She won the Miss Virginia Teen USA 2013 competition in November 2012, won the Miss Virginia High School America competition in October 2011and finished seventh at the Miss High School America competition in March 2012.

Miller-Keyes, a senior at Stafford High School in Fredericksburg, VA, participates in the National Honor Society, Key Club and Students Against Drunk Driving. She will attend Regent University, majoring in biology and hopes to become an anesthesiologist.

Caelynn Miller-Keyes, 17, took time out of her busy schedule to answer our questions.

Odawa Trails: When and how did you become interested in competing in pageants? Caelynn Miller-Keyes: "I began competing in pageants about two years ago. I was introduced to pageantry through

one of my best friends, and after competing for the first time, I fell in love with it all."

Odawa Trails: How many pageants have you competed in?

Caelynn Miller-Keyes: "Miss Virginia Teen USA was my eighth pageant."

Odawa Trails: What do you enjoy the most about doing it?

Caelynn Miller-Keyes: "I enjoy everything about pageants, other than five hour rehearsals, but the best part is all of the people I have had the pleasure of meeting. I've met many professional people- from other contestants, judges, pageant and clothing sponsors to winners from previous pageants. Working in pageants has given me the opportunity to showcase my Native American heritage; the judges are always curious about my background. It also has helped me boost my confidence."

As part of the Crooked Tree Youth Leadership Program, students from three Emmet County, MI, high schools attended the morning session of the November 18, 2012 LTBB Tribal Council meeting held in the Tribal Council Chambers at the LTBB Governmental Center in Harbor Springs, MI.

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Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians

The program is sponsored by LTBB, the Emmet County Board of Commissioners and Michigan State University Extension and gives students an opportunity to learn about local and state government through attending presentations and meetings and going on field trips.

It includes an introduction to tribal government (LTBB) and an introduction to county government (Emmet County) as well as attending the Michigan 4-H Capitol Experience to be held March 17-20, 2013 at the State Capitol in Lansing, MI. The Michigan 4-H Capitol Experience will include the students having breakfast with a State Senator or State Representative and visiting lobbyists, state agencies and state departments.

The 10 youth, who are participating in the leadership program, are primarily from Pellston High School in Pellston, MI, Harbor Springs High School in Harbor Springs, MI, and Petoskey High School in Petoskey, MI. They were

- 1. Make laws necessary to exercise Tribal jurisdiction, including civil and criminal authority and the regulation of commerce;
- 2. Approve/disapprove policies, resolutions and regulations presented from the Executive branch;
- 3. Provide by law for jurisdiction over Indian Child Welfare matters and all other domestic re-
- lations matters;
  4. Enact laws governing the

issuance of the charters of incorporation for economic or other purposes, and to regulate the activities of these corporations;

- 5. Implement, by statute the inherent right to exclude person(s) or other parties from Tribal lands;
- 6. Adopt rules of conduct to govern all levels of Tribal government;
- 7. Establish rules and procedures to provide access for review of the records of LTBB by the membership unless specifically excluded by this Constitution or applicable law;
- 8. Enact laws governing the encumbrance of lands or other intangible assets, and the encumbrance and disposition of non-real estate tangible assets;
- 9. Purchase, receive by gift, or otherwise acquire land, interests in land, personal property or other intangible assets which the Council may deem beneficial to LTBB:
- 10. Request lands be placed in trust with the United States for the benefit of the Tribe when the Council deems beneficial to the Tribe:
- 11. Approve land use plans and zoning of lands;
- 12. Approve leases for Tribally owned land and lands held in trust;
- 13. Approve all sales, or dispositions of Tribal lands, provided that such sale or disposition must also be approved by a majority vote by referendum, or by a quorum at an annual membership meeting;
- 14. Employ legal counsel;
- 15. Approve the filing of lawsuits in the name of the Tribe as proposed by the Executive, provided; the Council may approve the filing of a lawsuit in the name of the Tribe without Executive concurrence by an affirmative vote of six (6) members of the Council;
- 16. Establish committees, commissions, and boards, and approve appointments as presented by the Executive. The Council shall develop laws setting out qualifications for appointees and ensuring that the Tribal membership is given reasonable notification of available positions;
- 17. Establish and maintain government offices for the Tribe;
- 18. Appropriate funds, and enact a budget formulation statute that allows for public input from

## News from the Health Department

We said goodbye to a very valued employee, our Substance Counselor, Abuse Susan Yates. Sue retired after 13 years of service to the LTBB community. We were very sorry to see her go, but we wish her well on the next phase of her life!

We would like to welcome the newest member of our team, Jody Ginop. Jody is the new Licensed Professional Counselor in Mental Health. Welcome Jody!

If you have not done so, it is not too late to get your seasonal influenza vaccine. Seasonal flu activity peaks in January, February or later, which makes receiving your flu shot now even more important. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

recommends everyone six months or older should get a flu vaccine each year.

The United States Congress designated January as Cervical Health Awareness Month. According to the National Cancer Institute, Native American woman have the second-highest cervical cancer death rate among all ethnic groups. However, if it is detected early, cervical cancer is one of the most successfully treatable cancers.

Being vaccinated before exposure to the HPV virus helps protect women against cervical cancer and the precancerous lesions that precede it. The National Cervical Cancer Coalition (NCCC) recommends all girls and young women ages 11-26 be vaccinated against HPV to prevent cervical cancer. Also, regular pap tests will help detect any precancerous or abnormal cells early enough, so cervical cancer can be prevented. Together, vaccination and screening can save lives.

## Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement CERTIFICATE REDEMPTION UPDATE

Submitted by the Trust Fund Board

It has been more than a decade since the original Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement certificates were issued.

All adults have been paid or they have deferred payment to a later date, however, tribal children who were enrolled before December 16, 1997 but had not yet turned 18 are still in the process of redeeming their certificates.

The following steps are intended to aid in this process. Redeeming certificates from the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act, Public Law 105-143, are as follows:

- 1. Determine your eligibility: Tribal citizens who were enrolled, but had not reached the age of 18 on December 16, 1997 are eligible to redeem their certificates upon reaching the age of 18.
- 2. Sign your certificates with a notary: The tribal citizen redeeming his or her certificates must have a notarized signature.
- 3. Copy two pieces of identification: One piece of identification (e.g. Driver's license) must have a picture, and the second piece needs at least your signature.
- 4. Mail your signed certificates, the mailing address you would like your check sent to and two pieces of identification to the following address

10 tips to a great plate



**Making food choices for a healthy lifestyle can be as simple as using these 10 Tips.** Use the ideas in this list to *balance your calories*, to choose foods to *eat more often*, and to cut back on foods to *eat less often*.

balance calories
Find out how many calories YOU need for a day
as a first step in managing your weight. Go to
www.ChooseMyPlate.gov to find your calorie level. Being
physically active also helps you balance calories.

enjoy your food, but eat less
Take the time to fully enjoy
your food as you eat it. Eating
too fast or when your attention is
elsewhere may lead to eating too
many calories. Pay attention to hunger
and fullness cues before, during, and after meals. Use
them to recognize when to eat and when you've had

avoid oversized portions

Use a smaller plate, bowl, and glass. Portion out foods before you eat. When eating out, choose a smaller size option, share a dish, or take home part of your meal.

Eat more vegetables, fruits, whole grains, and fat-free or 1% milk and dairy products. These foods have the nutrients you need for health—including potassium, calcium, vitamin D, and fiber. Make them the

Choose red, orange, and dark-green vegetables like tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and broccoli, along with other vegetables for your meals. Add fruit to meals as part of main or side dishes or as dessert.

switch to fat-free or low-fat (1%) milk
They have the same amount of calcium and other essential nutrients as whole milk, but fewer calories and less saturated fat.



make half your grains whole grains
To eat more whole grains, substitute a whole-grain

# kid-friendly veggies and fruits

10 tips for making healthy foods more fun for children

Encourage children to eat vegetables and fruits by making it fun. Provide healthy ingredients and let kids help with preparation, based on their age and skills. Kids may try foods they avoided in the past if they helped

smoothie creations
Blend fat-free or low-fat yogurt or milk with fruit pieces and crushed ice. Use fresh, frozen, canned, and even overripe fruits. Try bananas, berries, peaches, and/or pineapple. If you freeze the fruit first, you can even skip the ice!

delicious dippers
Kids love to dip their foods. Whip up a quick dip
for veggies with yogurt and seasonings such as
herbs or garlic. Serve with raw vegetables like broccoli,
carrots, or cauliflower. Fruit chunks go great with
a yogurt and cinnamon or vanilla dip.

acaterpillar kabobs

Assemble chunks of melon, apple, orange, and pear on skewers for a fruity kabob. For a raw veggie version, use vegetables like zucchini, cucumber, squash, sweet peppers, or tomatoes.

personalized pizzas
Set up a pizza-making station in the kitchen. Use whole-wheat English muffins, bagels, or pita bread as the crust. Have tomato sauce, low-fat cheese, and cut-up vegetables or fruits for toppings. Let kids choose their own favorites. Then pop the pizzas into the oven to warm.

Fruity peanut butterfly

Start with carrot sticks or celery for the body. Attach wings made of thinly sliced apples with peanut butter

and decorate with halved grapes or dried fruit.

frosty fruits

Frozen treats are bound to be popular in the warm months. Just put fresh fruits such as melon chunks in the freezer (rinse first). Make "popsicles" by inserting sticks into peeled bananas and freezing.

bugs on a log

Use celery, cucumber, or carrot sticks as the log and add peanut butter. Top with dried fruit such as raisins, cranberries, or cherries, depending on what bugs you want!

nomemade trail mix

Skip the pre-made trail mix and make your own. Use your favorite nuts and dried fruits, such as unsalted peanuts, cashews, walnuts, or sunflower seeds mixed with dried apples, pineapple, cherries, apricots, or raisins. Add whole-grain cereals to the mix, too.

potato person
Decorate half a baked potato. Use sliced cherry
tomatoes, peas, and low-fat cheese on the potato
to make a funny face.

put kids in charge
Ask your child to name new veggie or fruit creations.
Let them arrange raw veggies or fruits into a fun
shape or design.

LTBB Tribal Great Lakes Commercial Fishers WAGANAKISING ODAWAK STATUTE 2004-02 **Commercial Fishing Vessel Safety** 

The LTBB Natural Resource Department (NRD) would like to remind all tribal commercial fishermen to please be mindful of the above mentioned statute, which in the introduction, states in part:

"In order to protect members engaged in commercial fishing pursuant to the rights reserved in the Treaty of 1836 and in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding with the United States Coast Guard (USCG), the Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians (LTBB) hereby enacts this Statute in an attempt to decrease the potential of death, personnel injury, and or property damage that may be associated with the high risk activity of commercial fishing. Any duly licensed LTBB commercial fisherman shall ensure that he and any vessel he may operate are in full compliance with these safety provisions."

So, please be advised, LTBB or USCG Enforcement Officers may terminate the fishing vessel's voyage and instruct the captain, owner or operator of the vessel to return the vessel to a mooring, dock or shore until the hazardous condition is corrected.

So, in summary, fishers are required to have their vessels inspected and receive a safety placard, which is valid for two years, if they operate their vessels beyond the "3 miles from shore" line. As of October 16, 2012, you must be able to demonstrate your vessel in compliance with current safety regulations or you could be subject to civil penalties, termination of the vessel's voyage or other operational controls.

All LTBB Commercial Fishers are encouraged to contact the LTBB NRD at 231-242-1670 to request a vessel Safety Examination to become compliant and avoid any further enforcement action.

## Tax Agreement Information

By Theresa Keshick, Department of Commerce Assis-

The Department of Commerce (DOC) would like to remind the tribal membership about a few items pertaining to the Tax Agreement.

First of all, I cannot express enough how important it is to keep your address updated.

The first step in becoming a Resident Tribal Member (RTM) is to officially change your address with the Enrollment Department. This must be done in writing and as soon as possible.

The DOC cannot and will not change the estimated beginning date (EBD) (which is always the first in any given month) of a member's tax exempt status (see example be-

It is YOUR responsibility to update your address on file with the Enrollment Department. This date will affect how many months you will be able

to file the Annual Resident Tribal Member Sales Tax Credit (Tribal Form 4013). It is to your benefit to be able to file for the maximum number of months for this credit.

In addition, being an RTM will allow you to purchase large items such as vehicles, boats, motorcycles and off the road vehicles tax exempt.

There is a form that needs to be filled out called a "Request for TCE" (Tribal Certificate of Exemption), which is available in my office. Once this form is completely filled out, I will then issue the RTM the actual Tribal Certificate of Exemption (Tribal Form 3998).

If you plan on purchasing any of these items, please contact me FIRST, and I will be happy to get you the form via e-mail or fax. I am also able to fax the TCEs to the dealership you are doing business with.

Being an RTM will also allow you to be tax exempt on utility bills such as phone, cable, gas, propane, electricity, satellite and cellular service. If you have not filled out a Utility Provider Survey, please contact the DOC, and I will be happy to get one

Also, another important thing to remember is if you do move into the Tax Agreement Area (TAA), your RTM status does NOT take effect until the first day of the following month.

Example: I move to Petoskey, MI, (inside the TAA) on September 5, 2010. My RTM (EBD) status begins October 1, 2010. All updates are sent to the State of Michigan as close to the end of the month as possible.

south side of Petoskey, MI, near the Big Boy restaurant. Please note: Exemption for tobacco and fuel is for LTBB Tribal Members' sole consumption ONLY!

IMPORTANT REMINDER: TRIBAL MEMBERS ARE NOT ALLOWED TO USE THEIR TRIBAL ID SWIPE CARDS FOR PURCHASES OF NON-MEMBERS NOR ARE THEY ALLOWED TO LEND THEIR CARDS OUT TO ANYONE.

The current limit on tobacco purchases is four cartons per week per tribal citizen age 18 and over. The same applies to all other tobacco products (OTP) packaged in similar fashion.





# 13 Giizisoon - Thirteen Moons

Giizisoon, the moons or months, are not a standardized, uniform or official designation of names. The names of the moons vary, geographically and otherwise. Also, the seasons seem to have shifted a bit. So, don't be surprised if the moons given here differ from what you know or what you've seen. You may know it by another name or remember what the elders used to call the month. If so, we'd like to hear from you to document input from other tribal speakers. 

## From the Desk of the Tribal Chairman Dexter McNamara

THE GREY WOLF

SENATE BLAST OUT WOLF HUNTING BILL: Michigan is one step closer to establishing a wolf hunting season as the Senate passed legislation on November 30, 2012.

Senate Bill 1350, sponsored by Senator Tom Casperson (R-Escanaba), would designate wolves as a game animal and would permit the Natural Resources Commission (NRC) to establish a hunting season as its only entity which can do so. Casperson said he thinks it's necessary as wolves prowl cities and towns in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

The bill passed 23-15 with Senators Roger Kahn (R-Saginaw), Mike Nofs (R-Battle Creek), John Pappageorge (R-Troy), Tonya Schuitmaker (R-Lawton) and John Gleason (D-Flushing) crossing over.

Casperson said he doesn't believe the bill, if it goes into law, will lead to a "full-blown, everybody hunts wolves" scenario. Casperson expects a regional hunt, especially, in areas in the Upper Peninsula. He said he's optimistic about the bill passing the House.

The Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians Natural Resource Commission, the Tribal Council and the Executive have submitted opposition for the hunt of the grey wolf.

#### SUMMARY OF K. HAR-RINGTON VS. LTBB TRIB-AL COUNCILORS DECI-SION

On November 29, 2012, the LTBB Tribal Court issued an important opinion, written by Associate Judge James Genia, about how decisions to spend tribal funds must be made

The case was brought by my predecessor, Ken Harrington, against the LTBB Tribal Council. He asserted the Tribal Council was making decisions about appropriating funds by amending funding resolutions which the Council had passed previously. The Council was amending these resolutions by a simple motion

at Council Meetings.

Mr. Ken Harrington argued according to our Tribal Constitution, any change in how funds were appropriated had to be made through the formal resolution process, not by passing simple motions. The difference is the Tribal Chairman has the opportunity to approve or veto a resolution, but not a simple motion. Not allowing the Tribal Chairman this authority removes an important check and balance from the process of making government spending decisions. It deprives me, as your Tribal Chairman, of the opportunity to carefully watch over how your dollars are spent.

The Tribal Court agreed and struck down the section of the Administrative Procedures Statute in which the Tribal Council had granted itself the authority to change funding resolutions by simple motion. The Tribal Court ruled any appropriation decision which did not allow an opportunity for the Tribal Chairman to approve or veto the decision was UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

Ultimately, I believe a strong set of checks and balances will result in better decisions about how tribal government spends tribal funds. I applaud the Tribal Court's decision, and I hope to work with Tribal Council to move forward in implementing this decision for the benefit of all.

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

LANSING, Mich. —The Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians on November 12 asked a federal judge to dismiss the State of Michigan's lawsuit seeking to block the tribe from starting the process to take land into trust under the Michigan Indian Land Claims Settlement Act for a Lansing casino.

State Attorney General Bill Schuette on September 7 filed a lawsuit in the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Michigan in an apparent effort to stop the Lansing casino project that would create 2,200 good jobs and generate enough revenue to pay four years of college for all Lansing public school students.

The tribe asked U.S. District Court Judge Robert J. Jonker to dismiss the lawsuit, arguing it is totally without merit.

"The essence of our motion is this: Because the state's lawsuit is utterly without merit, it should be dismissed and dismissed quickly," said Sault Tribe Chairperson Aaron Payment.

Despite the litigation, the City of Lansing and the tribe continue to move full speed ahead on all plans for the casino.

On November 1, the city and tribe completed a critical step in their effort to win federal approval of the \$245 million casino, which will be built adjacent to the Lansing Center in the heart of the city's entertainment district. On that day, the tribe completed the agreement to purchase the city-owned land adjacent to the Lansing Center where the casino will be built.

Pending the outcome of the litigation, the tribe will soon apply to the federal government to take the land into trust, clearing the way for the construction of the 125,000-square-foot casino. The casino is expected to create an estimated 1,500 permanent jobs at the property and more than 700 construction jobs.

The Sault Tribe has successfully operated Indian casinos in the state since 1984 and currently owns five Kewadin Casino properties in the Upper Peninsula. With more than 40,000 members, the Sault Tribe is the largest federally-recognized tribe east of the Mississippi and one of the largest job providers in Northern Michigan with 1,900 employees at its casinos, other businesses and tribal government agencies.

The tribe will use casino revenues to improve programs and services to members, including health care, education, housing, elder care, social services and more. The City of Lansing will use its annual revenue payments from the facility to create the Lansing Promise, a program to fund four-year college scholarships for Lansing School District graduates. The land transaction completed on November 1 includes a parcel adjacent to

# Mayor Bernero, Sault Tribe Chairman Payment Announce Completed Land Purchase for Casino Project

Editor's note: The following is a Sault Tribe of Chippewa Indians press release dated November 1, 2012.

Sault Tribe Will Now Apply to Federal Government to Take Land into Trust

LANSING, Mich. —The City of Lansing and the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians today completed a critical step in their effort to win federal approval of a casino in downtown Lansing, city and tribal officials announced.

The tribe today completed the agreement to purchase city-owned land adjacent to the Lansing Center where the casino will be built. Lansing Mayor Virg Bernero, Sault Tribe Chairperson Aaron Payment, and Bob Liggett -owner of Big Boy restaurants across Michigan and former owner of the very successful Lansing-based radio station WFMK -- signed documents today completing the transfer of the land to the tribe's ownership. Liggett is the main investor in the project and owns a majority of Lansing Future Development, LLC, the Sault Tribe's partner in the project.

"I'm thrilled to have this opportunity to finalize the transfer of land to the Sault Tribe of Chippewa Indians, our partner in this game-changing project," Bernero said. "While we still have a long way to go, today's milestone gets us one step closer to building a project that will help boost the economic revitalization of Michigan's capital city and transform our downtown into a major entertainment destination. Our eyes are on the prize - this project will create thousands of good jobs, attract tens of thousands of tourists to the region, and generate enough revenue to allow our city to send all of our school district graduates to college through the Lansing Promise."

The tribe will now apply to the federal government to take the land into trust, clearing the way for the construction of the \$245 million casino, which will be built in the heart of the city's entertainment district, adjacent to the Lansing Center. The 125,000-square-foot casino will create an estimated 1,500 permanent jobs at the property and more than 700 construction jobs.

"We wouldn't be to this point in the process if it wasn't for the team of professionals involved," Lansing Future Development's CEO Bill Martines said. "The city's department heads, the private professionals representing the city and the developer, and the Sault Tribe's staff, have countless hours invested. At the end of the day, this project will be successful because of the expertise and commitment from

these individuals."

"This is a wonderful day for the members of the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians," Payment said. "We continue to move aggressively on this project, and we will file our land trust application as soon as possible. We are grateful to have the city and people of Lansing as partners in this important endeavor. By exercising our sovereign government's legal right to develop a casino, we will be creating a project that will generate significant economic benefits for Sault Tribe members in addition to creating thousands of good jobs."

The Sault Tribe has successfully operated Indian casinos in the state since 1984 and currently owns five Kewadin Casino properties in the Upper Peninsula. With more than 40,000 members, the Sault Tribe is the largest federally-recognized tribe east of the Mississippi and one of the largest job providers in Northern Michigan with 1,900 employees at its casinos, other businesses and tribal government agencies.


The tribe will file an application with the U.S. Department of the Interior to take the land into trust as tribal lands under a specific provision of the federal Land Claims Act that gives only the Sault Tribe the legal right to the process. The tribe intends to open the casino after receiving federal approval.

ceiving federal approval. The tribe will use casino revenues to improve programs and services to members, including health care, education, housing, elder care, social services and more. The City of Lansing will use its annual revenue payments from the facility to create the Lansing Promise, a program to fund four-year college scholarships for Lansing School District graduates. The land transaction completed today includes a parcel adjacent to the Lansing Center at Michigan Avenue and Larch, which the tribe acquired for a total cost of \$280,000 plus \$9,000 in closing costs. The purchase price reflects the full fair market value of the land. The agreement between the city and tribe is for the tribe to close on the other two parcels of land over time at a price already agreed to by all parties, assuming all approvals for the project are secured.

Plans for the casino include up to 3,000 slot machines and 48 table games, and assorted bars and restaurants in an urban modern-themed property. The project has been approved by the Lansing City Council, the Sault Tribe Board of Directors and the Sault Tribe membership in a tribal referendum held earlier this

year.

with consultants, Tribal Council passed a motion by a 7-2 vote (Secretary Regina Gasco-Bentley and Councilor Winnay Wemigwase voted no and Councilor Winnay Wemigwase commented: I feel that the \$40,000 could purchase quite a few hearing aids or fulfill other needs of our people) to approve the letter to the Village of Mackinaw City as prepared by General Counsel Bransky dated November 18, 2012.

Tribal Council briefly stopped the aforementioned discussion to exchange introductions with the youth and those accompanying them. After introductions, Proctor briefly spoke about the leadership program.



"There is a model of this program in Genesee County (Michigan), and we based it on that," Proctor said. "It's a great program. It's a great resource for our youth. I want to thank the Title VII Indian Education Coordinators for helping us find students who were interested in participating. I also want to thank our partners in this program."

Legislative Leader Melvin L. Kiogima explained how the Tribal Councilors were elected for four-year terms with the Council Officers elected every two years, explained how the meeting was conducted and then continued with the meeting as usual. He indicated there would be a question and answer period right before the meeting recessed for lunch where the students could ask the Tribal Councilors questions.

At 10:28 a.m., a recess was called with the meeting resuming at 11:01 a.m. During the recess, the youth enjoyed breakfast and snacks in the Com-

mons Area courtesy of the Elders Program. The Elders Program provides breakfast and snacks because it offers transportation to LTBB Elders who wish to attend the morning session of Tribal Council meetings.

This particular Sunday, there was a language immersion class in the Commons Area due to work being done at the LTBB Community Center where the class is normally held. The language instructor explained what language immersion involved, how the class was conducted and how she travels to different Native communities to teach language immersion classes.

When the meeting resumed, Kiogima continued with his Legislative Leader report. The Legislative Leader report was followed by the Secretary Report given by Secretary Regina Gasco-Bentley, the Treasurer's Report given by Treasurer John Bott, and Tribal Council travel reports given by Secretary Regina Gasco-Bentley, Councilor Winnay Wemigwase and Councilor Belinda Bardwell.

At 11:36 a.m., the youth asked Tribal Council questions. The questions ranged from the proposed Mackinaw City casino, the requirements for being elected to Tribal Council, how LTBB administers its benefits to tribal citizens and if any benefits are available through LTBB for members of other federally recognized tribes, how the youth could submit a letter of support to oppose the proposed gray wolf hunt in Michigan, what being the Tribal Council Secretary entails, what safeguards are in place for confidential materials contained on the Tribal Councilors' laptop computers, what would happen if a Tribal Councilor was arrested and what the highest leadership role on Tribal Council is. Tribal Council answered all of their questions, and the morning session of the meeting concluded.

The leadership program began on September 24, 2012 and will conclude on May 9, 2013. The students received an introduction to tribal government (LTBB) on September 24, 2012, visited the tribal government (LTBB) offices on October 22, 2012 and attended the Tribal Council meeting on November 18, 2012. On April 22, 2013, the group will work together to identify community issues and propose possible action plans to address the issues. The group will then give a presentation to Tribal Council on May 4, 2013 to share the issues they felt were most important to tribal leaders and to make recommendations for action. The group will make a similar presentation to the Emmet County Commissioners on May 9, 2013.



# HOUSING DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

Services are available to citizens residing within the 27 county service area. An application packet must be completed and returned to the Housing Dept. for processing to determine qualification. To obtain an application, please contact the Housing Dept. at 231-242-1540.

**Short Term Rental Assistance:** This program offers up to \$1,500 for new tenants who need assistance with the first month's rent and/or security deposit. This can be used ONE TIME ONLY and the rent requested must be affordable and can NOT exceed 35% of the household gross monthly income. Please note the application packet must be received and approved in advance of your moving into the rental in order to qualify for this program.

Home Improvement Program: This program offers up to \$2,500 for non-cosmetic home repairs and may be utilized once every five years.

**Down Payment Assistance:** This program offers up to \$2,500 or 10% of your mortgage (whichever is less) and can be used to purchase or refinance a home. In order for you to receive any grant dollars, you must be able to match the grant amount with your own guaranteed funds.

**Foreclosure Prevention Program:** This program offers up to \$3,000 to assist in foreclosure prevention.

Well & Septic Assistance Program: Funded by the Indian Health Services located in Sault Ste. Marie, MI this program provides the resources and technical assistance associated with the installation of a new well and sanitation service or replacement of deficient existing well/septic.

**Credit Counseling:** We provide confidential advice and referrals to assist tribal citizens in regaining their financial stability and credibility.

**Tribal Rental Housing Program:** The LTBB Housing Department offers 29 rental units in the Northern Michigan area. These units are available to rent to Tribal Citizens and most rents are based on a family's monthly income. Any Tribal Citizen interested in renting a unit from the LTBB Housing Department should contact our offices for an application. Currently, there is a waiting list for available units.

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
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
