- WHEREAS** the Waganakising Odawak Nation, known as the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, and its citizens are vested with inherent sovereignty and right to self-governance;
- WHEREAS** the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians ("LTBB" or "Tribe") is a federally recognized Indian Tribe under Public Law 103-324, and is a party to numerous Treaties with the United States the most recent of which being the Treaty of Washington of March 28, 1836 (7 Stat. 491) and the Treaty of Detroit of 1855 (11 Stat. 621);
- WHEREAS** the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Tribal Council is the elected legislative body of the Tribe;
- WHEREAS** the Tribe's treaty delineated reservation area encompasses approximately 336 square miles in Northwestern-Lower Michigan;
- WHEREAS** the LTBB relies on environmental protection (including wetland protection) for the health of Tribal members and cultural perpetuation and this continues to be threatened by the ever increasing popularity of the area both as a tourist/resort area or relocation for permanent residence within the reservation area;
- WHEREAS** LTBB recognizes the need to prevent infestation of and reduce the transport and spreading of invasive species targeting aquatic vegetation within the Lake Michigan and Lake Huron Watersheds;
- WHEREAS** the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Environmental Services Department is eligible for funding from the United States Environmental Protection Agency Great Lakes Restoration Initiative Project to address significant Great Lakes ecosystem problems and efforts, including the Invasive Species Prevention and Control Grant Program.
