


LTBB TRIBAL CITIZEN WENONA SINGEL HONORED FOR HER YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE LIBB APPELLATE COURT



The LTBB Judicial Branch honored LTBB Tribal Citizen Wenona Singel for her years of service on the LTBB Appellate Court with an honor song and presentation at the 27th Annual Odawa Homecoming Pow Wow on August 11, 2018.

The following is her biography as it appears on the Michigan State University website:

Wenona T. Singel is an Associate Professor of Law at Michigan State University College of Law and the Associate Director of the Indigenous Law & Policy Center. She teaches courses in the fields of federal Indian law and natural resources law, and her research and publications address the development of tribal legal systems and tribal accountability for human rights. In addition to teaching, Ms. Singel's professional activities included serving as the Chief Appellate Justice for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and former service as the Chief Appellate Judge for the Grand

Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. From 2006-2009, she served as President and Board Member of the Michigan Indian Judicial Association. On March 29, 2012, the United States Senate passed by unanimous consent President Barack Obama's nomination of her to serve as a member of the Advisory Board of the Saint Lawrence Seaway Development Corporation. Ms. Singel is also an elected member of the American Law Institute where she is the Co-Reporter for the project to develop a Restatement of the Law of American Indians. Prior to joining MSU College of Law, Ms. Singel was an Assistant Professor at the University of North Dakota School of Law and a Fellow with the Northern Plains Indian Law Center. Before teaching, she worked in private practice with firms, which included Kanji & Katzen, P.L.L.C. in Ann Arbor, MI, and Dickinson Wright in Bloomfield Hills, MI. She served as a member of the Economic Development Commission of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and as General Counsel for the Grand Traverse Resort, a tribally-owned resort in Northern Michigan. Ms. Singel received an A.B. from Harvard College and a J.D. from Harvard Law School.

Ziibinijwang and Minogin Market Update

Ziibimijwang is committed to restoring and strengthening Mino-bimaadziwin of the Odawa Community through a foundation of indigenous food systems and cultural activities.

The Ziibimijwang Board, alongside a hard-working staff and dedicated volunteers, continue to make huge strides at the farm, as well as the newly opened Minogin Market in Mackinaw City, MI.

On the farm, the Youth Farm Stand Program has launched, two new hoop-houses have been assembled and new equipment has been purchased with the help of a BIA agriculture/invasive species grant. In addition, Ziibimijwang Farm was featured in the "Guide to Local





Food" published by Taste the Local difference.

Throughout 2017, board members and staff worked with MSU Extension to envision the future of Ziibimijwang Inc., identify component practices that will contribute to its success and identify "low hanging fruit" or LTBB-owned infrastructure that would substantially propel the organization forward. Over the course of two mediated sessions and numerous unmediated meetings, the board identified the property formerly known as Bell's Fishery as a critical component of Ziibimijwang's success. The board sees potential in this facility to provide food processing, retail, farm market space, food storage and distribution and food service practices, all of which will closer to achieving financial self-sufficiency, food sovereignty and the numerous service goals of our organization.

During the second quarter, Ziibimijwang Board members (and their family members!!) worked aggressively toward renovating and opening Minogin (it grows well) Market. The board applied for and received a \$179,000 grant from Michigan Economic Development Corporation, which has covered all renovation related expenses since April 30. Contractors were hired, and they addressed wiring, plumbing and structural issues. The old smoke-house and gut cooler was demolished, and a new sewer line was installed.

We are still in the process of scanning enrollment records and linking relationships in our Citizenship Database (Progeny ES). We will be contacting you via mail if your enrollment record is missing a photo copy of your social security card.

If we <u>do not</u> have a copy of your social security verification on file prior to October 31, 2018, (the 2018 per capita payment distribution deadline), your per capita payment may be held or delayed in 2018.

Acceptable Verification of your Social Security number includes the following:

- Copy of your Social Security Card
- Social Security Card number printed by

Social Security Administration Office

• Social Security Administration Benefit Statement

• W-2 or 1099 form

• Pay stub containing your name and social security number

• Valid U.S. military ID card with photo (DD-2 or CAC card)

• Other official document/card containing your name and social security number.

Our goal is to not only keep our records up to date, but to make sure by working together that everyone gets their 2018 per capita check. If you have any questions, call the Enrollment Department at 231-242-1520.



Tax Agreement Information

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how import- ant it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to pur- chase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemp- tion), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax ex- empt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, pro- pane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to you.

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Resident Tribal Members are exempted from the following Michigan taxes:

- 1. Sales Tax (currently 6% of retail price) via Form 4013
- 2. Use Tax (currently 6% of purchase price)
- 3. Income Tax (4.35% of Adjusted Gross Income)
- 4. Michigan Business Tax (currently 4.95%)
- 5. *Motor Fuel Tax (currently, 36.5 cents per gallon unleaded and 32.6 cents per gallon on diesel)
 - 6. *Tobacco Product Tax (currently \$2 per pack of cigarettes)

* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.

*The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.

*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Please Note:

Changeable address forms are available for LTBB Citizens at www.tinyurl.com/ltbbenrollmentforms. The forms must be printed and signed by the Tribal Citizen and hard copies returned to Enrollment. We still require the form to be witnessed or notarized depending on your address.

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ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, <u>YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST</u> before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! TRIBAL COUNCIL SEEKS TO FILL THE FOLLOWING POSITIONS ON ITS CORPORATE CHARTERS

ODAWA CONSTRUCTION ADMINISTRA-TION HOLDING CORPORATION/CORPO-RATE CHARTER Short titled, Odawa Construction Administration, Inc.

A tribally chartered corporation for economic purpose, to provide for the management of the non-gaming, economic affairs; created as a general purpose holding company that promotes economic self-sufficiency through governmental contracts and other contracts in the area of construction and creates jobs through its non-gaming enterprises, joint ventures and investments. The board shall consist of at least two LTBB Tribal Citizens, and who meet the eligibility requirements set out in subsection c. of this section and shall be approved by Tribal Council for a set term, with the intent to have staggered terms and may be compensated a reasonable amount as approved by Tribal Council, provided availability of funds. To serve on the board, a person must meet all of the following criteria:

1. A person must be at least 18 years of age;

2. No person can serve on the board within seven years of completion of a sentence or probation upon being convicted of a felony in tribal, state or federal court, unless such conviction has been vacated or overturned.

3. To be considered, a person shall meet the following criteria:

i. A Bachelor's degree in business administration, with a concentration in management or accounting; or at least six years as a business owner, preferably a business related to construction.

ii. Preferably some construction field experience or experience in the construction trades.

iii. Must possess leadership qualities, show good judgment, is approachable and is team focused.

ODAWA CONSTRUCTION CORPORA-TION/CORPORATE CHARTER

A tribally chartered corporation, to promote economic self-sufficiency and create jobs through construction of tribally owned projects or local projects within the community, to protect assets of the tribe and generate revenues and jobs. It is the duty of the Odawa Construction, Inc. to protect assets of the tribe and generate revenues and jobs. The board members may be compensated a reasonable amount as approved by Tribal Council, provided availability of funds. To serve on the board, a person must meet all of the following criteria:

1. A person must be at least 18 years of age;

2. No person can serve on the board within seven years of completion of a sentence or proba-

tion upon being convicted of a felony in tribal, state or federal court, unless such conviction has been vacated or overturned.

3. At least two members of the board shall be required to possess a Bachelor's degree in Engineering, with preferably licensed as a Professional Engineer.

4. One member's seat on the board shall be reserved for a member of the Odawa Economic Affairs Holding Corporation as selected by the Holding Corporation.

5. Must possess leadership qualities, show good judgment, is approachable and is team focused.

ODAWA ECONOMIC AFFAIRS HOLDING CORPORATE CHARTER

The purpose of the corporation is to act as a general purpose holding company that establishes uniformity and economic opportunities amongst the designated Tribally Chartered Corporations and LLCs by providing auditing services, reporting requirements, meeting policy and procedures, negotiating fire and utility services, insurance coverages and other administrative services. The board members may be compensated a reasonable amount as approved by Tribal Council, provided availability of funds. The board shall consist of at least three to five members with at least three members being LTBB Tribal Citizens, and who meet the eligibility requirements:

1. A person must be at least 18 years of age;

2. No person can serve on the board within seven years of completion of a sentence or probation upon being convicted of a felony in tribal, state or federal court, unless such conviction has been vacated or overturned.

3. To be considered, a person shall meet the following criteria:

i. Must have experience and knowledge in one of the following skills sets: Business, accounting or administration.

ii. Preferably a Bachelor's degree.

iii. Must possess leadership qualities, show good judgment, is approachable and is team focused.

All openings for board assignments shall be posted for a minimum of 30 days in at least the tribal government Administrative Buildings and on the tribal website and in the Odawa Trails newsletter as provisions allow. Forms are also available at www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov. Click on Offices/Government Center/Enrollment Department and click on the appropriate form. The adult form must be printed on legal size paper and the minor form on letter size paper. We will continue to add forms there in the future.

It is the responsibility of the parent, guardian or custodial parent to complete an address verification form.

If you are a custodial parent, please provide proof by documentation.

Once a minor turns 18, you must contact the Enrollment

Office and complete an address verification form or we will mark you as undeliverable.

If you are incarcerated and would like to continually receive the newsletter, you must keep your address current.

Towards the end of the year, we will notify you for purposes of the per capita payment.

Adult verification form must be witnessed. Minor verification form must be notarized.



WHAT IS ELDER NEGLECT?



By Sonja Fiel, Social Services Program Manager

Elder neglect is defined as "the withholding of basic care needs that an elderly person requires for their health, safety or well-being." While elder abuse is

intentional, elder neglect can be accidental or negligent. Examples of elder neglect include:

• Failing to reposition an immobilized individual, resulting in pressure sores.

• Failing to assist with changing, toileting or bathing of an elder.

• Failing to assist an elderly person with personal hygiene or in providing the person with adequate food, clothing or shelter.

• Not providing an elder with the reasonable medical care or medication to address his or her physical and mental health needs.

• Failing to protect an elderly person from health and

safety hazards (e.g. infestations, exposure to toxins, fire threats, etc.)

• Failing to take steps to avoid the elderly person from experiencing malnutrition and/ or dehydration.

MICHELLE CHINGWA EDUCATION HONORARIUM

August 7th, 2018

Dear Student,

On July 28th, 2018, Tribal Council passed the Michelle Chingwa Education Honorarium (MCEH) Act which has been enacted to provide a gift to honor Tribal Citizens that are obtaining post-secondary educational opportunities. The MCEH Act repeals and replaces the original and amended Michelle Chingwa Education Assistance Act including WOS 2007-005 and WOS 2014-010.

With the passage of the legislation, several changes have been made to the previous Michelle Chingwa Education Assistance (MCEA) Scholarship Program:

- Students attending a post-secondary institution that is accredited by a foreign government accrediting agency are now eligible for MCEH funding.
- 2. Students are no longer required to submit FAFSA information to remain eligible for an honorarium.
- 3. Honorariums will be distributed directly to the student.

These changes became effective on 8/2/2018 for Fall 2018. The new MCEH application can be found on the LTBB website. A direct link to WOS 2018-010 has been provided below:




looks like for tribal citizens and

Methanphetanine Suicide Prevention Initiative Together We Are Stronger - Behavioral Health Youth Suicide PREVENTION PROGRAM

The Methamphetamine Suicide Prevention Initiative (MSPI) program at LTBB is focused on early identification of at-risk youth. This is achievable by identifying and addressing suicide ideations, attempts and contagions among LTBB youth through culturally appropriate evidence based practices including, but not limited to community education, policy amendments and youth involvement.

Warning Signs

• Talking about not wanting to be around anymore.

• Giving away personal effects.

• Saying goodbyes to close acquaintances.

• Looking for a way to kill themselves, like searching online or buying a gun.

• Talking about feeling hopeless or having no reason to live.

• Talking about feeling

trapped or in unbearable pain. • Talking about being a bur-

den to others. • Increasing the use of alco-

hol or drugs. • Acting anxious or agitat-

ed; behaving recklessly.

• Sleeping too little or too much.

• Withdrawing or isolating themselves.

• Showing rage or talking

about seeking revenge. • Extreme mood swings.

Why is the MSPI program needed?

Suicide is a pervasive problem for Indian country that impedes our tribal communities from living harmoniously. A loss of life can send shockwaves throughout the community. Suicide is the eighth leading cause of death for American Indians/ Alaskan Natives of all ages. American Indian/Alaskan Native adolescents are disproportionately impacted as suicide is the second leading cause of death for ages 10-24.

What is the purpose of the MSPI grant?

The Methamphetamine and Suicide Prevention Initiative (MSPI) is a nationally-coordinated program focusing on providing much-needed methamphetamine and suicide prevention and intervention resources for Indian country. This initiative promotes the use and development of evidence-based

and practice-based models that represent culturally-appropriate prevention and treatment approaches to methamphetamine abuse and suicide prevention from a community-driven context.

What are some current goals for the LTBB MSPI grant?

• Educate the community on the early signs of suicide to increase the chances of prevention and intervention.

• Implement programs to reduce suicides/attempts/ideations in tribal youth.

• Develop stronger clinic/ behavioral health policies to assist those at risk for suicide.



follows: since it first filed suit, the Tribe has emphasized that even as it is committed to enforcing the United States' treaty promises, it also understands the value of negotiated agreements; and as early as October of 2015, it went on the record telling the Court that "The Tribe recommends that the court submit this case to mediation." There, the Tribe specifically pointed to the negotiation of the Saginaw boundary case as a model for negotiations in this case and told the Court that "Although the mediation process was long and complex, it resulted in the successful settlement of the reservation-boundary question that the case presented and reached accommodation of on-the-ground issues that could not otherwise have been answered by the claims and defenses at issue in that case." It offered that the Tribe "stands ready to participate in whatever form of alternative dispute resolution that the Court believes would be most beneficial in resolving this case." In contrast, the State told the court that mediation was "premature" and that "a formal dispute resolution process like mediation will not be meaningful before the State has had an opportunity to retain its experts and conduct discovery."; and when the issue came up again in October of 2016, the Tribe remained committed to negotiating with its neighbors. It told the Court that it "understands that its requested relief cannot address the jurisdictional-allocation concerns that certain defendants have raised. The Tribe has long invested in and seeks to maintain important working relationships with its neighbors. It respectfully requests that this Court appoint a mediator because it expects that the most efficient and effective means to address all the parties' concerns is through mutually agreeable resolution of this case." It emphasized again that

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"Mediation affords the parties an opportunity to reach clarity and certainty on these issues that this litigation cannot resolve-and to do so on a time table that would avoid years of multi-party, multi-expert, multi-phase, and possible multi-appeal expense." And it outright asked the Court: "The Tribe respectfully requests the appointment of a mediator in order to best position the parties for a cost-effective, workable outcome that is responsive to all parties' concerns." Again, in contrast, the State-and every other local government and private association who joined the case-rejected the idea of a negotiated resolution to the case. It said that mediation at that time "is not likely to be productive" and asked the Court to allow the parties to complete an extended and expensive discovery process before asking them to sit down to talk; and finally, as of today, the Tribe has not heard anything different from the defendants. But today the Tribe still stands ready to negotiate with its neighbors about how to resolve this lawsuit in a way that benefits everyone in the case. We will join them wherever they ask to talk about how this case impacts them and how the Tribe can address those issues. We look forward to hearing from them. Vote: 8- Yes, 0- No, 0- Abstained,

base beyond gaming - in partnership with Geodetic North Investors LLC.

Two buildings in the latter stages of construction near the west side of the complex will provide space for Boston's Restaurant & Sports Bar and a Starbucks coffee shop with a drive-thru. In a recent e-mail, Odawa Economic Development Management President Tanya



Gibbs said fall openings are expected for both of these chain-affiliated businesses.

The building, which will house Starbucks, also includes two additional retail spaces. Gibbs noted recent lease negotiations between project officials and a potential occupant for one of these, and added numerous other prospective tenants have expressed interest in the remaining space.

How to Spot the Red Flags of Abuse

Exploring a new relationship is an exciting time where it might seem like every moment you are learning something new about your partner's culture, family and beliefs.

While you and your partner might be having fun getting to know each other, it's important to watch for certain behaviors when dating someone new. In the beginning of a relationship, it's not always easy to tell if your partner might become abudown for being Native?

• Lose their temper with you or yell at you in private, but stay calm around others?

• Insist you "make more time for them" by spending less time with your family or friends?

• Encourage you to quit school or work or to stop participating in activities and hobbies?

• Insist on driving you everywhere or checking your car mileage when you return?

• Blame their former partners for abuse in previous relationships (for example, "My ex was crazy" or "It wasn't that bad")?

Someone who acts in these ways may try to blame their partner for their own abusive behavior. No matter the reason, a person chooses to abuse, it is never their partner's fault.

What You Can Do

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

It can also be hard to spot the early warning signs of abuse because every relationship is different. The one thing most abusive relationships have in common is that the abusive partner will do anything to gain power and control over their partner.

• Shower you with compliments or seem "too good to be true"?

• Constantly ask where you are all the time or frequently call or text you throughout the day?


• Follow you around or show up at your home, school or work without telling you in advance?
