

## GTB Tribal Member Emma Schwander Successfully Recovers from Spinal Fusion Surgery to Claim the Title of Miss Odawa Nation 2010-2011

On August 10, 2009, Emma Schwander underwent spinal fusion surgery in which two titanium rods and 19 screws were inserted into her back.

The surgery left her with a scar from the bottom of her neck to the middle of her back and was necessary due to complications caused by severe scoliosis.

Prior to having surgery, she wore a back brace for 23 hours out of the day for approximately eight months in hopes the brace would hold her spine in place so the curve caused by scoliosis wouldn't get any worse. It didn't help, and her curve got worse, affecting her heart and lungs. She started having respiratory problems and experiencing pain and discomfort. It got so bad that she couldn't stand or walk. Surgery was her only option.

"She is a very strong young woman who faced and overcame every obstacle with no complaints," her mother, Jane (Buswa) Schwander, said of her daughter. "Even with all she went through, she was only upset that she could not run for Miss Odawa last year because she had just turned 13 (contestants must be between 13 and 19 years old)." Remarkably, a little more than a

year later on August 14, 2010, Schwander was selected as Miss Odawa Nation 2010-2011 at the 19th Annual Odawa Homecoming Pow Wow held in Harbor Springs, ML

Schwander, а member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians (GTB), compiled 123 points to earn the title of Miss Odawa Nation while LTBB Tribal Citizen Josephine Laughlin had 121. All four Miss Odawa Nation contestants were judged on an essay, biography, interview and dance exhibition

Schwander and Laughlin were tied after the essay, biography, interview and dance exhibition portions. There was a public speaking tiebreaker. They were asked to share a story or teaching. Schwander spoke about the sweat lodge.

"I wanted to run for Miss Odawa last year, but I had to have the surgery done first," said Schwander, 14, a LTBB

Schwander, a traditional dancer, has grown up dancing at the Odawa Homecoming Pow Wow as well as at pow wows throughout the U.S. and Canada. She, her parents and her siblings have danced and attended pow wows as their way of life. Her father has served as an Arena Director and Head Dance Judge at pow wows. Her mother has served as a Head Dance Judge at pow wows and was a fancy dancer for several years. Her mother has made dance outfits for all of her family members, children and grandchildren. Her mother and her uncle were two step champions twice at the Bay Mills Pow Wow. As a family, they believe in preserving Native traditions, dance and ceremonies. "My favorite way to spend my

time is attending pow wows and dancing," Schwander said. "Since I was old enough to walk, I have been in the arena. This is what I love. This lifestyle has provided me with a healthy way to socialize with all Native communities, see friends, make new ones and laugh a lot. My family and I are blessed with the gift of traveling, dancing, singing and being together in a good way on our fully harvested a

Schwander strives to be a "role model for Native youth and to show abstinence from drugs, alcohol, sex, crime and all other negative influences, by way of her actions."

"I would like to speak on these matters and share that there are other healthy choices," said Schwander, who has attended Biimaadziwin Hoop Dance Society, Girls on the Run and Tribal Youth Camp. "I will display these choices to our people. Living and staying clean as well as carrying myself in a respectful way are what I have been taught and shown by my family. I am proud to be Native American, and I want to show it by carrying on our traditions. I find that had I not been raised attending pow wows and living our traditions, it would leave a big hole in my heart." Schwander will be a freshman

at Traverse City Central High School in Traverse City, MI, and hopes to attend Michigan State University in the nursing program. She would like to be a nurse in a branch

of the armed forces.

"I have the greatest respect for veterans and for the courage and actions that they use and give for our nation," Schwander said. "Being a nurse in this field would give me a way to offer care and thanks to them."

In December 2009, Schwander was one of seven GTB tribal members to receive an elk permit. She went on a two-day elk hunt with her father, brother, Quinten, and uncle, Larry Koon, and successhide to make dance regalia.

"I did take a bite of the heart to take part of the elk's spirit, so it will now always be a part of me," Schwander said. "We offered our tobacco, so we left her in a good way."

Her mother is from Whitefish River First Nation of Birch Island, Ontario, Canada, and her father is a member of the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians. Her maternal grandparents are Francis and Helen (Wacaush) Buswa, and her paternal grandmother is the late Freda (Walker) Schwander.

Freda "Bird" Schwander traveled to Washington, D.C. in the late 1960's to help GTB become federally recognized and served as a GTB tribal leader for eight years (1980-1988).

"Grandma Freda was a drafter of the tribal constitution and worked diligently to make GTB the first federally recognized tribe in the United States of America," Schwander said. "Her beliefs and actions stood up for me and my family, and I want to be as great as her. Her courage, strength and great will helped shape my father who carried that way of life unto me, so that I may share it with future generations. This is among the finest of gifts to carry and pass along."





Almost one year in office and the LTBB forbearance or loan restructure for our casino is close to completion. Tribal Council, the Executive, the Legal Department and other experts have collaboratively worked with our Odawa Casino

Resort investors in this complicated, but necessary process. Business will continue as usual at our casino and safeguards for our government budget are being initiated.

One safeguard measure the Tribal Chairman has initiated is an Executive Directive for cost-saving measures for the tribal government. Department directors and program managers have worked diligently and prepared written cost- saving plans, some having to make very tough decisions regarding the programs they manage.

During the sensitive and difficult bond negotiations, the Tribal Chairman VETOED a resolution that was not overridden by Tribal Council. The result of this VETO saved our tribe more than \$400,000.

The Executive is working collabora-

proximately 4.1 miles. Team OCR, the Petoskey Snowmobile Club (PSC), the Executive Director from Michigan Snowmobile Association (MSA), Lobbying Grassroots Inc. (LGI), our tribe's state lobbyist and the Executive staff are all working together on this project.

We have local support from the City of Petoskey Manager and staff, the Petoskey Regional Chamber of Commerce, Bear Creek Township, Emmet County and Meijer gas and shopping center for this community effort.

The snowmobile business creates nearly \$2 billion annually for Michigan business owners and communities. The State of Michigan Snowmobile Trail expansion is being sought throughout the Lower Peninsula, and there have been numerous requests for access to Odawa Casino Resort. from the old Victories site directly to Odawa Casino Resort for the month of February.

The tribe's state lobbyist is working with the Executive Director of MSA to bring the MSA Annual Winter Ride and the Legislative Ride to Odawa Casino Resort this winter.

LTBB placed second in the Michigan Indian Family Olympics this July. Last year, we placed first and rallied this year to finish second. Congratulations to all participants of the MIFO, and a big thank you to the staff who made the event possible.

The Pow Wow this August was a great success. Our dancers survived the heat this year. I would like to acknowledge the dedicated, hard-working Pow Wow Committee and the staff who volunteered their time for this successful event.

## HOW TO BECOME A RESIDENT TRIBAL MEMBER (RTM)

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The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is officially changing your address with the Enrollment Department. All RTMs are verified through Enrollment. Enrollment in turn sends the Department of Commerce (DOC) notification of your status. Please note on your Address Verification Form (AVF) the township you reside in. This alerts the Enrollment Department for RTM status. When you change your address with the Michigan Secretary of State's office, you will be asked if you would like to register to vote; by doing so, it will note the township you reside in. Otherwise, ask one of the Enrollment Department staff when filling out your AVF.


Your RTM status does not become effective until the first day of the following month in which you moved.

Example: I changed my address with the Enrollment Department on May 3. My RTM status did not go into effect until June 1.

It is VERY important you notify Enrollment immediately when you move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA).

It is your responsibility to notify Enrollment of any changes in address or name; the DOC cannot backtrack or backdate documents in order to qualify for RTM status.

Being an RTM exempts you from paying state sales tax on large tangible items such as vehicles, boats, snowmobiles and off the road vehicles. It also applies to affixation to your primary place of residence. There is a form that needs to be filled out to request a Tribal Certificate of Exemption (TCE). The request for this form (Request for TCE) can be



found on the LTBB website www.ltbbodawa-nsn.gov or by calling the DOC at 231-242-1584. Tribal Form 3998, which is the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption, may only be issued by the DOC with certain authorized signers. The signing order is as follows: DOC Assistant Theresa Keshick, Tribal Administrator Albert Colby, Jr., Vice Chairman Dexter Mc-Namara and Chairman Ken Harrington (in the absence of DOC).

Please note: All RTM updates are sent to the State of Michigan on a monthly basis as close to the end of the month as possible. If you plan to

purchase a vehicle or do any remodeling to your residence, please wait until after your RTM status is effective (after the first day of the following month in which you moved); otherwise, the State of Michigan will deny your claim for a refund.

Being an RTM also exempts you from sales/use tax on utilities such as phone, Internet, satellite, gas, electric, propane and cellular service. Please fill out the Residency Form for Tax Agreement and return it to the address noted on the bottom of the form.

Resident Tribal Members are exempted from the following Michigan taxes:

- 1. Sales Tax (6% of retail price)
  - 2. Use Tax (6% of purchase price)
- 3. Income Tax (4.35% of Adjusted Gross Income)
- 4. Single Business Tax (1.9 % of the applicable tax base)
  5. \*Motor Fuel Tax (31 cents per gallon unleaded and 27 cents per gallon on diesel)
- 6. \*Tobacco Product Tax (\$2 per pack of cigarettes)
- (To purchase tobacco products, you MUST be 18 years of age or older!)

\* All LTBB Tribal Members are entitled to the exemption on fuel and tobacco.

- \*The Motor Fuel and Tobacco Product Tax exemption is available at Biindigen (tribal convenience store) located at 2169 U.S. 31 North in Petoskey, MI.
- \*The Motor Fuel Tax exemption is also available at the BP station on the south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant.

Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

Waganakising Odawa Career and Technical Education Program (WOCTEP), operating under a U.S. Department of Education grant, offers short training programs in partnership with North Central Michigan College. Open registration for fall semester 2010 is ongoing, and there may still be seats available in many classes. WOCTEP staff can assist students with registration of classes for the following certificate programs:

TEXTILES – Learn color theory, surface design, dye techniques and a variety of weaving techniques.

GRAPHIC ARTS – Learn an artistic and professional discipline with a focus on visual communication; common uses include advertisements, product packaging and web design.

NEW MEDIA – An introduction to digital and web-based audio/video recording and editing using classroom cameras and computer software; learn about three-point lighting, video mechanics and editing techniques.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP ES-SENTIALS – Preparation for starting and successfully managing a business; discuss current business topics, develop a business plan, learn about finance, marketing strategies and more.

MEDICAL ASSISTANT – Classroom instruction and clinical placement provides training for employment in a physician's office and health clinic settings.

PHLEBOTOMY – Learn blood draw techniques and related procedures, specimen transport, processing and infection control through classroom, lab and clinical training.

CERTIFIED NURSE AIDE – Classroom and lab instruction, along with a clinical rotation, provides preparation for patient care employment.

Participants in these programs benefit from one-on-one academic advising and need based financial assistance including stipend, mileage and childcare assistance. Students who complete their program of study receive a Student Tool Kit containing items related to their studies; some students have received business cards and an accounting calculator (Entrepreneurship), DVD-R and memory cards (New Media) or stethoscopes and scrubs (C.N.A.).


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



















































## Important Facts You Should Know About Indian Health Service Contract Health Service

I.H.S. - CHS coverage is not automatic. You must be registered with CHS. Should you have an emergency situation requiring you to obtain care at a non- I.H.S. facility such as urgent care or the emergency room, you must notify the CHS office at 231-242-1600 within 72 hours of that visit. If you fail to do so, you will be held responsible for the bill.

**Eligibility Criteria:** 

8

- You must reside in the Contract Health Service Delivery Area (CHSDA).
- Be an enrolled member or descendent of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians or be able to prove social or economic ties to the community.
- A Native American claiming eligibility for CHS has the responsibility to furnish the tribal program with documentation to substantiate the claim.
- You must have an active and complete file with Contract Health before a reference number can be given.

#### Remember!!!!

Indian Health Service Contract Health is not an entitlement program - not everyone is eligible. Know your status before obtaining services. **Referrals:** 

Physicians write referrals when patients need medical

care that is not available in the Tribal Clinic. A referral is not an implication the care will be paid by CHS. A patient must meet eligibility criteria, medical priorities and use all alternate resources available.

If a referral is denied for CHS payment, the patient may elect to obtain medical services at his or her own expense. In most cases, an approved referral is limited to one medical appointment. Please call Contract Health Services at 231-242-1600 prior to any follow-up appointments for approval to make sure your coverage is still in effect.

Alternate Resources:

Contract Health Service is the payer of last resort. When a patient has Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans Assistance, Workman's compensation, private insurance or any other coverage, it is considered the primary carrier.

**Priority system:** 

Medical referrals are approved for payment by a priority system.

The system has highest priority to approve conditions related to life saving or potential death threatening situations, then we approve by severity of condition.

The amount of funding we receive for CHS services is limited. When we run out of money toward the end of the year, then we have to be very strict on referral approvals and may only have the funds to pay for emergency conditions.

## Meet Licensed Master Social Worker/Certified Advanced Addictions Counselor Sue Hoffman



## Notice to Boaters: possible salmon nets on northern lakes Huron and Michigan

SAULT STE. MARIE 6 From the beginning of August through the end of October, boaters in northern Lake Michigan and Lake Huron should be aware of the possible presence of tribal commercial salmon fishing nets. During their recreational boating and fishing activities, boaters should exercise extreme caution during low-light or bad weather conditions when navigating this area. Posters depicting what the nets look like, the general areas they could be set, and contact numbers for help have been displayed at nearby launch sites.

Each net has large orange floats that are 6 inches by 14 inches spaced at intervals of 300 feet or less. The license number of the tribal fisher is on the net. Net ends are marked with staffs 5-foot in length above the water surface, colored with at least 50 percent reflective orange coloring and a 12-inch by 12-inch orange flag on top.

CORA strongly recommends that boaters navigate around the nets they encounter, rather than between the staff buoys set at net ends. These salmon nets may be set at the surface and are composed of thick twine.

Fishers from the Bay Mills Indian Community, the Grand Traverse Band of Ottawa and Chippewa Indians, the Little River Band of Ottawa Indians, the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians are all required to uniformly mark their nets in the above manner. For more information contact CORA Executive Director Jane TenEyck at



# Housing Department Programs

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

**Short Term Rental Assistance:** This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used <u>ONE TIME ONLY</u> and the rent requested must be affordable and may not exceed 30% of the household's monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

**Down Payment Assistance:** This program offers up to \$5,000 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home.

Foreclosure Prevention Program: This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI; this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

Credit Counseling: We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

**Tribal Housing Rental Program:** This program is designed to assist families, for a limited time, until permanent housing can be found. Please submit a letter of interest and your application will be put on our waiting list for when LTBB rentals become available.





## LITTLE RIVER BAND OF OTTAWA INDIANS HOST 17TH ANNUAL Anishinaabe Family Language and Culture Camp in Manistee, MI

As always, the 17th Annual Family Language and Culture Camp held July 23-25, 2010 was a huge success. The camp is held at the Little River Band's pow wow and campgrounds on U.S. 31 near M-22, right across from the casino resort.

Kenny Pheasant coordinates the event with help from the Little River Band Culture Department and other tribal staff. The camp is organized as a family event, and activities include workshops for children or teens.

It's unique in that there are no costs to attend the camp. Registration is free, camping is free, and meals are provided, so it's a very affordable family trip. The campgrounds have shower facilities and free ice.

Near the pow wow grounds are the akiwinan (flags) which represent many of the Native people and communities attending the conference. There were approximately 14 flags posted and flying together throughout the weekend as a sign of unity. Michael Smith, Legislative Office Administrative Assistant and a veteran, attended camp and took responsibility for the LTBB Odawa akiwin.

Gijigowi Language Department staff, Coordinator Carla McFall and Language Instructor Terry Spanish, facilitated three workshops, using games to learn and have fun with Anishinaabemowin. Marie "Tootsie" Miller, Elders Program Coordinator, took a group of elders to the camp. Everyone had a good time and learned even more about our culture and language.



Workshops were presented in the mornings and afternoons with breaks for meals. Anishinaabemowin speakers do workshops to teach language or interesting theories about our language. Many others present

cultural workshops on traditional arts, traditional games, singing, hand drumming or cultural teachings in



general.

There was a talent show Friday evening (July 23, 2010) which included some beautiful songs, poems and jokes. After the workshops and dinner on Saturday (July 24, 2010), there were naming ceremonies followed by an evening powwow. Richard Snake, who is an Elders Program driver, looked very nice in his traditional regalia. The Gijigowi Language Department set up a vendor table of Anishinaabemowin language items. There were a couple spot dances, and a potato dance, all in fun.

Kenny has already started planning for next year. Language Camp is the last full weekend of July, so in 2011, it will be July 29, 30, 31, 2011. Kawaabmigoom oodi - we will see you'all there!

As of July 1, 2010, the Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver applications are processed by the Department of Civil Rights. In order to apply for the Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver, you must:

Complete the STUDENT PORTION of the Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver (MITW) Application.

 Submit the MITW application (and any attached documentation) to your Tribal Enrollment Department for certification.

2. Ensure the Tribe certified MITW application form and accompanying documentation is submitted to the MDCR office for verification. This will often be done by your Tribe after they complete their portion of the application, or they return the form to you. In any event it is your responsibility to ensure the completed application and required documentation are filed.

3. ELIGIBILITY: In order to be eligible for the MIT W, you must meet the following criteria: You must be enrolled at one of Michigan's public colleges or universities AND You must be ¼ or more Native American blood quantum as certified by your Tribal Enrollment Department AND You must be an enrolled member of a US Federally recognized Tribe as certified by your Tribal Enrollment Department AND You must be a legal resident of the state of Michigan for not less than 12 consecutive months.

DOCUMENTATION:

You must provide the following documentation with your MITW application: A photocopy of your Michigan Driver's License or State issued Michigan Identification Card A photocopy of your Tribal ID

**PROOF OF RESIDENCY:** Please note, your MITW residency status does not determine your residency status at your institution. Your institution may require additional documentation as proof of residency or to determine your length of residency in Michigan

TRIBAL CERTIFICATION : You must submit this application to your Tribal Enrollment Department for certification and signature. The Tribal Enrollment Department is certifying that the applicant (you), is ¼ or more Native American blood quantum and is a certified member of a Federally recognized Tribe. The Tribal Enrollment Department may submit this form and accompanying documents on your behalf to the MDCR office for verification.

#### STUDENT STATUS:

The statute does not limit tuition waiver eligibility based upon full/part time status, degree track, academic performance, or similar criteria - and such information will not affect MDCR verification.

#### **TRANSFER STUDENTS:**

Transfer students must fill out the "STUDENT PORTION" section of a new application indicating the school to which they will be transferring. It will not be necessary to resubmit the "TRIBAL CERTIFICA-TION PORTION" since MDCR has it on file.

## GARDENING A LITTLE FURTHER INTO THE FALL


The days are getting shorter, and the nights cooler. This is a great time for gardeners as the gardens they've tended all summer are now giving back in abundance. But, it is also an let the sunlight through, and since you need to get the covers on before it gets cold, you lose the last couple of hours of sunlight.

A couple of good alternatives are clear plastic or floating row cover. For frost protection, any clear plastic will do. But, if you are more serious about keeping things growing into the fall, it would be worth buying some greenhouse plastic from a garden supply store or catalog. Greenhouse plastic will usually let more of the sunlight through to the plants, and it will better resist UV radiation and last longer. In fall days that can give us frosty nights and warm sunny afternoons, you have to be careful that your plants don't get too hot in the afternoon under the plastic. Floating row cover doesn't provide quite as much frost protection as plastic, but is a little more forgiving in those warm afternoons. It is a white, spun or woven fabric made of a material that lets up to 85% of the light through, depending on the weight of the fabric.

it helps to have some structure holding it up off the plants. This structure can be made with whatever materials you have on hand, but usually, it is some sort of hoop. The hoops can be sized to cover a single bed or they can be large enough to walk into and cover several beds. Smaller hoops can be made of wire or flexible black PVC. Some garden catalogs sell a heavy gauge wire for that purpose. High-tensile fencing wire works well also. Larger hoops are usually made from PVC or bent metal conduit.

Another important strategy for extending your gardening season is choosing cold-tolerant crops for your fall garden. If you started greens in August – things such as lettuce, spinach, Swiss chard, kale and bok choi – you will have much more success at growing your garden on into the fall. But, it is still worth trying to get a few more weeks out of our tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers.

anxious time as we watch the weather forecasts for threats of frost and hope a few more tomatoes and peppers will ripen. We all know we can't control the weather, and part of gardening is learning to accept whatever Mother Nature brings us, but we can take some measures to protect ourselves from the coming frosts and carry our gardens just a little further into the fall.

When the air turns frosty, the best source of heat to protect your plants is the earth itself, so we look for ways to hold the heat around the plants as temperatures drop. The old techniques still work – cover your garden with sheets, blankets, painter's drop cloths or whatever else you can find. But, these kinds of covers don't

## LTBB TRIBAL CITIZEN IN NEED OF SECOND KIDNEY TRANSPLANT

My cousin, Joanna Gwen Sanchez, lost function of her kidneys in 1991. She was just 21 years old. She woke up one morning feeling like she had caught the flu. She had body aches and fever. She progressively got worse over the next few days. She finally had to stay home from work. Joanna knew something was very wrong when she dragged herself out of bed just to get a drink of water. She was so very thirsty and drank down a big, tall glass of ice water. Immediately, she threw it up. She was alone in the house and knew she needed to get to a doctor. Joanna drove herself to an urgent care doctor. The doctor prescribed something for her nausea and fever. After a few days, Joanna felt better.


TV; it was her eyesight.

She made a visit to her local eye doctor. The doctor tested Joanna for several different things, including a brain tumor. By this time, Joanna was legally considered blind. She had a retinal thrombus. The eye doctor sent Joanna to her family physician to really get down to the bottom of her problems.

Joanna made the appointment with her physician, and he did a simple blood test on her. The test revealed Joanna's kidneys were functioning at less than 10%. The doctor looked at her and said, "I don't know how you're walking around. Another three months and you would have just dropped dead." Joanna was immediately sent to the hospital and placed on dialysis. Her eyesight got better with medication. Joanna received a kidney transplant from her mother in June 1991. That transplant lasted 17 years. Her mother is currently 68 years old and doing great. Her mother is Sophie Ann (Wasegesic) Conlin. Joanna is the granddaughter of Daniel Enos and Ida Margret (Francis) Wasegesic. Daniel Enos Wasegesic was born in Cross Village, MI, and Ida Margret (Francis) Wasegesic was born in Peshawbestown, MI. Both were recognized members of their respective tribes in northern Michigan. Joanna had to return to dialysis in January 2009. Joanna is like a sister to me (we are exactly one month apart

in age), and I don't want to lose her. She desperately needs a new kidney transplant. Dialysis is difficult for her. She has to hook up to a dialysis machine each night for 8-1/2 hours. She is currently doing peritoneal dialysis. She is on fluid and diet restrictions.

Joanna is looking for a living donor. I wish I could be a donor for her, but I also have medical issues which prevent me from being her donor. One of her cousins has been tested as well as her brother. Neither of which were a viable match. One other cousin is presently in the process of being tested to see if she is a match, but it's very likely she will be rejected due to a pre-existing medical condition which may prevent her from donating. Joanna is registered on the kidney transplant list at Sentara Norfolk General Hospital in Norfolk, VA. The living donor coordinator number is 1-800-865-7644, Option #6. The blood test and kidney transplant would be done at no cost to you! LTBB Tribal Citizen Participates in National Native American Youth Initiative



Ashley Dominic, a 17-year-old LTBB Tribal Citizen, attended the 13th Annual Patty Iron Cloud National Native American Youth Initiative (NNAYI) held in Washington, D.C. from June 19, 2010 to June 27, 2010.

The Association of American Indian Physicians (AAIP) sponsors the program to educate and encourage more Native American students into health professions.

The students were taken on field trips that included tours of the National Institutes of Health, Office of Minority Health, Indian Health Service, Georgetown University, George Washington University, the U.S. Capitol Building and many more.

Students attended a series of lectures and interactive workshops which featured guest speakers who are physicians, researchers and educators in the field of medicine.

NNAYI was created in 1998 to increase the number of American Indian/Alaska Native students entering health professions and biomedical research. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for admission to college and professional schools. Students also receive information regarding financial aid, counseling and other college-related assistance. To be selected for the NNAYI summer program, students must be 16 to 18 and express interest in healthcare or biomedical research.

Dominic, a senior at Harbor Light Christian School (HLCS) in Harbor Springs, MI, has a 4.0 grade point average and plans to attend either the University of Michigan or Grand Valley State University next fall, majoring in the health field with interests in athletic training, pharmacy, physical therapy, physician assistant or pediatrician as career options.

She has received School Excellence awards in Geometry and English and has received Michigan Indian Elders Association student incentive awards for all A's and perfect attendance since grade school.

LTBB Tribal Citizen Serving as National Indian Child Welfare Association Secretary

Rochelle Ettawageshik, a LTBB Tribal Citizen, is currently serving as the Secretary of the National Indian Child Welfare Association (NICWA) after being elected to the position at the NICWA National Conference in April 2010. Her duties include recording the minutes of the meeting of the board and the meetings of the members; keeping the minutes of each meeting in a file; sending copies of the minutes of each meeting to each director; giving, when required, notice of meetings of the board or meeting of the members; maintaining an official listing of current directors, current members and existing committees; making provisions for handling all correspondence to and from the corporation; keeping a file of all reports of the corporation; being a custodian of the corporation's records and the seal of the corporation; and other duties prescribed by the board.



Ettawageshik, a Harbor Springs, MI, resident, has been in NICWA since 2007, is a member of the NICWA Executive Committee, is the Chair of the Governor's Committee for NICWA and is the Vice Chairman of LTBB's NICWA Commission. NICWA is a national voice for American Indian children and families.

NICWA was created to protect the most valuable resource of Indian people -Indian children; to promote safe, healthy and culturally strong environments for Indian kids; to promote the spiritual strength of Indian children and a positive cultural identity; to be a strong voice for the needs of Indian children and Indian child welfare programs nationwide; to advocate for and facilitate the proper implementation of the Indian Child Welfare Act; to promote the provision of effective services to Indian children by child welfare workers; to provide technical assistance for and information sharing among Indian child welfare programs; and to provide education and leadership opportunities for Indian child welfare workers. Ettawageshik worked for the State of Michigan for 33 years before her retirement with six of those years working

NICWA led much of the advocacy for the Fostering Connections to Success and Increasing Adoptions Act, passed by Congress on September 22, 2008. It generated significant improvements to the nation's child welfare system, including creating direct access for tribal governments to this country's largest child welfare program, the Title IV-E Foster Care and Adoption Assistance program.

This groundbreaking legislation marked the most sweeping Congressional reform of the U.S. foster care system in more than a decade. The legislation, spanning several areas of foster care reform, allows tribal governments to directly access Title IV-E federal funds for foster care and adoption assistance for the first time since the enactment of the Title IV-E program in 1981. The legislation also provides tribal access to new funding for guardianship placements involving relative caregivers and independent living funding.


"It took more than 20 years to get that passed," Ettawageshik said. "It was a hard fought victory won for our people because it meant tribes can exercise their sovereignty and request funding directly from the federal government instead of having to request funding from the states like they had to do prior to the legislation being passed."

Former Sault Tribe Chief of Police Convicted of Fraud

In a U.S. Department of Justice press release dated July 23, 2010, U.S. Attorney Donald A. Davis announced Frederick James Paquin, the former Chief of Police of the Sault Tribe of Chippewa Indians' police department, pleaded guilty to conspiracy to defraud the United States by dishonest means.

An investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) and the Department of Justice's Office of Inspector General (OIG) revealed Paquin and his Office Manager, Hope H. Schlehuber, at the tribal police department obtained grants from the U.S. Department of Justice in order to fund the tribal police department's serious unmet financial needs. However, rather than comply with the terms of the grants, Paquin and Schlehuber created elaborate dummy purchases that resulted in payments from these grants to numerous vendors of police equipment and uniforms where the funds were maintained as "credits" to the tribal police department. These funds were no longer subject to oversight by the tribal accounting department or the Department of Justice once transferred to the vendors under the guise of actual purchases. Paquin was then able to use the funds at any time and in any way he saw fit regardless of the terms of the grants. Paquin faces a sentence of up to five years in prison as a result of this conviction. In addition, he will be required to pay restitution to the tribe and the U.S. Department of Justice. He will be sentenced by U.S. District Judge R. Allan Edgar on December 13, 2010.

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


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
