

State of Michigan, LTBB and Little River Band Settle Long-standing Club Keno Lawsuit

On April 4, 2005, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians filed a lawsuit in the U.S. District Court in Kalamazoo, MI, contending the Michigan Lottery Club Keno games violated an "exclusivity" clause in their respective 1998 gaming compacts with the State of Michigan.

Because of this contention, both Little River and LTBB withheld their 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2007 casino revenue sharing payments. According to the gaming compacts signed by both tribes, the State of Michigan was to receive 8% of the tribes' casinos' electronic gaming profits semiannually.

The tribes maintained the compacts' exclusivity clauses limit "electronic games of chance" or "commercial casino games" to Michigan's Indian casinos and the three Detroit casinos and Club Keno is a "commercial casino game."

On June 22, 2005, Michigan Attorney General Mike Cox filed a lawsuit against Little River and LTBB in the U.S. District Court. The complaint alleged Little River and LTBB withheld their 8% electronic gaming revenue payments owed to the State of Michigan since 2004, and stated the State of Michigan viewed Club Keno as an extension of an existing Keno game the Lottery Bureau was operating at the time the compacts were signed.

The State of Michigan also contended Michigan's Lottery Bureau was exempt from the compact provision because it is not a for-profit, private enterprise, and it does not operate a casino.

On March 21, 2008, Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians announced a settlement in the long-standing lawsuit over the Club Keno game. The agreement settled the question of whether Club Keno terminated the tribes' obligation to pay a portion of their tribal casino revenues to the Michigan Strategic Fund (MSF).

Under the settlement, the percentage of slot machine revenues paid by the tribes will be reduced to 6% in most cases. In return, the tribes agreed to changes in their revenue sharing agreements that will make the payments more stable in the future,



specifically:

•Gaming exclusivity will no longer be measured on a statewide basis, but will instead be based on a more limited market area for each tribe - generally nine to 10 county areas in the immediate vicinity of each tribe's casino. This means new commercial gaming activities elsewhere in the state will no longer result in the termination of payments.

•Lottery and other similar activities by the state will not be considered to be new commercial gaming unless they involve large scale use of electronic machines.

•If new commercial gaming does occur within one of the tribe's market

areas, it will no longer result in permanent termination of payments. Instead, payments are suspended and can be reinstated later at a reduced rate if the tribe's casino business continues to grow.

In a press release dated March 21, Granholm said the agreement restored funds vital to Michigan's economic development efforts at a critical time and will help ensure a more stable and cooperative economic relationship between the state and these two tribal governments.

The agreement splits approximately \$52 million in electronic gaming revenue from the tribes that had been held in escrow since the dispute began almost five years ago. It included more than \$33 million paid in by Little River and \$19 million-plus from LTBB.

The state will receive half of the escrowed money, approximately \$26 million, to be used for economic development efforts through MSF. LTBB will receive approximately \$9.65 million with Little River receiving almost \$17 million.

LTBB Tribal Chairman Frank Ettawageshik said the settlement stabilized LTBB's relationship with the state.

"I am excited about the cooperative spirit that enabled this settlement," Ettawageshik said in the press release

"We have many tough economic challenges that are much easier to work through when we all work together."

Larry Romanelli, Ogema of the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, said he was pleased to be able to bring this question to a close.

"The settlement allows both the tribes and the state to work together for our mutual future while respecting the sovereignty of each side," Romanelli said in the press release. "Keno" continued on page 16.

HISTORIC CONVENING OF INDIGENOUS NATIONS GATHER TOGETHER TO HEAL MOTHER EARTH

In the shadows of the ancient Mayan pyramids, more than 200 leaders from 71 Native American nations in Mexico, the United States and Canada gathered in Palenque, Chiapas, Mexico for the Convening of Indigenous Peoples for the Healing of Mother Earth held March 10-13.

The vision of the convening was "As caretakers of Mother Earth, speaking with one spirit, one mind, and as one family, while maintaining the principles of inclusiveness and interconnectedness, reclaiming the original teachings given to the human beings by the Creator, we will restore balance and harmony to Mother Earth and all her children."

Participation in the convening was by invitation only. An International Steering Committee, comprised of two Indigenous representatives from Canada, the United States and Mexico, were appointed to develop criteria for the selection of Indigenous delegates. Through the process developed by the International Steering Committee, each country invited 63 delegates and a maximum of 15 observers.

There were 234 delegates, who attended the convening, at no cost to them. Funds were raised to cover all travel costs and per diem for the participants including lodging and meals.

from Manitoulin Island, Ontario, Canada, started as the Curriculum Specialist in the Language Program on March 3.

Prior to accepting his current position, Corbiere worked as the Literacy Coordinator for his tribe. He had worked in the forestry industry as a tree harvester for 15 years before teaching the language at various levels. Corbiere earned a Native Language Teaching Certificate from Lakehead University in Thunder Bay, Ontario, Canada.

"When I left the forestry industry, I knew right from the start, I wanted to be involved in the Native language field," Corbiere said. "Since that time, I have focused on one goal. I wanted to be involved in Native language in a fundamental way. With this position, I feel like I have achieved the goal I set for myself 12 years ago."

Corbiere, one of 11 children, grew up hearing only the language spoken at home, and he considers it his first language. He started speaking English in kindergarten.

Corbiere said Anishinaabemowin is a very important part of who we are as Indian people because it is fundamental to our culture, values and worldview.

"The philosophy and spirit of our ancestors is encoded in the language," Corbiere said. "When we talk in Anishinaabemowin, we are talking in the language of our ancestors.

"We need to study and revitalize our language in its truest form the best we can because we are retaining and revitalizing our worldview the ancestors encoded in the language."

Corbiere earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Native Studies and a Bachelor of Education degree from Lakehead University. He is currently working on his Master's degree in Education.

In his free time, Corbiere enjoys meeting new people, looking on the Internet for new computer software and videography. He started a community television station for his tribe.

Jessica Searles, a LTBB Tribal Citizen, started as a Payroll Technician in the Accounting Department on March 17. She previously worked as a Retail Clerk in the Quill Box Gift Shop inside Odawa Casino Resort in Petoskey, MI, and as a hostess at Mukwa Café in Victories Casino.

Important facts you should know about Indian Health Service Contract Health Service

I.H.S. - CHS coverage is not automatic. You must be registered with CHS. Should you have an emergency situation requiring you to obtain care at a non- I.H.S. facility such as urgent care or the emergency room, you must notify the CHS office at 231-242-1600 within 72 hours of that visit. If you fail to do so, you will be held responsible for the bill.

Eligibility Criteria:

- You must reside in the Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA).
- Be an enrolled member or descendent of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians or be able to prove social or economic ties to the community.
- A Native American claiming eligibility for CHS has the responsibility to furnish the tribal program with documentation to substan-

tiate the claim.

You must have an active and complete file with Contract Health before a reference number can be given.

Remember!!!!

Indian Health Service Contract Health is not an entitlement program - not everyone is eligible. Know your status before obtaining services.

Referrals:

Physicians write referrals when patients need medical care that is not available in the Tribal Clinic. A referral is not an implication the care will be paid by CHS. A patient must meet eligibility criteria, medical priorities and use all alternate resources available.

If a referral is denied for CHS payment, the patient may elect to obtain medical services at his or her own expense. In most cases, an approved referral is limited to one medical appointment. Please call Contract Health Services at 231-242-1600 prior to any follow-up appointments for approval to make sure your coverage is still in effect.

Alternate Resources:

Contract Health Service is the payer of last resort. When a patient has Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans Assistance, Workman's compensation, private insurance or any other coverage, it is considered the primary carrier.

Priority system: Medical referrals are approved for payment by a priority system.

The system has highest priority to approve conditions related to life saving or potential death threatening situations, then we approve by severity of condition.

The amount of funding we receive for CHS services is limited. When we run out of money toward the end of the year, then we have to be very strict on referral approvals and may only have the funds to pay for emergency conditions.

The sheets are tallied, and the results are sent to the Inter-Tribal Council, who announces the winner at the Michigan Indian Family Olympics. The winner is determined by the highest average step count.

All LTBB participants who turn in their completed log sheets will also receive a Walking Challenge Team Member t-shirt.

Trails newsletters, LTBB has moved to using Tribal Certificates of Exemption (TCEs) as of January 1, 2008. Resident Tribal Members (RTMs) are exempt from sales tax on certain enumerated items such as vehicles, watercraft, and snowmobiles and other off the road vehicles. Affixations to your primary residence are also tax exempt. This portion does not include furniture. Items purchased for tribal fishing are also exempt. This would include vehicles,

The following is the process to receive a TCE:

The RTM must request the TCE by filling out a Request for TCE form. This form is on the LTBB website www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov and the P-drive (so any LTBB Governmental Employee should be able to print it). There are also forms at the Department of Commerce (DOC) Office at 1345 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI, and at the main receptionist's desk at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

The RTM then fills out the form and returns it to the DOC. There,

it/they fall within the guidelines for exemption under the Tax Agreement. The DOC will then fill in the appropriate information and make two originals for the RTM. One will go to the vendor or seller, and the other the RTM should keep in their files. One copy will be kept in the DOC Office. When filling out the request form, please note the following:

RTM status is verified as well as the

item(s) being requested to make sure

1. When purchasing a vehicle, the Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) is needed prior to receiving the TCE along with Year, Make, Model and the dealership name, address and telephone number. Dealership paperwork is preferred. The same information is needed when purchasing a vehicle from an individual.

2. When making affixations to your primary residence and you are doing the work yourself, please make a list of all the materials and supplies needed to complete the job. This will save time and stop DOC from making several phone calls.

3. When purchasing a modular or mobile home, the Mobil or Modular ID Number, Year, Make and model will be needed along with the seller's name, address and telephone number.

to complete the affixations to your primary residence or for new construction, the contractor will have to fill out Form 3772, MI Sales & Use Tax Certificate of Exemption, in addition to the TCE issued by DOC.

5. Cost of item(s) being pur chased.

Please remember DOC Office hours are Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. If you plan to purchase a tax-exempt item on the weekend, please contact DOC prior to doing so, so your paperwork may be completed.

LTBB tribal citizens interested in harvesting bear and elk must apply for harvest tags.

For elk, tribal citizens must indicate the top three management units they are interested in hunting. Tags will be issued via lottery. The application period is May 1 through June 1. A successful applicant must wait a minimum of five years before reapplying.

For bear, the application period is May 1 through August 1. Tribal citizens must fill out an application which indicates the top three management units they are interested in hunting.

There is a \$5 non-refundable application fee for both.

Volunteers Sought for Annual Sturgeon Guarding Program and Sturgeon Spawning Habitat Conservation Project

Sturgeon Guarding Program

From late April throughout the month of May, Sturgeon for Tomorrow is again joining forces with Michigan citizens, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in Cheboygan County to protect spawning lake sturgeon in the Upper Black River.

'When lake sturgeon migrates upstream to spawn in the shallow riffles of the river, they are very vulnerable to poachers," President of Sturgeon for Tomorrow Brenda Archambo said. "With the help of Sturgeon Guard volunteers, we will be able to monitor key areas 24 hours a day."

When sturgeon are in the river to spawn, Michigan citizens and members of the local chapter of Sturgeon for Tomorrow stand watch and use cellular phones provided by Radio Shack of Cheboygan, MI, to report suspicious activity to conservation officers on patrol in the area.

Fisheries Biologists from LTBB, the Michigan DNR and volunteers are also on the river collecting biological data on the adults to better understand reproductive ecology and early life history of lake sturgeon.

leading to the arrest and conviction of any person or people illegally taking lake sturgeon. A person convicted for the illegal harvest of a lake sturgeon faces penalties of not less than 30 days in jail and not less than \$2,000 in fines and restitution or both.

Sturgeon Spawning Habitat **Conservation Project**

A series of three erosion sites on the banks of the Upper Black River, just upstream from Black Lake, are threatening the ecological integrity of this stretch of high-quality, cold water habitat. In addition to the ecological degradation associated with an increase in sediment input to streams, these sites are of particular interest in that this stretch of the Black River is a known spawning habitat of the state-threatened lake sturgeon. Preventing the further erosion of these sites and resultant input of sediment to the stream will help protect and restore the sensitive spawning habitat of lake sturgeon.

The three erosion sites affecting the sturgeon spawning habitat were identified in the Black Lake Watershed Stewardship Management Plan approved by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) in 2001. The position of the sites in relation to the river and its direction of flow,

as



vere" erosion sites, and it was noted they are contributing to the sediment load, the Black River's number one pollutant.

To successfully protect these sites from continued deterioration and to preserve the integrity of neighboring spawning grounds of the lake sturgeon, three tasks must be implemented:

1. Stabilize the shoreline and prevent further erosion and sedimentation using bioengineering techniques. This project will focus on using Large Woody Debris (LWD), coconut fiber logs, terracing and live plantings to minimize further erosion.

2. Provide educational/interpretive materials to the general public to teach about the environmental damage caused by unrestricted access to the site and the importance of using the designated path or viewing area. 3. This is also a great opportunity to educate users about the watershed and its management, non-point source pollution and habitat for endangered species.



Housing Department Programs

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Department at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used <u>ONE TIME ONLY</u> and the rent requested must be affordable and may not exceed 30% of the household's monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$3,000 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault St. Marie, MI; this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Housing Rental Program: This program is designed to assist families, for a limited time, until permanent housing can be found. Please submit a letter of interest and your application will be put on our waiting list for when LTBB rentals become available.

Yearly Notarized Minor Address Verification Form Necessary

All minors need to have a notarized Minor Address Verification form completed yearly before November 30. No faxed or electronic versions are accepted because all forms require original signatures. Forms must be mailed to the Enrollment Department at 7500 Odawa Circle, Harbor Springs, MI 49740 or dropped off at the aforementioned address. The Enrollment Department is located on the first floor of the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. If you have any questions concerning guardianship or custodial issues, please contact the Enrollment Department at 231-242-1520 or 231-242-1521.

Editor's note: The Minor Address Verification form running along with this article is only an example and may not be used. How To Become a Resident Tribal Member (RTM)

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is officially changing your address with the Enrollment Department.

All RTMs are verified through Enrollment. Enrollment in turn sends the Department of Commerce (DOC) notification of your status. Please note on your Address Verification Form (AVF) the township you reside in. This alerts the Enrollment Department for RTM status.

When you change your address with the Michigan Secretary of State's office, you will be asked if you would like to register to vote; by doing so, it will note the township you reside in. Otherwise, ask one of the Enrollment Department staff when filling out your AVF.

Your RTM status does not become effective until the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Example: I changed my address with the Enrollment Department on May 3. My RTM status does not go into effect until June 1.

It is VERY important you notify Enrollment immediately when you move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA).

It is your responsibility to notify Enrollment of any changes in address or name; the DOC cannot backtrack or backdate documents in order to qualify for RTM status.

Being an RTM exempts you from paying state sales tax on large tangible items such as vehicles, boats, snowmobiles and off the road vehicles. It also applies to affixation to your primary place of residence. There is a form that needs to be filled out to request a Tribal Certificate of Exemption (TCE). The **request** for this form (Request for TCE) can be found on the LTBB website <u>www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov</u> or by calling the DOC at 231-242-1584. Tribal Form 3998, which is the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption, may only be issued by the DOC with certain authorized signers. The signing order is as follows: DOC Assistant Theresa Keshick, Tribal Administrator Albert Colby, Jr., Vice Chairman Bill Denemy, Sr. and Chairman Frank Ettawageshik (in the absence of DOC). monthly basis as close to the end of the month as possible. If you plan to purchase a vehicle or do any remodeling to your residence, please wait until after your RTM status is effective (after the first day of the following month in which you moved); otherwise, the State of Michigan will deny your claim for a refund.





At the March 2 Tribal Council meeting, all eight Tribal Councilors present at the meeting voted yes to appoint Anthony to the six-year term.


The Appellate Court consists of Anthony, Associate Appellate Justice Wenona Singel and Associate Appellate Justice James Genia. Singel and

NCAI: I attended the Winter Executive Session for the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) in Washington, D.C. from February 29 through March 6. On Saturday, March 1, I represented NCAI in an interview with Cable News Network (CNN) conducted at the Smithsonian Institute's National Museum of the American Indian. I was interviewed about the apology to Native Americans attached by Senator (Sam) Brownback to the U.S. Senate version of the Indian Health Care Improvement Act reauthorization. This interview aired on Sunday, March 2.

The Executive Board of NCAI met all day on Sunday, March 2. I serve on the board as the Alternate Vice President for the Midwest Area. I met with the board Sunday morning and then I co-chaired the NCAI Federal Acknowledgement Task Force meeting from 1-5 p.m. The regular sessions started on Monday (March 3) and lasted until Wednesday morning (March 5). A full agenda for these meetings is available at <u>www.ncai.org</u> for those who are interested.

I spent Thursday morning (March 6) at the National Indian Health Board Appropriations Summit and the afternoon in meetings on Capitol Hill regarding Chippewa Ottawa Resource Authority (CORA) funding. Our D.C. lobbyist, Lydia Hofer, and I went to several offices to meet with staff for additional Fiscal Year 2009 funding and to talk about our Fiscal Year 2010 funding efforts. I returned to Harbor Springs late Thursday evening (March 6).

Club Keno Case: The Little River Band of Ottawa Indians (LRB), the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the State of Michigan worked together to make our case to the Office of Indian Gaming Management at the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) for the BIA to approve the Gaming Compact amendments to implement the settlement for the Club Keno case we negotiated. We jointly hired Jennifer Lindler of Alea Associates, who prepared a report that helped us make our case.

On Wednesday afternoon, March 5, we had a meeting in Washington D.C. with George Skibine and Paula Hart of the Indian Gaming Management Office at the BIA. Jim Bransky and I were there for LTBB, attorneys Dan Green and Joe Martin were there for LRB, John Wernet was there for the Governor's office and Jennifer Lindler was there to answer questions about her report. We left this meeting with the understanding that at the very least we would get the amendments "deemed approved" if not actually get an approval. On Monday, March 10, we got a faxed copy of the deemed approved letter. We still had to wait for the Federal Register publication before all parties were ready to make the announcement.

There are two parts to this settlement: The compact amendments have now been deemed approved at the Department of the Interior, and a stipulation filed in federal court ends the case and provides for splitting the escrowed funds being held by the court. As you recall, LTBB will be getting approximately \$9.65 million, which will be placed in the sinking fund for debt retirement on the Odawa Casino Resort in Petoskey, MI, after repayment of legal fees for this case.

We prepared a joint press release with Little River and the State of Michigan. I spent a good deal of Friday, March 21 doing interviews by phone with various news media from around the state.

NLEA: Vice Chairman Bill Denemy, Sr. and I attended the annual meeting of the Northern Lakes Eco-

nomic Alliance (NLEA) at Boyne Mountain in Boyne Falls, MI, on Friday, March 7. Andy Hayes of the NLEA and I are setting up a meeting to discuss the possible affiliation of LTBB with the Alliance.

MAST: Vice Chairman Bill Denemy, Sr. attended the Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes (MAST) Impact Week in Washington, D.C. the second week of March. He met with our lobbyist, Lydia Hofer, and they had several meetings on Capitol Hill.

Palenque, Mexico: During the second week of March, I attended The Convening of Indigenous Peoples for the Healing of Mother Earth. This gathering was held at the city of Palenque in the State of Chiapas, in southern Mexico. Approximately 200 delegates attended from all over North America from the Arctic Circle to the southern border of Mexico plus another approximately 150 observers, press and staff. This is the event for which I attended a planning session in Virginia last April. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Environment Canada and the Mexican Environment Ministry were all facilitators for this event planned and executed by indigenous peoples. Funds were raised to cover all travel costs and per diem for the participants including lodging and meals. We had simultaneous translation via head sets for all participants in Spanish, English and French.

We opened the convening with a sunrise ceremony Monday morning (March 10) at the Mayan ruins of Palenque, which date from 100 B.C. to 900 A.D. Spiritual leaders from the Maya conducted the ceremony on a large grassy area in front of the ruins. The weather was very hot, and our meeting rooms were air-conditioned. Due to the extremes in temperature from walking back and forth between the hot outside and the cool inside, the cold I took with me turned into bronchitis late Wednesday afternoon (March 12) and I made a trip to the local emergency room. I received a breathing treatment and some antibiotics and was released three hours later to go back to the conference.

I was one of the drafting team for a document we prepared from the discussions held at the convening. After a long floor debate on Thursday afternoon (March 13), we reached consensus on the document titled *"The Message of the Living Spirit from the Convening of Indigenous Peoples for the Healing of Mother Earth from the Traditional Territory of the Maya."* A copy of this message will soon be available at <u>www.indigenousconvening.com</u> or on the Executive Branch page of our LTBB website, <u>www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov</u>.

Lobbying: We continue to monitor the progress of the legislation at the Michigan Legislature regarding approval and implementation of the Interstate Compact that will help protect our Great Lakes surface and ground waters. So far, the drafts being considered fall short of what we believe need to be in place. We also are working in Washington D.C. on funding legislation for Indian health care and natural resource protection.

Implementation of Statutes and Resolutions

Signing: I have signed and returned to the Legislative Office all resolutions from the past month. I expect to sign the Supplemental Appropriations Procedures Policy Statute as well before the April 6 Tribal Council meeting.

Regulations: We continue to work on several sets of regulations.

<u>Oversight of Commissions and</u> <u>Programs</u>

Legal Department: I've been working with our Legal Department on the Club Keno settlement. We have successfully completed the negotiating and approvals on this project. All we have left to do is the implementation and transfer of funds. We also have submitted to Tribal Council for review and approval documents regarding the dissolution of the Reciprocal Easement Agreement (REA) for the Health Park in Petoskey, MI, and for approval of a storm water easement we are obtaining from the City of Petoskey for the storm water from the Hager Drive improvement project at the Health Park.

Enterprise Oversight Waganakising Odawa Develop-

ment, Inc.: Our first tribal corporation under our corporations code has now formed a partnership with the Northwestern Band of Shoshone Economic Development Corporation. This partnership is called Nimkee Technologies, LLC. We had the organizational meeting for Nimkee Technologies, LLC on February 27 by telephone conference. Officers selected were Chairman of the Board Frank Ettawageshik, Chief Executive Officer Bruce Parry, Secretary Michael Devine, Treasurer Alan Proctor, Vice Presidents Beatrice A. Law, Gerald Chingwa, John Warner, and Gwen Davis. Corporate Officers are Michael Devine, Chief Operating Officer, and Blake Rigby, Chief Financial Officer.

OEM Report: The monthly Odawa Enterprise Management (OEM) report from OEM Director Chuck Schofield includes a draft resolution to reestablish the line-ofcredit for Bell's Fishery in Mackinaw City, MI. The OEM Director and I have discussed how having the lineof-credit has helped Bell's bottom line in the past few months and why it is necessary in order to keep this progress going.

Report from our Owners Representative on the Odawa Casino Resort: We are getting closer to closing the project out, but we still have some issues to finish. We are down to approximately 4% of our project budget yet to pay out.

NCAI Executive Council Winter Session a Memorable Experience for the LTBB Contingent

Youth Services Coordinator Joe Lucier called it a life-changing event. Lucier, Tribal Chairman Frank Ettawageshik, Tribal Council Treasurer Gerald Chingwa and LTBB Tribal Citizen Cynthia Biro attended the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) Executive Council Winter Session held February 29 through March 6 in Washington, D.C.

"The city is amazing," Lucier said of Washington, D.C. "It's inspiring to go somewhere so many leaders have been. We were only five blocks from the White House so there were a lot of sightseeing opportunities to explore." For Lucier, his most memorable sightseeing trips included visiting Arlington National Cemetery and the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

He saw the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery.

"It was a great honor to visit Arlington National Cemetery," Lucier said. "It was an uplifting experience. "The holocaust museum was powerful and very sad. You realize how important it is to remember what happened and how important it is to tell the future generations about it."

Democratic National Committee Chairman and former Vermont Governor Howard Dean addressed the NCAI General Assembly about the importance of Native participation in the electoral process and organizing the Native vote on and off reservations.

Representatives of Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton and Senator Barack Obama also spoke to those in attendance at the winter session.

NCAI leaders came to a consensus on the organization's 2008 political platform, and then dispersed to present it to individual lawmakers. Lucier and Biro accompanied Chingwa to Michigan Congressman Bart Stupak's office where they saw Stupak briefly. "It's surprising how easy the

process is," Lucier said of approaching lawmakers.

The LTBB contingent also attended a reception at the Smithsonian Institute's National Museum of the American Indian featuring Native cuisine from different parts of the country. Biro, the daughter of James Biro and Valerie (Laughlin) Biro, is the NCAI Youth Commission Alternate Representative, and Cynthia Biro helped lead the NCAI Youth Commission's breakout sessions at the Executive Council Winter Session. Because of her age, Cynthia Biro will shortly step aside to allow other LTBB Youth to assume leadership roles within NCAI. If you are a LTBB Youth interested





There was a seven-month national online contest involving drum groups from the United States and Canada. It was modeled on "American Idol," and the contest was hosted online at <u>www.powwows.com</u>. The goal of the contest was to find the best unsigned drum group on the continent.


As the winner, Standing Horse will record a live CD produced by DrumHop Productions at the 2008

The changes made to the revenue sharing agreement were accomplished by amendments to each of the tribe's gaming compacts. Under the terms of the compacts, such amendments require approval of the governor, the tribe and the Secretary of the Interior. The governor and the tribes approved the compact amendments on February 27 with the Department of the Interior issuing a letter on March 10 permitting the amendments to take effect.

The gaming compacts also require both tribes to pay 2% of their net earnings to local units of government. These payments were not affected by the settlement.



May 2008 **Odawa Trails IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING IRS ECONOMIC STIMULUS PAYMENTS**

Starting in May, economic stimulus payments of up to \$600 for individuals or \$1,200 for married couples will be issued by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) based on 2007 tax returns. Parents also get \$300 for each eligible child.

To receive the payments this year, people must file a 2007 tax return. That's it. The IRS will determine eligibility, figure the amount and send the payment. This payment will be in addition to taxpayers' refunds.

But, the IRS needs your help. Many people are eligible for the payments, but may not know it.

Some people do not file a tax return because their income is too low or their benefits are non-taxable. Because they don't file a tax return, the IRS does not know their names or addresses.

People who do not normally file a tax return, but who have at least \$3,000 in qualified income may be eligible for a minimum payment of \$300 for individuals or \$600 for married couples.

The \$3,000 must come from specific sources. It must be earned from wages or self-employment. Or, it must be from certain benefits such as Social Security retirement, Railroad Retirement or Veterans Affairs payments to disabled veterans or veterans' survivors. It also can be from a combination of wages and these benefits.

There are some restrictions. People must have valid Social Security numbers for themselves and their children. Those who are claimed as a dependent on someone else's tax return or who are eligible to be claimed as a dependent on someone else's tax return do not qualify.

The IRS is working with the Social Security Administration and Department of Veterans Affairs to locate their beneficiaries who may be eligible. People who do not file a tax return because of low incomes are hard to locate. The IRS does not have their names or addresses.

Tribal governments can help by spreading the word about these payments, especially to those people who normally don't file a tax return.

The IRS also is encouraging churches, charities, non-profit and government organizations to help reach out to those who may be eligible for the payments.

People, who already file a tax return each year, need do nothing more than file their tax return. The IRS will do the rest. People who normally don't file a return can use Form 1040A with just a little information. There is no need to complete all the lines on the form. Details needed include:

• Name, address, social security number;

 Filing status, names and social security numbers of children;

•Workers with low incomes must complete Line 7;

• Recipients of certain benefits from Social Security retirement, Railroad Retirement and Veterans Affairs can report their total benefits on line 14a of Form 1040A;

•Write "Economic Stimulus Payment" at the top of the paper return

Filers with bank accounts should use direct deposit. It is the fastest way to receive stimulus payments. The IRS will begin sending taxpayers their payments in early May after the current tax season concludes. These payments will not be taxable nor will the payments affect any federal benefits people are receiving.

The IRS website, www.irs.gov, is the best source of information on economic stimulus payments.






