

## LTBB COLLABORATES WITH SEAPORTS GREAT LAKES IN CONSTRUCTION OF MACKINAW BOAT

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and Seaports Great Lakes are currently working together to construct a 30-foot Mackinaw Boat in front of the LTBBowned Bell's Fishery in Mackinaw City, MI.



It will be the first full-size Mackinaw boat to be built in the Straits for nearly 100 years, using only hand tools and indigenous wood such as Tamarack, Northern White

Cedar, Black Locust and Spruce.

Bob Schafer of Seaports Great Lakes, LTBB Youth and Mackinaw City fifth-graders from Charlene Darrow's class raised the frames of the ship on September 20, 2010. The project, called the Mackinaw Challenge, is expected to be completed by May 2011, and Schafer envisions it as a "northern Michigan community project."


Once completed, it will take passengers on 1-1/2 to 2-hour cruises in the Straits of Mackinaw

"It's been a real dream come true," Schafer said. "It's been my passion to work with youth and to create a cultural and historic maritime experience that can be enjoyed by enthusiasts of all ages. We hope to have as many people participating in 'the Making of a Mackinaw' as possible, young and old.

'The primary focus for this project is hands on interpretation of Great Lakes Maritime history."

To that end, he will be coordinating with area schools to give students "hands on history lessons," encouraging teachers, youth directors and anyone working with at-risk youth to contact him to schedule a time to visit the shipyard and

encouraging tribal and non-tribal community members to participate as members and as volunteers. People are encouraged to sign up as members and find out how they can



receive a complimentary sailing cruise on the boat next summer. Anyone wishing to donate old traditional woodworking hand tools is encouraged to contact him as well. He can be contacted at mackinawchallenge@hotmail.com.

The common origin of all Mackinaw boats was the Native American canoe. However, the canoe design was not stable with a mast and sail. The addition of a retractable centerboard made it possible to raise a small mast and sail over a canoe-shaped hull. This breakthrough "Mackinaw Boat" continued on page 18.


## Weaving Loom on Loan to North Central Michigan College for WOCTEP Textiles Certificate Program

Native artist Anthony Miron of Petoskey, MI, paid a visit to the LTBB Education Department and the Elders Luncheon in early September 2010 to begin wood-burning a design into a weaving loom.

The loom was purchased with grant funds for WOCTEP's Art-Textiles Certificate of Development pro-



gram, which was created in partnership with North Central Michigan College (NCMC), and provides students the opportunity to learn about textile production in a hands-on environment. Course topics include surface and fabric design, dye techniques and introductory and advanced weaving.

Miron's intricately detailed artwork included a feather on one side of the loom, and the LTBB drum emblem and feather on the other side. He also burned a woodland floral motif that wrapped around the top of the wood frame. When asked if he would be interested in taking on this project, Miron replied he was happy to do anything which would benefit LTBB because the tribe meant so much to him and his mom. In lieu of an honorarium,

On September 15, 2010, the loom was transported from the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI, to the NCMC main campus in Petoskey where it was set up in the Administration Building. Miron worked to finish his wood-burned design on the loom as NCMC students, instructors and staff wandered by or stopped to chat. The loom will be on loan to NCMC for the 2010-2011 school year and beyond if enrollment in the program remains strong. The idea for wood-burning a design into the loom came about as a way to make the loom a unique work of art and to promote interest in the Textile and other certificate programs offered through WOCTEP.


#### Being Odawa is all about Freedom



She is "very happy to be working here."


#### **Barry Bott**

## LITTLE TRAVERSE BAY BANDS OF ODAWA INDIANS WETLANDS PROGRAM UPDATE

This year has been busy for the Wetlands Program!


Here is an update on some of the big things which have occurred so far this year.

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative

Great news!!!! LTBB was awarded a \$196,148, three-year Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) grant - the LTBB Bear River Habitat and Restoration Project. The LTBB Wetland Specialist will be the Project Coordinator and will oversee erosion control projects, greenbelt (vegetated buffers along shorelines) improvement projects and invasive species removal and replacement with native species in the Bear River Watershed, which includes Walloon Lake. The agement plan. This project will improve the physical, chemical and biological health of the Bear River Watershed and waters flowing directly into Little Traverse Bay. Work began on this grant on October 1, 2010.

Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) Update

LTBB is continuing to monitor the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) problem in Michigan. The Wetland Specialist attended a training session this summer at the USDA APHIS lab in Brighton, MI. The lab rears parasitoid wasps currently being studied for controlling EAB. A couple of these species of wasps have been released at test sites downstate and are showing some positive results, however, there is still no method currently known to be effective at controlling EAB. Currently, the best method for preventing the spread of EAB is to "not move



Here is a list of reasons why you should not transport firewood:

Beech bark disease (caused from introduction of a fungus from small insects called beech scales), Eastern tent caterpillars (esp. on cherries) and forest tent caterpillars (esp. on aspen), Asian longhorn beetles (esp. in maple, aspen, willow and birch), white pine blister rust (a fungus), bronze birch borer, oak wilt, chestnut blight, gypsy moths, Jack pine budworm, black knot disease (a fungus on cherries) and Dutch elms disease (fungus). Transportation of firewood is the most common way for these harmful pests and diseases to spread.

Wetland Protection Program – LTBB field sites

The Wetland Specialist has been monitoring wetlands on LTBB properties throughout the field season. Monitoring includes field-truthing and correcting wetland maps, collecting vegetation data – especially concerning threatened and endangered species, invasive species and culturally significant plant species.

Wetland Permits


The Wetland Specialist is con-



tinuing to provide comments to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Environment (DNRE, formerly the MDEQ) reOther Hot Topics Phragmites! Invasive *Phragmites australis*, otherwise known as Com-

mon reed, have been gaining lots of at-

garding wetland and other waterbodyrelated permit applications as they come up. The Wetland Specialist has reviewed at least 12 permits this year and has provided comments regarding the downtown Petoskey Bear River Improvement Project as well as worked with staff from the Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan to provide comments regarding air permits for proposed coal-fired power plants around the state and a proposed cellulosic ethanol bio-refinery in the Upper Peninsula that could adversely affect Michigan's wetland resources.

The Wetland Specialist also commented on and opposed a permit requested by a private developer, who requested a permit to fill approximately four acres of high quality coastal wetlands at Duncan Bay on Lake Huron, just outside of Cheboygan, MI, for the purposes of building an RV park. These coastal wetlands support a federally-threatened coastal plant called Dwarf lake iris as well as provide important coastal habitat for other species including eagles, turtles, frogs other coastally-dependant and species. That permit was denied by the MDEQ in May 2010 though the applicant is appealing the decision.

Training

In June 2010, the Wetland Specialist attended the LTBB Aquatic Plants Identification Training hosted by LTBB Environmental Services with other Environmental Services Department (ESD) Water Programs staff. The training was very informative and will help ESD staff in surveying for native and invasive aquatic plant species.

couple of years. While native Phragmites have co-existed here for thousands of years in high quality wetland habitats, a new invasive strain from Eurasia has been making its way across North America for the last hundred years and is now becoming a real problem in some places. Last year, the Lake Michigan coast from Grand Traverse Bay up to Charlevoix, MI, including Lake Charlevoix and the Beaver Island archipelago, was surveyed for invasive stands. This year, the rest of the Lake Michigan coast from Charlevoix up to the Mackinac Bridge was surveyed by Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council where more than 300 stands of invasive Phragmites were found! The good thing is many stands are still in the early stages and hopefully, will be successfully controlled. The reality is these stands will have to be re-surveyed and re-treated year after year until they have been completely eliminated. #### Native Plants Initiative

## How to Become a Resident Tribal Member (RTM)

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is officially changing your address with the Enrollment Department. All RTMs are verified through Enrollment. Enrollment in turn sends the Departof Commerce (DOC) ment notification of your status. Please note on your Address Verification Form (AVF) the township you reside in. This alerts the Enrollment Department for RTM status. When you change your address with the Michigan Secretary of State's office, you will be asked if you would like to register to vote; by doing so, it will note the township you reside in. Otherwise, ask one of the Enrollment Department staff when filling out your AVF.

Your RTM status does not become effective until the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Example: I changed my address with the Enrollment Department on May 3. My RTM status did not go into effect until June 1.

It is VERY important you notify Enrollment immediately when you move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA).

It is your responsibility to notify Enrollment of any changes in address or name; the DOC cannot backtrack or backdate documents in order to qualify for RTM status.

Being an RTM exempts you from paying state sales tax on large tangible items such as vehicles, boats, snowmobiles and off the road vehicles. It also applies to affixation to your primary place of residence. There is a form that needs to be filled out to request a Tribal Certificate of Exemption (TCE). The <u>request</u> for this form (Request for TCE) can be

Tax Agreement Reminder When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center Harbor in Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

bodawa-nsn.gov or by calling the DOC at 231-242-1584. Tribal Form 3998, which is the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption, may only be issued by the DOC with certain authorized signers. The signing order is as follows: DOC Assistant Theresa Keshick, Tribal Administrator Albert Colby, Jr., Vice Chairman Dexter Mc-Namara and Chairman Ken Harrington (in the absence of DOC).

Please note: All RTM updates are sent to the State of Michigan on a monthly basis as close to the end of the month as possible. If you plan to

purchase a vehicle or do any remodeling to your residence, please wait until after your RTM status is effective (after the first day of the following month in which you moved); otherwise, the State of Michigan will deny your claim for a refund.

Being an RTM also exempts you from sales/use tax on utilities such as phone, Internet, satellite, gas, electric, propane and cellular service. Please fill out the Residency Form for Tax Agreement and return it to the address noted on the bottom of the form.

\* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.

- The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.
- \*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!



## Do you need help with Healthcare? Contract Health Service may be able to Help you!

I.H.S. - CHS coverage is not automatic. You must be registered with CHS. Should you have an emergency situation requiring you to obtain care at a non- I.H.S. facility such as urgent care or the emergency room, you must notify the CHS office at 231-242-1600 within 72 hours of that visit. If you fail to do so, you will be held responsible for the bill.

**Eligibility Criteria:** 

- You must reside in the Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA).
- Be an enrolled member or descendent of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians or be able to prove social or economic ties to the community.
- A Native American claiming eligibility for CHS has the responsibility to furnish the tribal program with documentation to substantiate the claim.
- You must have an active and complete file with Contract Health before a reference number can be given.

#### Remember!!!!

Indian Health Service Contract Health is not an entitlement program - not everyone is eligible. Know your status before obtaining services.

#### **Referrals:**

Physicians write referrals when patients need medical care that is not available in the Tribal Clinic.

A referral is not an implication the care will be paid by CHS. A patient must meet eligibility criteria, medical priorities and use all alternate resources available.

If a referral is denied for CHS payment, the patient may elect to obtain medical services at his or her own expense. In most cases, an approved referral is limited to one medical appointment. Please call Contract Health Services at 231-242-1600 prior to any follow-up appointments for approval to make sure your coverage is still in effect.

Alternate Resources:

Contract Health Service is the payer of last resort. When a patient has Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans Assistance, Workman's compensation, private insurance or any other coverage, it is considered the primary carrier.

Priority system:

Medical referrals are approved for payment by a priority system.

The system has highest priority to approve conditions related to life saving or potential death threatening situations, then we approve by severity of condition.

The amount of funding we receive for CHS services is limited. When we run out of money toward the end of the year, then we have to be very strict on referral approvals and may only have the funds to pay for emergency conditions.

## HELP US HELP YOU: IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES

Did you know one emergency room visit can produce multiple bills?

For example, I went to the emergency room for a sprained ankle. From that one ER visit, there could be a laboratory bill, a x-ray bill, an emergency room doctor's bill and the hospital bill just to name a few.

Not all bills are handled at the originating facility, so we need your help to ensure all your bills are paid in a timely manner. All tribal citizens should be aware of the procedure you must follow for Contract Health Services once payment has been approved by the Manage Care team.

It is important to note if we do not get the bill and the billing code, we cannot pay the bill.

#### Procedure

1. Call the number on any statement you receive in the mail and inform the provider to bill the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians. LTBB is the payer of last resort, so please verify any private insurance you may have and have the provider bill them first.

2. Bring any statement in to Contract Health Services.

**3**. Physically watch the Contract Health Services worker call the number on the statement.

4. Verify the name of the person the Contract Health worker spoke with and make sure it is written on your statement.

**5**. Request a copy of statement with date stamp and initials of person who assisted you.

This may seem redundant, but if we work together, the process will run smoothly.

When utilizing the ER, notice must be received within 72 hours of the visit. LTBB Elders have 30 days to notify Contract Health Services.

## LTBB Awarded IHS Healthy Heart Grant

#### Mina Ode (Healthy Heart)

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Indian Health Service (IHS) recently awarded the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians a two-year Healthy Heart grant.

The primary goal of the project is to reduce the risks of cardiovascular disease for LTBB community members with diabetes. Another goal is to contribute to the knowledge base of effective diabetes programs for Indians.

"Diabetes is an invisible enemy you learn to live with," Community Health Director Michele Keshick said. "It can wreck havoc on your life if you don't keep it under control. The key things we will be focusing on in this project are smoking cessation, weight loss, physical activity and making healthy food choices. Getting your blood sugar down is not enough. We need to get regular physical activity and make healthy food choices."


There will be a Diabetes Day 2010 held on November 23, 2010 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the LTBB

Health Park in Petoskey, MI, which will introduce the Mina Ode project and recruit participants for the project. Participants will be tracked for one year, and there will be incentives for those who choose to participate. The project will utilize several of the Health Department's staff as well as Traditional Healer Jake Pine and Dietician Betty Noland.

"It goes hand in hand with the diabetes program we already have in place," Keshick said. "It will specifically target the cardiovascular risks associated with diabetes. As with any project we do, there will be a cultural aspect to it. It's important we know who we are and where we came from to learn where we are going. We are spiritual people with a very strong connection to all of creation. Honoring this truth will take us a long way on our journey to wellness. Our ancestors kept our culture alive. We have the teachings, ceremonies and the mskiki we need to heal as individuals and as a community."

Through the grant, the Health Department will be able to hire a parttime transporter and a part-time Healthy Heart Assistant/Data Entry.

Prior to accepting her current position, she worked as the Title VII Indian Education Tutor for the Boyne City Public Schools.



## Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Certificate Redemption Update

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.

2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.

3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture,

and the second piece needs at least your signature.

4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address



## FALL IS A GOOD TIME TO TEST YOUR GARDEN SOIL By Larry Dyer, MSU Extension Tribal Extension

By this time in the season, most of us are finishing up our gardening activities. We may have a few things in cold frames, and we may still have some root crops to dig, but mostly, we're putting our gardens to bed for the winter. Another good thing to do in the fall is collect samples for soil tests. Why do soil tests in the fall? One good reason is to have the information available to prepare your garden for next year. Another reason is if your soil tests show a need for lime, you can apply the lime in the fall. Lime can take six to 12 months to have the desired effects, so applying now will benefit next year's garden more than applying in the spring.

There are a few steps to follow to do soil tests. The first is to decide where you want to sample. Collect separate samples from areas that will be managed differently such as vegetable gardens, perennial beds, fruit orchards or lawns. If areas have different soil types, those should be sampled separately as well. For each sample, combine 15 to 20 subsamples. An ideal tool for sampling is a soil probe, but you can use a shovel or a garden trowel. With a trowel, begin by lightly scraping the loose leaf litter from the soil surface. Then, dig out a scoop six to eight inches deep for garden soil (three inches for lawns, eight inches for trees and shrubs) and set it aside. Now, from the side of your hole, take a slice <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-inch thick and six to eight inches deep. Mix this slice with other subsamples in a clean pail - soap residue will throw off your soil test results. For the same reason, don't mix with your hands - use your trowel or a clean stick. Scoop out two cups of soil, free of sticks, stones and root clumps, and put it in a zip-lock bag. If the soil is wet or if it will be a while before you send in your sample, let it air dry in a paper bag. There are a number of laboratories where you can send your soil for testing. The Emmet County MSU Extension office will send your samples to the Michigan State University Soil and Plant Nutrient Lab for a cost of \$14. The results should be back in approximately two weeks.

If the results show you need lime, fall is a good time to spread it. Liming will regulate the soil pH, and optimal pH (6.0 to 7.0) is very important for the availability of soil nutrients. One good liming material is wood ash. But, if you have a wood stove and ash is abundantly available, it is very easy to apply too much ash to your garden. Be sure to apply at rates recommended by your soil test and only about once every three years. If your soil test calls for one ton per acre of lime, you can apply up to two tons of ash per acre. That works out to approximately nine pounds of ash per 100 square feet.

With information from your soil test in hand, you can look back at your notes from this year's garden, and it may help you interpret your successes and disappointments. It also gives you time to plan what soil amendments you will add either this fall or next spring (if you apply wood ash, remember that it can have 5-7% potassium and 25 % calcium). You only need to sample the same fields about once every three years. If you save your soil test and watch how they change over time, what you learn about your soil and your gardening practices will help you be a successful gardener.

probably took place sometime in the late 17th century or early 18th century at the Straits of Mackinac, hence the name. Mackinaw boat They were widely used in commercial fishing. A completed Mackinaw Boat can be viewed at Darrow's Restaurant in Mackinaw City. "Though seem-

ingly small, roughly 30 feet long, they were some of the safest, most seaworthy and reliable sailing ships to ply these notorious waters," Schafer said. "Developed by the Indians with the aid of the French, the Mackinaw boat gave

Mackinaw boat gave the tribes a much more seaworthy craft to move about these waters in their nomadic lifestyle." With the help

of a sail and a favorable wind, a Mackinaw boat could cover an equivalent distance with much greater ease than by rowing with paddles. The Mackinaw boat quickly became a favorite on the up-

per Great Lakes. With the decline of the fur trade in the upper Great Lakes in the late 1830s, owners of Mackinaw boats used them for commercial fishing. A standard Mackinaw boat used in fishing was Odawa Trails

18-24 feet long. The Mackinaw boat hull's relative flexibility and efficient movement through the water became less important in the 20th century with the invention of the outboard

motor and other powerboat innovations. Few new Mackinaw boats were built after the 1910s although they are still made for historical re-enactment and skills preservation.

The Mackinaw Challenge is a division of Seaports Great Lakes, a nonprofit organization whose mission is to

develop programs which provide training in the skills of seamanship and boat building, to celebrate the maritime heritage of our northern Michigan community, to foster cultural tourism and to nurture individual growth.

Michigan Governor Signs Tribal Language and Culture Bill into Law

On September 29, 2010 at the State Capital in Lansing, MI, Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm signed SB 1014, introduced by Senate Democratic Leader Mike Prusi, into law. It allows students to get credit for Native American tribal language and culture classes taught by tribal elders rather than traditional certified educators

"The Native American community was here in Michigan long before it was settled by European immigrants," Prusi said in a press release. "It is important that we help preserve and pass along their culture and language to the next generation. This legislation will allow Native American and non-Native American students alike to better understand tribal heritage and get credit for this class as taught by the tribal members who have the most knowledge on the subject."



The new law will permit the Michigan Department of Education to work with a federallyrecognized Native American tribe to allow a tribe, school district or public school academy to use teachers who did not possess a valid Michigan teaching certificate to teach a Native American tribal language and culture class. The teacher would need to demonstrate a mastery of the tribal language, and the plan would include requirements for renewal or continuing approval of the teacher. The law will enable students to receive credit for a Native American tribal language class and apply it toward their foreign language requirements.

Possible Infection Exposure to Native Patients

On October 4, 2010, the Yuma Sun reported lack of adequate sterilization of equipment may have exposed Quechan tribal members to deadly infections while receiving open wound care from Indian Health Services. Up to 111 tribal members may have been exposed two years ago to HIV, hepatitis B and C and other infections at the Fort Yuma Service Unit in Yuma, AZ. Staff at the facility were manually cleaning equipment used to clean wounds, but did not sterilize them. All the patients were contacted and asked to be tested.


