establish Michigan's first Anishinaabemowin language


class in a public school setting, at Harbor Springs High School. He also published books on the Odawa language to help revitalize and preserve our language (see book-cover below).

In January of 2005, Ray was recognized by the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians as fluent Odawa speaker. He credited his

Nookimis (Grandmother) Mary Ann for teaching him all about the Odawa language. Mary Ann did not speak English (she is pictured here >>>>).

Ray and his wife Mary Jane (Chingwa) married in 1966. She was a big supporter of Raymond and his passion for the Odawa language.

Raymond walked on July 23, 2014. He will always be remembered for his kindness, and for his lifelong passion for the Odawa language.
