

U.S. Supreme Court to Hear VANDERBILT CASINO ARGUMENTS IN DECEMBER

Editor's note: The following article appeared in the Gaylord Herald-Times on September 6, 2013 and is reprinted here with permission.

VANDERBILT, MI — The U.S. Supreme Court will hear the case, Michigan v Bay Mills Indian Community, in December after nearly three years of legal maneuvering regarding the Vanderbilt casino.

Michigan Attorney General Bill Schuette filed his first legal brief with the high court August 30, 2013 in a case that could determine the fate of where Native American casinos can be located.

The document defends state sovereignty and challenges illegal expansion of off-reservation tribal gambling.

"If state sovereignty means anything, it must include the ability to stop illegal conduct on lands under state jurisdiction," the brief states.


"If Bay Mills is allowed to break the law by opening casinos outside Indian lands, tribes that follow the law will be unfairly disadvantaged by illegal, competing casinos, or even encouraged to engage in the same unlawful behavior."

A week after the 34-slot gaming facility opened in November 2010 in Vanderbilt, the State of Michigan

and the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians filed separate lawsuits against the Bay Mills Indian Community, challenging the operation of an illegal off-reservation casi-

In March 2011, U.S. District Court Judge Paul Maloney issued a preliminary injunction ordering the casino to close its doors while the matter worked its way through the legal system.

This one is like a Pontiac canoe; it's built to be bouncy in the water." AARON WAYNE OTTO FILLS FINAL TRIBAL COUNCIL SEAT, TRIBAL COUNCIL Holds Officer Elections and Appoints Committee Members

Chief Judge Allie Greenleaf Maldonado administered the oath of office to Aaron Wayne Otto on September 8, 2013 as Otto fills the fifth and final Tribal Council seat from the June 24, 2013 General Election.

Because a complaint was filed in LTBB Tribal Court over the fifth and final Tribal Council spot in the General Election, and it was not dismissed by LTBB Tribal Court until July 22, 2013, Otto took his oath of office as a Tribal Councilor on September 8, 2013.

The LTBB Constitution states, "The Tribal Court shall administer the oath for the offices of Chairperson, Vice Chairperson and Tribal

Council at the next regularly scheduled Tribal Council meeting at least thirty days following the certification of election results."

The LTBB Election Board certified the General Election with the exception of the fifth and final Tribal Council spot on July 9, 2013. The LTBB Election Board certified the fifth and final Tribal Council spot on July 22, 2013 after the LTBB Tribal Court dismissed the aforementioned

Otto is serving a four-year term until 2017 along with the top four finishers, Julie Shananaquet (471 votes, 13.21%), Marci Reyes (460 votes, 12.9%), Mike Naganashe (408 votes, 11.44%) and Beatrice A. Law (341 votes, 9.56%). Otto received 326 votes (9.14%) for fifth place.



The site connects commut-







U.S. LABOR DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES FINAL RULES TO IMPROVE EMPLOYMENT OF VETERANS, PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

Editor's note: The following is an U.S. Department of Labor news release dated August 27, 2013.



WASHINGTON, D.C. — The U.S. Department of Labor today (August 27, 2013) announced two final rules to improve hiring and employment of veterans and for people with disabilities. One rule updates requirements under the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act (VEVRAA) of 1974; the other updates those under Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. For more than 40 years, these laws have required federal contractors and subcontractors to affirmatively recruit, hire, train and promote qualified veterans and people

with disabilities respectively. "In a competitive job market, employers need access to the best possible employees," said Secretary of Labor Thomas E. Perez. "These rules make it easier for employers to tap into a large, diverse pool of qualified candidates."

"Strengthening these regulations is an important step toward reducing barriers to real opportunities for veterans and individuals with disabilities," said Patricia A. Shiu, Director of the department's Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, which enforces both

The VEVRAA rule provides contractors with a quantifiable metric to measure their success in recruiting and employing veterans by requiring contractors to annually adopt a benchmark either based on the national percentage of veterans in the workforce (currently 8%) or their own benchmark based on the best available data. The rule strengthens accountability and record-keeping requirements, enabling contractors to assess the effectiveness of their recruitment efforts. It also clarifies job listing and subcontract requirements to facilitate compliance.

The Section 503 rule introduces a hiring goal for federal contractors and subcontractors

that 7% of each job group in their workforce be qualified individuals with disabilities. The rule also details specific actions contractors must take in the areas of recruitment, training, record keeping and policy dissemination — similar to those that have long been required to promote workplace equality for women and minorities.

The rules will become effective 180 days after their publication in the Federal Register. More information is available at www.dol.gov/ofccp/ VEVRAARule/ and www.dol. gov/ofccp/503Rule/.

OFCCP enforces Executive Order 11246, Section 503 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and the Vietnam Era Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1974. These three laws require those who do business with the federal government, both contractors and subcontractors, to follow the fair and reasonable standard that they not discriminate in employment on the basis of sex, race, color, religion, national origin, disability or status as a protected veteran. News from the Department of Commerce

Aanii. The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to have all tribal-member owned businesses contact my office, regardless of what tribe you are from. My office is collecting this to provide information to persons putting out bids and/or "Requests for Proposals" (RFPs) for tribally-owned businesses, minority businesses, disadvantaged businesses and/or women-owned businesses. Periodically, my office will receive such a request to these types of businesses. It doesn't matter if you've filed a DBA, profit or non-profit corporation through this office or not. One of the goals of the DOC is to promote tribally-owned businesses.

I'm also in the process of putting together a Tribal Business Directory of businesses located within the State of Michigan. So, regardless of geographical location (within the tribe's reservation boundaries or not), I would appreciate if business owners could supply the following information: Business name, owner(s), business address, phone, fax, e-mail, and/or website, Facebook page, Twitter or any other social network information. If you already have a

flier/PDF with this information, that would be even better. What's important is that people are able to contact you! This directory will be supplied to persons or organizations upon request.

I would like to remind tribal citizens that when you move, it is VERY important you notify the Enrollment Department and fill out a new Address Verification Form (AVF). This is VERY important when moving into, within or out of the tribe's Tax Agreement area. DOC submits changes to the State of Michigan on a monthly basis on the 1st day of every month. Here's an example: I moved into the Tax Agreement Area on August 30 and filled out a new AVF, so my tax exempt status is effective September 1; OR if I were to fill out an AVF on September 2 in the Enrollment Office, my tax exempt status would NOT be effective until October 1. The DOC or the State of Michigan's Department of Treasury will NOT go retroactive on any tax exempt status beginning date. It is the individual's (or parent's/parents' if person is a minor) responsibility to fill out and submit the AVF. Even if you notify another department you have moved, say for example, the Elder's Department, Housing Department or Education Department, it does

NOT automatically update your address with Enrollment. YOU MUST MAKE ALL ADDRESS CHANGES WITH THE EN-ROLLMENT DEPARTMENT.

For tribal citizens who have a disability and who are unable to walk or if walking is difficult, you may authorize another individual to use your Tribal ID to make fuel and tobacco purchases on your behalf. The application form and instructions are available in my office. You MUST either have a disability parking placard (temporary or permanent) or a letter from your physician stating the disability and the duration. The Tribal ID of the citizen requesting this is needed as well as a picture ID of the authorized person. Expired ID's are not acceptable. This may also come in handy if you have an upcoming surgery and may need a temporary disability parking permit, you may apply for this authorization prior to your surgery. Again, you will need a letter from your physician. If you have questions or need further information, I may be contacted at my office at 231-242-1584 or via e-mail at tkeshick@ltbbodawa-nsn.gov

And, as a reminder, I am a Tribal Notary. My office is located in the "Whitehouse" on the north end of Petoskey, MI.

AGREEMENT INFORMATION

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example below).

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable,

gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

ATTENTION ALL RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBERS (RTMs)

If you are planning to purchase a vehicle, ORV or plan on doing any home improvements to your principal place of residence, YOU NEED TO CONTACT ME FIRST before making the actual purchase(s). You must fill out the "Request for TCE" form located on the LTBB website or by contacting my office. I will then issue you a "Tribal Certificate of Exemption" for such purchases. The tribe no longer uses the Refund Method, as indicated in the monthly newsletter, as of January 1, 2008. If you've already made a purchase, there is no recourse! If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me.

south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant. Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members'

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.

Tax Agreement Reminder

When moving into the LTBB Tax Agreement Area, in order to become a Resident Tribal Member, you must change your address in writing at the Enrollment Department located in the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI. Your RTM status will take effect on the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

- 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.
- 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.
- 3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least
- 4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address

The Health Department welcomed a new face to the Health Clinic, Tara Riley. Tara is the new part-time Domestic Violence Health Educator, funded through our new Project Connect 2.0 Grant. The Project Connect 2.0 Grant is through Futures Without Violence and brings awareness to a problem, which often goes unreported in our community. Welcome Tara! We also saw the return of Chris Peariso to Contract Health Services as a Contract Health Assistant

With the return of fall, comes the return of the cold and flu season. While it is not possible to avoid all germs, there are ways to reduce your risk of infection, which includes eating a nutritious diet, maintaining a healthy lifestyle, staying germ free by washing your hands fre-

quently throughout the day and receiving a vaccination against seasonal influenza. Stay tuned for updates on the availability of the seasonal influenza vaccine at the Health Clinic in Petoskey, MI, as well as upcoming flu shot clinics. You will be seeing a lot of pink this month as October is Breast Cancer Awareness month. The month is dedicated to increasing awareness about the importance of the early detection of breast cancer through a nationwide campaign. The last two decades have seen large increases in both incidence and mortality rates for American Indian and Alaskan Native women. The following is the American Cancer Society's recommendations for early breast cancer detection.

- Breast self-examination (BSE) is an option for women starting in their 20s.
- Women in their 20s and 30s should have a clinical breast exam (CBE) as part of a periodic



(regular) health exam by a health professional preferably every three years.

- Starting at age 40, women should have a CBE by a health professional every year.
- Women age 40 and older should have a mammogram every year and should continue to do so for as long as they are in good health.

The end of the month brings us Halloween, so don't forget to check treats for signs of tampering before children are allowed to eat them. Candy should be thrown away if the wrapper is faded or torn or if the candy is unwrapped. Drive carefully and watch out for all the little ghosts and ghouls who are out!

When using Quick Care, you are required to call LTBB Contract Health at 231-242-1600. Notice must be received within 72 hours of the visit. LTBB Elders have 30 days to notify Contract Health.

Notice: Up North Medical Center, also known as Boyne Country Urgent Care, located on M-119 in Harbor Springs, MI, is no longer open after hours or on weekends, so LTBB is no longer using it as an urgent care facility. After hours and weekend emergency treatment can be obtained at Quick Care Family Medical Center, McLaren Northern Michigan Regional Hospital in Petoskey, MI or Charlevoix Area Hospital in Charlevoix, MI.

The Dental Clinic will be closed for hygiene appointments between Christmas and New Year's. Since both holidays fall on a Tuesday, please call to schedule hygiene appointments for January 2014 on December 23, and December 30, 2013.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICE (CHS) PRIOR AUTHORIZATION ENFORCEMENT

CHS is a federally funded program, which can provide for medical care not available through direct services at the LTBB Health Clinic in Petoskey, MI, if the patient meets eligibility requirements.

One very important requirement for CHS to pay for non-emergency patient medical services is PRIOR AUTHORIZATION. Per federal regulation, the patient is required to notify CHS of any non-emergency medical service needed PRIOR to the medical service occurring. The patient is also required to provide information supporting the need for the medical service, so the CHS Managed Care team can make a decision regarding the medical need for the service and patient eligibility.

In the CHS Program, prior authorization means a REFERENCE NUMBER or a faxed approval for a prescription refill. Getting a reference number equals getting prior approval for a medical service provided outside of the LTBB Health Clinic.

Here are some examples where patients have <u>NOT</u> been getting prior authorization:

- A patient gets approval for his or her first appointment with an outside provider and then, does not get reference numbers for their follow-up appointments.
- Patients order prescription refills without getting prior approval. Patients are required to call CHS for prescription refills; CHS faxes approval to the pharmacy.
- Patients see a provider and get an order for an x-ray or other test. The patient gets the test done without getting a reference number.
 - Patients see an outside provider, and the

provider refers the patient to another outsider provider. The patient goes to see the other provider without prior approval.

By not following federal regulations, CHS funding could be jeopardized, which would be devastating to our patient care. Therefore, starting October 1, 2013, the requirement for prior authorization for medical services will be strictly enforced. What it means is if patients do not get approval from LTBB CHS BEFORE their medical service occurs, then, CHS will not pay the bill from the provider. That bill will become the responsibility of the patient. No reference number (or faxed approval for prescriptions) will mean no payment.

The CHS front desk is staffed Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. – 5 p.m., and the voicemail is active 24 hours a day. The voicemail is checked first thing in the morning and continuously throughout the day. Patients can call for prescription refill approvals and reference numbers anytime. Reference numbers will be given right away for services, which do not require managed care approval. For services required to be approved by managed care, patients can get reference numbers after managed care approval is given.

Prior approval is required for non-emergency care. For emergency care, non-elder patients must notify CHS of the emergency care within 72 hours of the start of the emergency care, and elder patients must notify CHS of the emergency care within 30 days. Per federal regulation, emergency means any medical condition for which immediate medical attention is necessary to prevent the death or serious impairment of the health of an individual. Thank you for your cooperation, and we look forward to serving you. Please contact CHS at 231-242-1600 with any questions.

We affirm the sacred role of women in the community as givers of life and promote understanding of the importance of family well-being and the health of women throughout the lifespan.





Executive Report



What an exciting few weeks we have had since our swearing in on August 18, 2013! We are really pleased to be here and looking forward to building a strong, positive, progressive, professional and responsive team to serve you, our tribal citizens. We are also working very hard to represent you on the state and national levels and to become the respected leaders across the state and nation that you deserve.

It truly has been a whirlwind of activities with so much going on from attending Elders Luncheons to traveling to Washington D.C. with a contingent of tribal leaders from across the nation to meet with congressional leaders to educate them on the impact budgets cuts, because of the sequestration, are having on our ability to provide critical level of services, especially with heath care. We have also attended events on the implementation of the Affordable Health Care Act and met with the U.S. Attorney Patrick Miles and staff and other agency representatives such as the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Secret Service, the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA), the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) covering the Western District who provide technical assistance with the various programs and funding we receive through those agencies.

We are very interested in offering opportunities for professional development to ensure we have well trained and competent staff, so I was really pleased to be a part of the Seven Teachings staff training recently offered, which focused on bravery. We were also the host site for a regional conference on the USDA Food Distribution on Indian Reservations, and I was honored to welcome tribal representatives from all over the Midwest to our beautiful area. The main talking points were on nutrition and education and how it is important to be actively fighting the obesity and diabetes epidemic we all confront on our reservations and in surrounding areas. Currently, we have received a nutrition and education grant to provide cooking classes to our youth this winter. Our goal is raise awareness and to teach healthy eating habits to our young people.

With the recent grand opening of the LTBB Fisheries Enhancement Facility in Levering,



MI, we just released 202 sturgeon fingerlings we raised into the Sturgeon River at the Burt Lake State Park in Indian River, MI. Also related to natural resources is the ongoing battle to protect them. I have attended Chippewa Ottawa Resource Authority (CORA) meetings, which is a consortium of tribal leaders from the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, LTBB and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians, who are proactive in efforts to protect our natural resources and who do the negotiating with the state related to hunting and fishing and treaty implementation.

The Vice Chair (Debbie De Leon) and I attended the Good Governance training with the Tribal Council Members. We will use every opportunity, like this one, to develop and foster a better working relationship with our Tribal Council. Even though we may have different roles and responsibilities, we should always remember we do have a common goal, and that is to work together to build a strong foundation, which will support a progressive future and promote the best interests of the tribe as

There are some important deadlines coming up with the implementation of the Affordable Health Care Act, which is scheduled to go into effect October 1, 2013. The Vice Chair and I have been on webinars, phone conferences and attended the National Indian Health Board conference (the first time in many years it was held in our own backyard at the Grand Traverse Resort in Acme, MI ©) to ensure citizens and employees are getting the best care. We are going to see changes to health care regarding who is covered, what is covered, the implementation of the exchanges and veterans benefits. As we learn more about the impact this new law will have on our health care services and on our tribal citizens in general, we can continue to advocate on behalf of our tribal citizens and educate them in the process as these changes are implemented.

The Vice Chair and I have also attended a local session on Internet gaming, which is beginning to be a huge issue for tribes. We have to be ready to make some decisions in the near future as this issue continues to develop and is sweeping the nation in the gaming world. Some tribes are already moving to be ready to implement Internet gaming as soon as it becomes possible. We are following this issue very closely as it will impact tribes and the gaming industry. It might seem as though iGaming could be readily and easily implemented, but we learned quickly that is not the case. It takes a lot of planning to make

sure it is done right and that all

the appropriate protections and

safeguards are in place. Sequestration ... many are asking what does it really mean for us? How will it be implemented in Indian country? Sequestration basically means there will be a mandated reduction in federal dollars we receive for various programs as long as Congress doesn't take any action to prevent it. The likely result will have an enormous impact in the level of services provided to our citizens ... less money equals less service. We have just received a 5.5% cut to our funding with projections discussed at an additional 14% for fiscal year 2014. We are taking a very proactive approach. Tribal leaders across the nation are meeting with Congressional leaders in Washington, D.C. to bring their

attention to the impact these cuts, especially in Indian Health Service (IHS) funding, will have on tribal communities, AND we believe IHS funding should be held harmless in the same manner Medicaid funding has been held harmless. It appears from their response they had assumed it was included in the "hold harmless" category! Now, to see if they will take the necessary action to ensure it IS included. Regardless of that outcome, we must continue to do our due diligence in seeking new funding sources and cutting back on non-essential items.




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












Wenesh eyaawiyiing? Who are we?

These are the seven personal pronouns used to distinguish who is spoken about.

In Zhaaganaashiimowin (English), they are called "Personal Pronouns."

In Zhaaganaashiimowin, "First" person is me, myself, I. Yet in Anishinaabe language and worldview, it seems the third person, wiin, is considered to be more prominent. Wiin forms occur as a base or root stem in structure. See the example below and the visual key. It is often helpful when we notice and study the patterns while learning a language. Observe the patterns and similarities between words and meanings.

The examples below are present tense, happening now. They are given in a simplistic form. We would otherwise place a tense indicator between the personal pronoun prefix and the root verb. For all persons except wiin and wiinwaa, present tense is indicated by "da" (or do, daa, di, de, ...). An example, Nbakade, is "I am hungry" or could be said a bit more formally, Ndabakade.

10 tips for setting good examples

You are the most important influence on your child. You can do many things to help your children develop healthy eating habits for life. Offering a variety of foods helps children get the nutrients they need from every food group. They will also be more likely to try new foods and to like more foods. When children develop a taste for many types of foods, it's easier to plan family meals. Cook together, eat together, talk together, and make mealtime a family time!

show by example

Eat vegetables, fruits, and whole grains with meals or as snacks. Let your child see that you like to munch on raw vegetables.

go food shopping together Grocery shopping can teach



get creative in the kitchen

Cut food into fun and easy shapes with cookie cutters. Name a food your child helps make. Serve "Janie's Salad" or "Jackie's Sweet Potatoes" for dinner. Encourage your child to invent new snacks. Make your own trail mixes from dry whole-grain, low-sugar cereal and dried fruit.

offer the same foods for everyone Stop being a "short-order cook" by

making different dishes to please children. It's easier to plan family meals when everyone eats the same foods.



reward with attention, not food

Show your love with hugs and kisses. Comfort with hugs and talks. Choose not to offer sweets as rewards. It lets your child think sweets or dessert foods are better than other foods. When meals are not eaten, kids do not need "extras"—such as candy or cookies—as replacement foods.

is very hungry. Avoid lecturing or forcing your child to eat. June 2011

Serve something your child likes along with the new food.

cut back on your kid's sweet treats



10 tips to decrease added sugars

Limit the amount of foods and beverages with added sugars your kids eat and drink. If you don't buy them, your kids won't get them very often. Sweet treats and sugary drinks have a lot of calories but few nutrients. Most added sugars come from sodas, sports drinks, energy drinks, juice drinks, cakes, cookies, ice cream, candy, and other desserts.

serve small portions

It's not necessary to get rid of all sweets and desserts. Show kids that a small amount of treats can go a long way. Use smaller bowls and plates for these foods. Have them share a candy bar or split a large cupcake.

sip smarter Soda and other sweet drinks contain

 a lot of sugar and are high in calories. Offer water, 100% juice, or fat-free milk when kids are thirsty.

use the check-out lane that does not display candy Most grocery stores will have a candy-free check-out lane to help moms out. Waiting in a store line makes it easy for children to ask for the candy that is right in front of their faces to tempt them.

choose not to offer sweets as rewards By offering food as a reward for good behavior, children learn to think that some foods are better than other foods. Reward your child with kind words and comforting hugs, or give them non-food items, like stickers, to make them feel special.

make fruit the everyday dessert Serve baked apples, pears, or enjoy a fruit salad. Or, serve yummy frozen juice bars (100% juice) instead of high-calorie desserts.

Sugary foods that are marketed to kids are advertised as "fun foods." Make nutritious foods fun by preparing them with your child's help and being creative together. Create a smiley face with sliced bananas and raisins. Cut fruit into fun and easy shapes with cookie cutters.

encourage kids to invent new snacks Make your own snack mixes from dry whole-grain cereal, dried fruit, and unsalted nuts or seeds. Provide the ingredients and allow kids to choose what they want in their "new" snack.

play detective in the cereal aisle Show kids how to find the amount of total sugars in various cereals. Challenge them to compare cereals they like and select the one with the lowest amount of sugar.

make treats "treats," not everyday foods

Treats are great once in a while. Just don't make treat foods an everyday thing. Limit sweet treats to special

if kids don't eat their meal, they don't need sweet "extras" Keep in mind that candy or cookies should not replace foods that are not eaten at meal time.

LTBB Fisheries Enhancement Facility Housed Lake Sturgeons Recently Set Free in the Sturgeon River

Under an agreement between the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) and the Black River Sturgeon Facility, LTBB Natural Resource Department staff released 202 lake sturgeons into the Sturgeon River at Burt Lake State Park in Indian River, MI, on September 3, 2013.

Prior to being released into the Sturgeon River, the lake sturgeons were in tanks at the LTBB Fisheries Enhancement Facility in Levering, MI. The facility, which cost \$2.5 million, was financed from Tribal Council appropriations (general fund money), Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) road funds, United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) funds, Michigan Conservation Fund money and a \$500,000 donation from CMS Land Company.

In addition to the facility, there are two ponds,

jiimaan approximately 10 years ago and had the wood in his backyard for approximately five years before the SPRING Program approached him this summer. Gary Simon of Petoskey, MI, is constructing the jiimaan with assistance from Harrington, and Matt Koontz, who has built wooden flutes for almost 10 years, constructed the paddles.

"This guy (Gary Simon) is a maniac; he works no matter how hot it is," Harrington, Jr. said. "I meet with Gary every morning, and we discuss what to do that day. The mold took us three weeks to build. The jiimaan is made of cedar and has cedar ribs. We used strips and maple skin instead of wiigwaas (sweet grass in Anishinaabemowin)."

Once completed, the intent is to have the entire tribal community utilize the jiimaan. It will be used by the youth who participate in the annual Jiimaan Journey, sponsored by the Youth Services Department, in the parade at the Sovereignty Day Celebration and be available for use during other tribal events and functions. Two canoes are used during the annual Jiimaan Journey, the Odawa Institute's large jiimaan and one rented from Sanford, MI.

"We'd like to display it eventually at the (LTBB) governmental center (in Harbor Springs, MI) for people to see and to spark an interest in building more in the future for our community to use," Woodin said. "We need to find more funding sources in order to build more."

The Odawa Institute's jiimaan appeared in a Pure Michigan commercial; is in area parades; is available for rides during the annual Festival by the

Bay in Petoskey, MI, during the Petoskey Rocks! events in Petoskey, MI, and for private rides; makes annual trips to Beaver Island, MI, for the summer solstice ceremonies; and makes trips across Little Traverse Bay.

"We like to accommodate everyone who wants to go out on it," Harrington, Jr. said. "I give rides to anyone who asks. Our goal one year was to give 1,000 rides. We gave 946 that year, so we were close."

The SPRING Program is under the umbrella of the Substance Abuse/Mental Health Department, which is a part of the Health Department, and the SPRING Program is located at the LTBB Health Park in Petoskey, MI. SPRING is funded by a federal grant, which started in July 2009 and ends in July 2014.



Colville Tribal Council Acknowledges Same-Sex Marriage



Editor's note: The following is a Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation press release dated September 6, 2013. In addition to the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, the Coquille Tribe of Oregon, the Suquamish Tribe of Washington, LTBB and the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians, both in Michigan, and the Santa Ysabel Tribe of California

all legally recognize same-sex marriage in their jurisdictions. Marriages performed within their jurisdictions are now recognized by the federal government in the same way marriages from the 13 marriage equality states are recognized because of the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling, which struck down Section 3 of the Defense of Marriage Act in June 2013.

NESPELEM, WASH. On September 5, 2013, the Colville Business Council, the official governing body of the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation, amended Title 5-1, the tribe's Domestic Code, to recognize same-sex marriage.

This change is in keeping with tribal values, and in recognizing the special place the Two-Spirited Peoples hold within the Colville tribal community.

These amendments will ensure for purposes of tribal law, all marriages will be treated equally.

"The Colville Tribes want to ensure that all of its members are treated equally and with respect," said Michael Finley, Chairman of the Colville Business Council.

The amendments were initiated by tribal members.

"This Resolution makes me feel stronger, because it validates my relationship, and the relationships of all same-sex couples, and it makes me feel safer because it offers protection and recognition for my family," said Lois Trevino, a tribal member.

The tribe will now begin the process of modifying its codes, plans and policies to comport with the amendments.

DEPARTMENT OF DEFENSE ANNOUNCES SAME-SEX SPOUSE BENEFITS



Editor's note: The following is a U.S. Department of Defense press release dated August 14, 2013.

Today (August 14, 2013), the Department of Defense announced its plan to extend benefits to same-sex spouses of uniformed service members and Department of Defense civilian employees.

After a review of the department's benefit policies following the Supreme Court's ruling Section Three of the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) is unconstitutional, and in con-

sultation with the Department of Justice and other Executive Branch agencies, the Defense Department will make spousal and family benefits available no later than September 3, 2013, regardless of sexual orientation, as long as service member-sponsors provide a valid marriage certificate.

The Department of Defense remains committed to ensuring all men and women who serve in the U.S. military, and their families, are treated fairly and equally as the law directs.

Entitlements such as TRI-CARE enrollment, basic allowance for housing (BAH) and family separation allowance are retroactive to the date of the Supreme Court's decision. Any claims to entitlements before that date will not be granted. For those members married after June 26, 2013, entitlements begin at the date of marriage.

We recognize same-sex military couples who are not stationed in a jurisdiction

which permits same-sex marriage would have to travel to another jurisdiction to marry. That is why the department will implement policies to allow military personnel in such a relationship non-chargeable leave for the purpose of travelling to a jurisdiction where such a marriage may occur. This will provide accelerated access to the full range of benefits offered to married military couples throughout the department, and help level the playing field between opposite-sex and same-sex couples seeking to be married.

For civilian benefits administered government-wide to federal employees, the Department of Defense will follow the Office of Personnel Management and the Department of Labor's guidance to ensure the same benefits currently available to heterosexual spouses are also available to legally married same-sex spouses.

Housing Department Programs

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

Short Term Rental Assistance: This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

Down Payment Assistance: This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

Tribal Rental Housing Program: The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.



Shananaquet served on Tribal Council from 2009-2011 and served as the Vice Chairperson from September 1, 2011 to August 18, 2013. Law previously served on Tribal Council for 10 years as the Secretary, Vice-Chairperson and Legislative Leader. Otto served on Tribal Council from 2009-2013. Reyes and Naganashe are both new to Tribal Council.

Councilors Regina Gasco-Bentley, Winnay Wemigwase, Bill A. Denemy and John Keshick III are all serving four-year terms, which end in 2015.

At the September 8, 2013 Tribal Council meeting, Tribal Council held officer elections for Legislative Leader, Treasurer and Secretary and selected Councilors to serve on the various Tribal Council committees for the next two years until the next Tribal Council election in 2015.

Gasco-Bentley, Shanan-aquet and Otto were all nominated for Legislative Leader, however, Shananaquet declined her nomination. Gasco-Bentley was selected as the Legislative Leader by an 8-1 vote. Shananaquet was nominated for Secretary, and she became the Secretary when no other Tribal Councilor expressed interest. Law, Denemy and Reyes were all nominated for Treasurer, however, Denemy declined his nomination. Reyes was selected Treasurer by a 6-3







American Indian University Professor Relieved of Teaching FOR ANTI-REPUBLICAN

EAST LANSING, MICHI-GAN - Bowing to pressure from several Republican university professors, William Penn, a tenured English professor at Michigan State University, has been relieved of his teaching duties by the University for making comments that attacked Mitt and Ann Romney and Republicans.

Penn, Nez Perce/Osage, was secretly videotaped during the spring of 2012 by a student. The video captured Penn saying: "They raped this country." The eight-minute video was posted to YouTube and found its way to the national media earlier this week on FOX's "The O'Reilly Factor."

The 64-year-old professor

has been placed on a paid sabbatical for this semester.

Penn was the advisor to the Native Writers Circle and American Indian Studies Program at Michigan State University at the time of being relieved of his teaching duties.

Penn is the author of seven books and won a North American Indian Prose Award (essays) and a Distinguished Faculty Award. Presently, he is shopping a new novel, Hazing: A Novel in Ten Satires, completing a new novel, The Revenge of King George, working on a collection of essays and revising two film scripts, according to the Michigan State University website.



TRADITIONAL TRIBAL BURIAL GROUNDS POLICY INTENTIONS, PART 2

The September issue of Odawa Trails included the first of a series of articles discussing the Policy Intentions of the Traditional Tribal Burial Grounds, in which the environmental effects of conventional cemetery's use of vaults and embalming were discussed. The second Policy Intention of the statute

B. The Tribe encourages the use of markers that don't intrude upon the landscape. These natural markers can include shrubs and trees, or an engraved flat stone native to the area. The planting of native trees, shrubs and flowers on or near the grave establishes a living memorial and helps form a wildlife area. (Statute 2009-018, Section II, B.)

This method of marking the grave site helps create a place of natural beauty and repose which can stand as living testament to tribal people's keen identification with plant and animal life. In addition, by stressing stones and plants be native to the area, the statute supports the rehabilitation of lands and ecosystems previously stressed by invasive species or under threat by them. Further, choosing vegetation or a stone native to Waganakising homelands can provide a meaningful connection to the marker which is perhaps more personal than an engraved headstone of far-off origins might be. The traditional use of spirit homes and carved, wooden clan markers are also in alignment with the intentions of the burial grounds. This Policy Intention helps create a burial grounds which will eventually function like a wildlife refuge - a peaceful place welcoming to the spirits of those who passed and remain.

Specifying the use of natural markers is also an

important way to meet the Green Burial Council Standards/Eco-Rating System for Burial Grounds. The Traditional Tribal Burial Grounds Board is currently developing a relationship with the Green Burial Council, an internationally recognized organization at the forefront of the green burial movement. As already written, our statute intentions position the Tribal Burial Ground to receive the highest "Three Leaf Rating," given only to Conservation Burial Grounds. It is significant the independent wording of the LTBB Statute concurs with an organization considered the "standard bearer" in the work to "encourage environmentally sustainable death care and the use of burial as a new means of protecting natural areas" (www.greeenburial.org). It is another example of how traditional tribal values, steeped in the physical and spiritual necessity of biodiversity, provide guidance to our most pressing ecological problems.

We invite and encourage all tribal citizens to join us at Burial Grounds board meetings with any thoughts, ideas or questions. Upcoming meetings, held at the Mina Mskiki Gumik Health Building in Petoskey, MI, and beginning at 9 a.m., will be on October 5, 2013 (moved from September 21, 2013), October 26, 2013, November 9, 2013 and December 14, 2013.

"Vanderbilt Casino" continued from page 1. to keep the casino closed.

Then, in August 2012, the 6th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals ruled in favor of Bay Mills, vacating the injunction against the Vanderbilt casino, essentially allowing it to reopen and raising the hopes of the citizens of Vanderbilt that it would bring jobs, visitors and money to the community.

However, Bay Mills kept the casino's doors shut.

Last October, Schuette asked the U.S Supreme Court to review the case.

The U.S. Solicitor General, whose job is to conduct government litigation in the Supreme Court, responded with a 24page brief recommending the state of Michigan's petition to keep the casino closed should be denied.

Schuette challenged that recommendation, arguing that the high court's "immediate intervention is so crucial."

In June 2013, Schuette announced the high court would indeed weigh in on the case.

According to a statement made in June 2013, Schuette said the ruling "sets the stage for an important discussion about the states' ability to halt the unrestrained expansion of off-reservation tribal casino gambling. We look forward to making our case before the nation's highest court."

The Bay Mills Indian Community maintains that through the Michigan Land Claims Settlement Act of 1997, from which they received funds, the property on the north side of the Village of Vanderbilt previously owned by Treetops Resort and

purchased with those funds, is a tribal reserve and, therefore, can be the site of a tribal

casino.

In a June 2013 statement, Bay Mills Indian Community Tribal Chairman Kurt Perron said the community "is deeply concerned by the U.S. Supreme Court's decision to review this case as it is in any case where it appears the

Court may examine the doctrine of tribal sovereign immunity. We remain confident that the nation's highest Court will agree with our position."

Under U.S. Supreme Court rules, Bay Mills will file a response to Schuette's latest brief on October 24, 2013.




