the year, we will notify you for purposes of the per capita payment.

Adult verification form must be witnessed.

Minor verification form must be notarized.

Our management plan for the site is to partner with a carefully selected developer or multiple developers who can assist us in the creation of a regional commercial destination and provide long-term revenue to the tribe as well as employment opportunities. Much of the last year has been spent working through the selection process and negotiating Joint Venture agreements with our selected developer partners. We've also been busy working with the Michigan Economic Development Corporation, which has provided us with a great deal of financial and operational assistance.

While our original goal was to get the first phase of leasable space designed and built by late 2014, the fact the site is high above U.S. 131 has slowed us

down due to it needing a lot of engineering studies. We now believe we can begin re-grading the site to get it ready for building and road construction in early 2015. In addition, we are very nearly ready to present the final drafts of our Joint Venture agreements to Tribal Council for its review and approval.

Odawa Economic Development Management, Incorporated is a tribally-chartered corporation and a wholly-owned entity of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. Our charter and mission are to provide for the development and management of non-gaming economic development on the former Victories Casino site. The purpose of the corporation is to develop and operate businesses as means of increasing and diversifying the tribe's long-term revenue streams.

"Don't Delay" continued from page 1. Medicaid, Medicare, VA, Tri-

care or any other type of medical coverage, there is nothing you have to do to avoid the mandated fee as the fee only applies to the uninsured population.

Two Ways to Apply for the Exemption

If you are an **enrolled member** of a federally recognized tribe, you have two options while applying for the exemption.

1. Fill out the paper application, and send a copy of your tribal ID to the federal govern-

ment.

2. File the exemption when you do your income tax return.

I am strongly suggesting utilizing the paper application at this time because the federal government has not given specific instructions on what the tax preparer will need to do at the time of filing your taxes in order to fulfill the required information for the exemption application.

If you are a **descendant**, the only way you can apply for the exemption is by filling out the paper application and sending a

letter from an IHS Clinic stating you are eligible to be seen at a tribal facility along with your application to the federal government.

I am available to help any uninsured tribal citizen with this application process and strongly encourage anyone who is uninsured to contact me at vglazier@ltbbodawa-nsn.gov, 231-242-1748 or by stopping by my office at the Health Park in Petoskey, MI, as soon as possible to ensure there will be no delay when doing your taxes.

injection wells have done countless times throughout the country. Our watershed will not survive if this happens here. We are surrounded by water, and our lives depend on it. Think of the consequences. Whether you vote for either one of us in this upcoming election, there are more important things than politics. This is one of them. We need to work together for the future of this planet."

Phil and Tim have 28 calendar days from the date of the Judgment in order to appeal. They stated that they will meet that deadline, but hope that the Appellate Court upholds an individual Tribal Member's right to sue according to the Tribal Constitution, wherein it clearly states that a Tribal Member cannot be denied equal protection of its laws (in this case, they are suing to ban the diversion of clean drinking water, which is a very obvious and serious health issue)."

Both Phil and Tim acknowledge that the Tribal Constitution states that Tribal Court has the power to approve the filing of a lawsuit in the name of the Tribe, but it also doesn't seem to bar individual suits. In either case, they state that they did not sue on behalf of the Tribe, only themselves and Article 32.org, which is incorporated through the Tribe. They feel that the Judge is referencing a Statute, approved by the Tribal Council, which appears to be inconsistent

with the Constitution (wherein the Council is denying the right of an individual to sue in Tribal Court.)

This may have violated the "Reserved" clause in the Tribal Constitution whereby the Council may have been exercising powers not listed in the Constitution. Finally, both of them cite Article XIX Rights of the Tribe and Its Members wherein it states, "Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed as restricting any Treaty Rights or any other rights of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and its members." By blocking a private lawsuit by a Tribal member, both LaCroix and Bellfy feel that this is restricting the rights of that Tribal Member, and, by extension, all Tribal Members. They are confident that Members have the right to sue for the enforcement of a Tribal ban on the diversion of fresh water on behalf of all of us.

"The reality is, we are not suing the Tribal Government, nor are we suing on their behalf," Bellfy said. "We are suing State officials as a Tribal Member, and a Native American who owns a corporation that is incorporated through the Tribe, and, consequently, the 'corporate entity' possesses all of the Tribe's legal entitlements. Our battle is against the illegal diversion of fresh water for fracking, and we will continue to fight this. History is on our side. It's just a matter of time – we will prevail."

To provide more hands-on experience, participants will have the opportunity to tour both tribal and local government departments to learn more about their specific role in government. Our goal is to provide youth with knowledge and skills related to civic engagement, including local government and leadership while incorporating tribal government, thus, also creating and strengthening cultural competency as well. As a result, youth will be equipped to make informed decisions, participate in their community, and have the leadership skills to be successful in any career.

As part of the program, teens from across Michigan will gather at the state capitol March 22-25, 2015 for the annual 4-H Capitol Experience conference http://4h.msue.msu.edu/events/4-h\_capitol\_experience. The four-day event gives youth the chance to become involved in civic engagement and public policy as well as an in-depth look at state government. During their time in the capital city, students will learn the responsibilities of citizens, explore different aspects of policy issues, discover various career options available in public policy, attend a bill writing session, learn more about tribal–state interactions and meet people involved with state government. The goal of this conference is for youth to learn that they can influence the government even at a young age.

### HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

**Down Payment Assistance:** This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

**Foreclosure Prevention Program:** This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

**Credit Counseling:** We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

**Tribal Rental Housing Program:** The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.


