FROM THE DESK OF THE TRIBAL CHAIRMAN KEN HARRINGTON

The January 28, 2011 Mtigwaakiis open house was a success. The regional U.S. Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Director Kevin Fitzgibbons was on-site for the ribbon cutting ceremony. The ribbon cutting was performed by LTBB Housing Commissioners. The project was funded by American Recovery Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding. TV 7/4 Up North Live covered the historical event for our tribe. The GOLD Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certified multiple unit affordable housing complexes are exclusive in a 26-statewide area. Fitzgibbons said, "Vice President (Joseph) Biden will see this project." The Vice President monitors ARRA funded



projects. Lynda Lantz, a reporter for HUD in Washington, D.C., interviewed the Chairman on February 3, 2011 for a national article illustrating our tribe's green project. Our tribe has paved the way for tribes and other communities who want to build energy efficient affordable housing.

The Mtigwaakiss housing site is shovel ready for 20 more units to be added and to house LTBB Tribal Citizen Families. The backup well house, utilities and infrastructure are in place, including parking areas. Currently, the Executive is seeking site plan approval from Tribal Council for wind mill power at Murray Road. The state of the art, highly energy efficient units are all electric. The infrastructure will accommodate wind or solar as a renewable energy source. Our tribe is pursuing grant funding for renewable energy projects such as wind or solar power.

The Chippewa Ottawa Resource Authority (CORA) held its election of officers at the January 28, 2011 regular meeting. The five member tribes include the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians (GTB), the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Sault Ste. Marie Band of Chippewa Indians, the

Bay Mills Indian Community and LTBB. Chairman Derek Bailey from GTB retained CORA Chairman; Ogema Larry Romanelli from Little River retained CORA Vice Chairman for 2011.

Securing of CORA funding in Washington, D.C. is ongoing. The five tribes remain fixed to the 2000 Great Lakes Consent Decree funding. A portion of the funding is earmarked, and the new Congress has pledged no more earmarks. The five tribes continue to work together for the federal commitment for the 2007 Inland Consent Decree appropriations.

Newly elected Congressman Dan Benishek visited our LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI, on February 2, 2011. After introductions, the Congressman stressed concerns of the current \$1.5 trillion deficit spending the federal government is guilty of in 2010. Cuts were stressed to prevent deficit spending. When we asked for appropriations, the response was negative. Congressman Benishek is proposing jobs, jobs, jobs. His theory or plan is to create policy for lower tax incentives for businesses effectively creating jobs. We stressed to the Congressman and his aide appropriations are necessary for housing, fishing and treaty rights.

By majority vote, Tribal Council accepted the \$250,000 donation from CMS presented to the Chairman in December 2010. CMS designated the money for our tribe's Natural Resource Department fish hatchery. Construction drawings for the hatchery have been awarded to Northwest Design Group (NDG) of Petoskey, MI. Construction of the fish hatchery is scheduled to start by June 2011, and the hatchery is expected to be operational in 2012. At first, the hatchery will produce two different species of 50,000 finger-length fish per year. Lake trout, walleye and other fish species can be produced for science and stocking of

additional fish for area lakes and rivers on our reservation.

Concept drawings for the Veterans Memorial are scheduled for spring 2011. The location has been selected by the Veterans Workgroup. Veterans from past



and present will be formally recognized. If you know of any LTBB Veteran, please forward his or her name, rank, branch and years of service to Lisa Flynn at 231-242-1401 because it is very important all of our LTBB Veterans are recognized.

The Executive is currently researching Internet speed and phone upgrades for intergovernmental increased efficiency. Additional Information Technology (IT) expansion considered is video conferencing throughout our LTBB Tribal Government. Large video conference screens for large meetings and commission trainings can be accomplished through video conferencing to save our tribe money.



Also, if you were a minor RTM and worked during 2010, please contact me as well. The forms were mailed to RTMs ages 18 and up as of 1-1-2010.

This year, the DOC plans to expand its horizons a bit and work on promoting tribal member-owned businesses. It is the department's hope to offer the following to tribal member business owners:

- Post your website as a link on the DOC webpage.

- Showcase your business at the Annual Membership meeting.

If you are interested in any of these endeavors, please contact me as soon as possible. Space is limited for the Annual Membership meeting.

Also, as a reminder, DOC offers Tribal Notary services. If you need to file a Change of Address, the forms are available in my office. I would be happy to notarize them for you and forward them to the Enrollment Department.

One last thing, if your Tribal ID is faded, cracked or taped together, please go to the Enrollment Department for a new one. There's a new system and register at Bi-indigen Gas Station and Convenience Store in Petoskey, MI, and any Tribal ID in this condition will not be accepted. The clerks need to be able to identify the person presenting the ID as the cardholder.

LEGISLATIVE CORNER

As most of you are aware, in the summer of 2009, Tribal Council enacted WOS 2009-018 that provided for a Traditional Tribal Burial Grounds. The purpose of the statute is to establish and create a Traditional Tribal Burial Grounds for natural burials. Natural burials minimize the impact of burials on the planet by not allowing the use of chemical preservatives and only allowing biodegradable materials for caskets and unobtrusive grave markers.

The burial grounds are intended to allow tribal citizens to make a statement of personal values and recognize the Circle of Life and that life is cyclical in nature.

The Land and Reservation Committee has had some inquiries about the Traditional Tribal Burial Grounds and would like to have more citizenship input in the process of selecting the land for the burial grounds. Also, the statute requires the Tribal Council to establish a tribally-chartered corporation to maintain the burial grounds, and we are looking for interested persons to fill this role.

In order to have adequate tribal citizenship participation in this process, the Land and Reservation Committee is hosting a public hearing on March 17, 2011 to discuss the land selection and process for establishing the Traditional Burial Grounds. Please join us for the hearing, but if you are unable to attend the hearing, and would like to submit written comment, please contact the Legislative Office for the proper form. As always, we hope you can join us for the hearing and look forward to your comments.

Prior to accepting her current position, she temped in the Human Resources Department since December 6, 2010. Her position is a combination of field and office work, and she coordinates the recycling


program. She works in both the Environmental Services Program, located in the LTBB Governmental Center, and the NRD building.

ATTENTION ICE FISHERMEN: PLEASE REPORT YOUR HARVEST IN SEVEN DAYS

Ahnee tribal fishers, A couple of reminders as we en-


sure another one of our Michigan winters and take advantage of some ice fishing opportunities.

As we move away from ice covered lakes and into more open water towards spring, we have an elevated interest in spearing and other methods of taking fish. Please be mindful of reporting requirements set forth in both on and off reservation regulations.

On the 1855 Reservation: Any walleye, northern pike, muskellunge, salmon, trout (including steelhead and brook) taken through the use of a spear, dip net, trotline or bow fishing equipment shall require submitting a harvest report within seven days of harvest.

In the 1836 Treaty Inland Consent Decree area: Upon harvest of walleye, northern pike, muskellunge, salmon, trout (including steelhead and

brook) via the use of spear, trotline, club, short seine, hands, dip net, cross-bow or bow, a harvest report shall be submitted within seven days of harvest date.



The LTBB NRD appreciates our citizens complying with these requirements in helping with the future management and wise use of our natural resources.



ELDERS VENISON DISTRIBUTION A COLLABORATIVE EFFORT

On January 27, 2011, the Human Services Department, the Natural Resource Department and the Chairman's Office all came together to harvest, process and distribute venison to the tribal elders. Natural Resource Commission Chairman John Keshick, Jr. hunted eight deer on the Berg Lease tribal property and took the deer to be processed. Human Services picked up the venison, housed and inventoried the meat for distribution. The Chairman's Office was able to pay for the processing. Each tribal elder had to show their enrollment card and sign for their portion at the time of distribution. The meat was distributed frozen, on a first-

come, first-serve basis. The venison distribution and collaboration was a huge success in the community, and the venison went fast! There were 78 tribal citizens who benefited from this project.

Inland Waterway 2011 Fisheries Survey

In 2011, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Natural Resource Department and the Department of Fisheries and Wildlife at Michigan State University will be conducting a comprehensive survey of the walleye populations throughout the Inland Waterway. The main objectives of the project are to estimate population size, growth rates, movement and reproductive success of walleye in the Inland Waterway. The survey will begin in early spring when intensive netting and electrofishing will take place. We will tag and release walleyes and will track recoveries of tagged fish with angler interviews and by voluntary tag returns. We will also collect walleye spine samples to determine fish ages. In addition to the spring survey, we will be conducting work throughout the spring and summer with a variety of collection gears in the lakes and tributaries, including a summer gill-net survey targeting lake sturgeon in Burt Lake.

Fish are marked with a metal jaw tag (see photo below) which will have an address and tag number. Approximately 1/2 of the tags are denoted as having a monetary reward of \$10. If you catch a tagged fish, please fill out a tag return form (provided at access sites) and send it to the address given, give it to an MDNRE or MSU representative or you may complete a form online (www.michigandnr.com/FISH/TAGGEDFISH.ASP). If you catch a fish which will be released, please remove the tag before releasing the fish. Letters will be sent to anglers detailing information about the tagged fish. We also ask for angler's assistance in providing information to the sampling crews which will be working on the lakes throughout the year. The information they collect is essential for making accurate estimates of population size and movement. Your participation is appreciated and will help in future management.

Tax Agreement Information

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow

you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to you.

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September

5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

Minors who turn 18 by November 30, 2011 must complete an ADULT ADDRESS VERIFICATION FORM. This form must be returned by November 30, 2011.

5. *Motor Fuel Tax (currently 33 cents per gallon unleaded and 29 cents per gallon on diesel)
6. *Tobacco Product Tax (currently \$2 per pack of cigarettes)

* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.

*The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.

*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, **YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST** before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB

website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me. Thank you.

DO YOU NEED HELP WITH HEALTHCARE? CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICE MAY BE ABLE TO HELP YOU!

I.H.S. - CHS coverage is not automatic. You must be registered with CHS. Should you have an emergency situation requiring you to obtain care at a non- I.H.S. facility such as urgent care or the emergency room, you must notify the CHS office at 231-242-1600 within 72 hours of that visit. If you fail to do so, you will be held responsible for the bill.

Eligibility Criteria:

- You must reside in the Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA).
- Be an enrolled member or descendent of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians or be able to prove social or economic ties to the community.
- A Native American claiming eligibility for CHS has the responsibility to furnish the tribal program with documentation to substantiate the claim.
- You must have an active and complete file with Contract Health before a reference number can be given.

Remember!!!!

Indian Health Service Contract Health is not an entitlement program - not everyone is eligible. Know your status before obtaining services.

Referrals:

Physicians write referrals when patients need medical care that is not available in the Tribal

Clinic. A referral is not an implication the care will be paid by CHS. A patient must meet eligibility criteria, medical priorities and use all alternate resources available.

If a referral is denied for CHS payment, the patient may elect to obtain medical services at his or her own expense. In most cases, an approved referral is limited to one medical appointment. Please call Contract Health Services at 231-242-1600 prior to any follow-up appointments for approval to make sure your coverage is still in effect.

Alternate Resources:

Contract Health Service is the payer of last resort. When a patient has Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans Assistance, Workman's compensation, private insurance or any other coverage, it is considered the primary carrier.

Priority system:

Medical referrals are approved for payment by a priority system.

The system has highest priority to approve conditions related to life saving or potential death threatening situations, then we approve by severity of condition.

The amount of funding we receive for CHS services is limited. When we run out of money toward the end of the year, then we have to be very strict on referral approvals and may only have the funds to pay for emergency conditions.

Help Us Help You: Important Information from Contract Health Services

Did you know one emergency room visit can produce multiple bills?

For example, I went to the emergency room for a sprained ankle. From that one ER visit, there could be a laboratory bill, a x-ray bill, an emergency room doctor's bill and the hospital bill just to name a few.

Not all bills are handled at the originating facility, so we need your help to ensure all your bills are paid in a timely manner. All tribal citizens should be aware of the procedure you must follow for Contract Health Services once payment has been approved by the Manage Care team.

It is important to note if we do not get the bill and the billing code, we cannot pay the bill.

Procedure

1. Call the number on any statement you receive in the mail and inform the provider to bill the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. LTBB is the payer of last resort, so please verify any private insurance you may have and have the provider bill them first.

2. Bring any statement in to Contract Health Services.

3. Physically watch the Contract Health Services worker call the number on the statement.

4. Verify the name of the person the Contract Health worker spoke with and make sure it is written on your statement.

5. Request a copy of statement with date stamp and initials of person who assisted you.

This may seem redundant, but if we work together, the process will run smoothly.

When utilizing the ER, notice must be received within 72 hours of the visit. LTBB Elders have 30 days to notify Contract Health Services.

Country Urgent Care, located on M-119 in Harbor Springs, MI, is no longer open after hours or on weekends, so LTBB is no longer using it as an urgent care facility. After hours and weekend emergency treatment can be obtained at Quick Care Walk-In Medical Center or Northern Michigan Regional Hospital in Petoskey.



Medical Transportation

Is available to tribal households who have no alternate means of transport.

For LTBB household members residing in the LTBB service delivery area.

For medical appointments/purposes only.

Transport must be arranged 72 hours in advance.





LTBB EMPLOYEE RECEIVES LEGACY AWARD

On November 18, 2010, Gijigowi Bipskaabiimi employee Eric Hemenway was awarded the Legacy Award by the Grand Rapids Public Museum. This award recognizes young leaders in Michigan whose work makes a positive impact in Michigan.

The work for which Eric was given the award was with the Grand Rapids Public Museum. The issue was the repatriation or return of Native American human remains in the control of the public museum. These remains, approximately 100 individuals, were from the Grand Rapids, MI, area. Some of the remains were more than 1,000 years old!

Eric began working with the other tribes in Michigan, preparing a joint request of these remains as Anishnaabek ancestors. After two years of working through the legal process of getting the remains returned, the day finally came when

the Anishnaabek of Michigan could finally lay their ancestors to rest. The Little River Band of Ottawa Indians handled the reburial of the remains.

Peggy Hemenway, LTBB Tribal Citizen, accepted the award on behalf of her son, Eric, who could not attend the award ceremony due to a mandatory Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation (NAGPRA) Commission meeting in Washington D.C.

"Working to return our ancestors has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. It has been ingrained in me from an early age to respect the dead and honor their burials. I am fortunate to be in a position to help those who cannot help themselves now," Eric Hemenway said.




ARCHIVES, COLLECTIONS AND MUSEUM SERVICES

The Gijigowi Bipskaabimi Department Archives, Collections and Museum Services use a list of categories to determine how and where records are to be retained.

Those categories are Archaeological, Documents: Records and Tribal History, Ethnological, Film: Audio, Visual, Photographs, Tintypes, Government records: Tribal, Natural History, Reference Collection and Spiritual.

Some of the unique items have been donated or loaned by families and/or individuals for the purpose of safe archival storage and for the use of the tribe as cultural education for citizens.

The Archaeological might hold Lithics - Anchor stones, sinker stones mortar and stone tools.

Documents might be original tax receipts, records, plat books, Anishinaabemowin bible, original book publications of Aniishinabe Enamiad, a publication of the Holy Childhood of Jesus Indian School print shop, letters written in the Odawa language by tribal citizens, a copy of "Status of Cross Village Indians 1850" by Louis Sifferith, copies of the

James McClurken tribal research, genealogy files for tribal research and tribal rolls.

Ethnological items would be woodland pottery, black ash baskets, sweet grass baskets, white birch items, basswood containers and a headdress.

Film items would be audio tapes of our elders telling stories, recorded conversations, interviews, recorded tribal meetings, recorded music and songs, videos of tribal meetings, videotaped interviews and more than 5,000 photographs of our tribal people and their families.

Government records would contain Northern Michigan Ottawa Association (NMOA), correspondence with the United States government regarding treaties, tribal affairs and living conditions of the people and minutes before and after reaffirmation. We also have a cultural reference activity file for those interested in making something relating to our culture.

We assure you the Archives, Collections and Museum Services has something for everyone, and all are welcome to come in and browse.

The following information appears in Waganakising Odawak Statute Tribal Elections and Elec-

tion Board.

SECTION X.

REGISTRATION AND VOTING

A. Registration

This section sets out procedures to ensure that a vote cast in the name of the voter is in fact cast by that voter.

1. Each Tribal Citizen who desires to vote in an election must have a Voter Registration Form on file with the Election Board ninety (90) days before the day of election.

2. The Voter Registration Form shall be in a format approved by the Election Board.

3. The Voter Registration Form must be signed by the Tribal Citizen and verified either by (1) the seal and signature of a notary public or (2) attaching a legible copy of one of the following forms of identification: a valid Tribal Identification Card, Driver's License, state issued Identification Card, or Passport, provided such identification bears the signature of the Tribal Citizen.

4. It is the responsibility of each Tribal Citizen who wishes to vote in an election to ensure that he or she has submitted a Voter Registration Form to the Election Board.

5. Any voter who changes his or her name shall submit a new Voter Registration Form to the Election Board.

6. Based on the Voter Registration Forms submitted to the Election Board, the Election Board shall keep a roster of voters known as the Voter Registration list with voters listed in alphabetical order or nearly so as possible. The Election Board shall update the Voter Registration list as Voter Registration Forms are submitted.

7. Any voter who changes his or her address shall submit a change of address with the Enrollment Department.

8. The Election Board shall keep a roster of voters known as the Voter Registration List.

9. Tribal Enrollment Department shall upon request by the

Election Board provide a list of enrolled Tribal Citizens' names, addresses, enrollment numbers and current addresses (if available), in alphabetical order or as nearly so as possible, provided that the Tribal Citizen shall have obtain the age of eighteen by election day.



HELPING NATURE HELP YOUR GARDEN

Everyone who grows a garden has to share some of the produce with insects and other creatures. That's just the reality of this big, complex world we are a part of. Most of us are willing to share a little bit, but we would like to keep insect feeding from rising to the level of "pest" damage.

While it may sound strange, one of the ways to protect your vegetables from insects is to attract more insects. The key is attracting insects that will be garden helpers or beneficial insects. Two of the most important ways insects can benefit our gardens is by pollinating our crops and by eating the insects that want to eat our crops.

Many of our vegetable crops need to have pollen transferred from one plant to another in order to produce the fruit we want to harvest, including tomatoes, melons, cucumbers and



squash. Most of us have heard of the importance of honey bees for pollination, but they aren't the only ones. There are a number of wild bees, flies, butterflies and moths that pollinate our crops as well.

If we want to attract beneficial insects to our gardens, we have to create habitats for them which provide some of their needs. They will



need a constant supply of food which can include pollen, nectar and other insects. They also need shelter, nesting sites and overwintering sites. One of the best ways to create habitat for beneficial insects is to plant flowers which will attract them with nectar and pollen. Some families with very accessible nectar and pollen are the daisy family (aster, daisy and goldenrod) and the carrot family (Queen Anne's lace, coriander, fennel and common cow parsnip.)

Ideally, we would like to create a stable habitat which will keep beneficial insects around for the whole season and from one season to the next. Some of the native bees are ground nesters, and some of our most important predators are ground beetles, so it is important to have some undisturbed sites. It helps to have an assortment of flowers which will provide a floral display during the whole growing season.

Perennial plantings are best for providing stable habitat, but annual plants can be part of your floral display as well. Starting perennials from potted plants or rooted plugs will usually give you flowers in one to two years, but if you want to cover a larger area, it will be less expensive to start from seeds. Perennial plants started from seed may take three to five years to flower. So while perennials may be desirable in the long run, starting some annuals at the same time you start your perennials can give you results in the first few years. Besides, many of the annuals are just nice flowers to have around.

One of the best places to learn about growing native perennial plants to attract beneficial insects is at Michigan State University, <http://www.nativeplants.msu.edu/>. If you don't have Internet access, please give me a call at 231-439-8982, and I can get you those resources. Many garden catalogs will have a section for flowers to attract beneficial insects, including Johnnys (<http://www.johnnyseeds.com/>) and Peaceful Valley (<http://www.groworganic.com/good-bug-blend-lb.html>). Be sure to check local nurseries to find plants which will work well in this area.

I'd love to hear what you think about this and hear what your experiences are. Please feel free to give me a call.


The American Indian Journalism Institute (AIJI) offers a concentrated 10-day journalism course and paid summer internships for college students. The institute is funded by the Freedom Forum, an organization promoting employment diversity in America's newsrooms. AIJI students may be eligible to earn three hours of college credit if they successfully complete the class, which is taught at the Freedom Forum's Al Neuharth Media Center on the University of South Dakota's Vermillion campus.

Students attend AIJI for free and receive other financial assistance. Applications are welcome from any Native American college student hoping to become a journalist. In its first 10 years, more than 170 students have completed the program. Application forms are available at www.freedomforumdiversity.org. Preference will be given to those applicants interested in journalism careers and who show the greatest potential.

AIJI graduates compete for six-week paid internships as reporters, copy editors, photographers and multimedia journalists in daily newsrooms and with the Associated Press. The internships begin around July 1, 2011.

Applicants must submit a signed application and:
 • A written essay (at least 500 words). The essay will be read for content and to determine the ability to think and to express thoughts and ideas cogently. The essay should be autobiographical with an emphasis on interest in journalism and what the applicant hopes to accomplish through AIJI.

Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Certificate Redemption Update

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.

2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a **notarized** signature.

3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least your signature.

4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address

Are you looking to shake things up in the new year? Looking for some fun activity that doesn't involve getting outdoors? The Native Way Two Gym has four classes taking place during the week, and there are no start or end dates — join anytime! There are no fees to participate. All activity helps burn calories and reduce stress, but these classes will also help with strength, balance, coordination, self-confidence and overall health. Before participating, you should see your health care provider and be sure you are ready to take part in physical activity. Please feel free to stop by and watch a class to see if you might be interested. Call Community Health at 231-242-1601 for more information.

Yoga: Yoga is a thousands year old system of health care from India. Through poses called *asanas*, we learn to control the breath, improve flexibility and balance and gain strength. We use a style called Hatha Yoga, which emphasizes the use of props to assist the less flexible. Almost anyone can take part in yoga, and everyone can benefit from it.

Tae Kwon Do: Tae Kwon Do is a style of martial arts which began in Korea back in the 1950s; its practitioners are known for their powerful kicks and fast reflexes. In our six years of existence, we have graduated 16 black belts from age nine up to 55. Children should be at least six years old before taking part, and there is no upper age limit.

Boxing: Boxing is probably the oldest sport known to man although the rules governing it are of more recent vintage. Our instructors are Brad Houle, a former Marine champion and a three-time Wisconsin Golden Gloves champion, and Terry Samuels, both of whom are certified USA Boxing coaches.

Jiu Jitsu: Brazilian Jiu Jitsu is a martial art that focuses on using leverage and proper technique for defense. It originated in Brazil back in the early 20th century, but has its roots in Japanese judo. We base our practice on Rigan Machado's style; he is a member of the famous Gracie family.

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a families monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently there is a waiting list for available units.


