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5	SECTION I. PURPOSE
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7	The purpose of this Statute is to set out the roles and functions of the Legal Department in
8	accordance with the LTBB Constitution. This Statute repeals and replaces WOS 2014-008

15 16	SECTION II. DEFINITIONS
17	A. "Constitution" or "Tribal Constitution" means the Constitution of the Little Traverse
18	Bay Bands of Odawa Indians as adopted on February 1, 2005, and any amendments thereto.
19	buy builds of Oddwid Indians as adopted on Feordary 1, 2000, and any amendments defeto.
20	<b>B.</b> "Department" means Enjinaaknegeng, the Legal Department.
21	
22	C. "Executive" means the Tribal Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Executive
23	Branch created under Article VIII of the Constitution, including their designees.
24	
25	<b>D.</b> " <b>Tribal Citizen</b> " means an enrolled member of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa
26	Indians.
27	
28	<b>E. "Tribal Council"</b> or <b>"Council"</b> means the elected body of the Little Traverse Bay Bands
29	of Odawa Indians to carry out legislative powers under Article VII of the Constitution.
30	
31	F. "Tribe" or "LTBB" means the Waganakising Odawa, also known as the Little Traverse
32	Bay Bands of Odawa Indians.

1	SECTION III. LEGAL DEPARTMENT AUTHORITY
2	
3	A. In accordance with Constitution, the Legal Department is under the authority of Tribal
4	Council, Article VII (D)(14), but shall be available to assist the Executive and Executive
5	Departments as set forth in this Statute.
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7	<b>B.</b> The Department shall be made up of a General Counsel, Legislative Services Attorney,
8	and Citizens Legal Assistance Attorney.
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10 11	SECTION IV. LEGAL DEPARTMENT DUTIES
11	SECTION IV. LEGAL DEI ARTMENT DUTIES
12	<b>A.</b> The General Counsel shall provide legal services, counsel and representation of LTBB on
13	legal matters, as per contract and/or job description, which may include, but not limited to,
15	negotiations with federal, state, local and tribal governmental entities, issues relating to
16	economic development, reserved Treaty rights, Indian child welfare policy, litigation, and work
17	with subordinate Tribal entities including Tribally Chartered Corporations, Enterprises,
18	Executive Departments, and Executive Commissions, Committees and Boards.
19	
20	<b>B.</b> The Legislative Services Attorney shall provide legal services to Tribal Council and Tribal
21	Council Committees as per contract, statute, and/or job description which may include, but not
22	limited to, assisting one or more Tribal Councilors or committee members with drafting of
23	Resolutions, Statutes, Certified Motions, policies, procedures, Legislative Directives,
24	Declarations, Special Tributes, agreements, proposals, legal memorandums, MOUs, leases and
25	contracts; provide legal advice in order to promote and protect Tribal Sovereignty, Tribal Self-
26	sufficiency, and Tribal Self-determination; provide representation of Tribal Council in
27	negotiations and court; and provide advice and analysis of the Tribal Constitution, Tribal Codes,
28	state and federal laws and regulations for the Tribe and Tribal Council.
29	
30	<b>C.</b> In the event that the Tribal government, or any Legislative or Executive officials or staff
31	are sued in their official capacity, General Counsel and/or Legislative Services Attorney shall
32	defend such suits and ensure that Tribal Council receives proper notification, and shall raise
33	sovereign immunity as a defense unless Tribal Council has taken an action to expressly waive
34	sovereign immunity for the type of claim or specific case.

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2	D.	Assig	nments may be dispersed between General Counsel and Legislative Services
3	Attorney based on allocation of resources and areas of expertise, as recommended by the		
4	Depart	ment a	nd allocated by Tribal Council.

6	Е.	Gener	al Counsel and Legislative Services Attorney may also utilize outside attorneys and
7	consul	tants w	ithin a budget adopted by Tribal Council within the scope of Tribal Council
8	approv	ed litig	ation or other approved activities. Any attorney contracts in excess of five-
9	thousa	nd doll	ars, (\$5,000) must be individually approved by Tribal Council.

11	F.	Gener	al Counsel and Legislative Services Attorney will provide current updates to the
12	Tribal	Counc	il on legal matters taken on behalf of the Tribe and any recommendations for final
13	actions	s, that r	equire Tribal Council approval under the Constitution, shall be presented to the
14	Tribal	Counc	il prior to that action being taken.

16	G.	Citize	ns Legal Assistance Attorney shall provide advice and assistance to Tribal Citizens
17	on lega	al issue	s, provide legal guidance and draft documents, but cannot appear in Court on
18	behalf	of Trib	al Citizens. The Citizens Legal Assistance Attorney shall maintain the attorney-
19	client p	privileg	ge relationship with respect to all communications between it and any Citizen it
20	service	es and 1	may assist with the following:

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10	The De	epartment shall begin operations with current attorneys and staff of the Legal Department,	
11	Legisla	ative Services Attorney Office and Office of the Citizens Legal Assistance.

14	SECT	ION VII. BUDGET, PERSONNEL and ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS

16	<b>A.</b>	The Legislative Services Attorney, working with staff shall present the Department's

18	Modifi	cation Process, or as amended.

27	D.	Attorneys hiring and/or employment contracts must be approved by the Tribal Council, in

30	Е.	Carry-Over Reserve Funds

32		1. Unspent annual budgeted funds for the Department shall carry over to the	
33		following year. The Department, as directed by Tribal Council, may utilize the	
34		cumulated funds for additional legal services or expense. Any carryover funds not	

1	expended will be carried to future years indefinitely unless otherwise re-appropriated by		
2	the Tribal Council. The Department shall provide reports quarterly or as otherwise		
3	requested by Tribal Council, on the status of the amounts and expenditures of these carry-		
4	over funds.		
5			
6	2. If Tribal Council makes a special appropriation for a distinct project or specific		
7	litigation, such specially appropriated funds will carry over as long as the original		
8	approved litigation or project is still ongoing. At the conclusion of all approved litigation		
9	or project costs the remaining specific appropriated funds will revert to General Fund-		
10	Funds Balance unless Tribal Council directs otherwise.		
11			
12	<b>F.</b> Under the supervision of the Legislative Services Attorney, administrative function for		
13	the Department will be through the Legislative Branch, as appropriate.

24	SECTION IX. SAVINGS CLAUSE		
25			
26	In the event that any section, subsection or phrase of this Statute is found by a court of competent		
27	jurisdiction to violate the Constitution or laws of the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa		
28	Indians, such part shall be considered to stand alone and to be deleted from this Statute, the		
29	entirety of the balance of the Statute to remain in full and binding force and effect so long as the		
30	overall intent of the Statute remains intact.		
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33	SECTION X. EFFECTIVE DATE		
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1	Effective upon signature of the Executive or 30 days from Tribal Council approval whichever
2	comes first or if the Executive vetoes the legislation, then upon Tribal Council override of the
3	veto.
