# LTBB TRIBAL GAMING: PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the State of Michigan entered into a compact providing for tribal Class III gaming on December 3, 1998.

On July 24, 2003, then Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm signed an agreement with LTBB to amend the 1998 compact to allow LTBB to operate an additional gaming facility in Emmet or Charlevoix counties. The 1998 compact had limited LTBB to a single gaming facility.

Victories Casino in Petoskey, MI, opened on July 16, 1999, closed on August 31, 1999 until the land could be put in trust, reopened on January 26, 2000 and closed on June 18, 2007.

Odawa Casino Resort in Petoskey, MI, opened on June 20, 2007. In February 2006, LTBB sold bonds in the amount of \$122 million to build Odawa Casino Resort. The bonds were sold at the rate of 10.25% and were due in 2014. The yearly interest payment was \$12 million. LTBB made the interest payments from August 2006 until February 2009 for a total of \$36 million in payments. The tribe was permitted to receive \$12.5 million a year from the casino for governmental services known as the Annu-



al Service Payment increasing annually at 3%. In 2008, LTBB did not pay \$8.2 million of the Annual Service Payment in order to meet its debt liability.

In May 2009, the tribe hired Oppenheimer & Co., Inc. and Fredericks Peebles to assist it in restructuring the \$122 million debt. The completion of the financial restructure with the bondholders took place on November 30, 2010 with these terms: Exchanged \$122 mil-

lion of existing notes and \$21 million of related unpaid accrued interest for \$23 million of cash and \$40 million of new notes, a reduced interest rate of 10.25% to 9%, reduced the yearly interest payment from \$12 million to \$3.6 million and extended maturity date from 2014 to 2020. Since the restructuring, LTBB has made the interest payments, but has not paid on the principal of \$40 million.

Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara and Executive staff, Legislative Leader Melvin L. Kiogima, Odawa Casino Resort General Manager David Wolf and several consultants for the proposed Mackinaw City casino met with the Village Council of the Village of Mackinaw City on October 18, 2012.


The meeting was well attended with several tribal citizens in attendance. I thought the presentation went well and was well received by the Village Council. The Village Council will conduct its due diligence on the project and is expected to render a decision in January 2013.

Kiogima, several members of Tribal Council and Treasury Director Michael Garrow also met with tribal citizens in Detroit, MI, Lansing, MI, Escanaba, MI, Grand Rapids, MI, and again at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI, to further address any concerns and answer questions our tribal citizens had about the project. While the number of tribal citizens in attendance outside of our homelands was less than expected, for the most part, the proposed casino project generated many questions, but

### LTBB Tribal Citizen Bill Denemy Elected as Michigan Indian Elders Association President

LTBB's two delegates are Bea Law and Bill Denemy, both LTBB Tribal Citizens. At the MIEA meeting on July 17, 2012 held in Escanaba, MI, Denemy and RoAnn Beebe-Mohr, a delegate of the Nottawaseppi Huron Band of Potawatomi, were nominated for the position of MIEA President. At the subsequent MIEA meeting on October 16, 2012 held in Peshawbestown, MI, Denemy was elected as MIEA President and is serving a two-year term. Denemy, a Petoskey, MI, resident, previously served as the MIEA Vice President from October 2010 to October 2012.

According to the MIEA by-laws, the President "shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Association, shall generally perform all duties usually performed by the President of like organizations, shall chair the Association meetings, be the spokesperson for the Association and be responsible to see recommendations of the Association are acted on."

"We (MIEA) meet three times a year (April, July and October), and the 12 tribes take turns hosting the meetings," Denemy said. "On the first day, there is a delegates' dinner where we set the agenda for the business meeting, which is held the next day. After the business meeting, we hold an auction to raise money for MIEA."

Annually, MIEA awards scholarships to enrolled members or direct descendants of the MIEA constituent tribes who have been accepted to or who are attending a public college or university or technical school and offers

a Student Incentive Program to recognize students who achieve all "A's" for a marking period as well as students who achieve perfect attendance for a marking period. For more information about the Scholarship Program and the Student Incentive Program, please visit the MIEA website at www.michiganindianelders.org and click on the Students tab.

At the October 16, 2012 MIEA meeting, MIEA drafted a letter supporting Senate Bill 1232, known as the Michigan Indian Family Preservation Act (MIFPA), and the letter was signed by all the tribes in attendance at the meeting.

In part, the letter states, "The Michigan Indian Elders Association recognizes there is no resource more vital to the continued existence, vitality and integrity of Indian nations than our children. It is with such a belief in promoting and preserving Indian families that the United States Congress passed the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) in 1978. Unfortunately, there has been a continued inconsistent application of ICWA by officials within many states, including the State of Michigan. MIFPA will end this inconsistency by providing clarity and reinforcement of ICWA at the state level. MIFPA will ensure the tribes' cultural connections with its children are promoted, Indian families are preserved, and the best interests of Indian children will be truly followed."

"Loopholes exist in the implementation of ICWA," Denemy said. "MIFPA would tighten those loopholes. Su Lantz, who works as a Legal Assistant in our Legal Department, did an outstanding job giving a presentation on MIF-PA on behalf of LTBB."



#### TAX AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example be-

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable,

gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant. Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members'

sole consumption ONLY! IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

#### Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

#### NEW LTBB I.D.

Tribal identification cards now have a hologram. This is an added security feature to eliminate duplication. We will be phasing out the old cards. means the cold and flu season is in full swing. If you haven't already received your seasonal influenza vaccine, it's not too late. The flu season peaks in January, so protect yourself now. Call the Health Clinic at 231-242-1700 to schedule a nurse visit or ask for one at your next scheduled appointment.

take to protect yourself from not only the flu, but other respiratory illnesses (nose, throat and lungs) as well. The following recommendations are from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

- sneeze.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
  - Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you or your child gets sick with a respiratory illness, limit contact with others as much as possible to help prevent spreading illness.

If you do catch a viral infection, which antibiotics cannot treat, you will usually recover when the illness has run its course. Colds, a type of viral infection, can last for up to two weeks. You should keep your healthcare provider informed if you or your child's illness gets worse or lasts longer than expected. Here are some things you can do to feel better when it's a virus antibiotics can't help.

- Get plenty of rest.
- Use a <u>clean humidifier</u> or cool mist vaporizer.
- Avoid smoking, second-hand smoke and other pollutants (air-







### From the Desk of the Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara



#### \$\$ MACKINAW CITY, MI, OUR NEXT CASINO? \$\$

Our tribal representatives and business partners proposed casino plans to the Village Council in Mackinaw City, MI, for approximately 30 minutes on the evening of October 18, 2012. We presented key items such as an executive summary, capabilities of the tribe and the entire team with their strong gaming expertise, we spoke of our casino in Petoskey, MI, we presented as a tribe of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians or Ottawa people who have been in this geographical area of Michigan long before the Europeans arrived here on Turtle Island known as Canada and North and South America. Demographics and marketing were presented, benefits of the project and the statutory basis for the project.

The meeting was held in the James B. Marshall multi-purpose room at the Mackinaw City School because more people were expected to attend the meeting. People filled the entire room. Detailed information consisted of the construction of the 29,000 square foot facility which would include approximately 100 construction jobs, followed by 85-90 year-round employees and add 2% of its revenue from 550 slot machines to local government based on Class III gaming.

Mackinaw City Village Council President Jeff Hingston stated no voting or motions would be considered after the meeting. He also stated during the course of the next several weeks, the Village Council was going to digest and confer with its legal counsel and will have a public hearing in approximately a month. Hopefully, we will have an answer by January 2013.

#### **2012 PER CAP**

On October 12, 2012, I submitted a supplemental request of monies in the amount of \$455,000 to Tribal Council's Appropriations and Finance Committee to be able to distribute an additional \$99 to each LTBB Tribal Citizen making the total \$599 per tribal citizen. Checks were mailed in early November. .... HAPPY HOLIDAYS!

#### **CANDIDATES**

On October 23, 2012, and October 30, 2012, I met with Frank Foster and Suzanne Shumway respectively in my office. They were both running for the 107th District, representing Chippewa, Emmet and Mackinaw counties in Michigan, a part of Cheboygan County, MI. Foster was later elected. I spoke to each on opposition to the grey wolf hunt,

no matter where the wolf hunt would take place. I informed both the grey wolf is a culturally significant species with a role and place in Odawa culture.

In the creation story of the Anishnabe, Ma'ingan, the wolf is a brother to the Original Man. The two traveled together throughout the world naming everything they encountered. Afterward, the Creator had them take separate paths, but told them both they would be feared, respected and misunderstood by others who would arrive later and that each other's fates would mirror one another.

I asked our Natural Resource Director, Doug Craven, to represent our tribe on our opposition of the grey wolf hunt to Senator Tom Casperson at Brimley, MI, on November 7, 2012. We are in very good hands with Mr. Craven.

#### UNITED STATES ATTORNEY AND STAFF, WESTERN DISTRICT OF MICHIGAN

On October 24, 2012, a meeting was held at Odawa Hotel in Petoskey, MI, with attendees from the United States Attorney's Office, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Drug Enforcement Administration, United States Secret Service and the Bureau of Indian Affairs along with our own Legislative Services Attorney, Tribal Prosecutor, Chief of Police, General Counsel, Court Administrator, Tribal Council and Yours Truly.

There were case updates, training details for classes and where they were going to be held, and updates on the Adam Walsh Act and the Tribal Law and Order Act.

I asked how our tribal police were doing, and I was informed "OUTSTANDING."

#### **ELECTION DAY**

I allowed anyone employed by the LTBB Government to take one hour off and not have to use personal time or flex time to exercise their right to vote on November 6, 2012.

#### **GHOST SUPPERS**

Ghost Suppers started on November 3, 2012 and went through the third week of November.

#### **CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER**

I am pleased to announce Carrie Carlson accepted the position, starting on November 5, 2012. For the last eight years, Carrie has worked for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Accounting Department, first as the Enterprise Accountant, and then as the Senior Staff Accountant and Grants Compliance Manager. In addition, Carrie served as the Interim Controller from July 2009 through September 2009 and was currently serving as the Interim CFO before she moved into her permanent position on November 5, 2012. Carrie attended high school in Cheboygan, MI, and attended Saginaw Valley State University. Carrie falls under the supervision of the Chairman.



# NATURAL RESOURCE DEPARTMENT

RADON ACTION MONTH 2013



You can't see, smell or taste radon, but it could be present at a dangerous level in your home. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer deaths among non-smokers in America and claims the lives of approximately 21,000 Americans each year. In fact, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Surgeon General urge all Americans to protect their health by testing their homes, schools and other buildings for radon. Exposure to radon is a preventable health risk, and testing radon levels in your home can help prevent unnecessary exposure. If a high radon level is detected in your home, you can take steps to fix the problem to protect yourself and your family.

The EPA has designated January as National Radon Action Month. The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians' Air Quality Program will once again be participating in Radon Action Month. Similar to previous years, the air program will be partnering with the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality to provide free testing supplies and informational documentation to all tribal citizens and employees at no charge.


The Michigan Department of Environmental Quality has designated Emmet and Charlevoix Counties as "Zone 2," suggesting a moderate potential to detect radon gas at a level above the safe limit or 4.0 piCu / liter of air (right). Houses in this area can expect to see levels of radon gas between 2-4 piCu / L. In Michigan, one in eight homes can expect to see a level of radon gas considered above the safe limit, and in some counties, that number increases to one in four homes1.

Radon enters the house though cracks in concrete slabs, loose fitting pipe penetrations, cracks in your home's foundation and even through the water system. While complete eradication is difficult, it is possible to greatly reduce the danger of radon in your home. During Radon Action Month, the EPA suggests every homeowner has his or her home tested

for radon gas. New homebuyers should have their home tested for radon before agreeing to purchase the home.

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public

w 105-143, are as follows

1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had
not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their
ertificates upon reaching the age of 18.

2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his

3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g.

#### HUMAN SERVICES DEPARTMENT RAISES AWARENESS OF DOMESTIC AND FAMILY VIOLENCE mental Center: "Roses Are Red, Violets

With October being Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the Human Services Department created Clothesline Project displays and organized a "mugging" of the tribal community to raise awareness to domestic and family vio-

The Clothesline Project displays were at the 911 Spring St. Building in Petoskey, MI, where the Human Services Department is located and at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

The following is a sampling of what was written on the various shirts hanging up on the display at the LTBB GovernAre Blue, No One You Love, Should Ever Hurt YOU; Family Violence Doesn't Discriminate, It Crosses All Barriers; They Said It Was How I Dressed; and Love Doesn't Hurt. According to information distribut-

ed by Human Services Department staff, the Clothesline is a visual, public display that bears witness to violence. Each shirt is decorated to represent a particular person's experience. The original project started in Hyannis, MA, in the fall of 1990 with 31 shirts hung. Since that time, projects have begun in communities all across the country and in other countries as well.

The purpose of the project is fourfold: To bear witness to survivors and vic-

tims of domestic violence; to help with the healing process for people who have lost a loved one or are survivors; to educate, document and raise society's awareness of the issue; and to provide a nationwide network of support, encouragement and information for other communities starting their own Clothesline Projects.


The "mugging" of the tribal community involved handing out coffee mugs that had purple Domestic Violence Awareness ribbons and "Never Give Up" printed on them. An informational handout about domestic and family violence and a purple and white pen with the Domestic Violence Awareness ribbon and the Human Services Department contact information on it were inside the mug. The mugs were

purchased with federal funds set aside as outreach to bring awareness to the community through the Family Violence Services and Prevention Act.

Human Services Department staff handed out mugs and gave an informational presentation about the department and the services it offers to the elders at the Elders Luncheon on October 11, 2012.

The trip was set up by LTBB Executive staff, but none attended. It was disappointing since they are the ones who will make decisions regarding such a facility. Committee was disappointed no Tribal Administration personnel or Tribal Council members attended.


Motion by Secretary Bea Law to adjourn and was seconded by Member Richard Wemigwase.


He served as the President of the Michigan State Employees Association and as the State President of the Michigan Association of Governmental Employees.

### Housing Department Programs

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,300 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. 

In 2003, LTBB purchased land for economic development on Nicolet Street in Mackinaw City, MI. LTBB presented Mackinaw City with a plan to build a second casino there, but the Mackinaw City Village Council rejected the plan by a 6-1 vote in September 2003.

In January 2012, LTBB purchased three additional parcels of land in Mackinaw City, MI, which was adjacent to two parcels already owned by the tribe and in trust, for \$550,000. In September 2012, LTBB purchased the land in Mackinaw City, MI, on which the former Thunder Falls Water Park operated on, for \$1.5 million.

Pending final approval by Tribal Council and approval by the Mackinaw City Village Council, the proposed Mackinaw City casino with 550 slot machines and a small deli would be built between I-75 and Nicolet Street. The casino can be built at 1020 S. Nicolet Street, the site of the former King's Inn, since the land is in trust.



The cost of the proposed casino is \$26 million, and the tribe currently owes \$40 million on Odawa Casino Resort. The plan is to refinance both casinos and pay off the loan by the end of 2018. The proposed Mackinaw City casino is expected to generate approximately \$5 million yearly for debt payment and create approximately 85 to 90 year-round jobs and approximately 100 construction jobs during construction. The proposed opening date would be in the spring of 2014 after 10 months of construction.

On September 23, 2012, Tribal Council held a special meeting for LTBB Tribal Citizens and their spouses to discuss the proposed project. The Tribal Council Chambers, located inside the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI, was full as approximately 60 people attended the meeting. Of those in attendance, 27 gave public comment or asked questions regarding the proposed project, and two letters were read by tribal citizens who were unable to attend. Some spoke in support of the proposed project, and some voiced opposition to it.

Tribal Council held Mackinaw City Casino Project Q & A meetings with tribal citizens in Detroit, MI, on October 26, 2012; in Lansing, MI, on October 27, 2012; in Escanaba, MI, on October 29, 2012; in Grand Rapids, MI, on November 1, 2012; and in Harbor Springs, MI, on November 3, 2012.

In order to have a Class III casino in Mackinaw City, MI, LTBB must have approval of the local governing body as mandated by its compact with the State of Michigan. Toward this end, LTBB

gave a presentation to the Mackinaw City Village Council regarding the proposed project on October 18, 2012 held at the Mackinaw Public Schools auditorium in Mackinaw City, MI. The auditorium was full as approximately 80 people attended the meeting. Those in attendance were allowed to give public comment before and after the presentation. Of the 12 who gave public comment there, nine spoke in opposition to the proposed casino, two asked questions and one spoke in favor of it.

At the meeting, Mackinaw City Village Council President Jeff Hingston indicated the Village Council would hold a public hearing on the proposed casino prior to the Village Council taking a vote on it. LTBB later received word the Village Council will hold the public hearing in January 2013.

If the Mackinaw City Village Council does not grant LTBB approval to build a Class III casino, LTBB does not need the approval of the Mackinaw City Village Council to build a Class II casino.

In the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, Congress included the definition of Class II gaming as follows: Bingo; when played in the same location as bingo - pull tabs, lotto, punch boards, tip jars, instant bingo, other games similar to bingo; and non-house banked card games authorized or not explicitly prohibited by the state in which the tribal operation is located. All other games are Class III, except for certain social or traditional forms of gaming. Class III games include, but are not limited to the following: Baccarat, chemin de fer, blackjack, slot machines, and electronic or electromechanical facsimiles of any game of chance. The National Indian Gaming Commission Office of General Counsel reviews games on request by a tribe or a game developer and issues advisory opinions on whether they are Class II or Class III.

If a Class III casino is built, LTBB would have to give 6% of the net win at the casino derived from all Class III electronic games of chance, as those games are defined in the compact, to the State of Michigan semi-annually and would have to give 2% of the net win derived from all Class III electronic games of chance, as those games are defined in the compact, to local governments semi-annually. The 2% is dispersed through the Local Revenue Sharing Board.

If LTBB built a Class II casino, the tribe would have to give the 6% semi-annual payments to the State of Michigan, but the tribe would not be required to give the 2% semi-annual payments to local governments.

At the November 4, 2012 Tribal Council meeting, a motion was made by Councilor Winnay Wemigwase and supported by Secretary Regina Gasco-Bentley to submit the proposed Mackinaw Casino project to a vote of the registered tribal voters at a referendum election per ARTI-CLE XIV., Part B. of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Constitution. The motion failed with two Councilors, Winnay Wemigwase and Secretary Regina Gasco-Bentley, voting yes, and seven Councilors, Kevin Gasco, John Keshick III, Belinda Bardwell, Legislative Leader Melvin L. Kiogima, Treasurer John Bott, Bill A. Denemy and Aaron Otto, voting no. An affirmative vote of six Councilors is required for a referendum vote of the registered voters. Some tribal citizens had asked Tribal Council to put the proposed casino project to a referendum vote at the special meeting held on September 23, 2012.

Currently, there are five casinos – Bay Mills Resort & Casino in Brimley, MI; Kewadin Casino – Hessel in Hessel, MI; Kewadin Shores Casino & Hotel in St. Ignace, MI; Kings Club Casino in Brimley, MI; and Odawa Casino Resort in Petoskey, MI – within 50 miles of Mackinaw City, MI.

cil to move forward with the project.




