FINAL TRIBAL COUNCIL SEAT DETERMINED BY COURT-ORDERED MANUAL RECOUNT, JOHN KESHICK III TO JOIN NEWLY SWORN IN COUNCIL MEMBERS



Eight candidates vied for the four open Tribal Council seats in the June 27, 2011 General Election.

The top three finishers were as follows: Bill A. Denemy with 381 votes, Winnay Wemigwase with 359 votes and Regina Gasco-Bentley with 336 votes, so there was no question those three can-

didates won three of the four open Council seats.

However, the unofficial General Election results showed John Keshick III as the fourth finisher with 328 votes and Kevin Gasco as the fifth finisher with 327 votes.

According to the Tribal Elections and Election Board statute passed in 2010, any contest that ends with a margin of less than one percent shall be subject to an automatic recount, which the Election Board performed. The Election Board then performed a hand count because the automatic recount resulted in a tie with the hand count showing Keshick III with 328 votes and Gasco

According to both the LTBB Constitution and the Tribal Elections and Election Board statute, any registered voter may contest the results of an election by filing a written protest with the Tribal Court within 10 calendar days after the preliminary results are posted. Gasco did so, and eventually, the Appellate Court issued a September 12, 2011 order in the matter of Kevin A. Gasco v. Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Election Board, Case No. A-017-0711, stating the Election Board would conduct a new manual recount of the ballots casted at the June 27, 2011 General Election only regarding the fourth Tribal Council seat involving John Keshick III and Kevin A. Gasco.

The manual recount took place on September 26, 2011 with Keshick III winning the fourth Council seat by two votes (330-328). According to the LTBB Constitution, the Tribal Court shall administer the oath of office at the next regularly scheduled Tribal Council meeting at least 30 days following the certification

The Election Board certified the manual recount on September 26, 2011, and Keshick III is scheduled to take the oath of office at the November 6, 2011 Tribal Council Meeting.

After Keshick III is sworn in, Council will hold an officers

election for Legislative Leader, Treasurer and Secretary and select Councilors to serve on the various Council committees for the next two years until the next Council election in 2013.

Associate Judge Jenny Lee Kronk administered the oath of office to Denemy, Wemigwase and Gasco-Bentley on September 25, 2011. Leonard "Joe" Mitchell performed a pipe ceremony after the swearing in process, and the Spirit Lake drum (John Naganashe, Jim Naganashe, Patrick J. Naganashe, Barry Bott Mike Naganashe and Aaron Wayne Otto) played an honor song for the newly sworn-in Councilors. The Robert Wemigwase, Sr. Melissa Laughlin and John Bott, Sr. families hosted a lunch af terwards. Alicia Bott made the sheet cake with the medicine wheel and bear paws, Donna Budnick brought pies and bread, and Sarah VanDeCar made chocolate Texas sheet cake.

The oath of office for the all newly elected Tribal Councilors had previously been scheduled for the August 21, 2011 Tribal Council meeting, but was postponed until the Tribal Court made a ruling in Gasco's case and then the Appellate Court.

All of the newly elected Tribal Councilors are serving fouryear terms until 2015 with Gerald Chingwa remaining on Council in the interim until Keshick III is sworn in.

Gasco also took the oath of office on September 25, 2011 along with Denemy, Wemigwase and Gasco-Bentley after Council appointed him at the September 25, 2011 Council Meeting to fill the vacancy of former Legislative Leader Julie Shananaques who resigned from Council to become the Vice Chairman. Gasco is serving the remainder of Shananaquet's four-year term which

Denemy, Gasco, Wemigwase and Keshick III are all new to Council, but Gasco-Bentley had served on Council for eight years prior to being re-elected in 2011.

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

Tax Agreement Information

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider

Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one to you.

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.

*The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.

*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Charlevoix County Sheriff's Office, in City Hall in Boyne City, MI, Harbor Springs Police Department, in the front lobby of City of Petoskey Police Department and at the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians tribal police department located at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Residents can drop off unused or unwanted medications at any time throughout the year. All medications are handled according to the law enforcement agency's evi-

dence protocols until they are taken for final destruction in accordance with state and federal laws.

"The Watershed Council would like to thank each of the participating law enforcement agencies," said McKay. "Without their participation and agreement to take on the role of managing POD boxes in the future, would

not have been able to make this program a success."

"While the annual events offer a good option for residents and an opportunity for the community to be educated on the problems associated with improper disposal of unwanted medications, the POD drop-off boxes at the law enforcement offices offers a year-round, more convenient and safe method for citizens to dispose of unwanted medicines," said Petoskey Department of Public Safety Director John Calabrese. "This is a great way to help keep dangerous drugs off the streets and out of the hands of people who should not have them."

"Public safety and the environment are important for our community, and this program helps Charlevoix County make progress on both," said East Jordan Police Chief Dale Boehm. "We are glad to be part of a program offering a safe and viable disposal option to reduce the risk of prescription drug overdose and abuse."

Additional POD collection boxes will be installed at other locations throughout Tip of the Mitt Watershed Council's four-county service area of Antrim, Charlevoix, Emmet and Cheboygan counties as we receive additional funding to expand the program.





CREPE PAPER FLOWER CROWNS

Submitted by the **Cultural Team**, Gijigowi Bipskaabiimi Department

Crowns made of crepe paper flowers are attached to red willow rounds to form a wreath. The wreaths are blessed with smudging and a prayer and then, are placed on the graves of our ancestors the last few days of October before "All Saints Day" on November 1. This custom honors our ancestors who have passed on. It is believed our ancestors who do not have a crown are sad and walk in disappointment that they are forgotten. Those spirits who receive one may wear them to Ghost Suppers with pride.

Families that carry on this tradition through the years have their own special way of selecting colors, shapes and sizes of flowers to look like mums. Usually, all veterans' crowns have red, white and blue flowers, and babies have pink or blue flowers.

The flowers are secured with wire wrapped around the willow, and then, crowns are finished off with stripes of white material to tie them on crosses. As the weather washes the color from the flowers to the earth, the spirits are happy. Some families remove the crowns when the color has all faded out, then ceremonially burned. The ones done in mass or in our present community are usually removed when new ones are placed.

HOMEWORK HELP TIP SHEET

"Schools should teach kids how to learn, and parents should teach them how to work by establishing work rules and work ethic at home." – Dr. Mel Levine, Co-Founder and Co-Chair, All Kinds of Minds

Homework provides an opportunity for parents to reinforce and build upon what a child learns at school. Follow these tips to help your child achieve success during homework time:

- Set a consistent time each day for doing homework. During this time, distractions should be limited (e.g., television should be off; other family members should be doing quiet work, too).
- Encourage your child to make a homework checklist. The checklist should include estimating how long each assignment will take, setting priorities, collecting materials for the first task, setting a timer, completing the task, collecting materials for the next task, resetting

the timer and placing the completed assignments in his backpack.

• As needed, provide assistance to help your child get

- started on a task. Support might include providing the first sentence of a paragraph or clarifying directions.
 - Help your child make a list of all the materials he

needs to gather before starting his homework.

- Provide materials only as they are needed. For instance, instead of distributing an entire package of pencils, give your child two pencils at a time.
- Break large tasks into smaller, shorter or simpler "mini-tasks." Allow your child to take a brief break after completing each mini-task.
- Before beginning homework, encourage your child to decide which assignments can be done without assistance and which require the help of an adult. The simpler

assignments should be completed before the more complex tasks.

- Ask, "Why do we need to learn this?" and answer it seriously. Connect the concept with "real life" to establish relevancy and interest. If you need help making the connection, ask your child's teacher.
- Check work in progress. If an assignment given on Monday is due on Friday, ask your child to show you what she has finished each day or to show you a

plan of what will be done each day between Monday and Friday.

• Encourage your child to follow a writing process. For instance, use the C.O.P.S. proofreading strategy (capitalization, organization, punctuation and spelling) to create a checklist.

HELP YOUR KIDS REACH THEIR POTENTIAL

No one likes a pushy parent. On the other hand, no one has more genuine interest in your child's success than you do. How can you help your kids reach their full potential? Here are some tips on nurturing your child's strength and building their skills from Annmarie Edwards, author of the new book, "50 Ways to Maximize Your Potential."

• Set goals: Ask your kids about their dreams, whether they are short-term or long-term. Then, help them figure out some steps they can take to get there. Before someone can be an Olympic breaststroker, they need to learn how to swim.

• Help them learn to manage their time: Show older kids how to make daily and weekly checklists of tasks they

need to accomplish and to check them off as they complete them.

- Teach persistence: Slow and steady wins the race. Help your children stay focused on their goals, no matter the obstacles. Encourage them not to give up. Persistence pays off, but kids need to believe in themselves to stay the course.
- Foster creativity: Engage your children in creative activities or help them look at things in new ways.

• Get outside: Breathe fresh air. Take a stroll and enjoy nature. This can offer time for reflection and inspiration.

From the Desk of the Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara

Aanii everyone.

There are a couple of items to cover here first in regards to casinos. First, rumors have persisted the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians has worked with Lansing Mayor Virg Bernero to announce plans of opening a Lansing, MI, casino. Apparently, this would be done using the same method the Bay Mills Indian Community (BMIC) used in Vanderbilt, MI, with the Michigan Indian Lands Claim Settlement Act (MILCSA).

On October 3, 2011, I attended a public presentation to the Flint Township Board of Trustees from the Bay Mills Indian Community about a similar casino effort/opening. BMIC Chairman Jeff Parker and BMIC tribal attorneys made an oral presentation to the Flint Township Board of Trustees. The meeting was packed with what appeared to be mostly interested residents. I would guess there were approximately 70 to 75 people there. The Executive will follow this closely as two Flint TV stations covered the

On September 30, 2011, LTBB hosted the U.S. Attorney's visit in Tribal Court. The annual Federal Law Enforcement Partners meeting included the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), the United States Secret Service (USSS) and the Assistant United States Attorney (AUSA). Discussions with federal enforcement on the reservation were held.

The first issue was the new law concerning

the Medical Marijuana and Possession of Firearms Prohibition. At this point, the U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Michigan Don Davis was not aware but enlightened by the agent from the ATF on enforcement in Indian country as we are the only tribe in Michigan



with a statute which acknowledges the state law.

Secondly, Don Davis acknowledged LTBB as one of only two tribes in Michigan which is substantially compliant at this time for the Adam Welsh Act. Training was discussed at length for Sex Offender Registry and Violation investigation. The Law and Order Act along with discussion on incarceration costs was briefly touched upon as we need to have a long-term plan for housing inmates for more than a year.

Finally, Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Michigan Jeff Davis acknowledged LTBB for its long-standing deputization in Charlevoix and Emmet counties in Michigan. Jeff Davis went on to state LTBB deputization is used throughout Michigan as a model for the other tribes as well as throughout Indian country in the United States. At this point, acknowledgement went to LTBB Executive General Counsel Jim Bransky and Jeff Davis for their help creating the deputization and the work Tribal Council did on the creation of a resolution to enact deputization.

After the meeting, it was felt our federal law enforcement partners and the U.S. Attorney for the Western District of Michigan were pleasantly surprised at LTBB's proactive and current approach to all the evolution and change of federal law over the last year.

On September 22, 2011, I attended a special meeting at the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians casino's Three Fires Conference Center in Manistee, MI, for Strategic Review and Assessment Report from Public Sector Consultants with Organizational Assessment of the Chippewa Ottawa Resource Authority (CORA). This was based on obligations under the current charter of the 2000 and 2007 Inland Consent Decree: Whether it is operating in a financially sound manner, whether it should maintain the Inter-Tribal Fisheries Assessment Program contracts and whether CORA's responsibilities can be more effectively performed in other areas on behalf of member tribes through staffing of biological and enforcement agencies

and promulgation of harvesting regulations

binding on tribal members engaged in off-reservation treaty harvesting activities.

CORA provides biological and administrative services which ensure proper regulation of tribal fisheries and cooperative management with federal and state agencies. The five CORA tribes, the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians, are successors in interest to tribes and bands of Indians which signed the Treaty of Washington on March 28, 1836.

Our tribe continues to express a strong interest in the Asian Carp issue. Our lobbyist, Lydia Hofer, from Washington D.C. last week discussed the topic with the Capitol Hill staffer (one of U.S. Senator Carl Levin's staff) she thinks is one of the most knowledgeable on the issue. Generally, the effort to keep the carp from moving from the carp-invested Illinois River into Lake Michigan is going well. The electric barriers have been strengthened further. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is about to increase the voltage on one of them to further discourage the carp from moving north, but the evidence shows no fish of any kind are swimming upstream through the barriers.

perfund division for a meeting to discuss the Bay Harbor CKD release site. The Executive and the Natural Resource staff requested clarification on the status of the agreement between CMS Land (a group which signed the agreement with the EPA) and the Michigan Department of Envi-

ronmental Quality (MDEQ). LTBB also wanted to express its concerns for the transition of the site from EPA to MDEQ authority.

The Bay Harbor CKD release site is located along Little Traverse Bay and within the historical reservation boundary. LTBB has been involved with the site since 2004 when high pH leachate was discovered directly entering the bay. The tribe was included in the Ad-

ministrative Order of Consent (AOC) between CMS Land and EPA in 2005. All emergency response activities outlined in the AOC are complete, and the site is now transitioning from EPA oversight to the MDEQ.

LTBB has significant concerns about the long-term, final remedies which will be put in place to prevent further degradation of the bay from the cement kiln dust leachate. LTBB is particularly concerned about the point source discharge of treated leachate which contains heavy metals and mercury. Additionally, LTBB has made several attempts to keep the same level of participation with MDEQ and CMS as the project transitions, including submitting a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to MDEQ to no avail.

LTBB has treaty rights to and a vested interest in the protection and preservation of Little Traverse Bay for the next seven generations. LTBB respectfully requested the EPA not concur on the agreement between CMS Land and MDEQ unless LTBB's involvement in the site is clearly outlined and addressed.

On September 25, 2011, Derek Bailey, a citizen of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, met with Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara, Vice Chairman Julie Shananaquet and Tribal Council to share his intent to run for U.S. Congress for District 1, serving all of Northern Michigan.

His words are to represent our true interest and to get results. He believes through more collaboration across boundaries and party lines, we can restore our country's financial health by reducing our enormous debt, and we all have an obligation to preserve our precious Great Lakes

> for generations to come. He is running to truly represent all of us in word and in deed to make sure our voices are heard.

> Citizen Derek Bailey humbly asks for our help, support and votes at this critical time. The primary election will be August 7, 2012, and the General Election day is November 6, 2012. Citizen Bailey said when he is elected, please know you will have a voice in Washington, D.C. who answers your calls with, "Aanii, Aniish naa?" For Citizen Bailey and for all of us in Indian country,

this is definitely an uplifting thought.

On October 24 and 25, 2011, the Chairman and Vice Chairman were scheduled to attend training and the United Tribes Meeting in Manistee, MI.

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. 



Lawrence "Larry" Crossett, 85 Long-time Newberry, MI, resident, Lawrence "Larry" Crossett, 85, died early Saturday morning, September 24, 2011, at his residence. Born May 1, 1926, in Moran, MI, the son of the late Harley and Ida (Kiogima) Crossett, Larry resided in Petoskey, MI, prior to moving to Hulbert, MI, where he attended elementary school. Later in life, Lawrence graduated from Newberry High School. Lawrence volunteered for military service at the age of 17, entering the Navy during World War II. He joined the Naval Service on January 12, 1944 and served until August 2, 1946. He was assigned to several training stations and served his primary military station at Hilo, HI, assigned to Naval Air Station Hilo being attached to AVR C-948. During his time in Hawaii, he was primarily assigned to a Naval Air Sea Rescue Boat. Lawrence was honorably discharged as Coxswain Petty Officer, receiving the Pacific Area Ribbon and the World War II Victory Ribbon. Traveling was always an enjoyment to Lawrence, and he visited all 50 states and the countries of Finland and Mexico. Later in life,

Lawrence had been a caregiver to his mother, Ida, followed by being a caregiver to his wife, Orba. In addition to his parents, Lawrence was preceded in death by his loving wife, Orba, on December 27, 2003; siblings, Marion Gray, Hazel Poling, Leonard, Francis, Irvin and infant sibling, Levi; halfsister, Hazel Craycraft. Survivors include his children, Lawrence J. 






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
