LTBB TRIBAL CITIZEN DIANNA KAY WORKING FOR THE MICROSOFT WINDOWS PHONE TEAM

Only two months after graduating from college, Dianna Kay found herself working for the world's largest software company, Microsoft.

Kay, a LTBB Tribal Citizen, works as a tester on the Microsoft Windows Phone Team after she graduated from Michigan State University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Computer Science from the College of Engineering. She previously worked as a Display Ad Delivery SDET Intern for Microsoft - AdCenter from May 2011 to August 2011, working on Microsoft sites and Bing, Microsoft's web search engine.

"My recruiter suggested I try Windows Phone," said Kay, 23, who lives in Seattle, WA. "I honestly didn't think I would get the job. You have to prove your coding and problem solving skills in the interview to some of the smartest people in the computer industry, which can be intimidating. Fortunately, I passed and got the job. My mom (Stella Kay, a LTBB Tribal Citizen who works as the Senior Financial Analyst in the Treasury Department) thinks you sink or swim. She thinks you should jump off the deep end, and you swim your way out. You can't die from trying. My mom is very fond of saying if it is not working out, it's not because we can't do it. We just haven't done it yet. Try again. My mom wanted us to try something before we decide we can't do it. She is a very supportive person."

Kay's team works on the phone calls for the Windows phones. Microsoft will unveil its new Windows Phone 8X and 8S, both HTC phones, with the new Windows Phone 8 operating system later this month. The Nokia phones are called the Lumia 820 and Lumia 920.

"I work on the phone portion of the phone," Kay said. "We make sure the audio quality is good, calling voicemail and dialing. Things most people take for granted. It's amazing what happens to a phone before you get it."

At Microsoft, you are either a developer, tester or project manager. Kay said it was difficult when she first started working there because she was working with a developer who has worked at Microsoft for 23 years.

"He is a nice guy, but he intimidates a lot of my co-workers, too," Kay said. "He's been working here for as long as I've been alive, and I was testing what he did. But, I've gained confidence in the time I've been working

LTBB Studying New Casino Project in Mackinaw City, MI

Editor's note: The following is a LTBB press release dated September 24, 2012. LTBB was scheduled to give a presentation about the proposed casino to the Mackinaw City Village Council on October 18, 2012.

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians is currently in the process of assessing the potential development of a casino in Mackinaw City, Michigan. The Tribal Council and Tribal Chairperson have been aggressively seeking new ways to generate revenue and expand the local economy.

Feasibility studies have shown a satellite casino with 550 slot machines and a small food and beverage outlet to serve patrons will generate revenues, be appropriately sized for the community, and will create more than 100 construction jobs and approximately 80 full-time casi-

The tribe currently has an appropriate and attractive site, which includes land in trust as required for a tribal casino.

"We are looking forward to a cooperative, mutually beneficial, and lasting relationship with the Village of Mackinaw City," Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara said. "This project would be good for both the Tribe and Mackinaw City. Northern Michigan needs more year-round businesses that create jobs with benefits, and this project will help fill that need."

The tribe's amended compact with the State of Michigan allows for a second site in Emmet County, MI. However, according to the compact, "[t] he location of the Second Site is contingent on the approval of the affected local unit of State



LTBB Natural Resource Department Staff and Natural Resource Commissioners DISCUSS ASIAN CARP WITH THE U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS IN CHICAGO, IL

On September 25, 2012, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Natural Resource Department staff and Natural Resource Commissioners met with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Chicago, IL, to discuss the status of the invasive Asian Carp and to tour the electric

"Overall, I think the trip was very informative," LTBB Natural Resource Commissioner Billy McNamara said. "I went there with the belief that the Corps of Engineers had any bit of control on the situation. With the attendance of this meeting and LTBB being a stakeholder in the Great Lakes, I did see that it is evident we were taken seriously and given the information that we had requested, and that the Corps of Engineers are taking serious steps in keeping the Asian Carp out of our waters. It was nice to see the Tribe has its concern and was not only welcomed, but informed on this environmental situa-

Asian carp have become a major concern for many Great Lakes Natural Resource Professionals and Citizens. After experiencing the dramatic impact of other invasive species such as the sea lamprey and zebra mussel on the Great Lakes ecosystem, many hope Asian carp introduction can be

In the 1980s, aqua culture farmers along the Mississippi River had



unwanted algae growing in their ponds. The solution to this problem was to stock the ponds with several fish species of Asian carp which feed on algae. However, flooding in the early 1990s, allowed the non-native species to escape into the Mississippi River system. Slowly, Asian carp spread through the Mississippi River and its tributaries, including the Illinois River, which is hydrologically connected to Lake Michigan through the Chicago Area Waterway System (CAWS). The CAWS is a man-made waterway for sanitary and shipping purposes connecting the two basins, which would not occur naturally.

To address the threat of aquatic invasive species, in 2007, the U.S. Congress authorized the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (or Corps) to aquatic pathways between the Great Lakes and Mississippi River basins. This study includes the CAWS and several other locations where invasive species transfer is possible between the two basins. The Great Lakes and Mississippi River Interbasin Study (GLMRIS) has identified 39 species with a high risk of transferring from one basin to the other through the CAWS; three species are currently being removed from the list because they are already found in both basins. Including Asian carp, 10 invasive species have been identified as potential invaders to the Great Lakes, and 29 invasive species could potentially invade the Mississippi River basin from the Great Lakes.





Tax Agreement Information

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example be-

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable,

gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

sole consumption ONLY! IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Tax Agreement Reminder







REPATRIATION, ARCHIVES AND RECORDS DEPARTMENT HOSTS MEETING WITH THE National Park Service and Tribes Regarding the War of 1812

The Repatriation, Archives and Records Department recently hosted a unique meeting at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

On September 6, 2012, three staff from the National Park Service and six tribal representatives met to discuss projects the National Park Service is initiating in regards to the War of 1812. 2012 marks the bi-centennial anniversary for this historic event, which had deep and long-lasting repercussions for the Odawa of Little Traverse.

Charles Smyth, Ethnography Program Manager, Northeast Region National Park Service, Christine Arato, National Coordinator, War of 1812 Bicentennial National Park Service, Northeast Regional Office, and Dan Downing, Education Director for the River Raisin National Battlefield, represented the National Park Service.

Tribal representation included the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community,

the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe, the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians.

It was an encouraging turnout for an introductory meeting between the tribes and the National Park Service.

The major project the National Park Service is engaging in is the development of a website designated to the War of 1812. The National Park Service is seeking input from various tribal nations who had participated in the war. Each tribe's experience and history is different relating to the War of 1812.



In an effort to make sure the most comprehensive story is told, tribes are being asked to contribute to the development of the website. Photos, stories, people, villages and the repercussions of the war are some of the major themes brought up by the tribes in the meeting. The tribes expressed a great interest in the ability to tell their perspective of what happened.

The development of a website was not the only project discussed. Various banners which will be displayed at various national parks was brought up. These banners will highlight certain people and battles of the war. The tribes wanted to make sure the warriors who fought for their respective tribal nations would receive proper accolades as well as the communities they represented.

In summary, the meeting was productive. It was encouraging to see the National Park Service take a proactive role in gathering historical and cultural information from the tribes themselves. It was also encouraging to see the tribal participation as

From the Desk of the Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara



THE CENTER OF ATTEN-TION: MACKINAW CITY----A CASINO

I am going to shed some light on the project which could take place. Even though a lot of tribal citizens from this area are aware of the ongoing news that our tribe wants to put a casino in Mackinaw City, MI, I am providing a little information, hopefully, to you out there who don't have access to a computer and even if you do, the computer is time-consuming and sometimes, get a little bored of sitting and reading line for line. There are mixed concerns out there as to approve or not approve whether you are tribal or non-tribal.

On September 29, 2012, there was a closed session only to tribal citizens to voice their opinions. Some tribal citizens want to pay off the amount still owed on our Odawa Casino in Petoskey, MI, while other tribal citizens support the project in Mackinaw City which will create more jobs.

The local newspaper here, the Petoskey News-Review printed in its headlines on September 25, 2012 the tribe plans a \$26 million casino in Mackinaw City. It reported Tribal Council had agreed to shift \$970,000 to its capital project fund for pre-construction fees and consulting for a new satellite casino in Mackinaw City. Under our compact with the State of Michigan, we, as a tribe, are allowed to build two casinos in Emmet County, MI. At one time, Mackinaw City was originally considered before we settled on the location in Petoskey. The new casino will include 550 slot machines and a small deli. The projected annual revenue is approximately \$5 mil-

I can appreciate opinions of mixed concerns, whether it is orally or submitted in a local newspaper. I tend to disagree with some, especially when someone says Mackinaw City is not drawing tourists like it used to. I lived in Mackinaw City until I graduated from high school, and I can remember on the late afternoon on Labor Day, you could shoot a cannon down Main Street and not hit anyone because there was no one left in town after the bridge walk. That is not true today. Stores have been upgraded, roads redone, sidewalks improved, ferries running a later schedule and a theater is in town. You can't compare a tourist town to an auto industry.

Tribal Council said it has done due diligence. There are no warranties in life and not in businesses. Council has looked at all aspects of this project from advisors, when it comes to either projected revenues, competition from other casinos across the bridge and competition of our

own in Petoskey, operation cost, the airport in Pellston, MI, or the car counts going back and forth across the Mackinaw Bridge. In 2010 and 2011, according to statistics, there was an average of four million vehicles going over the Mackinaw Bridge each year. There are 4,534 eligible tribal citizens which count on the leadership of this tribe. A casino generates quicker revenue than any other business, and this is prime location.

Our proposed \$26 million casino project was slated for the Mackinaw City Village Council agenda for 7 p.m. on October 18, 2012. We will be presenting our plan to the Mackinaw City Village Council for the first time

Normally, all meetings are held in the Village Chambers, however, with the anticipation of a larger crowd, the meeting has been changed to the Mackinaw City High School.

GROUNDBREAKING FOR NEW BOAT WASH STA-**TION**

In the report above in regards to the casino, it now appears we are getting closer and closer to making great neighbors not only with a casino, but now, with a boat wash station in Paradise Lake in Emmet County, MI, which is muddled with Eurasian milfoil. This plant was introduced from Eurasia in the 1940s, crowds out native species and could just crowd out boats.

With the efforts of an improvement board and Carp Lake, MI, residents, the milfoil has been beaten pretty badly. With an interested board and a lake with a problem, our very own Kira Davis, Water Quality Specialist for the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the tribe's Natural Resource Department, were part of a wash station which looks like car washers where boaters can rinse their trailers and boats before entering a lake, and after leaving a lake, with the hopes of preventing the spread of aquatic invasive species such as milfoil out of or into Paradise

So, in 2009, the tribe's Natural Resource Department hosted a boat wash symposium and discovered there was a definite interest. After a failed proposal, Davis and her colleagues won a grant from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative. The object of the grant? Well, Paradise Lake of course.

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the Paradise Lake Improvement Board celebrated the boat wash station with groundbreaking ceremony on October 5, 2012 at the Paradise Lake trail public access and launch followed with a reception at the Carp Lake Township Hall.

She works in the Environmental Services Program suite, which is located at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI, and at the NRD Building in Harbor Springs, MI, and coordinates recycling and composting.

"This position involves an interest I've been pursing at home," Vicki said. "We've (she and her husband, Scott) been exploring options to be more energy efficient at home in terms of utilizing solar, geothermal and wind energy."

Prior to accepting her current position, Vicki worked as a LTBB temporary worker for six months, working the majority of that time in the Health Department. "I remember staying w Grandma on Second Street, the 'Old Guard,' Aunt Hattie, Aunt Rose, Uncle Sam, Great Uncle Mike and Aunt Amelia, big cookouts at Dorothy's and Aunt Hattie's house, the beach in Harbor, poison ivy, the sand dune

behind Grandma's house, the rhubarb patch, the sugar bowl, Michigan Rummy, Cribbage, Euchre, walking the Mackinac Bridge, spending time with my cousins, with Smitty and Salty and with Lila Gibson, and 'Elvis passing," Vicki said. "Everyone remembers where they were when Elvis passed. I remember coming into my Aunt Hattie's house and watching the news report on TV."

She moved to Washington in 1988 where she was married and raised three children, Adam Olson, 27, Eli Olson, 22, and Izzy Olson, 17. She moved back to Michigan in 2004 after the end of her marriage and the loss of her job. Izzy is a senior at Petoskey High School in Petoskey, MI, and is a jingle dress dancer. In addition to Adam Olson, Eli Olson and Izzy Olson, their daughters are April Kelley, Jennifer Flynn and Christina McClees, and their grandchildren are Kelley, 3, Logan, 2-1/2, and Colin, nine months.

Vicki is a volunteer for the LTBB Hawks basketball program, the Odawa Homecoming Pow Wow, the Traditional Pow Wow, other tribal community events, the LTBB Youth Council and the Waganakising Eshkiniigijik UNITY Council.

"I'm glad to be back because it feels like home," Vicki said. "I am learning the 'old ways,' and helping out where I can. Protecting Nibilsh

Are you aware or have you ever wondered who and how your favorite swimming hole, fishing spot or boating lake is protected? We all know the importance of Nibiish to our culture, traditions and to life sustainment. But, how is water quality assessed and who does it?

Surface water is protected primarily through the implementation of the Clean Water Act (CWA). The CWA was passed in 1972 in response to the state of the United States (U.S.) waters during the 1960-70s industrial boom. At that time, industry was flourish-

ing, and the discharging of toxic and harmful pollutants into waterways was of common practice. The most famous example of the state of U.S. waters and the need for water quality protection was the Cuyahoga River, seeming to be on fire due to the ignition of oil and sludge which sat atop the river's surface. This fueled the need for increased water quality protection. The CWA is a federal law which aims to make all waters of the U.S. "fishable and swimmable." This goal is to be achieved by creating and enforcing water quality standards and uses as well as regulating discharges of pollutants into U.S waters. The responsibility for implementing the CWA resides with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA).

The CWA allows the EPA to distribute funds to states and tribes that develop work plans and apply for funds through the CWA to develop their own Surface Water Quality Programs. Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) has been delegated authority by the EPA as the enforcement agency of the CWA in Michigan and has EPA approved Water Quality uses and standards. A federally reaffirmed or recognized tribe only has enforcement authority on its reservation if it has



a fishery use. There is cold water, cool water and warm water fishery use applied to all water bodies monitored by the Surface Water Quality Protection Program (SWQPP). These use classifications are based on whether the fish inhabiting and being caught in a water body need cold water, cool water or warm water conditions to thrive. Another example of a tribal use is primary contact use. The definition for this use is any activities normally involving direct contact with water to the point of complete submergence, particularly immersion of the head with considerable risk of ingesting water. Therefore, this would be a tribal use designated at water bodies known for swimming and recreation.

The SWQPP has drafted tribal uses and designated water bodies monitored by the SWQPP with these draft tribal uses. Water bodies monitored are assessed by utilizing standards for the parameters measured. Standards are either thresholds or criteria which determine whether or not a water body is supporting or not supporting the draft tribal uses designated to a particular water body. Currently, LTBB uses a host of standards to determine water quality. For example, LTBB uses the MDEQ Dissolved Oxygen standards when as-

sessing whether or not waters are supporting a fishery use. For instance, the lower stretch of the Bear River is considered to have a LTBB draft tribal use as a cold water fishery and needs to meet a minimum concentration of seven milligrams per liter of dissolved oxygen to support cold water fish. It is important to note dissolved oxygen is not the only LTBB measured parameter to determine support of a cold water fishery, but is just an example of how data is used to assess water quality conditions based on tribal uses and standards. Other parameters which are measured to determine whether or not a water body is supporting cold water fish spawning and survival include, but are not limited to temperature, substrate conditions, flow and pH. Data is also analyzed by tracking the long-

term trends of each parameter. LTBB will develop its own tribal standards after tribal uses have been finalized. Although LTBB does not have jurisdiction of these waters at this time, LTBB can establish tribal uses and standards so that if/when our boundaries are recognized and/or a water quality issue arises, we have a better capability to present our concerns based on our advancement, understanding and assessment of our water resources and uses. When our boundaries have been recognized, we will be prepared to submit our tribal uses and standards to EPA for approval.

As we move forward, we are seeking tribal input into these draft LTBB tribal uses, definitions and classifying water bodies with these tribal uses. Please feel free to read over these draft tribal uses and other documents on the website and provide feedback. Once we have reviewed any comments for discussion, we will begin the process of finalizing these uses and classifying water bodies. received EPA approval on Tribal Water Quality

uses and standards and its boundaries have been recognized by the Department of Interior.

LTBB has secured CWA funds since 1999 and has completed a baseline assessment of many waters within the 1855 reservation boundary and waters adjacent to the reservation. A baseline assessment is a study which measures certain parameters for a specific amount of time on a consistent basis. LTBB chose to complete a five-year study on specific water bodies with a monitoring design of collecting monthly data between the months of May to October. In 2009, winter sampling was added to the monitoring design.

The baseline assessment was completed and submitted to the EPA in June 2011. The assessment, supporting documents, and all water bodies monitored (not just water bodies which were analyzed in the baseline assessment) are available on the LTBB Environmental Services website. The baseline assessment has allowed LTBB to determine current water quality conditions. The next step is to protect and maintain water quality conditions by establishing tribal use designations for each water body based on how LTBB and its tribal citizens use these water bodies. One example of a tribal use would be





LTBB Tribal Citizen Donna L. Budnick Overcomes Her Fear of Bears to Have a Successful Harvest



Sometime last year, Bill A. Denemy, a LTBB Tribal Citizen, asked me if I would like to go bear hunting. I hesitated, and told him, I would get back with him. What screamed in my head is, "I am scared of bears," "always respect a bear," "and never get between a mom and her cubs." These thoughts came from my childhood fears.

When I was growing up, we visit-

ed my grandpa in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. He had an "outhouse," so whenever we went outside to use the outhouse, we were warned to look out for the bears. I grew up respecting bears and knowing to stay out of their way. The idea of going out in the woods and actually looking for bears was very scary to me.

Over the last couple of months, un-

der the reassurance by Bill, my newly acquired "hunting guide," I decided to go bear hunting.

Opening day, I was sitting approximately nine feet up in the air in a treestand. Bill had been baiting an area approximately 30 feet off from Robinson Road near Pleasantville. It was approximately 7:40 p.m. when I spotted the bear. She came in with her nose up in the air. She knew I was there. She was approximately 250 pounds, and she whipped the cinder block off the bait pile with one hand. I waited a moment to size her up and watched slowly to take the perfect shot.

I don't actually remember the shot because I was still shaking. I watched her run into the woods; a few seconds later, it turned around and started running straight at me. I saw nothing but huge teeth and claws. I don't know if I screamed, but I do know that I raised my gun in case it was a second bear. All of a sudden, it dropped approximately 20 feet from where I was sitting.

I can't thank Bill enough for giving me this once in a lifetime chance to take a bear. Miigwetch Bill, I will always treasure the memory.

LTBB, MDNR and Paradise Lake Improvement Board Host Groundbreaking CEREMONY FOR PARADISE LAKE BOAT WASH STATION IN CARP LAKE, MI Roscommon County, MI, so the design of the Par-

The LTBB Natural Resource Department, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the Paradise Lake Improvement Board have joined forces to combat the spread of Eurasian milfoil, an invasive plant introduced from Eurasia in the 1940s, on Paradise Lake in Carp Lake, MI.

Funded by a Great Lakes Restoration Initiative grant awarded to LTBB specifically for Paradise Lake, a boat wash station will be constructed and located on Paradise Lake Trail public access and launch. A groundbreaking ceremony for the boat wash station was held there on October 5, 2012 followed by cake and refreshments at the Carp Lake Township Hall. A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the boat wash station is being planned for this spring.

"This project is unique and exciting for three reasons," Vice Chairman Julie Shananaquet said. "It is a simple technique to combat the spread of in-



vasive species, it has a critical educational and outreach component, and it was a collaborative effort. I thank all the partners involved who worked so diligently to make this happen.


"I hope people stand up and take notice of this project and follow our lead."

Water Quality Specialist, Kira Davis, was familiar with a boat wash station in Higgins Lake in adise Lake boat wash station was modeled after the Higgins Lake boat wash station. The design consists of a shed with a drive-through on each side with two booms hanging overhead with power washers that boaters can use to wash down their boats. This is a pilot project.

"We are conducting surveys targeting boat users and the riparian owners surrounding the lake to assess whether or not boat users will and would utilize boat wash stations if they were available for use," Davis said. "We will also monitor the use of this particular station next year when the boat wash



HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept, for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept, at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste, Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units

The Health Clinic now has seasonal influenza vaccines available. Please call 231-242-1700 to make an appointment to receive this very important vaccine. The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommend "all persons aged 6 months and older should be vaccinated annually."

While flu outbreaks can happen as early as October, most of the time, flu activity peaks in January or later, which makes now the time to receive your influenza vaccine.

The American Cancer Society's "Great American Smokeout" is on November 15, 2012.

Smokers are encouraged to use this date to make a plan to quit or to plan in advance and quite smoking that day. By doing so, smokers will be taking an important step towards a healthier life and also reducing their cancer risk.

When Michigan residents enroll with the Quit Line, they will receive a personal coach who will assist them in setting a quit date and making an individualized quit plan. 



John Kawegoma spoke regarding lack of communication with Tribal Citizens with regard to closed sessions, requested full disclosure and detailed Citizens' comments in the minutes. Debra Smithkey-Browne spoke in favor of the Mackinaw casino as long as we do not over build ourselves and watch spending. Debra also requested Tribal Council to stop buying property. John Gasco spoke in opposition to the Mackinaw casino and would like to see the Odawa Casino Resort become a resort with an attached hotel. John also asked for a referendum in order to build the Mackinaw casino. John additionally asked what the mentoring program is at the casino and human resource policies with regard to rehiring Tribal Citizens who go on medical leave and are let go in accordance with policy, not ability. Annette VanDeCar spoke regarding the late arrival of the letter, need for Tribal Citizen in-put, need to pay off current loan, current economic development need, low per cap, daycare and spending money in general. Annette also asked for assisted living, and other Tribal Citizen needs. Patty Dyer Deckrow spoke in opposition to a new casino and the need to build other economic development. Patty also spoke regarding training for higher paying jobs for Citizens and more services for the people. Arlene Naganashe spoke regarding the purpose of the meeting and if Tribal Council is just having this meeting to tell her what to do, or do they want her opinion? Julie Shananaquet read a letter from Mildred Shomin in opposition to a Mackinaw casino but in support of other health, education and welfare needs. Mildred also asked for professionals to be hired. Jerry also spoke in support of Tribal Council saving programs for Citizens to be able to enjoy and the need to make money to be able to spend money on what the people want. George Pamp spoke in support of the Tribal Council and the need for finances to come first, and the need for the Odawa water tower to say: CASINO. George said we need to go out there and say "let's make money". George additionally said we need to trust Tribal Council and we will make mistakes, but we need to do it together. Marty VanDeCar spoke in support of Tribal Council's due diligence and support of the Mackinaw casino if the numbers support it. Aaron Wemigwase asked the Treasury Director if he would stake his family's future on future casino debt. Fred Kiogima spoke in support of buying back the land but need to spend wisely. Fred also commented that if we have a casino we should not need commodities, the need for better casino mentoring of Tribal Citizens, and high turnover rate at the casino. John Kawegoma asked Tribal Council to bring back a second proposal with regard to use of existing equipment. Doug Emery spoke in support of a value system and helping people in need. Pat Naganashe spoke in support of a traveling casino on the lake using the docking facilities

Michigan's Federally Recognized Tribes Participate in Annual State-Tribal Summit with Governor Rick Snyder

Editor's note: The following is a State of Michigan press release dated August 23, 2012.

The state is committed to building its relationship with Michigan's federally recognized Indian tribes for years to come, Governor Rick Snyder said today (August 23, 2012) during the 2012 State-Tribal Summit.

Snyder also signed Executive Directive 2012-2 on state-tribal affairs, affirming his commitment to the Government-to-Government Accord between the State of Michigan and the federally recognized Indian tribes of Michigan executed in 2002, and now spanning three administrations. The annual meeting is held pursuant to the accord.

"By signing this executive directive, I am signaling my commitment to building a strong relationship between the tribes and the state, not only during my tenure as governor, but for many years in the future," Snyder said. "The state

including transportation, human services and economic development, and I look forward to improving this relationship as we move toward a brighter future for all of Michigan."

Under the directive, the governor will select an advisor on tribal-state affairs from a member of his legal division to monitor the state's adherence to the 2002 Accord. The advisor shall have regular communication with tribal leaders and department tribal liaisons and will also work closely with the directors and tribal liaisons from each executive branch department.

When formulating or implementing laws, rules or policies which have tribal implications, state executive branch departments, agencies and officials are directed to be cognizant of tribal sovereignty and the state's unique legal relationship with federally recognized tribes. Departments may estab-

lish guidelines for implementation and must consult with tribes and respond to legislative inquiries if requested.

The parties to the accord agreed to meet on at least an annual basis and consult on matters which significantly or uniquely affect the governmental interests of the other.

The event was opened with a traditional prayer offered by Cecil Pavlat, Sr., a member of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians, followed by an honor song performed by the Great Lakes Alliance Singers of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe. Attendees discussed issues of common concern, including human services, transportation and economic development.

Michigan's Indian tribes are the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, Match-E-Be-Nash-She-Wish Band of Pottawatomi (Gun Lake Tribe), the Hannahville Potawatomi Indian Community, Keweenaw Bay Indian Community, Lac Vieux Desert Band of Lake Superior Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, Nottawaseppi Huron Band of the Potawatomi, Pokagon Band of Potawatomi, the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians.


Meet LTBB Artist Kenny Dewey



Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but

had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates. The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public aw 105-143, are as follow

- 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.
- 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his
- or her certificates must have a notarized signature.

 3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least

The GLMRIS study releases interim reports, including a report identifying control methods to prevent invasive species transfer.

The meeting took place at the Corps' District Office in Chicago. Other federal agencies were also in attendance. The U.S. Geological Survey, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the White House's Council on Environmental Quality discussed their work and research to reduce the current and potential future impacts of the Asian carp. The meeting, which lasted almost three hours, covered a variety of topics, including an update on the Corps' Great Lakes and Mississippi River Study; biological research of the Asian carp; and methods of preventing the Asian carp from migrating towards the Great Lakes. LTBB staff was able to reiterate physical separation of the two basins is the tribe's preferred and best long-term solution to preventing the Asian carp and other invasive species from entering the Great Lakes. By putting a physical barrier in the CAWS, the aquatic pathway would be closed; this would address a critical access point for aquatic invasive species.

After the meeting, LTBB representatives toured the electric dispersal barriers located in the CAWS. The barriers are approximately 25 miles downriver from Lake Michigan and are designed to prevent the Asian carp from entering the Great Lakes. The three barriers span a 1,500 foot section of the CAWS and are operated by the Corps as part of the GLMRIS project. The tour included a walkthrough of all three barriers and discussion on the operation and effectiveness of the barriers.

There are now three electric barriers installed on the waterway with two operating at a given time, and the third as a backup. The barriers are specifically designed to prevent aquatic organisms from passing though the waterway. LTBB representatives were shown the design for a new electric barrier; construction is expected to begin by the end of 2012. Once the new barrier is operational, the oldest and smallest "demonstration barrier" will be decommissioned.

Environmental DNA (or eDNA) testing also occurs in the CAWS regularly as well as physical monitoring. In June 2011, seven positive eDNA samples were found beyond the electric barriers; bringing the total since 2009 to 85. However, after extensive netting and electrofishing, no Asian

carp were found. Researchers make it clear positive eDNA results do not necessarily mean a live Asian carp is present. A positive result only means Asian carp DNA is in the water, which could come from dead Asian carp tissues, Asian carp excrement or any other material which has come in contact with

Asian carp south of Chicago are within 40 miles of Lake Michigan, but are not spawning. There is verified spawning 150 miles south of Lake Michigan, which has occurred during the last three years. However, it does not appear the spawning population is moving towards Lake Michigan; research is ongoing to understand why Asian carp are not spawning closer to the electric barriers. Only one live Asian carp has been found above the electric barriers since monitoring began. A netting survey found this fish in Lake Calumet in 2010.

In order to best coordinate government activities such as eDNA sampling and netting surveys, an Asian Carp Regional Coordinating Committee was formed. Led by John Goss of the White House's Council on Environmental Quality, the committee has outlined its goals and actions in the 2012 Asian Carp Control Strategy Framework and the 2011 Monitoring and Rapid Response Plan. Goss gave an overview of the committee's work at the Chicago meeting. With more than 180 known invasive species established in the Great Lakes, the 2012 framework stresses past and future impacts, stating invasive species "can devastate Native communities as well as cause great economic damage to the Great Lakes commercial, sport and tribal fisheries." The framework continues, "[t]he potential invasion of Asian carp is one of the most serious invasive species threats facing the Great Lakes today."

The Corps have until January 2014 to complete the GLMRIS study and submit a final report to Congress. The final report will layout several options of dealing with aquatic invasive species transfer between the Great Lakes and Mississippi River basins. The Corps have committed to including an option to physically separate the basins in the CAWS. Once the report is submitted, it will be up to Congress to choose and fund any actions.

The Natural Resource Department and Natural Resource Commission will continue to be involved in the Asian carp issue and continue to call for physical separation of the two basins.

"We look forward to bringing jobs and increased economic activity to Mackinaw City and creating additional revenue for both the Tribe and the Village," Kiogima said. "This potential project will have an immediate and positive impact on all of us today."

The tribe will make its determination to proceed with the development in the coming months.

"Dianna Kay" continued from page 1. here. We have a motto at Microsoft: If you're here, you deserve to be here, and that is the attitude you need to have. I'm here, and I have a job to do. I was very appreciative because I just had my review where they get comments from your co-workers, and I received all positive feedback from the developers, which is hard to

Kay works in a male-dominated field. According to a Slate Magazine article titled, "How to Fix the Gender Gap in Technology," published June 7, 2012, it states women hold only 27% of all Computer Science jobs and account for only 20% of undergraduate Computer Science ma-

"My Women in Computing group at school (MSU Women in Computing) is very large, and the members are very supportive," Kay said. "The seniors help direct the freshmen. It helps talking to seniors because they've done what you're trying to do and can give you advice on what to expect and mistakes to avoid. The major problem with women in Computer Science is what is called imposter syndrome. It's been documented for several years. It's something the group is trying to avoid with seniors propping up freshmen."

Imposter syndrome was originally documented in psychological literature in 1978 and was first applied to highly accomplished women who nonetheless felt as though they had achieved their success through luck or fraud.

Kay has advice for college students looking to pursue a career in Computer Science.

"If you are planning on going into Computer Science, get a web programming job," Kay said. "It's something you can get real world experience on in computer science with only one or two classes under your belt."

Microsoft employees are from all over the world.

"I am very glad to be a Native American at Microsoft," Kay said. "I see all different kinds of ethnicities here, but not Native Americans. I test the phones in all different kinds of languages. I tested something in Hindi, and I didn't need to use a computer translator to figure out what the buttons said because someone on the floor spoke it, and I could just ask him. I tested something in Russian, and someone on the floor spoke that. It's very nice to be in such a diverse working environment. You learn a lot about different cultures."

Eventually, Kay would like to work for a small app or web programming company.

"Apps are the little programs

on your phone," Kay said. "Websites and apps are nice because they reach all people. They are open to the entire world, and that is cool. I enjoy helping people communicate."

For a long time, Kay thought she wanted to be a translator and work for the United Nations. Her Computer Science degree has a Minor in Linguistics. She became interested in web design and computer programming in high school.

"I took a web design class in 10th grade, and I enjoyed making websites," Kay said. "It's super easy to learn how to do it. I'd taken all of the web programming classes my high school offered, and there was a two-year computer programming class which taught some web programming. I took it, figuring I could deal with the computer programming part, but then, I decided I liked the computer programming more so than the web programming. I still make websites outside of work for friends, but it's not my primary focus."

Kay developed a computer application called Dumbledore: Language Tools for the Partially Fluent in June 2011.

"It's something that can help you if you don't want to learn the whole language," Kay said. "In applications such as Google Translate and Rosetta Stone, those tell you what you are going to learn or make it so you don't have to learn the language at all. In Dumbledore, you decide what words you want to learn. Dumbledore is more personalized."

Although she lives far away from where she grew up in Ohio and Michigan, Kay has settled into Seattle, WA.


"Seattle is a beautiful city; I tell people it's the best of both worlds," Kay said. "It's Petoskey and Detroit mixed in one, but cleaner. It's either urban or rural in Michigan. In Seattle, it's woodsy and urban with water. It's very green with mountains. I have a great job, and I live in a great city even though it's hard






