Successful Hunter Program

The LTBB Natural Resource Department will be running a successful hunter program for this year's deer hunting seasons. The department will be giving out successful hunter patches to any tribal member or other lawfully authorized hunter who brings is/her deer into the LTBB Natural Resource Department. The NRD staff will then collect biological information from the deer such as sex, weight and age. This information is vital to determining an overall picture of tribal member harvest and will be used to help determine population numbers of the Reservation as well as other deer trends.

Remember, in order to receive a one of a kind tribal patch, you will need to bring your lawfully harvested deer into the LTBB Natural Resource Department.

TB Testing:

The LTBB NRD is again collecting white-tailed deer heads for the Tribal 2005 hunting sea-

sons. Tribal Hunters can voluntarily submit their deer heads to the LTBB NRD Department at the NRD office located at the LTBB Governmental Complex. The heads should be dropped off at the office in a drop-box located in back of the LTBB NRD. Heads can be dropped off at any time.

There will be information sheets inside the box. Fill out the information sheet, attach to the head according to the instructions and then place the head with the flyer into the drop-box. The collected white-tailed deer heads will be turned in to the Rose Lake Wildlife Research Lab in Lansing, Michigan. The results will be mailed to the Tribal Hunter as soon as possible in 2006.

Any tribal member that submits a head for testing will also receive a successful hunter patch for participating in the program.

Our language is what identifies us as a united group of Odawa, it defines our history and who we are as a people today. It provides a sense of belonging and self-esteem and needs to be revisalized for our young people and the next seven generations. We have a special relationship with the United States federal government because of our status as a sovereign nation. Our own language is a key factor in what defines us as an Odawa nation. When guage is a key factor in what defines us as an Odawa nation. When we hear our stories in the language, when we hear those old songs sung in the language, when we hear an elder offer a prayer in our language, when we strive to learn our language - It is like coming home, we are comforted and our spirits awakened.



The Green Menace and LTBB

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB aka The Green Menace), Agrilus planipennis (family Buprestidae), is an exotic foreign pest indigenous to Asia and is known to occur in parts of China, Korea, Japan, Mongolia, the Russian Far East, and Taiwan. Here are some important facts to know about the EAB:

- EAB generally has a one year life cycle, but may require two years in colder regions.
- The adult EAB emerges from ash trees in May and June, leaving D-shaped exit holes in the bark.

- From mid-May to mid-August adults feed on ash tree leaves, mate, and lay eggs (individually) in the bark crevices. The female can lay 60-90 eggs during her lifetime; adults live about 3-4 weeks.
- Eggs hatch 7-10 days after being laid and the larvae tunnel into the bark from May to August.
 - Larvae begin feeding and tunneling in the cambium (the layer of living material just under the bark that transports food and water throughout the tree) creating S-shaped galleries from August to October. The larvae overwinter under the bark and begin pupating in early April.

EAB kills ash trees by feeding and tunneling in the cambium. Extensive feeding in the cambium disrupts the flow of food and water which eventually girdles and kills the tree.

Important Facts About Ash Trees:

Black and green ash trees primarily found within wetland habitats, while white ash is characteristically found in upland hardwoods. Within LTBB's reservation, there are approximately 32,552 acres or 51 square miles of wetlands not including Garden or High Island.



Historically, ash trees, specifically

Black Ash Fraxinus Nigra, are viewed as a culturally significant plant for LTBB Tribal Citizens. The inner wood of black ash is used for basket making, while the leaves, wood and bark of green and white ash has been used for tools, tonics and teas.

Due to the feeding habits of the EAB, it is a significant threat to the ash tree fraxinus spp. resource within the State of Michigan, as well as the entire North American continent. Preliminary findings by the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service's 'National Urban Forests' stated, "the estimated potential national impact of A. planipennis is a loss of between 0.5% - 2% of total leaf area and a value loss of between \$20-60 billion." In Southeast Michigan, damage to ash trees as a result of EAB infestation over the past five years is estimated at \$11.6 million. Not reflected in this figure are social and aesthetic impacts resulting from the removal of infected ash trees in urban and rural neighborhoods leaving entire subdivisions with no trees at all.

EAB was first identified in Southeast Michigan in July 2002, although it is thought to have been introduced into Michigan as early as five years prior to this date. The EAB was identified as the causative agent in the ash tree mortality and decline in the Detroit metropolitan area. Before the end of that month, the Michigan Department of Agriculture issued a quarantine of six southeastern counties (Macomb, Oakland, Livingston, Washtenaw, Wayne and Monroe) to prevent and control the spread of EAB. Under the quarantine ash trees, branches, logs, and firewood could not be moved from the effected counties. The State of Michigan added seven more counties in August 2003 to their Emerald Ash Borer quarantine (Genesee, Ingham, Jackson, Lapeer, Lenawee, Shiawassee, and St. Clair). Then in July 2004, portions of another seven counties were added (Berrien, Branch, Calhoun, Eaton, Kent, Roscommon, and Saginaw). This quarantine zone was designed to prevent the artificial spread of this pest thorough human means while eradication plans were being formulated and executed. However, EAB has since surfaced in many other parts of Michigan's Lower Peninsula resulting in quarantine zones throughout the state. EAB has also effected Ohio, Indiana, and parts of Ontario, Canada thus far.

In March 2005 a workgroup composed of staff from the Environmental Services Department, Natural Resources Department, Archives and Records Department, the Tribal Administrator, and the GIS Department was started to address the imposing threat of the EAB and the fate of all ash tree species within our reservation boundaries and the surrounding areas. From this first meeting a draft Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan was developed to address EAB and its potential impacts to cultural, environmental, and economic resources within LTBB's reservation lands and surrounding areas of interest. The Emerald Ash Borer Management Plan provides a means for Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians (LTBB) to protect our ash from this green menace known as the EAB. Included within this plan are the following components: history of EAB in Michigan, identification of LTBB EAB Quarantine Zones (see map below), education and public outreach, monitoring, management strategies and decision matrix, legislation and policy, and communication and partnerships. The LTBB EAB Workgroup will continue to meet regularly to finalize the management plan and implement its strategies.

Education is a number one priority for the EAB Workgroup. The EAB Education Plan has one main goal; educating Tribal Citizens and the general public about the EAB through the Odawa Trails Newsletter, public forums, Annual Community Meeting, Prevention and Identification workshops, and youth programs. A binder of information and other educational EAB materials is available in the Environmental Services Department located at 7500 Odawa Circle Harbor Springs, MI 49740.

The EAB workgroup is hoping to present the EAB Management Plan to Tribal Council at the end of October 2005.

GIS Department Relocation

The GIS Department office is scheduled to relocate at the end of October, 2005 to the second floor of 1345 N US 31 (The 'White House'). This move will provide the GIS Department with the additional space necessary to continue and expand those services GIS provides to LTBB departments and Tribal Citizens. The LTBB GIS Department has organized a 1 day collaborative meeting for all Michigan Tribes, which is intended to bring our GIS professionals together in order to promote the use and optimization of GIS throughout Tribal


operations. Additionally, this meeting will provide an opportunity to hear from each Tribe and hopefully collaborate on many common issues that Michigan Tribes are facing. A representative from the BIA (Bureau of Indian Affairs) GDSC (Geographic Data Service Center) along with the BIA's Regional GIS Coordinator will be speaking on available GIS services and training opportunities available to Michigan Tribal operations, and to answer additional questions related to GIS and its applications. I am personally very excited about this meeting, and hope that other Tribal professionals will feel the same.

LTBB GIS Departmental Outreach

The GIS Department has presented at several venues throughout summer and fall, most recently at the request of the NSGIC Conference (National States Geographic Information Council) held this year in Rochester, New York. AJ Matthews, LTBB Air Quality Specialist/GIS Technician's presentation centered on collaboration between Tribal and Non-Tribal governmental entities, highlighting the 2004 Aerial Orthoimagery Project between the LTBB GIS Department, Charlevoix County GIS and Emmet County GIS as a successful case study. LTBB GIS is the first Tribe to do a presentation at this national conference.

LTBB GIS also presented at the 7th Annual NTCEM (National Tribal Conference on Environmental Management) held at Grand Traverse Resort and Spa. AJ Matthews spoke on the implementation of GIS for Tribal Environmental and Natural Resource programs, centering on its role as a vital tool for the conservation, management and analysis of Tribal environmental resources, while my presentation centered on the drafting of data sharing agreements between Tribes and other governmental entities. Both of these conferences are great opportunities to make additional Tribal contacts within the GIS community, as well as the professional community as a

Thoughts on the new Constitution and Announcement of Pending Appointments

The new constitution is now in effect and we have been working diligently to identify all the new systems we need to get in place. The Tribal Council and the Tribal Chairman's budgets have been separated. The Tribal Administrator will be moving upstairs in the north wing of the Administration Building and the Tribal Council Offices will be in the suite formerly occupied by the Administrator. We expect to have the offices all moved and ready for work by the end of October or soon-

One of the most important actions that must be done now is the nomination of candidates for the appointed positions under the new constitution: the members of the Judiciary and the Prosecutor. We also have some open positions on Boards and Commissions. I will be calling prospective candidates that I have identified and feel would be good to be considered. Other people have called me with suggestions. It is the duty of the Tribal Chairman to develop a way to sort through the potential candidates and to finally decide upon individuals to nominate for these positions.

Once the Chairman has sent

nominations to the Tribal Council, then it is up to the Council to decide how to proceed with either appointing a nominee or rejecting them and asking for a new nominee. The separation of powers sometimes is cumbersome and time consuming but ultimately it protects the interests of the tribal citizens.

On the 10th of September, the day before the newly elected officials were sworn in under the new constitution, all the officials attended a work session with two consultants who specialize in helping tribal governments work through the issues of separation of powers. It was very helpful for me and the Vice Chair to have this training session. The Council members as well have said that they benefited from the lively discussions that we had that day.

Where will we be in 10 years? In 100 years? We don't know for sure. However, we have been carefully working to build a solid legal foundation of statutes and resolutions, of policies and procedures, of a more open government for all our members to participate in as they wish, while at the same time honoring our ancestors by singing the traditional songs and composing new ones, by helping all those who work to keep our culture alive for the coming generations.

If you don't sign up at the deadline for application there is an ongoing 1% penalty for every month you don't sign up. It is a type of insurance that costs you \$35.00 a month designed to offset prescription costs. You may feel that you don't need the "insurance" at this time because your prescriptions are not expensive, but if you have a medical issue at a later date and you are given

new prescriptions that are expensive and decide to sign up for Medicare Part D at that time you will be penalized for every month after the application deadline that you did not sign

You can get more information through your local senior center or your state agency on aging in your area. It is important that each individual take a look at the program and determine what direction they might



Just a reminder from the Substance Abuse Department about our community

We have begun to ask several adult community members to fill out the survey. We are still going to have surveys completed by the membership from Elders, Young Adults, Parents, singles, Grandparents, etc. This survey will help us design a prevention program that will best fit our community. And remember each person that completes a survey will receive a T-shirt. An early Miigwetch to all those who fill out a survey!

All of the staff at the Substance Abuse Department hopes everyone is enjoying the beautiful fall weather. This is a great season to take a walk in the woods and enjoy the beauty of the changing seasons as mother earth prepares to rest. We thought it would be a good time to give out some dangers information on the Methamphetamine labs. The extremely toxic "left over" chemicals from making this drug are often dumped in remote areas like the woods. You may find these dump sites while out on a walk or possibly on a road side. The chemicals may be in boxes or bottles. Some of the chemicals you may find are drain cleaners, Freon, acetone, gas line antifreeze, sulfuric acid, camp stove fuel, and ammonia. That's just to name a few. These are all chemicals that go into making the drug "methamphetamine." You may also notice a very strong toxic smell, it is possible that there is very little smell if the chemicals are in containers like pop bottles or glass and other containers. Do not for any reason get near or touch any suspicious trash. Leave the area and report to the police where and what you have found. We do not want to "scare" people with this information however we live in an area that has many remote areas where it would be easy to dump chemicals with out being seen. For every pound of methamphetamine produced or attempted it leaves behind approximately six pounds of toxic waste. This toxic waste seeps into Mother Earth contaminating the water and the land all around the area. These dump sites need to be decontaminated by people trained to deal with toxic chemicals. Enjoy your walks in the woods, you most likely will not come upon anything unsafe but please be aware of all the things around you. Miigwetch.

News From Economic Development:

ATTENTION RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS:

At this time, the Economic Development Department would like to address some of the questions regarding the tax exemptions. The following is an exerpt from the Tax Agreement between the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the State of Michigan:

II. General Definitions

"Resident Tribal Member" means a Tribal Member whose principal place of residence is located within the Agreement

The following Townships and/or **portions** of the following Townships, which are located in Emmet and Charlevoix Counties, are included in the Tax Agreement Area: Bliss, Cross Village, Center, Readmond, Friendship, Pleasantview, West Traverse, Little Traverse, Bear Creek, Resort, Bay, Hayes, and Charlevoix.

Sales and Use Tax

2.Resident Tribal Member a. Tangible personal property, other than

use is exempt from both sales tax and use tax if the transaction takes place in the Tribal and Trust Lands and the property is used exclusively within the Tribal and Trust Lands. Purchases by a resident

- Tribal Member of tangible personal property for personal use are exempt from both the sales tax and use tax if the transaction takes place in the Agreement Area and the property is used exclusively within the Agreement Area. Resident Tribal
- Members are exempt from both the sales tax and use tax on the following items regardless of where purchased or used provided they are purchased for non-commercial, personal use and principally garaged, berthed, or stored

within the Agreement Area:

- i Passenger vehicles including automobiles, pickup trucks, recreational vehicles and motorcycles;
- ii. Recreational watercraft; iii.Snowmobiles; and iv.Off road vehicles.
- d. Resident Tribal Members are exempt from both the sales tax and the use tax on modular homes and mobile homes used as their principal residence.
- The exemptions in § III (A) (2) (c), § III (A) (2) (d), and § III (A) (3) (b) shall apply in full to purchases by a Resident Tribal Member even if the items are jointly titled in the name of the Resident Tribal Member and his or her spouse.
- 3.Affixation to Real Estate a. Materials that are purchased, used or

ance of a contract entered into by the Resident Tribal Member, Tribe, or Tribal Entity for construction, renovation or improvement of real property owned by the Tribe or federal government in trust for the Tribe are exempt from both sales tax and use tax if the real property is located within the Tribal and Trust Land and there is no contrac tual entitlement for a non-Resident Tribal Member or non-Tribal Entity to remove the improvement.

- b. Materials that are purchased, used or acquired in the performance of a contract for construction, renovation or improvement to the principal residence of a Resident Tribal Member are exempt from both the sales tax and the use tax.
- 7. Sale of Electricity, Natural or Artificial Gas, Home Heating Fuels, and Telecommunications and Internet Services

Sales of electricity, natural gas or artificial gas home heating fuels and all transmission and distribution charges are exempt from both the sales tax and use tax if the if the product is delivered to..... or (iii) a Resident Tribal Member's principal resi dence located within the Agreement Area.

In addition, telephone (intrastate and interstate), telegraph leased wire, internet, cable, and other similar communications rendered to and paid for by the Tribe, a Tribal Entity, or Resident Tribal Member are exempt from both the sales tax and the use tax if the service is rendered to.... or (iii) a Resident Tribal Member's principal residence located within the Agreement Area.

PLEASE NOTE: This means that if the utilities are in a family member's name that is a non-Tribal Member, they need to be switched into the Tribal Member's name in order to be eligible for the exemption.

The utility providers that have been contacted thus far are:

> Waste Management, Alanson South, Alanson North, Top Rank Disposal, Emmet County Recycling & Waste Disposal Services, Consumers Energy (Boyne City and Cheboygan), Great Lakes Energy, Michigan Consolidated Gas, Petoskey Propane, Amerigas, Derrer Oil & Propane, Holtons LP Gas, Cities of Petoskey-Harbor Springs-Charlevoix Dept. of Public Works, Charter Communications, Cellular One of Petoskey, SBC Ameritech, AT&T, MCI, DTE, Direct TV, Dish Network and Lodgenet.

RTM status is established on the 1st day of the proceeding month from which the **Tribal Member has notified** the Enrollment Department of their new address. This is done by filling out a Change of Address form. Newly **enrolled Tribal Members** residing within the Tax Agreement area will be automatically added.

RTM lists are sent once per month to the State of Michigan. Utility providers are up-dated once per quarter by the State. Therefore, exemption from State taxes on utility bills may not be seen until the following quarter.

Newly enrolled Tribal Members and Tribal Members who has recently moved into the Tax Agreement Area are urged to contact Economic Development to fill out a utility provider sur-
