Update Regarding LTBB's Reservation Boundary Lawsuit

When the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians brought suit in 2015 to confirm our1855 Treaty reservation boundary, its foremost concern was the protection of the welfare of our citizens and the resources we steward. After the federal district court's August 15, 2019 ruling that the 1855 Treaty did not create a reservation, those concerns remain our priority.

The Tribe is certainly disappointed by this ruling. But it is

also very surprised. The district court's ruling is at odds with more than 100 years of federal law that recognized the 1855 Treaty created a reservation for the tribe.

In the days and weeks to come, the Tribe will listen to its citizens, meet with its attorneys and consider its legal options. And as our constitution promises, we will continue to approach this work in a constructive, cooperative spirit to preserve and protect our lands, resources and treaty rights.

Gijigowi Anishinaabemowin Language Department (GALD) received a new Administration for Native Americans (ANA) language grant. The purpose of the grant is to develop online language classes.

The name of the project is "Aankwadong," which means "On the Cloud." Aankwadong Project has been funded by ANA for a three-year period. It will involve hiring three new, full-time staff. New project staff will include a Project Coordinator and two Project Technicians for the duration of the three-year project.

ANA is a federal program under the Administration for Families and Children (ACF). ACF is under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

The online course will be a two-year program. The schedule, similar to high school or college with two semesters each year, will be equivalent to a Fall semester and a Winter/Spring semester. There will be four levels: Beginning I and Beginning II will make up year one classes. Intermediate I and Intermediate II will be the year two classes.

The primary stages of development are:

- Design the two-year curriculum;
- Create all resources and materials for the curriculum;
 - Develop, populate and pilot the online, web-



We are gearing up to celebrate our sovereignty. Celebrating 25 years since Public Law 103-324 was signed into law. Be sure to stop and check out the bridge in Charlevoix, MI, on September 21st at dusk because it will be lit up in the four directional colors in honor of our re-

The Gijigowi Anishinaabemowin Language Department was awarded funding for a threeyear project to create online language courses and to target revitalization efforts through online language courses targeting high school aged youth.

Our newly elected Tribal Councilors have been sworn in, and we are looking forward to progressive and productive cooperation between the branches of government to move the tribe forward in a good way.

DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

ATTENTION:

Fuel and tobacco exempted purchases are only available to LTBB tribal citizens for their own vehicles or consumption. LTBB citizens are not allowed to utilize their sales tax exemption for non-LTBB citizens or non-LTBB owned businesses! Making taxexempt purchases for non-LTBB citizens or businesses violates the tax agreement and may also violate applicable law. Store clerks have the right to deny any and all tax-exempt purchases that they have reasonable cause to believe are made for a non-tribal citizen or for the business/commercial vehicle of a citizen's employer. YOU WILL THEN BE CHARGED THE FULL PRICE FOR FUEL AND TOBACCO PURCHASES.

All citizens must remain present during the entire transaction.

TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how import- ant it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to pur- chase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! If you have any questions, please contact us at 231-242-1442.

STRENGTHENING COMMUNITIES AND DEVELOPING LEADERS

AmeriCorps NCCC/FEMA Corps is a full-time, residential, team-based program for young adults, age 18-24 (with no upper age limit to serve as a team leader). Members develop leadership skills and strengthen communities by completing service projects and gaining life experience.

Teams, comprised of 8-10 members, complete multiple projects that address essential community needs throughout the United States. During the 10 month service term, members receive lodging, transportation, uniform and meals. Upon the completion of the program, members are eligible to receive the Segal AmeriCorps Education Award equal to the maximum Pell Grant amount: \$6095, as of Oct. 1 2018.

HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

STR - Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

HIP - Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

DPA - Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

FPA - Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.







Celebrating Career Tech to Careers at MacGregor Plumbing AND HEATING, HARBOR SPRINGS, MI



A new initiative by Char-Em ISD, known as Career Tech to Careers, is celebrating the decision of high school graduates to enter the workforce after earning their diploma - specifically those students whose high school careers included Career and Technical Education classes.

On July 24, 2019, ISD staff held a Career Tech to Careers signing event with Noodin Craven, a 2019 graduate of Pellston High School. Craven, an LTBB Tribal Citizen, has started a career with MacGregor Plumbing and Heating as an apprentice installer. He was able to land the job - which is full-time and will include a full menu of traditional benefits after 90 days - due in part to the Career and Technical Education classes he took during high school, specifically welding and construction.

At MacGregor Plumbing and Heating, Craven is learning and applying those skills hands-on in diagnosing and repairing plumbing, heating and cooling issues for residential and commercial customers.

Owner of the company, Julie Wieman, praised Craven's attitude and work ethic and said it's uncommon to find such a hardworking person right out of high school.

"He is doing such a great job for us," said Wieman. "Schools really need to keep doing more to teach kids these kinds of skills and encourage them to think outside of a traditional four-year college degree. We feel we can give these young adults the positive role models they need to be successful. Noodin is great, he has a phenomenal attitude - we can always train the right person in the skills they need when they have the right, positive attitude."

Craven's enthusiasm for taking the position and running with it is infectious. Set up on a job shad-Coach, his interest was sparked immediately.

my future by my senior year," he said. "My dad was telling me that I really needed to find a direction, and I knew college was not for me. I couldn't see myself going to school again after graduating from high school. During my senior year, I got into the welding class and construction, and it clicked - it was like a whole new world."

Craven said with his interest now piqued, and with the help of Hansen, the connection to Mac-Gregor Plumbing and Heating arrived at the perfect

"When Annie got me the interview, I was super excited," he said. "From there, things just came together."





COURT RULED ICWA IS CONSTITUTIONAL

Editor's note: The following article appeared on Indian Country Today on August 9, 2019 and is reprinted here with permission.

The 5th Circuit Court of Appeals unanimously voted to uphold the constitutionality of the Indian Child Welfare Act; overturning a lower district court's decision in a late decision Friday afternoon (August 9, 2019).

Dan Lewerenz, an Attorney at the Native American Rights Fund, worked on the case. He was still reading through the court's decision, but said they were thrilled for this win for Indian country.

"The 5th Circuit recognized the constitutionality of ICWA," Leweranz said. "We hope this is the end of this litigation."

The case, Brackeen v. Bernhardt, took the initial blow in October 2018 when a federal judge in Texas ruled the legislation unconstitutional. Judge Reed O'Conner ruled the Indian Child Welfare Act is a "race based statute" that violates the Equal Protection Clause of the Constitution.

Passed in 1978, the Indian Child Welfare Act has been praised as the "gold standard" by national child welfare organizations. The law states when a Native child is up for adoption, homes of family or tribal members are prioritized for placement.

Research has also shown Native and non-Native children alike have better outcomes when they are raised in their communities rather than foster homes or state child welfare systems.

Sarah Kastelic, Executive Director of the National Indian Child Welfare Association, said the decision was in the best interest of Native children.

"This ruling is a strong affirmation of the constitutionality of ICWA and the inherent tribal authority to make decisions about the well-being of member children, whether they live on or off of tribal lands," Kastelic said. "ICWA remains the gold standard of child welfare policy and practice; it is in the best interest of Native children."

Social worker Lucinda Myers, Muscogee, was

excited about the decision. She received the news while at the 48th Annual Association of American Indian Physicians Conference in Chicago, IL.

"The National Congress of American Indians commends the efforts of the intervening tribes - the Cherokee Nation, Morongo Band of Mission Indians, the Navajo Nation, the Oneida Nation and the Quinault Indian Nation - the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the Department of Justice and all others in Indian country that joined this fight to protect our Native children," she said. "Today's decision that clearly defines the breadth of the relationship between the federal government and tribal nations, sends a sharp message as to the strength of tribal sovereignty, which will safeguard Indian country from such misguided litigation in the future."

The Association of American Indian Affairs has been fighting to keep Native children and their families connected.

Shannon Keller O'Loughlin, Executive Director and Attorney for the organization, said this reinforces tribal nations as political entities.

"The Fifth Circuit's decision today acknowledges Indian Nations' important political and sovereign rights to protect Indian children and families and strengthen the continuation of our cultures," she

The 5th Court's decision is a big win for Indian country, but it is not yet known if this will be the last word in this long legal battle.

NSCD has been approached by not only tribes in the area, but also local municipalities to see if we could assist in them with these valued tax breaks/ incentives to offset construction costs.

"We are always looking ahead of what is needed, not only for our Tribe, but all Tribes in the area as well as the people that they (and us) serve," NSCD Board of Trustees Chairman Laura Blum-



Service Announces Landmark Revision to Eagle Retention Policy

Editor's note: The following is a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service press release dated August 13, 2019.



In a monumental decision that underscores the agency's commitment to honoring the wishes of federally recognized tribes, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has revised its policy regarding the retention of eagle remains on lands within Indian country. Federally recognized tribes are now able to retain bald and golden eagle remains found on these lands under certain conditions and with the proper permits.

In 2017, the service hosted numerous in-person and telephone consultation opportunities for federally recognized tribes in the United States. During these consultation sessions, tribal members requested the ability to retain bald and golden eagle remains found on their lands. The service has revised its policy to accommodate this request.

The updated policy has three goals: Authorize the retention of eagles found by a tribe's members in Indian country, enhance eagle conservation on these lands and avoid unnecessary human health or safety challenges that some deceased eagles pose.

"The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is honored to have the ability to support tribes' spiritual, religious and cultural pursuits by authorizing the retention of eagle remains found by federally recognized tribal members on their lands," said Principal Deputy Director Margaret Everson. "By working together, we hope to conserve bald and golden eagle populations for future generations."

"The Trump Administration is proud to acknowledge the significance of the eagle in many tribal cultures," said Joe Grogan, Director, White House Domestic Policy Council. "This new policy honors that significance as well as the commitment Tribal governments have displayed leveraging their sovereignty, in concert with the United States, to safeguard the bald eagle and other eagle species of religious importance in Tribal communities. It also cuts back needless bureaucratic red tape. The White House thanks the Department of the Interior for leading the way to this sensible new policy."

"Because of its intrinsic beauty, skill and courage, the eagle is a valued symbol of America and has long been venerated in many Tribal



cultures throughout Indian Country," said John Tahsuda, Interior Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary - Indian Affairs. "Indian Affairs staff have worked with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Tribal nations on a common-sense approach to the handling of bald and golden eagle remains found on Tribal lands. This updated eagle remains retention policy respects Tribal cultural and religious practices while protecting eagle populations now and in the future."

Under the updated policy, a federally recognized tribe must receive a permit prior to possessing eagle remains found within Indian country. When a tribal member or an employee of a federally recognized tribe discovers eagle remains, he or she must report it immediately to tribal or service law enforcement officials.

Eagle remains found and reported may be eligible for return to the federally recognized tribe for religious purposes after the service completes any activities it deems necessary for law enforcement or for scientific management reasons.

If the service or a tribal law enforcement officer designated by the service determines that the eagle was not taken intentionally and human health risks aren't suspected or known, it may be transferred directly to the respective federally recognized tribe as long as the proper permits are in place.

Bald and golden eagles are protected under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act, the Lacey Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. Certain activities like harassing, killing or selling these species are strictly prohibited. Eagles that are unlawfully taken, diseased, poisoned or part of an ongoing investigation will not be eligible for distribution.

Tribal Nations Win a Substantial Victory in the Fight to PROTECT CULTURAL RESOURCE



On August 9, 2019, the United States Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia

published its decision in United Keetoowah Band of Cherokee Indians v. Federal Communications Commission (FCC). The court's decision was a win for tribal nations and a clear statement historic and environmental protection matters.

The United Keetoowah Band, with other petitioners, including the National Resources Defense Council and the Blackfeet Tribe, challenged a 2018 FCC Order exempting most small-cell 5G construction from review under the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) and the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). The petitioners also challenged FCC's attempt to abbreviate tribal participation in NHPA review.

The court agreed the elimination of NHPA and NEPA review of small-cell 5G construction was unsupported and did not respect laws protecting tribal cultural and natural resources. Unfortunately, the court allowed the FCC to limit tribal participation in the review process.

worksheets, audio and video clips, vocabulary lists, games and practice materials. They will also include assessments (assignments, quizzes and tests) to determine and track increases in students' language proficiency.

Community members, adults and teens, will be subjects of video clips and/or audio recordings in the Anishinaabe language. GALD will record them and make short clips related to the lessons.

In Fall 2020, LTBB will test the Community Class online as a pilot program. They will be seeking volunteers who are willing and prepared to make the two-year commitment to complete the full four-semester pilot-course. In Fall 2021, the Community Class will be launched to the public. The Anishinaabemowin online course will be provided to tribal members and tribal community members for free.

The two-year curriculum will be adapted to high school courses that will meet the Michigan Department of Education standards and benchmarks. This way, GALD can deliver the classes to

In her own words: "Most kids around my age enjoy playing video games or being inside with their phones, I myself am different. I love learning about my culture, making regalia and most importantly, dancing. Recently, I have been attending a Native Empowerment class where my teachers have taught me everything dancing, how to make regalia and teaching us about our culture like the seven grand-

high school students to meet their World Languages graduation credit requirements. Petoskey and Harbor Springs High Schools will tentatively serve as "Pilot Schools" where GALD will pilot the courses, beginning in Fall 2021. Once the two-year pilot program has been successfully delivered, GALD hopes to expand to other schools.

Pilot classes will be offered as full classes. They are referred to as "Pilot" only because they will be used to test performance of the online platform, any glitches will be fixed and improvements will be made. It is uncertain, at this time, how many students and how many classes we can accommodate at any given time. Plans are to offer classes to all who are interested, with preference given to LTBB tribal members. Over the years, GALD has received inquiries and suggestions for online classes. We're looking forward to finally being able to provide this service.





Native American Heritage Fund Announces 2019 Grant Recipients

Editor's note: The following is a Native American Heritage Fund press release dated August 6, 2019.

The Native American Heritage Fund (NAHF) Board selected projects in seven Michigan communities as recipients of the fund's 2019 grants at the board's July 29, 2019 meeting.

The 2019 NAHF grants include:

- Bay de Noc Community College – \$6,000 to publicly acknowledge the Treaty of 1836 through a public plaque on each campus and a Treaty Day celebration.
- Godfrey-Lee Public Schools \$98,000 to rebrand the current mascot from "Rebels" to a new mascot and nickname that is culturally responsive.
- Grand Rapids Community College \$5,285 to support the Grand Rapids Community College Education and Reconciliation Project, including a trip to the Ziibiwing Center of Anishinaabe Culture and Lifeways and a Native American Speaker's Forum.
- Indigenous Law and Policy Center at Michigan State University College of Law – \$20,000 to provide a two-day symposium,



Native Family Day, and ancillary programming throughout the year.

- Monroe County Community College \$199,234 to create curriculum and a set of immersion experiences for K-12 students, focused on how to research stories from the Native perspective
- Northern Michigan University \$134,612.80 to expand Anishinabék language course offerings at undergraduate and graduate levels.
- The Friendship Community/LIFT Teen Center \$16,650 to support an overnight backpacking trip to South Manitou Island, exposing students to the history of the Ottawa tribe.

The fund, which was ap-

proved in 2016 as part of the Second Amendment to the Tribal-State Gaming Compact between the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi (NHBP) and the State of Michigan allocates a portion of NHBP's state revenue sharing payments to the NAHE.

Michigan's K-12 schools, colleges, universities and local units of government were eligible for funding through the NAHF to defray the costs of projects that promote positive relationships and accurate information about the history and role of Michigan's Indian tribes and Native Americans in the state.

The NAHF Board is composed of Chairperson Jamie Stuck (NHBP Tribal Council Chairperson); Vice Chairperson Dorie Rios (NHBP Tribal Council Vice Chairperson); Secretary Elizabeth Kinnart (Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians Citizen); Treasurer Melissa Kieswetter (Michigan Department of Civil Rights Tribal Liaison/Native American Specialist); and Board Member Kimberly Vargo (Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Vice Chairperson).

SECRETARY OF THE NAVY NAMES NEWEST TOWING SALVAGE AND RESCUE SHIP SAGINAW OJIBWE ANISHINABEK



Editor's note: The following is a Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan press release dated July 26, 2019.

Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer has announced the newest Towing, Salvage and Rescue ship (T-ATS 8) will be named Saginaw Ojibwe Anishinabek in honor of the history, service and contributions of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan.

The Saginaw Chippewa people are comprised of Saginaw, Black River and Swan Creek bands. Ojibwe is also referred to as Chippewa and Anishinabek means "original people."

"I am deeply honored to announce that the history of the Saginaw Chippewa people will once again be part of Navy and Marine Corps history," said Spencer. "The future USNS Saginaw Ojibwe Anishinabek honors the original people of modern-day Michigan, with their original name, and

will carry the proud Ojibwe legacy for decades to come."

This is the first ship to bear the name Saginaw Ojibwe Anishinabek, and the fifth U.S. ship to be named in honor of Native American nations.

"It's a great honor to have the name and language of our people on a Navy ship," said Chief Ronald Ekdahl of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan. "We hold our veterans in high regard, and we have a proud tradition of having many of our men and women provide service to our country. Chi Miigwetch (Thank You) to the U.S. Navy for recognizing the culture in such a distinct way."

Gulf Island Shipyards was awarded a \$64.8 million contract option for the detail design and construction of the new Towing, Salvage and Rescue Ship, which will be based on existing commercial towing offshore vessel designs and will replace the current T-ATF 166 and T-ARS 50 class ships in service with the US Military Sealift Command. The future USNS Cherokee Nation is the second ship in the new class of Towing, Salvage and Rescue Ships and will be designated T-ATS 7.

The contract includes options for potentially six additional vessels, and each additional ship will be named in honor of prominent Native Americans or Native American tribes.

The T-ATS will serve as open ocean towing vessels and will additionally support salvage operations and submarine rescue missions. The ship will be built at the company's shipyard in Houma, LA, and is expected to be completed in July 2021.






Charles Keway, Jr., 81





The Shirley Naganashe Oldman Completion Award, in the amount of \$100, will be awarded to LTBB tribal members who complete a secondary education program. In order to receive this award, a copy of your official transcript, copy of high school diploma, GED certificate or certificate of completion MUST be submitted.
